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Oregon State baseball from A to Z

Beavers have been a big hit since 1907

Some of the highlights and personalities that have become part of OSU's baseball lore

A as in All-Americans: Since the American Baseball Coaches Association began selecting All-America teams, Oregon State has had players named to various All-America teams 19 times.

The first was outfielder Dwane Helbig in 1952; the most recent was pitcher Andrew Checketts in 1998.

B as in ballpark: OSU has had just one home field since starting baseball as a varsity sport in 1907 - Coleman Field. The park is located just south of the center of campus, at the foot of Waldo Place, and is named for long-time coach Ralph Coleman.

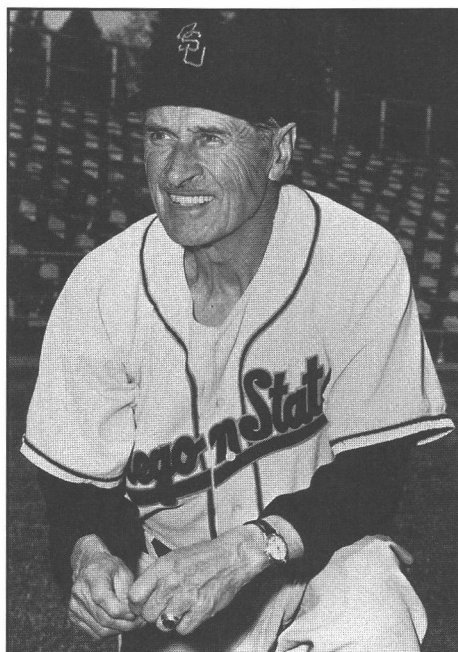
In 1999, a new chapter in the ballpark's history begins with the addition of Goss Stadium at Coleman Field. The stadium is named for the family of John and Eline Goss, the major donors to the \$2 million project.

Goss Stadium was designed to blend into the architecture of the central campus area, with an old-style brick exterior. The main grandstand extends from roughly first to third base and seats approximately 1,500, many in theater-style seats. Goss Stadium includes a lobby/concession area, a ticket area, restrooms, an enlarged press box with two private booths, and locker rooms for both the home and visiting team connected to their dugouts via tunnel.

For decades, the field was simply known as the OAC or OSC diamond. The first published references to it as Coleman Field appeared in the mid-1940s and the name quickly went into common usage. It wasn't until 1981, though, that the ballpark was officially named Coleman Field by OSU.

C as in Coleman: Ralph Coleman served the longest tenure of any coach in Beaver baseball history, 35 seasons from 1923 through 1966. His teams were 561-315-1 with 10 Northern Division titles and a spot in the 1952 College World Series.

Coming to OSU - then known as Oregon Agricultural College - as a student from Canby High, Coleman pitched for OAC in 1918. His main interest was track and field, though, and Coleman lettered three years before trying baseball as a senior.

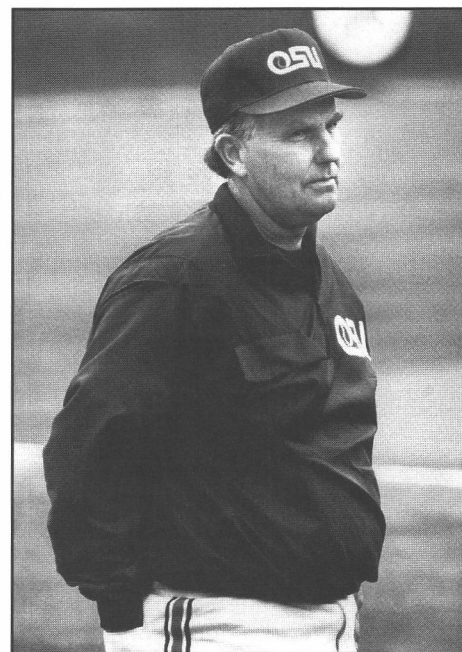
After serving in World War I, Coleman coached at Corvallis High and OAC. He pitched for the Portland Beavers in the Pacific Coast League and fared well enough to be offered a tryout with the Detroit Tigers, but turned it down to become OAC's head coach.

D as in draft: Major League Baseball began its amateur draft in 1965. Since then, OSU has had 53 players drafted, including three in the first round.

Shortstop Steve Lyons was the Beavers' initial first-rounder, being taken with the 19th pick overall by the Boston Red Sox in 1981. Pitcher Scott Christman was OSU's highest selection ever, being nabbed by the Chicago White Sox with the 17th overall pick in 1993. Pitcher Mike Thurman was Oregon State's latest first-rounder, being taken by the Montreal Expos at No. 31 as a supplemental pick in 1994.

