



OSU Baseball's 90th Anniversary, from A to Z

A as in All-Americans:

Since the American Baseball Coaches Association began selecting All-America teams, Oregon State has had players honored 11 times.

The first was outfielder Dwayne Helbig in 1952; the most recent was pitcher Mason Smith in 1994.

B as in ballpark: Oregon State has had just one home field since starting baseball as a varsity sport in 1907 - Coleman Field. The park is located just south of the center of campus, at the foot of Waldo Place.


For decades, the field was simply known as the OAC or OSC diamond. The first published references to it as Coleman Field appeared in the mid-1940s and the name quickly went into common usage. It wasn't until 1981, though, that the ballpark was officially named Coleman Field by the university.

C as in Coleman: Ralph Coleman served the longest tenure of any coach in Beaver baseball history, 35 seasons from 1923 through 1966. His teams were 561-315-1 with 10 Northern Division titles and a berth in the 1952 College World Series.

Coming to Oregon Agricultural College as a student from Canby High, Coleman pitched for OAC in 1918. His main interest was track and field, though, and Coleman lettered three years as a standout trackman for the Beavers before trying baseball his senior year.

D as in draft: Major League Baseball began its amateur draft in 1965. Since then, OSU has had 47 players drafted, including three in the first round.

Shortstop Steve Lyons was the Beavers' initial first-rounder, being taken with the 19th pick overall by the Boston Red Sox in 1981. Pitcher Scott Christman was OSU's highest selection ever, being nabbed by the Chicago White Sox with the 17th overall pick in 1993. Pitcher Mike Thurman was Oregon State's latest first-rounder, being taken by the Montreal Expos at



No. 31 as a supplemental pick in 1994.

E as in extra innings:

The longest known game in Beaver baseball history? It was a 20-inning, 2-1 loss to Washington in 1972.

F as in Forsch: Ken Forsch, a righthander from Sacramento, Calif., was the Beaver who had the longest Major League career, 16 seasons. After pitching at OSU in 1967 and 1968, Forsch was 114-113 with a 3.37 earned run average for the Houston Astros and California Angels from 1970-86. In 1979, while pitching for Houston, Forsch no-hit the Atlanta Braves. Forsch is currently director of player development for the Anaheim Angels.

G as in Gill: Slats Gill is better known as Oregon State's all-time winningest men's basketball coach, with a record of 599-392 and two Final Four teams in 36 seasons.

But Gill, who had been an OAC athlete from Salem High, was the Beavers' baseball coach while Ralph Coleman concentrated on duties in the physical education department from 1932-37. Gill's teams went 56-70.

H as in homers: Coleman Field has always been a spacious ballpark, but the Beaver teams of the late 1970s and early 1980s tested what was then a 355-foot leftfield line with regularity. Six of OSU's top seven single-season homer marks by a player

were set from 1980-83, including Jim Wilson's record of 21 hit in 1982.

I as in Ira: Cecil Ira was a two-time All-America pitcher on OSU's 1962 and 1963 Northern Division champions. He is still OSU's career earned run average leader with a 1.79 mark, and he posted a record of 27-9 from 1961-63.

J as in Jones: When the Beavers claimed their first Northwest Collegiate championship in 1910, their coach was Fielder Jones.

Just four years before, Jones had been a player/manager on the Chicago White Sox's World Series championship team known as the "Hitless Wonders." A salary dispute with Sox owner Charles Comiskey led to Jones' departure from the Windy City, though.

Jones came to the Pacific Northwest to look after timber and land interests and was enlisted as Oregon Agricultural College's baseball coach, traveling from Portland to Corvallis for practices and games whenever possible.

The Beavers posted a 13-4-1 record in 1910, claiming the Northwest Collegiate Championship. Jones eventually went back to Chicago to coach that city's entry in the Federal League in 1914.

K as in K's: The names at the top of the strikeout lists among Oregon State pitchers are Mason Smith and Ken Forsch. Smith is the career leader

with 267 strikeouts from 1991-94, while Forsch is the single-season leader with 121 in 1968.

Las in Lyons: Steve Lyons put together an nine-year career in the Major Leagues after playing at Oregon State from 1979-81. Nicknamed "Psycho" for his unique approach to the game, Lyons can now be seen every Saturday during the summer as one of the hosts of Fox's Major League Game of the Week telecast.

After being the first-round draft pick of the Boston Red Sox in 1981, Lyons played for the Chicago White Sox, Atlanta Braves and Montreal Expos from 1985-93.

