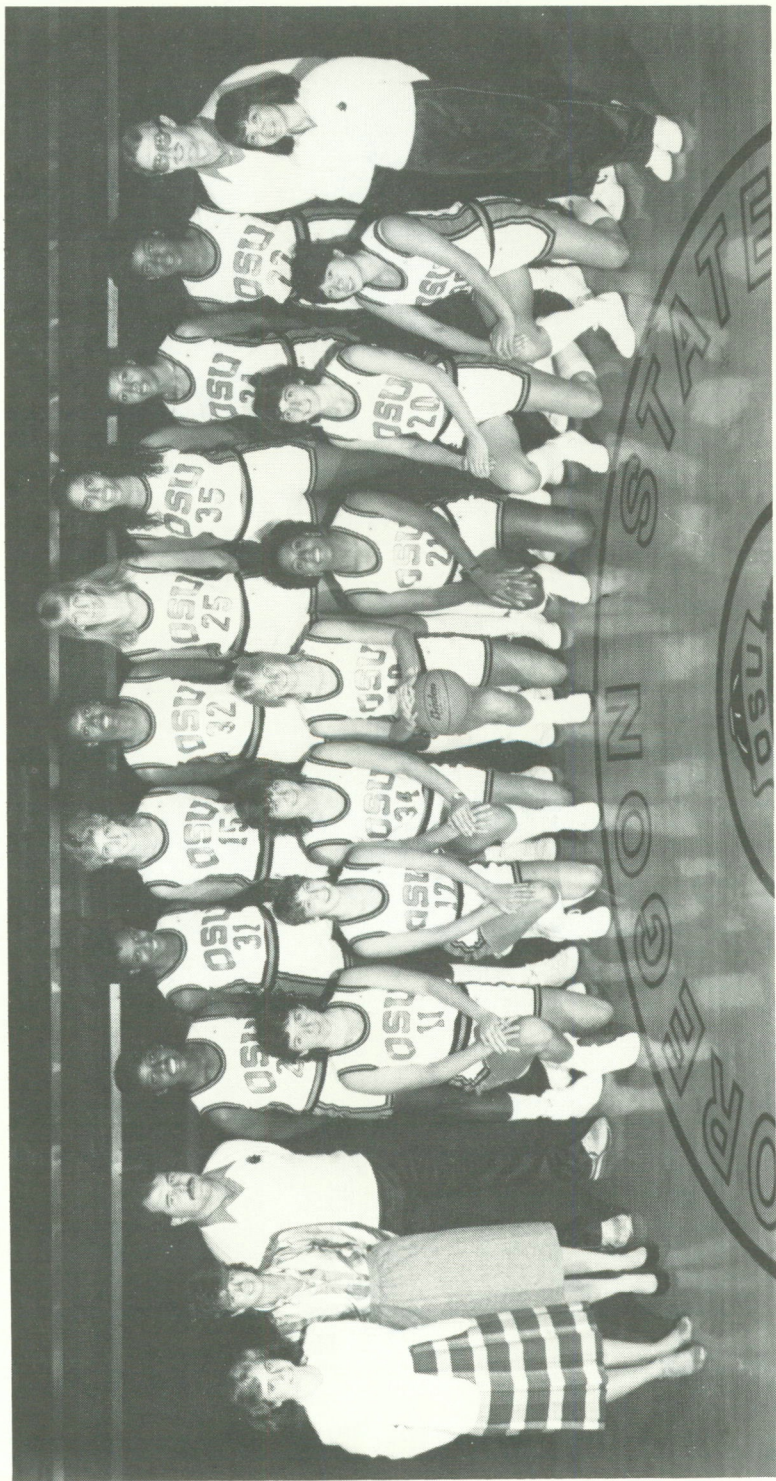

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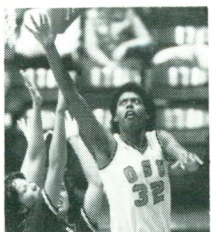
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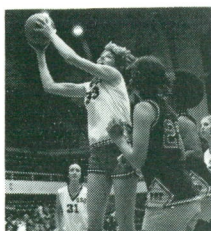

A new president will lead Oregon State University into its 116th year as one of the leading educational and research centers in the United States.

John V. Byrne will assume office in November, becoming OSU's 14th president.

Byrne, 56, is a former vice president at Oregon State and most recently Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. He returns to OSU, the oldest state supported institution of higher learning in Oregon, with a charter day of Oct. 27, 1868.

Oregon State is one of just a handful of universities in the United States which is both a Land Grant and Sea Grant institution. OSU, in addition to its main campus, has research bases at the OSU-Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport and at a dozen Agricultural Experiment Stations around the state.

National leadership is also provided by the university in fields other than oceanography and agriculture, including

forestry, veterinary medicine, food science, education, high technology, pharmacy, gene research, business administration and home economics.

The first graduating class at OSU, in 1870, consisted of a grand total of three persons, two men and one woman. Since that time, the school has grown to where it now confers some 3,000 degrees each June and enrollment is more than 15,000. But the emphasis remains on the individual.

The program offerings are plentiful and of high quality at Oregon State in both undergraduate and graduate fields. About one out of every six students at OSU is in the Graduate School. Bachelor's degrees are offered in some 150 fields; master's in 100 fields; and doctorates in 50 fields.

Oregon State's campus is one of the most picturesque in the West, based at the foothills of the Coast Range in the fertile Willamette Valley. Many of the buildings at OSU are made of red brick, while some of the newer structures have modern architectural design.

OREGON STATE'S GILL COLISEUM EXPANDED

Gill Coliseum, home of the Oregon State women's basketball team, will take on a new look for the 1984-85 season.

Seating capacity for the multi-purpose arena has been raised to 10,500, but there are more aesthetic changes as well. The outer lobbies have been given a more modern look with carpeted walls and tiled floors. Several classrooms and meeting rooms have been added and the lower part of Gill will consist entirely of theater seats for more comfortable viewing.

Gill Coliseum has been considered the perfect arena for spectators since it was opened in December of 1949. Despite its size, covering 1.3 acres, there are no posts to obstruct the view within the main arena. And 80 percent of the seats are located to the side of the court for better viewing.

The coliseum was named after Slats Gill,

Oregon State men's basketball coach for 36 years and later athletic director.

During the 1976-77 season, the OSU women's team first began playing its games in Gill on a regular basis. During the first couple of years, many of those games were played as doubleheaders with the men's team and the Beavers will have a pair of twinbills this season.