E as in extra innings: The longest known game in Beaver baseball history? It was a 20-inning, 2-1 loss to Washington in 1972.

F as in Forsch: Ken Forsch, a righthander from Sacramento, Calif., was the Beaver who had the longest Major League career, 16 seasons. After pitching at OSU in 1967 and 1968, Forsch was 114-113 with a 3.37 earned run average for the Houston Astros and California Angels from 1970-86. In 1979, while pitching for Houston, Forsch no-hit the

Atlanta Braves. Forsch is currently director of player development for the Anaheim Angels.

G as in Gill: Slats Gill is best known as Oregon State's all-time winningest men's basketball coach, going 599-392 with two Final Four teams in 36 seasons.

But Gill, who had been an OAC athlete from Salem High, was the Beavers' baseball coach while Ralph Coleman concentrated on duties in the physical education department from 1932-37. Gill's teams went 56-70.

H as in homers: Coleman Field has always been a spacious ballpark, but the Beaver teams of the late 1970s and early 1980s tested what was then a 355-foot leftfield line with regularity. Six of OSU's top eight single-season homer marks by a player were set from 1980-83, including Jim Wilson's record of 21 in 1982.

I as in Ira: Cecil Ira was a two-time All-America pitcher on OSU's 1962 and 1963 Northern Division champions. He is still OSU's career earned run average leader with a 1.79 mark, and he posted a record of 27-9 from 1961-63.

J as in Jones: When the Beavers claimed their first Northwest Collegiate championship in 1910, their coach was Fielder Jones.

Just four years before, Jones had been a player/manager on the Chicago White Sox's

World Series championship team known as the "Hitless Wonders." A salary dispute with Sox owner Charles Comiskey led to Jones leaving the Windy City, though.

Jones came to the Pacific Northwest to look after timber and land interests and was enlisted as OAC's baseball coach, traveling from Portland to Corvallis for practices and games whenever possible.

The Beavers posted a 13-4-1 record in 1910, claiming the Northwest Collegiate Championship. Jones eventually went to St. Louis as a player-manager for that city's entry in the Federal League from 1914-15. He later managed the St. Louis Browns from 1916-18.

K as in K's: The names at the top of the strikeout lists among Oregon State pitchers are Mason Smith and Ken Forsch. Smith is the career leader with 267 strikeouts from 1991-94, while Forsch is the single-season leader with 121 in 1968.

L as in Lyons: Steve Lyons put together a nine-year career in the Major Leagues after playing at Oregon State from 1979-81. Nicknamed "Psycho" for his unique approach to the game, Lyons can now be seen as a broadcaster during baseball telecasts and other programs on the Fox Sports network.

After being the first-round draft pick of the Boston Red Sox in 1981, Lyons played for the Chicago White Sox, Atlanta Braves and Montreal Expos from 1985-93.

Lyons' on-field moves included playing tic-tac-toe with opposing players by scratching the game in the dirt with his spikes. And yes, Lyons was the guy who dropped his pants to brush the dirt out after sliding headlong into first base in 1990.

M as in Majors: There have been 14 Beavers who went on to play in the Major Leagues. One of the first was Ed Coleman, brother of longtime OSU coach Ralph Coleman. Ed Coleman pitched for the Beavers in 1924 and 1926, then played for the Philadelphia Athletics and St. Louis Browns from 1932-36.

N as in Northern Division: This spring, the Pacific-10 Conference returns to playing baseball as a single league. However, Oregon State has spent most of its baseball history in the Northern Division, which dated back to 1913.

In 1998, the Northern Division included Oregon State, Portland State, Washington and Washington State. Through the decades, the division also included Oregon, Portland, Gonzaga, Eastern Washington, Idaho, Montana, Whitman, Willamette and Pacific (Ore.) at various times.

O as in origins: Varsity baseball began at OAC in 1907, but the roots of the sport reach further back.

The official history of Oregon State Univer-

sity lists a baseball game as the school's first intercollegiate athletic event - a game against Monmouth Christian College in Monmouth in 1883. The score of that game has been lost over the years.

Several tries were made at starting the sport over the next 24 years, but most seem to have been thwarted by the Pacific Northwest's wet springs. Indoor baseball was popular, however, and the Barometer for June, 1900 pictures the OAC indoor baseball team with its championship banner.

P as in pennants: OSU teams have brought home 20 pennants over the years. The first was the 1908 Oregon Collegiate Championship; the latest was the 1994 Pacific-10 Northern Division title.