Lyons' on-field moves included playing tic-tac-toe with opposing players by scratching the game in the dirt with his spikes. And yes, Lyons was the guy who dropped his pants to brush the dirt out after sliding headlong into first base in 1990.

M as in Major Leagues:

There have been 13 Beavers who went on to play in the Major Leagues. The first was Ed Coleman, brother of longtime OSU coach Ralph Coleman. Ed Coleman pitched at OAC in 1924 and 1926 and went on to play for the Philadelphia Athletics and St. Louis Browns from 1932-36.

N as in Northern Divi-

sion: Oregon State has always been a member of the Northern Division, which has existed in various forms since 1913. Through the years, Northern Division members have included the current schools of OSU, Portland State, Washington and Washington State plus Oregon, Portland, Gonzaga, Eastern Washington, Idaho, Montana and Whitman.

O as in origins: Varsity baseball began at OAC in 1907, but the roots of the sport reach further back.

The official history of Oregon State lists a baseball game as the school's first intercollegiate athletic event - against Monmouth Christian College in Monmouth in 1883. The score of the game has been lost over the years.

Several tries were made at starting

the sport over the next 24 years, but most seem to have been thwarted by the Pacific Northwest's wet springs. Indoor baseball was popular, however, and the Barometer for June, 1900 pictures the OAC indoor team with its championship banner.

P as in pennants: OSU teams have brought home 20 pennants over the years. The first was the 1908 Oregon Collegiate Championship; the latest was the 1994 Pacific-10 Northern Division title.

Q as in "Quiet, I'm trying to study!": OSU has had three Academic All-Americans in baseball: Ken Bowen and Bryan Ganter in 1986 and 1987 and Mason Smith in 1994. Another OSU player was named a Rhodes Scholar: Knute Buehler, who lettered from 1983-85.

R as in Riley: Jack Riley is Oregon State's winningest baseball coach ever, going 613-411-5 in 22 seasons. A fiery competitor who wasn't shy about showing his emotions on the field, Riley coached at OSU from 1973-94. His teams won or tied for five Northern Division titles and won two division tournaments. His 1986 team set a school record for victories, going 39-15 and finishing third in the NCAA Midwest Regional.

An outstanding baseball and basketball player at nearby Linfield College, Riley was the NAIA national stolen base leader his senior season and later played for the Salem Dodgers.

S as in Schulmerich: Wes Schulmerich, one of the finest athletes in the school's early years, completed his collegiate career by hitting .459 for the 1927 Beavers. The centerfielder went on to play in the Major Leagues from 1931-34 with the Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies. He was inducted into the State of Oregon Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

T as in travel: Oregon State baseball teams have been journeying far from the Pacific Northwest since 1920. That year the Beavers made their first extended spring trip, going to the Bay Area for games against Santa Clara,

Stanford, California, the Sacramento Senators and Cal State-Chico.

U as in unhittable: Two no-hitters have been uncovered in Oregon State baseball history. On April 12, 1947, Fred Gallagher blanked Montana 1-0 in the second game of a doubleheader at Coleman Field, striking out seven. On April 11, 1967, Cleve Benson, Eric Selberg and Jack Humphrey combined to blank Portland 11-0 at Coleman Field.

V as in victories: The 1986 Beavers set an OSU record for victories, going 39-15 and finishing third in the NCAA Midwest Regional at Stillwater, Okla.

W as in World Series:

Oregon State appeared in the College World Series in 1952. The Beavers defeated Southern California in the Pacific Coast Conference Championship Series and swept Fresno State for the NCAA Far West Regional championship before a record Coleman Field crowd of 5,000.

At the College World Series in Omaha, Neb., the Beavers lost two straight games, 18-7 to Duke and 10-1 to Texas.

X as in exhibitions:

Oregon State has played a wide variety of non-collegiate and foreign opposition over the years, including two 1996 games against Nittaidi University of Japan in the Hawaii Easter Tournament.

Local pros like the Eugene Emeralds and Salem Senators were frequent opponents into the 1950s; OSU played the Portland Beavers as recently as 1981. Coleman Field was the site of two games in the 1920s against Meiji University of Japan and a 1921 game against the New York Colored Sox.

Y as in years without

baseball: Since starting a varsity baseball program in 1907, Oregon State has twice halted the sport. No team was fielded in 1917 due to World War I, and there was no competition in 1944 or 1945 due to World War II.