Since 1976, the OSU women have hosted national teams from the Soviet Union, the Republic of China and the Republic of Korea, as well as club teams from Japan and Australia. The Beavers have also drawn national champion USC and several other powerhouse teams from around the country to Gill, where OSU coach Aki Hill has compiled a home record of 51-8 (.864) during the last six years, including an incredible 36-3 mark over the last four seasons (.923).

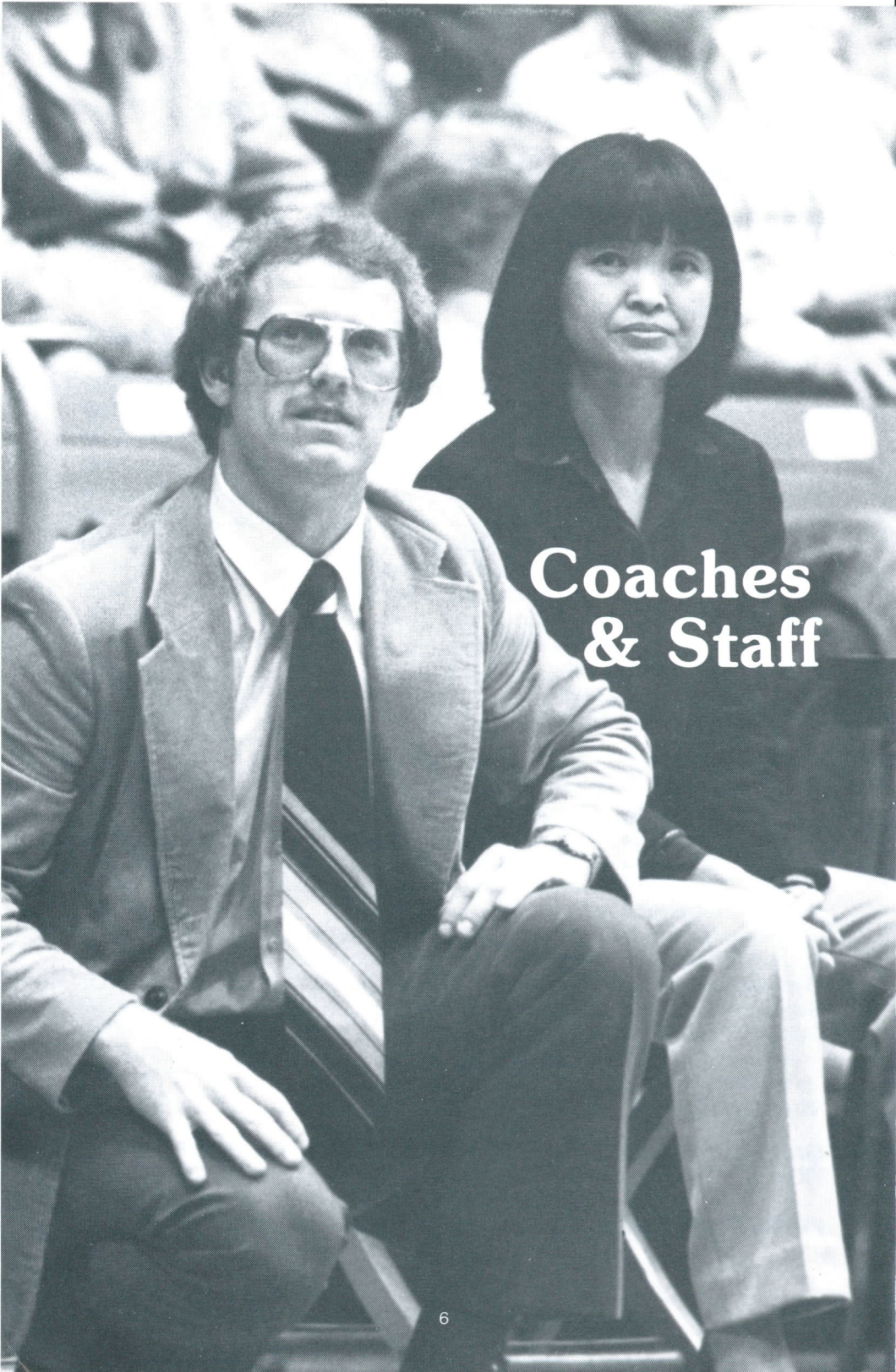

In just six seasons at Oregon State University, women's basketball coach Aki Hill has transformed the Beaver program into one of the finest in the country.

Hill has guided the Beavers into post-season play in each of her six seasons, including two consecutive NCAA appearances, 1983 and 1984. She has led Oregon State to 20 or more wins in each of the last five seasons and has a career winning percentage of .740. She has coached an All-American center, an All-American forward and an All-American guard at OSU. And she was named Coach of the Year by her peers in the Northern Pacific Athletic Conference (NorPac) in both of the league's first two years.

The 44-year-old Hill is regarded as one of the best women's basketball coaches in the country and has a style unique among collegiate women's teams. Her halfcourt press defense is an Oregon State tradition as is the Beavers' 40 minutes of constant pressure.

Hatsue Aki Hill is a native of Japan. She trained under some of basketball's most noteworthy authorities, including the legendary UCLA coach John Wooden. Other mentors of Hill include Tatsuo Hata, a leading Japanese authority on basketball; Hall of Famer Pete Newell; and Stu Inman, director of player personnel for the Portland Trailblazers.

Hill has spent the past 25 years playing, studying and coaching basketball. Her U.S. coaching career began in 1976, when she was an assistant at Foothill Community College and Santa Clara University in California.

In 1970, Hill became the first and only woman coach in Japan's 75-team AAU organization. She coached the Tokyo Marine Insurance teams, guiding one to a second place national finish during her final year.

In 1972, Hill took a leave of absence from coaching to study in a special program under Wooden at UCLA. She is one of the few women, or Japanese, coaches to have such an extensive background of training in the United States.



As a player, Hill competed for three years in high school basketball, then seven years on an AAU first division team in Japan. She was a starting guard for the Tokyo Marine Company, the same team she later coached. Her team won the national championship in 1965.

Hill has been nominated for national Coach of the Year honors four times in her first six years at Oregon State. She has to her credit a pair of National Women's Invitational Tournament titles, two Northwest Women's Basketball League crowns and a NorPac championship.

Bucky Gill came to Oregon State from the prep ranks of the Philadelphia, Penn., area, where he coached his Prendie High team to the conference title.

Gill, 28, is a 1979 graduate of Cheyney State College. He played basketball competitively through his junior year, forgoing his senior season of eligibility to accept the head coaching job at Notre Dame Catholic High School. He inherited a team which had a record of 0-36 during the previous three years and transformed it into a playoff team within three years.

A year later, Gill accepted the coaching job at Archbishop Prendergast High, where he coached for two years, including a final season of 23-9. Gill was also active in summer coaching, taking his Philadelphia Bells AAU team to nationals in 1982.