Q as in "Quiet, I'm trying to study!": OSU has had four Academic All-Americans in baseball: Ken Bowen and Bryan Ganter in 1986 and 1987, Mason Smith in 1994 and Ben Bertrand in 1998. Another OSU player was named a Rhodes Scholar: Knute Buehler, who lettered from 1983-85.

R as in Riley: Jack Riley is Oregon State's winningest baseball coach ever, going 613-411-5 in 22 seasons. A fiery competitor who wasn't shy about showing his emotions on the field, Riley coached at OSU from 1973-94. His teams won or tied for five Northern Division titles and won two division tournaments. His 1986 team set a school record for victories, going 39-15 and finishing third in the Midwest Regional.

An outstanding baseball and basketball player at nearby Linfield College, Riley was the NAIA national stolen base leader as a senior. He later played professionally for the Salem Dodgers.

S as in Schulmerich: Wes Schulmerich, one of the finest athletes in the school's early years, ended his collegiate career by hitting .459 for the 1927 Beavers. The centerfielder went on to play in the Major Leagues from 1931-34 with the Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies. He was inducted into the State of Oregon Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

T as in travel: OSU baseball teams have been journeying far from the Pacific Northwest since 1920. That year, the Beavers made their first extended spring trip, going to the Bay Area for games against Santa Clara, Stanford, California, the Sacramento Senators and Cal State-Chico.

U as in unhittable: Two no-hitters have been uncovered in Oregon State baseball history. On April 12, 1947, Fred Gallagher blanked Montana 1-0 in the second game of a doubleheader at Coleman Field, striking out seven. On April 11, 1967, Cleve Benson, Eric Selberg and Jack Humphrey combined to blank Portland 11-0 at Coleman Field.

V as in victories: The 1986 Beavers set an OSU record for victories, going 39-15 and placing third in the NCAA Midwest Regional at Stillwater, Okla.

W as in World Series: Oregon State appeared in the College World Series in 1952. The Beavers defeated Southern California in the Pacific Coast Conference Championship Series and swept Fresno State for the NCAA Far West Regional championship before a record Coleman Field crowd of 5,000.

At the College World Series in Omaha, Neb., the Beavers lost two straight games, 18-7 to Duke and 10-1 to Texas.

X as in exhibitions: Oregon State has played a wide variety of non-collegiate and foreign opposition over the years, including two 1996 games against Nittai University of Japan in the Hawaii Easter Tournament.

Local pros like the Eugene Emeralds and Salem Senators were frequent opponents into the 1950s; OSU played the Portland Beavers as recently as 1981. Coleman Field was the site of two games in the 1920s against Meiji University of Japan and a 1921 game vs. the New York Colored Sox.

Y as in years without baseball: Since starting a varsity baseball program in 1907, Oregon State has twice halted the sport. No team was fielded in 1917 due to World War I, and there was no competition in 1944 or 1945 due to World War II.

Z as in zipping along: Oregon State has twice had 18-game win streaks, in 1951 and 1962. Both winning streaks came in the first 18 games of the season.

1999 Oregon State outlook

Beavers show off new looks this spring

Goss Stadium at Coleman Field will be the home for a potentially potent lineup, a very young pitching staff

As Oregon State gets ready to unveil a new look for its longtime ballpark, the Beavers are also sending out a new-look team.

One of the most notable aspects of 1999 will be the opening of Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, adding the first permanent grandstand to the field the Beavers have called home since 1907.

"It's outstanding," OSU head coach Pat Casey said of the \$2-million project. "We're going to have a place where people can go and really enjoy a game. We're looking to put together a tremendous atmosphere.

"We're going to have a facility where guys really want to come play, and to play in the Pacific-10."

After going 35-14-1 in 1998, OSU loses eight seniors to graduation and one junior to the draft. Those players left with a record of 105-42-3 over their last three seasons.

"I think as confident as we were last year with our seniors and the leadership they provided, we're as uncomfortable this year with our lack of experience and leadership," said Oregon State head coach Pat Casey, who is starting his fifth season. "Our biggest concern is creating a continuity and chemistry within this club. We've got to find some leaders who will emerge other than our captains.

"We have had a couple of guys come out and be better than we thought they'd be, but they've still got to play. Games are going to be the teacher for them - they've got to get in those situations."

It's not as though 1999 finds the Beavers entirely lacking in veterans. Oregon State returns 14 lettermen, including five position players who could form the nucleus of a potent lineup.