Z as in zipping along:

Oregon State has twice had 18-game win streaks, in 1951 and 1962.

1997 outlook

Pitching, defense replace power at OSU

Oregon State is celebrating the 90th anniversary of its varsity baseball program this spring, and the 1997 Beavers will have a different look than the team that went 32-16-1 last spring and placed second in the Pacific-10 Northern Division with a 14-10 mark.

Gone will be catcher David Schmidt, outfielder Chris Wakeland and shortstop Brandon Hageman, who combined to hit .347 with 21 home runs and 122 runs batted in. Gone will be all-league pitcher Eric Lovinger, who led the staff with a 9-2 record, and Brian Masewicz, who was 3-1 out of the bullpen.

"I don't think we'll make up for Schmidt, Wakeland and Hageman in one shot," head coach Pat Casey said. "We won't replace that, so we're going to have to be much better on the mound, and as good or better than we were defensively."

Pitching may make the greatest leap. "We're going to miss Eric Lovinger," Casey said. "But all of our freshmen last year were instrumental, and Andrew Checketts came in and threw well."

The Beavers have two proven talents in the starting rotation in Checketts, now a junior, and sophomore Chris Pine. Both are righthanders.

Pine (Tigard, Ore./Tualatin High) went 4-3 last year but had an earned run average of just 2.77 and 49 strikeouts in 55 1/3 innings pitched, earning All-Northern Division honors and an invitation to the 1997 USA Baseball National Team Tryouts. Checketts was 6-2 with a 3.47 ERA and a team-high 61 strikeouts in 72.2 innings in 1996.

"Chris finished strong and he's picked up a lot of experience - he should be ready," Casey said. "Andrew had a real good year last year and we're looking for him to repeat that."

The third starter could be sophomore righthander Matt Gunderson (Keizer, Ore./McNary High), who was 2-2 with a 2.43 ERA in 1996; sophomore righthander Mark Newell (Salem, Ore./

Ryan McDonald, senior second baseman and team co-captain

Jefferson High), who was 1-2 with 3 saves and a 4.19 ERA; or senior lefthander James Bowman (Seattle, Wash./Texas Tech).

Junior lefthander Brody Percell (Portland, Ore./Beaverton High) will move to the bullpen after going 2-1 with a 4.93 ERA last season. Also throwing in relief will be junior righthander Jason Bronson (Roseburg, Ore./Mississippi), junior righthander Joe Messman (Hood River, Ore./Chemeketa CC), sophomore righthander Mike Boire (Tigard, Ore./Tigard High), freshman righthander B.R. Cook (Salem, Ore./Sprague High) and freshman lefthander Joe Gerber (Portland, Ore./Grant High).

Two more returning all-leaguers are in the infield - senior second baseman Ryan McDonald (Issaquah, Wash./ Bellevue CC) and junior third baseman Ryan Lipe (Klamath Falls, Ore./Mazama High). McDonald batted .353 with 34 runs batted in and stole 7 bases last season; Lipe hit .324 with 34 RBIs and 4 home runs. Both are co-captains along with Checketts.

"We've got to get a lot out of Lipe and McDonald," Casey said. "They should be our team leaders. Ryan McDonald should be effective driving in runs and getting extra-base hits.

"Ryan Lipe is a good defensive third



baseman who can play any infield position. He runs well and he should drive in some runs for us."

The shortstop will be sophomore transfer Troy Schader (La Center, Wash./Green River CC). He was a first-team all-league pick last season in junior college.

Senior Mike Leone (Milpitas, Calif./ West Valley CC) and junior Matt Bailie (Aloha, Ore./Hillsboro High) will battle at first base. Leone hit .338 with 4 homers and 39 runs batted in last season; Bailie hit .233 but homered 7 times and drove in 38 runs.

At catcher, junior Ben Bertrand (The Dalles, Ore./Chemeketa CC) steps in after playing just two games last year due to an ankle injury.

Senior Jason Stranberg (Ashland, Ore./Mt. Hood CC) moves from center field to left after batting .261. Another senior, Tyson Vermillion (Myrtle Creek, Ore./Clackamas CC), hit .262 while playing right field last season; he's now in center. Freshman Scott Skeen (Bend, Ore./Mountain View High) will have a shot at the right field spot.

Sophomore Ryan Hilts (Medford, Ore./North Medford High), who hit .311 last season, and freshman Drew Hedges (Portland, Ore./Beaverton High) could also see outfield time.