Among Gill's honors are his All-Regional status as a basketball player at Brandywine Junior College in Delaware; he was Who's



Who in American Junior Colleges and in high school at St. James in Chester, Penn.; he was captain of Brandywine and won the President's Award as top student-athlete; and he was nominated in 1981 as one of the Top Ten Young Men in America by Weidner and Brandywine Colleges' Alumnae.

Andy McClouskey is in his third season as assistant coach with the Oregon State Beavers. He was previously an assistant coach for Ralph Miller's OSU men's team.

McClouskey graduated from OSU in 1982 with a degree in technical journalism. He played basketball on the 1979-80 Pacific-10 championship team before injuries ended his active career.

One of the best guards in the history of Oregon high school basketball, McClouskey hails from Lebanon. He was the highest scoring guard in the state's history and was selected all-state his senior year. He was all-league three times, the Valley League scoring champ twice and a member of the Oregon High School All-Star team. McClouskey was also a standout in football and baseball at Lebanon.

The 25-year-old McClouskey helped coach the OSU men's team during his last two years at Oregon State. The Beavers won Pac-10 championships both seasons.



President of Oregon State

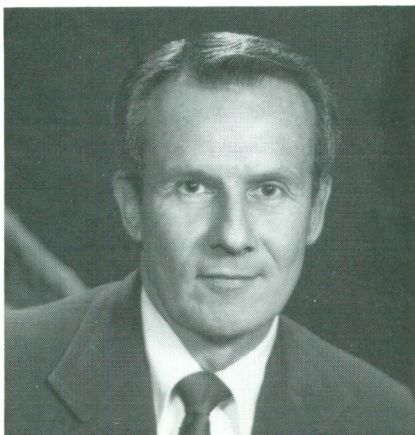
JOHN V. BYRNE

The 14th president of Oregon State University is John V. Byrne, who succeeded Robert W. MacVicar following his retirement in November of 1984.

Byrne, 56, is a former vice president for research and graduate studies at Oregon State. He spent 21 years at OSU before he was nominated by President Reagan in 1981 to head the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The U.S. Senate confirmed his appointment and Byrne served as NOAA Administrator for three years.

The new OSU president has also been U.S. Commissioner to the International Whaling Commission and was a member of advisory panels for the National Science Foundation, and the Departments of Agriculture, Interior, State, Commerce and Defense.

Born May 9, 1928, in Hempstead, N.Y., Byrne is a graduate of Hamilton College in New York. He received his bachelor's degree in marine geology from Hamilton in 1951, earned a master's in geology from Columbia University in 1953, and was awarded his doctorate in marine geology from the University of Southern California in 1957.



Byrne joined the Oregon State faculty in 1960 as an associate professor in what was then the department of oceanography. He was promoted to department chairman of the growing program in 1963, earned full professor status in 1965 and was appointed dean of the OSU School of Oceanography in 1972 (the program is now the College of Oceanography).

In 1980, Byrne was appointed vice president for research and graduate studies.

Byrne and his wife, Shirley, have four grown children: Donna, Lisa, Karen and Steven.

Athletic Director

DEE ANDROS

When Dee Andros was named athletic director at Oregon State in 1975, the University's athletic department had been operating in the red for several years. The first thing that Andros, a former Marine sergeant, did was to tighten the reins on the budget and he succeeded, putting OSU in the black ever since.

Andros' athletic career began at Central High in Oklahoma City, but was put on hold when he entered the Marine Corps and served in World War II. He was decorated with a Bronze Star for heroic achievement at the Battle of Iwo Jima.

After his discharge, Andros played at the University of Oklahoma for four years, helping the Sooners to the Sugar Bowl twice and the Gator Bowl once. After graduating, Andros joined the Oklahoma staff as an assistant coach under Bud Wilkinson. He had stints at Kansas, Texas Tech, Nebraska, California and Illinois before landing his first head coaching job at the University of Idaho in 1962.



Andros was named head coach at Oregon State in 1965 and the "Great Pumpkin" enjoyed several excellent seasons. Perhaps his most celebrated team was the 1967 Giant Killers, which defeated No. 2 ranked Purdue on the road, tied No. 2 UCLA in Los Angeles and defeated No. 1 USC and O.J. Simpson 3-0 in Corvallis.

Andros and his wife, Luella, have one daughter, Jeanna.

Deputy Athletic Director **DR. SYLVIA MOORE**

Dr. Sylvia Moore was named OSU's first deputy athletic director following the merger of the Oregon State men's and women's athletic programs in July, 1982.

The number two administrator in the department, Moore has been at OSU since 1966. An associate professor, Moore has had a busy and varied career at Oregon State. She first taught a number of professional preparation courses for physical education majors, and was acting head advisor in coordinating the undergraduate program in 1975-76. She was named acting director of women's athletics in 1977-78 when the program was a part of the physical education department.

Moore coached the Oregon State women's basketball team for the 1966-67 season, and was the women's gymnastics coach from 1966 to 1974. She was named director of women's athletics in July, 1980, after working as an administrative intern in the President's Office the previous year.



A 1963 graduate in physical education from the University of Washington, Moore earned her master's degree in motor learning from the University of Oregon in 1966. She received a doctorate in social-psychology of sport in 1980, also from the University of Oregon.

Manager PHYLLIS ARMOUR

Oregon State's basketball manager for the past three years has been Phyllis Armour. The 21-year-old junior is a graduate of Beaverton High School in Oregon, where she played basketball and softball. An All-Metro area softball player and a guard in basketball, Armour came to OSU to major in sports leadership.

Armour's hobbies include cycling, fishing and athletics. Born Nov. 28, 1962, she is the daughter of Martha and Philip Armour and one of seven children.