Pat Casey

Head coach Third year (George Fox, 1990)



In its third season under Pat Casey, Oregon State's baseball program is out to take its tradition of success to new levels.

The Beavers have continued to win under Casey. His OSU teams have a record of 57-40-2, a winning percentage of .586. That includes a 32-16-1 record in 1996.


"I think this program could be in the top 25 in the country and compete for a regional on a regular basis," Casey said. "I try to have my teams play hard and fundamentally sound. You have to do things right to win, and that's something I stress."

Casey, has also been instrumental in the drive to build a new stadium at Coleman Field. That effort could result in a new facility at Oregon State's longtime ballpark by the spring of 1998.

Casey came to OSU after spending seven seasons at George Fox College, an NAIA school in his native Newberg. Under Casey, the Bruins went 171-113-1 overall and were 155-54-1 against NAIA competition; they won three District 2 championships, five Metro Valley Conference titles and two Cascade Conference titles.

During his time at George Fox, Casey was named Coach of the Year three times in District 2, four times in the Metro Valley Conference and twice in the Cascade Conference.

Casey earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from George Fox in 1990. He played for the University of Portland from 1978-80 and was a first team All-Northern Division



outfielder his final two seasons. He was also a second-team All-West Coast Region selection in 1980. He also lettered in basketball one season.

After being drafted in the 10th round by the San Diego Padres in 1980, Casey played seven professional seasons. He reached Class AAA with the Calgary Cannons in 1985-86 and the Portland Beavers in 1987.

After concluding his playing career, he took over George Fox's baseball program and also played basketball for the Bruins while completing his degree.

Casey was born March 17, 1959 in McMinnville, Ore. He graduated in 1977 from Newberg High, where he was a standout athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

Casey enjoys fishing, camping and spending time with his family. He and his wife, Susan, have three children - Jonathan (11), Brett (10) and Elie (6).

1996 in review

Beavers take race to finale

Oregon State put together a record offensive performance and a late-season run in 1996, but the Beavers wound up one win short of Washington in the Pacific-10 Northern Division race.

Five wins in six games down the stretch left OSU in position to tie for the division title by sweeping Washington in the spring's final four-game series. The Beavers won the first three games - all by one run or in extra innings - but fell short in the finale to finish in second place.

Oregon State set school records for runs scored (381) and fielding percentage (.968), as well as being hit by pitches (65) and hitting opposing batters (42). OSU finished first in the division in batting (.306), pitching (3.93 earned run average) and fielding.

Senior outfielder Chris Wakeland won the Northern Division batting title with a .368 mark, tied for 10th on the school's single-season list. He also broke onto the lists for runs (2nd with 51), runs batted in (6th with 49) and doubles (tied for 3rd with 17), among others.

There were a number of other imprints on OSU's single-season lists, including senior catcher David Schmidt's league-leading 12 home runs (tied for 5th) and junior second baseman Ryan McDonald's 71 hits (4th).

OSU had six of the top seven finishers in the Northern Division batting race, with Wakeland followed by McDonald (2nd, .353), senior shortstop Brandon Hageman (3rd, .348), junior designated hitter Mike Leone (4th, .338), sophomore third baseman Ryan Lipe (6th, .324) and junior catcher David Schmidt (7th, .321).



Coleman Field

The campus ballpark is the only home OSU baseball has ever known


When Oregon State began fielding a varsity baseball team in 1907, the school laid out a diamond on a lot just south of the main campus. Now, 90 years later, that same site still serves as the baseball home of the Beavers, making Coleman Field the oldest diamond in the Pacific-10 Conference and one of the oldest college ballparks in the country.

Over the past nine decades, the campus has grown around Coleman Field, making it one of the most picturesque settings in college baseball. The 2,310-seat ballpark is a short walk down Waldo Place from the Memorial Union and central campus area, making it easy for students to catch a game between classes.

The field is named for former Oregon State player and coach Ralph Coleman, who guided the Beaver program for 35 seasons from 1923-66. OSU's all-time record at Coleman Field is 811-344-1, a winning percentage of .702.

The park is symmetrical, measuring 330 feet down the foul lines, 365 to the power alleys and 400 to center.

Plans have been made to give Coleman Field a new look before long.




A model of the stadium planned for Coleman Field

The project, which will extend roughly from first to third base, calls for a concrete-and-brick grandstand with just over 1,000 seats, a new press box, a lobby/concession area, men's and women's restrooms, team rooms and storage areas.