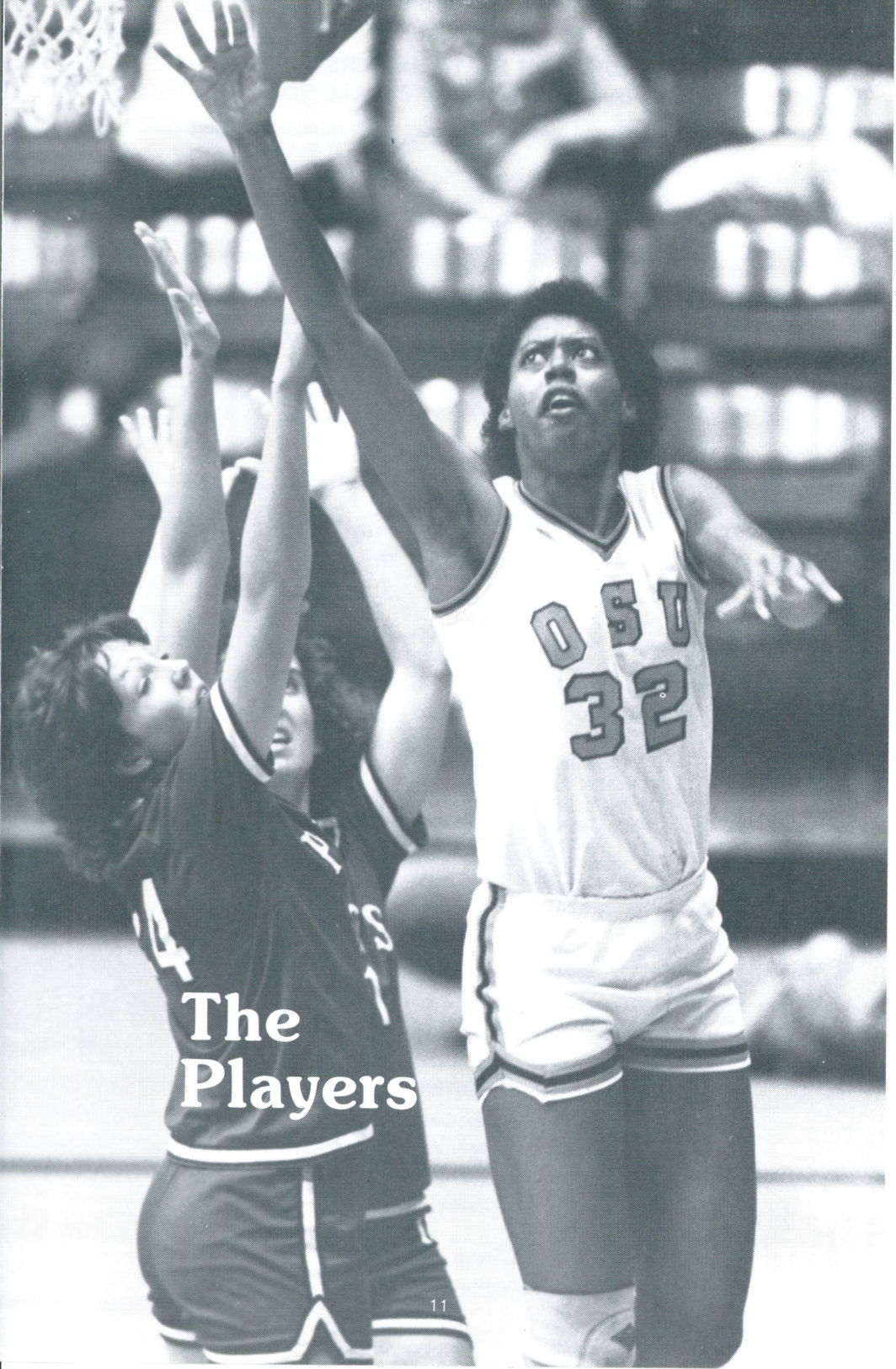


Trainer MELANIE WILLIAMS

Veteran, but youthful Beavers optimistic

Just when coach Aki Hill thought the youth movement was over on her Oregon State women's basketball team, here comes 1984-85 and a squad full of baby-faced hopefuls.

Hill will enter her seventh campaign as OSU coach with a 15-player roster comprised of five freshmen, seven sophomores, a lone junior and a pair of seniors. Lest someone start playing violins, however, it should be noted that this could very well be Hill's best team ever.

That would be saying quite a bit, because in her six years thus far Hill has compiled a record of 125-43, led the Beavers to postseason play every year, taken teams to the NCAA playoffs the last two seasons and won the Northern Pacific Athletic Conference Coach of the Year award in both of the league's first two years.

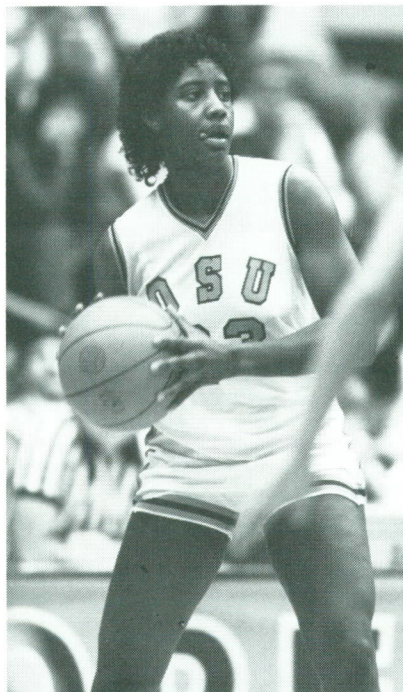
Despite the youth, the Beavers return four starters from a team that went 21-8 last year during a supposed rebuilding year. And leading the parade for her senior season is All-America candidate Juli Coleman.

The 5-8 guard from Issaquah, Wash., led NorPac in scoring last year and was among the top 16 in the nation with her 22.7 average. Coleman exploded for 37 points in the opener at BYU and scored in double figures for 28 straight games, including a conference record of 40 against Pacific.

Coleman was the Most Valuable Player of the conference tournament a year ago, a consensus pick for All-NorPac, the conference Athlete of the Month for December, a CoSIDA Scholastic second team All-American and, generally, one of the most dangerous offensive players on the West Coast. She can also play the other side of the court, and her 10 steals at BYU was a school record.

The player responsible for getting Coleman the ball last year, Cheryl Sturzenegger, is gone via graduation. That leaves the responsibility to junior Lisa Channel to run the club and the 5-11 Portland product has experience at both point and wing. But Channel must avoid injuries and foul trouble and she had trouble with both last year. There are no experienced guards beyond Coleman and Channel in the lineup and both must play close to 40 minutes.

"We should be pretty good at starting guard with Lisa and J.C.," Hill acknowledged,

"But we will have to find someone else who can play and that someone will be inexperienced."

OSU's other senior is Tanya Mothershed, who came into her own as a starter last year after two seasons on the bench. The 6-3 center has all of the physical tools to be a dominating player, but Hill would like a little more consistency from her game and a tougher mental approach. Mothershed was hampered by a stress fracture last year, but her health is 100 percent starting the new season.

The surprise of last year's team was a freshman, Brenda Arbuckle. The 5-11 forward played high post in OSU's 1-4 offensive set, and was surprisingly effective, considering she was usually battling players four and five inches taller. But Arbuckle was second on the team in scoring, 14.0, and led the Beavers in rebounding, 10.3. She tied a school record with 20 rebounds against Arizona, equalling the mark set by former All-American Carol Menken, a 6-5 center.

Arbuckle will be in for a new challenge in 1984-85, according to Hill.

"Brenda will be changing to a wing position and she might be a year away from being able to do that successfully," Hill said. "We will have to watch and see whether she can play there or if she will end up back at high post."

The only other returners played sparingly. Cindy Ahr, a 6-4 center, spent most of the year recuperating from a severe knee injury, and Ayako Kikuchi, a 5-7 guard, was a little bit over her head last year as a freshman trying to adapt to college basketball.

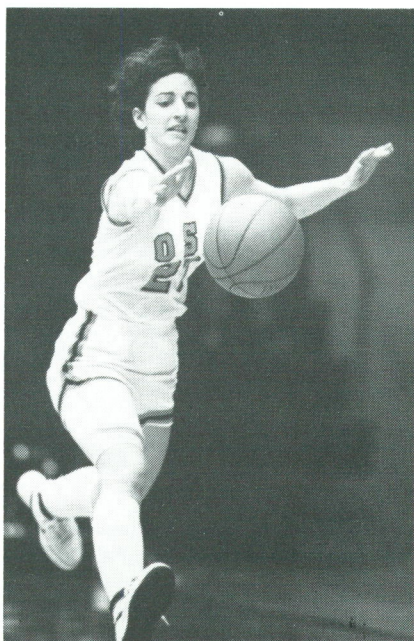
The door is therefore wide open for someone to claim the fifth starting spot and top substitute positions. Hill had hoped that recruit Martina Attanasi would be able to help at guard, but the New Jersey standout suffered an illness and is unable to enroll at Oregon State.

Of the remaining newcomers, a freshman from Portland who happens to be the daughter of former NBA player LeRoy Ellis, has the best shot, according to Hill.

"Lisa Ellis will have to step in right away, because we don't have many inside players," Hill said. "No question, she will have to help us as much as possible."

Ellis, a 6-4 center from Reynolds High, is strong at 190 pounds, surprisingly mobile, and has a nice little hook shot. If she is aggressive and can play defense, she could be a tremendous help to the Beavers' inside attack.

If Arbuckle successfully moves to the wing, that opens up the high post position and it is an important one in the OSU offense. Freshman Debbie Dalluge, a prep All-American from Montana, has looked strong in early practices and Ellis or Mothershed could conceivably play there.

Los Angeles products Fonda DeCree and Monica Raspberry are being groomed for the wing and walkons Laura Amiton and Monica Witt are prospects for guard and high post respectively. Two redshirts of a year ago, Yvette Flippen and Lisa Cataldo, should also help on the wing, and transfer Jennifer Young may be able to help the Beavers' thin guard corps.

Oregon State will likely be favored to win NorPac this season because of the four returning starters and a rather good recruiting year, though the loss of Attanasi will hurt. But Hill would rather not wear the hat of conference favorite.

"We are not ahead of the pack, no, not by any means," she said. "If we improve, then we will be ahead of where we were last year when we had to scramble to make the playoffs. But we are still the underdogs; we have to catch up to Oregon and California."

QUOTES FROM OSU COACH AKI HILL

OSU YOUTH—"We are going to be an even younger team this year than in 1983-84. We will have four returning starters and that is good, but our fifth person will be a newcomer, and our sixth and seventh people may be newcomers, too. Of the people who will actually play, probably half of them will be new faces.

"But we look at it in a very positive way. Last year, we just wanted to hang in there. This year, we really want to start building. I am confident that our incoming freshmen, because of numbers, are quite solid and have the potential to be pretty good players. They will be the core of the team for the next few years."

RECRUITING—"Definitely, when we began recruiting, we felt our top priority was an inside player with height. Fortunately, signing Lisa Ellis early took the pressure off our shoulders. We wanted one more tall player, but that will be our project for next year.

"Losing Peanuts (point guard Cheryl Sturzenegger) to graduation meant that we needed someone at the point and we had hoped it would be Martina Attanasi. But we are able to bring in Lisa Channel from the wing to point, so one of our other freshmen must fill in the gap.

"We are also looking for a dynamic wing player with size, a James Worthy type player who can shoot from the outside. We are hoping that Brenda Arbuckle can move out to wing and that freshmen Fonda DeCree and Monica Raspberry will also fill that role."

THE FIFTH STARTER—"Freshman Debbie Dalluge has been very consistent at high post and wing and I feel very comfortable in playing her as a freshman. She is very solid, and has experience from playing in so many pickup games, it has helped her adapt to college basketball. She is not a spectacular player, but a steady player. And when she moves out to the wing, it will allow us a chance to experiment with Tanya (Mothershed) and Lisa (Ellis) together inside, giving us a pretty tall lineup for teams like California."

OSU WEAKNESSES—"We will still be weak inside this year and we were not at all solid inside all last season. Tanya (Mothershed) was not ready to play 40 minutes a game last year so we can't expect that from her now. Lisa Ellis will make some freshman mistakes, but we can live with those. We had hoped to have three people switch off in those two inside spots, so we have to hope for a contribution from Cindy Ahr or one of the forwards."

OSU STRENGTHS—"We would like to find some surprises among our freshmen because if they can contribute even a short time, that will give us depth and that would be a big, big difference from last year. Last season, at times, we had four-and-a-half players because Lisa Channel was in and out with injuries. We had no one to turn to, so depth would be nice.

"And Juli Coleman is a definite strength. She has to do the same thing she did last year for us, play 40 minutes a game. We have been surviving on two or three good people a year and we are counting on J.C. to do a lot again for us."

CONFERENCE—"We are not ahead of the pack, no, not by any means. If we improve, we will be ahead of where we were last year when we had to scramble to make the playoffs, but we are still the underdogs. We have to catch up to Oregon and we have to catch up to California.

"Our goal, though, is to win the conference championship and take things from there."

QUESTION MARKS—"We should be pretty good at starting guard with Lisa and J.C., but we will have to find someone else who can play and that someone will be inexperienced. Brenda Arbuckle may be changing to a wing position and she might be a year away from being able to do that successfully. We will have to watch and see whether we can play her there or if she will end up back at high post.

"Of the freshmen, Lisa Ellis will have to step in right away, because we don't have many inside players. No question, she will have to help as much as possible. The others all have potential to compete with our starters for a position, especially if they can learn to play defense."

**Cindy Ahr, 6-4, 150, C,
Sophomore, Saugus, Calif.**

High School: Cindy Ahr helped her Kennedy High team to the Los Angeles City championship, averaging 19 points and 15 rebounds a game as a senior. She was voted All-City in Los Angeles and was all-conference for three years. Under coach Craig Raub, Ahr was voted Most Improved Kennedy player three years in a row.