The field itself has been upgraded in recent years. In the early 1990s, the outfield drainage and irrigation systems were reworked; in the summer of 1996, the entire infield was regraded, covered with Turface for improved consistency, and resodded.

When conditions call for indoor practice, the Beavers head for nearby McAlexander Fieldhouse. The building has batting cages and an artificial turf surface.

Free one-day visitors passes are available at the Parking Services Office just east of McAlexander Fieldhouse. Passes are good for the student/visitor lots behind the left-field fence and the lots next to the dormitories just south of Washington Way. Unrestricted parking is available at Parker Stadium.

OSU academics and athletics

Oregon State leads the way in education

It's the oldest state-assisted institution of higher education in Oregon.

It's a comprehensive research university, and one of the few in the country able to claim combined Land Grant, Sea Grant and Space Grant status.

It's a school whose alumni include the only person to have won two unshared Nobel Prizes; a school internationally respected for teaching, research and public service.

And it's the school with the highest athletic graduation rate among NCAA Division I-A schools in a recent study.

That's Oregon State University, an institution of 14,500 students founded in 1868. Located in Corvallis, a city of 45,000 in the heart of the Willamette Valley, OSU attracts scholars from every state and over 100 countries to pursue undergraduate and graduate degrees in 217 programs.

OSU has long prepared students for success and leadership in business, education, science, liberal arts, health and human performance, engineering, oceanography, forestry, agricultural sciences, home economics, pharmacy and veterinary medicine. Dr. Linus Pauling, a 1922 graduate, went on to earn Nobel Prizes in chemistry and peace.

Recent additions to Oregon State's academic program include an honors program, an ethnic studies department and an international degree program for undergraduates. OSU is also an innovator in international education, with agreements, contracts and exchanges with more than 75 countries.

While the top priority at Oregon State is teaching, research also plays a crucial role. It allows for the creation, application and integration of new knowledge into the educational


process. A distinguished faculty of over 2,000 scholars attracts more than \$110 million each year in research grants.

OSU also operates academic and research programs in each of Oregon's 36 counties, working with citizens in such areas as energy conservation, home improvement, agriculture, forestry, community development and the 4-H youth program. Facilities include the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport and a conference/education center in Portland.

But Oregon State's home is Corvallis, which often appears when publications

issue their lists of America's mostlivable small cities. The city is at the confluence of the Willamette and Marys rivers, providing opportunities for boating, water skiing, and fishing; the attractions of Portland, the Oregon Coast and skiing in the Cascade Mountains are all less than a two-hour drive away.

While Corvallis has always been a college town, with all the tree-lined streets and historic buildings the term implies, it's also home to a business community that includes several industrial parks with an emphasis on research and computer technology.

Dr. Paul G. Risser



President (Grinnell, 1965)

Dr. Paul G. Risser, the 13th president of Oregon State University, began his tenure Jan. 1, 1996. Risser can often be found watching Beaver teams in action and has made a commitment to university support for athletics.

Risser came to OSU from Miami University of Ohio, where he had been president since 1992. Previously, he had been provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of New Mexico; he had arrived at UNM as vice president for research in 1986.

Honors bestowed upon Risser include being appointed a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1985 and the

American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1994. He served as president of the American Institute of Biological Sciences in 1991-92; he is currently Secretary General to the Parisbased Scientific Committee on Problems of the Environment.

An internationally-known biologist, Risser's research interests include the structure and function of grassland and forest ecosystems, environmental planning and management, landscape ecology and global change.

Born Sept. 14, 1939 in Blackwell, Okla., Risser received his bachelor's degree in biology from Grinnell College in Iowa in 1961. He earned a master's degree in botany in 1965 and a doctorate in botany and soils in 1967 at the University of Wisconsin.

Risser began his teaching career at Wisconsin in 1963 and joined the faculty of the University of Oklahoma in 1967.

Risser's wife is Les Risser; he has four sons.

Beavers make the grade in classroom and on field

When it comes to combining academics with athletics, Oregon State has a national reputation for success. Just take a look in Sports Illustrated, or any of the other publications that last summer carried the news about the Beavers' triumph in the classroom.

In July, OSU was named as having the highest graduation rate among NCAA Division I-A schools for scholarship athletes - 95 percent. The six-year study, which tracked students entering school in the fall of 1989, showed 42 of 44 graduating; OSU's 95 percent compared favorably to the 58 percent for Division I nationally.