At OSU: Ahr came to OSU in 1982-83 with high hopes of collegiate success, but those hopes were put on hold when she suffered a severe knee injury in December, 1982. The injury kept Ahr on crutches for some six months and the damage to her knee was so severe her rehabilitation took well over a year. Ahr entered the 1983-84 season at less than 100 percent, but came on in mid-year to give the Beavers some valuable minutes inside. She averaged 2.1 points and 2.5 rebounds a game while spelling starting center Tanya Mothershed. Ahr's high game was eight points.

Personal: An exploratory studies student at OSU, Ahr is also interested in photography and horses...she is the daughter of Marylu Allen...she was born May 2, 1964, in Los Angeles, Calif.

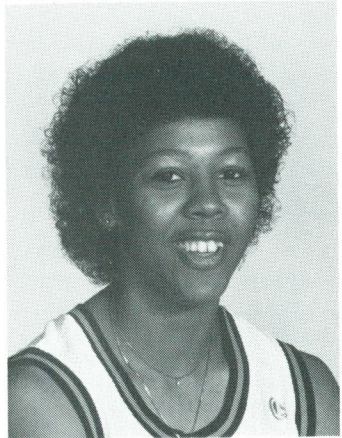

**Brenda Arbuckle, 5-11, 158, F,
Sophomore, Chandler, Ariz.**

High School: A center in high school, Brenda Arbuckle had to make a few adjustments in coming to Oregon State. A 5-10 post player for Chandler High in Arizona, Arbuckle led her team to a 55-0 record over her junior and seniors season as well as a pair of state championships. She averaged 21.0 points and 18.5 rebounds a game for Chandler, was named All-State for three years and was voted to several All-America teams.

At OSU: Arbuckle was asked to step into a starting role at OSU and she performed well above expectations. She led OSU in rebounding with a 10.3 average, was second in scoring at 14.0 and she was named to the second team, All-NorPac squad. Arbuckle was on the conference All-Freshmen team and was named to the all-tournament teams at the Sun Devil Classic and the Big O Classic.

Despite playing the high post at just 5-10½ last year, Arbuckle tied a school record for rebounds in a single game with 20 in a win over the University of Arizona. She also had a high of 24 points in a game and was third on the team in steals with a 2.6 average. The second leading rebounder in the NorPac Conference, Arbuckle was a force on the boards all year. Her 298 caroms is the third best single season total in OSU history and she ranks fourth in average with 10.3; eighth in scoring, 14.0; eighth in total points, 407; eighth in field goals made, 176; eighth in steals, 75; and fourth in free throws attempted, 103.



Despite her success as a freshman, Arbuckle may be in for a new challenge in 1984-85. Because of her athletic ability and OSU's lack of backcourt depth, Arbuckle is being moved outside, primarily as a small forward, but also as a guard. The OSU coaches feel it is a move which will help the Beavers this season and benefit Arbuckle in the long run. At 5-11, she will find herself more suited to a role away from the basket.

Personal: An exploratory studies student, Arbuckle's hobbies include volleyball, roller skating and dancing...she is the daughter of James and Maudean Arbuckle and one of five children...she was born June 15, 1965, in Madera, Calif.

**Lisa Channel, 5-11, 161, G,
Junior, Portland, Ore.**

High School: The first blue chip athlete recruited by coach Aki Hill, Lisa Channel came to OSU from Jackson High School, where she earned Parade third team All-America honors. She was generally regarded as the best prep guard in the Northwest her senior year and was named to the all-state team and several all-tournament squads.

At OSU: Channel had an up and down season as a freshman, playing in every game and averaging 6.4 points and 2.5 rebounds. Her quick hands and anticipation helped her pick off 2.3 steals a game, but invariably got her into foul trouble.

As a sophomore, however, Channel showed a lot more maturity. She improved her average to 9.5 points and 4.5 rebounds a game while still maintaining her 2.3 steals pace. Channel's biggest turnaround came in ball handling and passing. As a freshman she had 84 turnovers to 41 assists, but that ratio improved to 120 assists to 115 turnovers as a sophomore. That average of 4.1 assists should come in handy as a junior because Channel will be required to play point guard.

Channel is a better shooter than her .418 field goal percentage of last year might indicate. She has battled injuries in both years at OSU and had surgery offseason to hopefully correct a circulation problem in her lower leg. Channel had no problems at the free throw line and her .744 mark was second best on the team.

The Athlete of the Week in the NorPac Conference Feb. 5-12, Channel was also named the Most Valuable Player of the Big O Classic. She was an honorable mention, All-NorPac selection as a sophomore.

Personal: Channel is majoring in pre-law at OSU...she is the daughter of Theodis and Florzella Channel of Portland...she is interested in music and poetry...she was born January 30, 1964, in Portland, Oregon.

**Juli Coleman, 5-8, 138, G,
Senior, Issaquah, Wash.**



High School: As a senior, Juli Coleman was the leading scorer in the Washington State prep ranks with a 36.5 average. The Issaquah High product was an all-state selection as a senior and was selected to the Converse Top Ten All-America team. An all-conference player for three years, Coleman also lettered in soccer and softball at Issaquah.

At OSU: Despite her credentials, Coleman was not highly recruited by major colleges. She came to OSU and joined a veteran team, which forced her into the unaccustomed role of spectator as a freshman. Despite averaging just 3.1 points a game in her initial campaign, Coleman showed signs of her explosiveness with a 20-point outburst against Portland State. She was named OSU's Scholar-Athlete for women's basketball.

Coleman's patience paid off as a sophomore. The hard working guard blossomed into OSU's leading scorer with a 15.8 average despite playing on a senior laden team. She was a second team, All-NorPac selection and an honorable mention CoSIDA Scholastic All-American. She was fifth in the conference in scoring, fifth in free throw percentage and seventh in field goal percentage. Again, she was named OSU's Scholar-Athlete.

Her junior year put Coleman into the limelight. One of just two returning starters, the 5-8 guard was the target for every opposing defense, yet Coleman exploded for a 22.7 average, 16th best in the nation. She opened with a standout performance of 37 points and a school record 10 steals on the road against Brigham Young and kept up her pace from there. Coleman set a NorPac single game scoring record with 40 points against Pacific and scored in double figures in 28 consecutive games.

Despite a variety of trick defenses, Coleman hit from the outside and in traffic en route to a .501 field goal percentage. Her .752 from the line was best on the OSU team. She led the conference in scoring with her 22.7 average, which was fourth best in OSU history. Her total of 658 points for the season ranks her second; her 291 field goals made is third best; and her 581 field goals attempted ranks number one. Coleman is also fourth in free throws made, fourth in free throw percentage and fifth in steals. With 1,194 points in three years, Coleman ranks second on OSU's all time scoring list behind All-American Carol Menken.

Coleman won a number of awards last year including MVP of the conference tournament. She was a first team, All-NorPac selection and the conference Athlete of the Month for December. She made the all-tournament teams of the Sun Devil Classic and the Giusti Tournament and was a third team All-American by two publications and a second team CoSIDA Scholastic All-American.

The 1984-85 season will bring an added dimension to Coleman's progress. Because OSU lacks guard depth, she will likely play 40 minutes a game, including some duties at point guard. Last season, Coleman was also required to play some 39 minutes a game and was forced into action at small forward as well as guard. In preparation for duty at the point, the OSU senior has been working on her ball handling and passing skills during the offseason. She has already been named a preseason All-American by Women's Court magazine.

Personal: Coleman is an elementary education major at OSU...she is the daughter of John and Maureen Coleman and one of four children...she was born November 17, 1962, in Seattle, Washington.

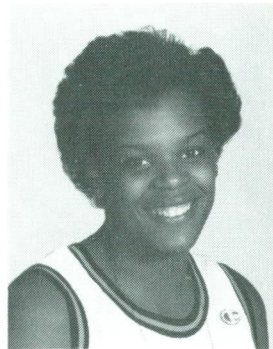


**#31 Fonda DeCree, 6-0, 156, F,

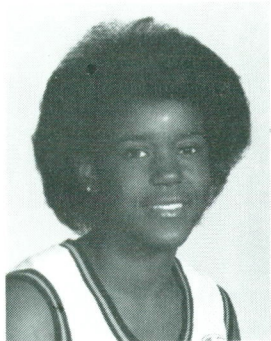


**#22 Yvette Flippen, 5-10, 148, G-F,

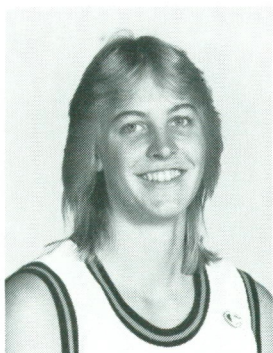


#40 **Jennifer Young, 5-8, 140, G,**

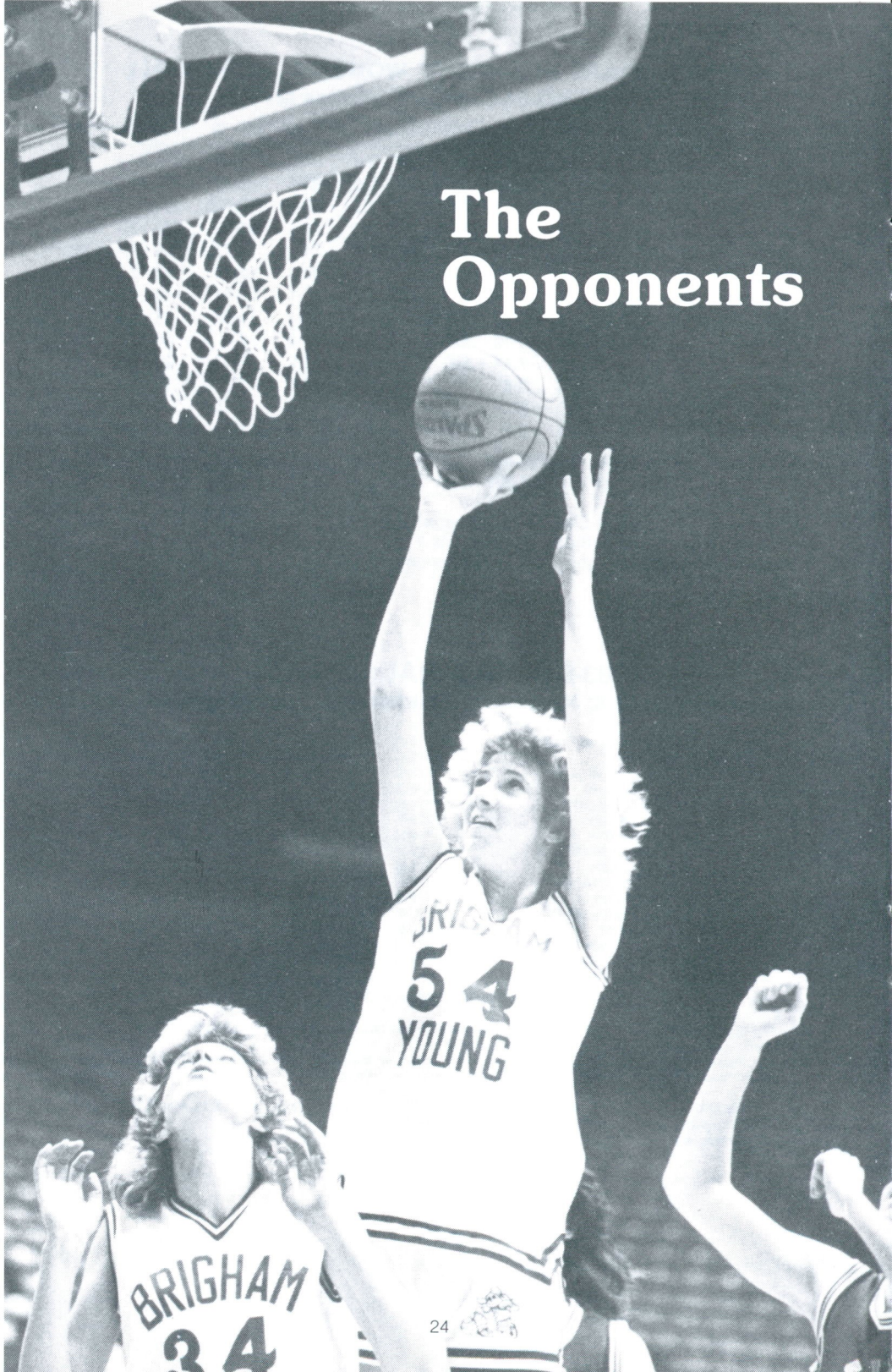

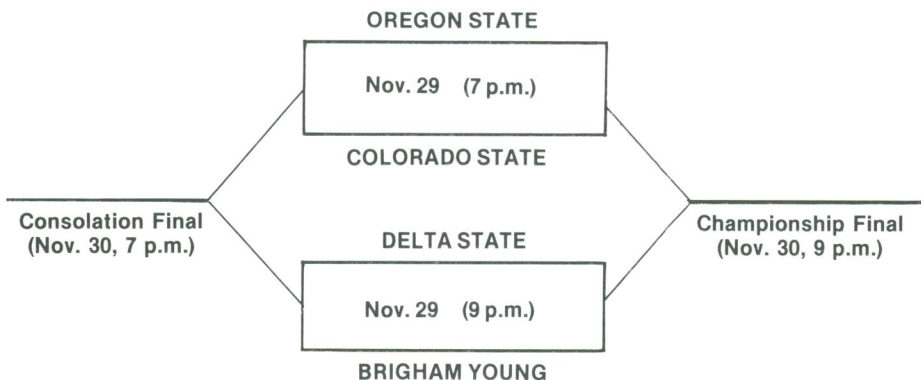

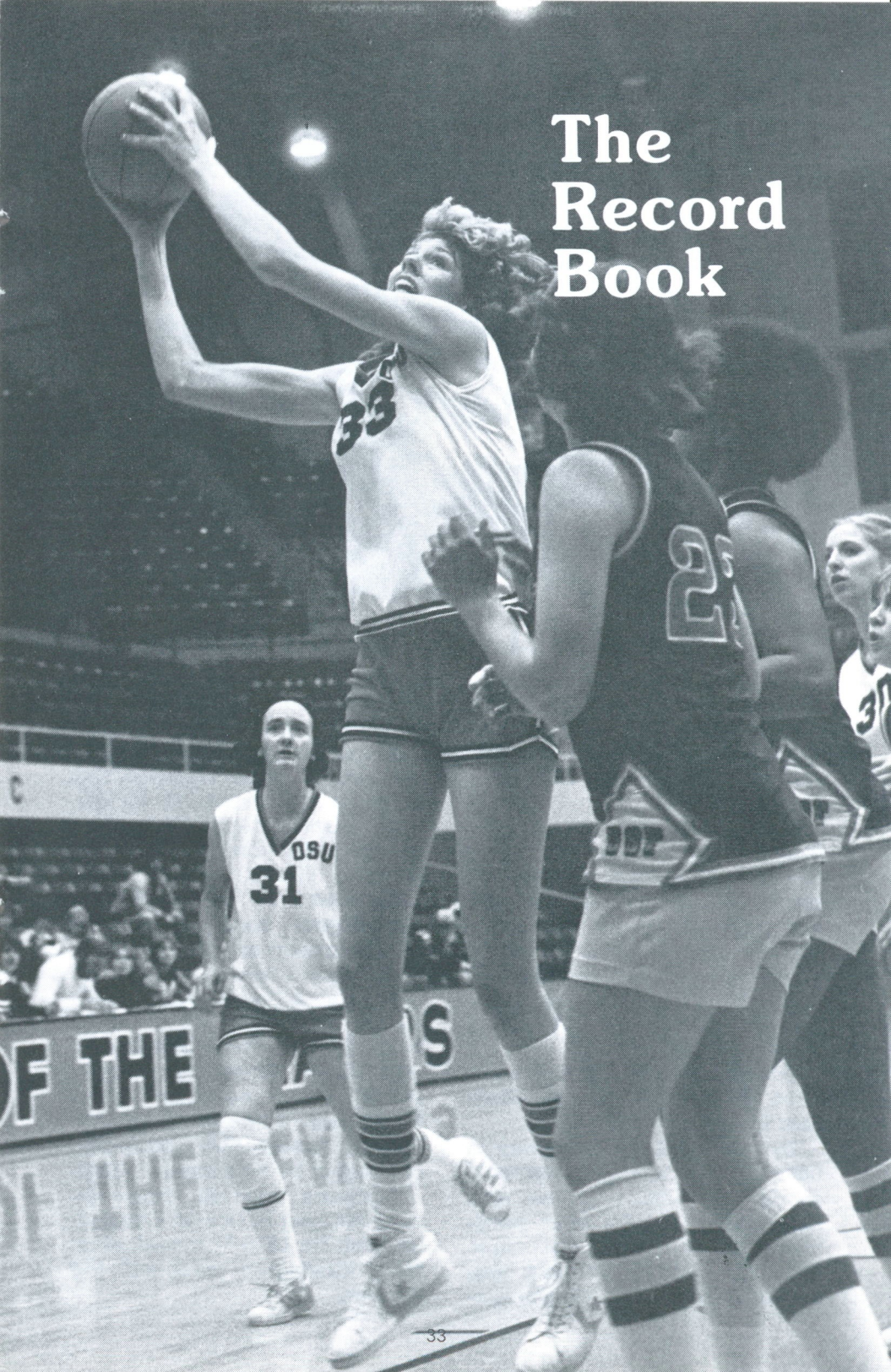

BASKETBALL HISTORY AT OSU