An academic support and advising program headed by Mary Alice Stander is one reason for Oregon State's graduation rate.

"Personally, I think the graduation rate is great," Stander said. "But it's not the end product I'm thinking of when I work. I'm thinking, 'Is the student getting the education they need to get where they want to be?'

"If a student finishes their eligibility, I expect them to graduate. If they don't, I don't know what they've been doing."

OSU is a charter member of the Pacific-10 Conference. Besides baseball, OSU fields varsity teams in football, men's and women's basketball, gymnastics, softball, volleyball, wrestling, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's golf, women's swimming, and men's and women's crew. A wide variety of club sports are also offered, including track and field and rugby, and intramurals are a big part of student life.

Athletic facilities include 35,362-seat Parker Stadium for football and 10,400-seat Gill Coliseum for basketball, gymnastics,volleyball and wrestling. Training facilities and meeting areas for most sports are also housed in Gill.

Dutch Baughman



Athletic director (Ohio State, 1976)

Dutch Baughman was named the 10th athletic director in Oregon State history on April 30, 1990. Baughman was promoted from his position of senior associate athletic director, a position in which he started in October, 1989.

Baughman's hiring was a popular move among OSU coaches and athletic department staffers. In his time as senior associate, he had improved morale and operating procedure; he was responsible for the 1989-90 budget in

which OSU finished in the black for the first time in years.

Under Baughman's leadership, OSU was named in 1996 as having the highest NCAA Division I-A graduation rate for scholarship athletes. OSU has also started the BALANCE program to helps athletes develop life skills; the program has been a model for other universities.

Prior to coming to OSU, Baughman had also been athletic director at Furman from 1979-83 and at Virginia Tech in 1988. He was also assistant and associate commissioner of the Southwest Conference from 1983-87.

Baughman was a football player and graduate assistant coach at Ohio State, where he received a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1976.

Baughman and his wife, Jacquelyn, have one son, Eric, and one daughter, Emily.

OSU athletic traditions

THE BEAVER NICKNAME:

Oregon State University, like many other universities in the United States, takes its nickname from its home state's official animal.

In the school's early days as Oregon Agricultural College, the athletic teams were known as the Aggies. When orange uniforms replaced the drab sweatshirt-gray and tan jerseys, the teams were often referred to as the Orangemen.

In 1916, when the school year-book was renamed the Beaver, the name Beaver became associated with the school. It is believed the press also had some influence in changing the name, particularly L.H. Gregory of The Oregonian newspaper in Portland. Whatever its origin, the name Beavers gained instant popularity among alumni and students.

THE COLORS ORANGE AND

BLACK: Oregon State played its first football game in 1893 and the color orange was adopted as the school color. The school's yearbook, in fact, was originally known as the Orange.

Oregon State teams have generally worn uniforms using orange, black and white as the base colors.

However, orange is still the school's official color. Former men's basketball coach Slats Gill and





former football coach Tommy Prothro both popularized all-black uniforms during their careers at Oregon State, though, and some teams still wear black jerseys.

THE MASCOT, BENNY BEA-

Benny was introduced to the student body Sept. 18, 1952, in an effort to pick up sagging school spirit. Years later, he was joined by a female compatriot, Bernice.

BALANCE aids athletes in learning life skills

Oregon State's support for athletes isn't limited to the classroom. The athletic department's BALANCE program - standing for Beaver Athletes for Lifeskills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence - has been recognized as a national leader in providing athletes with the chance to mature in the areas of career skills, community service and personal development.

All of Oregon State's studentathletes are involved with some aspect of the program, which is overseen by former Beaver softball player Andrea Talcott.

"To be successful and happy with everything you do, each area of your life - academics, athletics and your personal life - need to be functioning well," Talcott said. "The program is designed to give the student-athletes the knowledge and the skills to make the right choices in their life."

There are three credited classes in the BALANCE program, along with a number of seminars and workshops. Topics include time and stress management, communication skills, interviewing skills, networking, resume and cover letter writing, community outreach and public speaking, alcohol education, diversity, ethics, fiscal responsibility, manners and etiquette, nutrition and values clarification.

The BALANCE program's reputation has grown considerably on the national level over the past two years. Talcott has been asked to NCAA conferences about the success of OSU's efforts.

"An athlete who uses the resources offered them through the BALANCE program will have a considerable amount of experience to take with them as they go out into the real world," Talcott said.