Women's basketball at Oregon State actually got its start before organized men's competition began. The first women's game was played in 1898; the first men's contest in 1901.

That game bore little resemblance to modern day basketball, however. The court was divided into three zones, each containing two players from the two teams. The divisions included areas for guards, centers and forwards. A center jump was held after every basket and no one was allowed to leave their zone.

Scores were low in that era—in 1914, for example, Oregon State beat Oregon by a 10-8 score.

By the 1930's, there was a change in philosophy in women's sports. Competition, per se, was discouraged. On the other hand, mass participation via class instruction and intramurals was encouraged. That philosophy pre-

vailed until the early 1970's although women's basketball was organized as an extramural and club sport in the late 1950's.

No school in the Northwest was quite as successful as Oregon State University. Competing against clubs from other schools, Oregon State teams went undefeated from 1959 to 1966.

Basketball became an intercollegiate sport for women in 1972, when the newly organized women's athletic department started competition as a charter member of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW). Teams competed in the Northwest College Women's Sports Association (NCWSA), Region 9 of the nine-division AIAW.

Accurate records, however, were not kept in women's basketball until the 1976-77 record, when Mary Covington coached the Beavers.

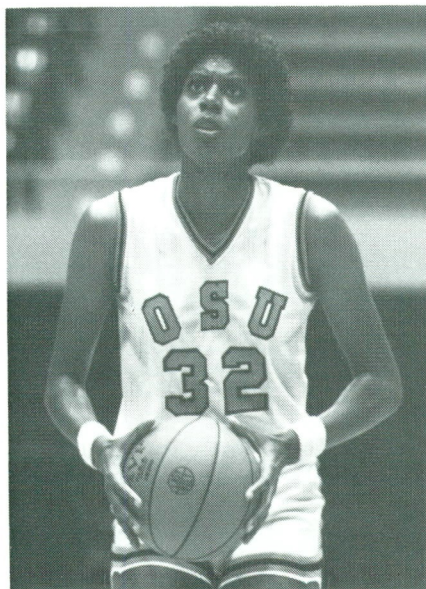