Senior rightfielder Rob Colley (.362, 6 homers, 62 runs batted in) tied the single-season school record for RBIs in 1998 while junior first baseman Joe Gerber (.377, 11, 38) and junior leftfielder Drew Hedges (.350, 6, 36) both got hot during the last half of the season.

"Last year, all three of them produced," Casey said. "Now, they're in the forefront. We need all of them to not only produce, but to give us some leadership. They've got to step

up and be more complete in their game. We have to expect them to come out and give us something defensively that will help us there."

Senior shortstop Troy Schader (.313, 8, 38) is back for his third season as a starter after hitting 22 homers in summer ball for the Humboldt Crabs.

"He had a real good summer and a real good fall," Casey said. "He'll be one of our captains (with Hedges and junior pitcher Mark Newell), and he's a guy a lot of people are going to look at. He's shown he wants to take on that role and I think that will help him as a player."

Also back is senior second baseman Corrie Willkie (.287, 2, 31).

"He had a decent year last year, but I think he can be a better player," Casey said. "I think he'll be more comfortable now after a year in Division I."

In the everyday lineup, the Beavers will look at some new faces at catcher, third base, center field and designated hitter.

At catcher, redshirt freshman Bryan Ingram or senior transfer Jeff Sakamoto will get the nod as freshman Chris Biles sits out the season with a knee injury. Ingram is a converted infielder, while Sakamoto comes to OSU from Puget Sound.

"Bryan stepped up and was willing to make the change," Casey said. "And he's going to be a good player. He's also got the ability to play anywhere in the infield, and offensively he's come as far as anybody."

"Jeff brings us some experience. That and

his mental toughness will really help this staff. He's a good guy to have come in and pick us up at that position."

Third base will likely go to freshman Josh Carter or junior transfer Tim Dryden.

"Josh is going to be a real good player, but he's a freshman," Casey said. "He's got a ways to go but he can help us out."

Center field will probably be manned by sophomore Eric Stark, a returning letterman who started part of last season due to a teammate's injury.

"He's a guy who didn't hit for us as a freshman, but his mental makeup and confidence is much different now," Casey said. "If he can hit the ball for us, he can be a good player."

Dryden or junior transfer Rod Gott will be the designated hitter. Others who could find themselves in the lineup from time to time are junior infielders Craig Avery and Brian Duerr; freshman Ken Simonton may be in the outfield if the football player decides to try baseball this spring.

The pitching staff has the most holes to fill, having lost most of its starters and a closer.

"When those guys give you that many innings over a three-year period, the other guys don't get much experience," Casey said.

Junior righthanders B.R. Cook (1-3 record, 9.97 earned run average) and Mark Newell (8-0, 2.12 in 1997), who is coming off elbow problems, could fill the top two starting spots.

"B.R. has to step up and lead this staff," Casey said. "And if Mark is 100 percent, we know what type of guy he is - he has the ability to be the ace."

Another possibility for the rotation is senior righthander Mike Boire (3-1, 4.75), a control pitcher who holds the school's single-season and career save records.

"He's a three-pitch guy who's been in some big games for us," Casey said. "He's like B.R. - we really need him to step up and get it done."

Also in the running to start are transfer junior righthander Travis Rainwater, sophomore righthander Don Stykel and freshman lefthander Craig Hays.

Newell could begin the season in long relief, depending on how he progresses. Others could be senior righthander Hal Ranstad (1-1, 7.04); transfer junior righthander Pat Versluis, sophomore righthanders Mike Gits (0-0, 0.00), Paul Hansen (0-0, 12.71) and Brett Strode (0-0, 0.00); and freshman lefthander Jed Mitchell.

Competition for the closer role is between two transfer righthanders - junior Rich Dorman and sophomore Nathan Clarck.

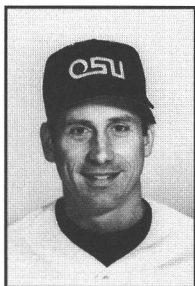

In its fifth season under Pat Casey, Oregon State's baseball program is out to take its tradition of success to new levels.

The Beavers have continued to win under Casey. His OSU teams have a record of 130-66-4, a winning percentage of .660. That includes a 38-12-1 record in 1997; that team's winning percentage of .755 was the fifth-best in Beaver baseball history.

Casey was also named Co-Coach of the Year in the Pacific-10 Northern Division for the 1997 season. The Beavers have set numerous school records during Casey's time at OSU; he and his coaching staff are aiming to take Oregon State even further.

"I think this program could be in the top 25 in the country and compete for a regional on a regular basis," Casey said. "I try to have my teams play hard and fundamentally sound. You have to do things right to win, and that's something I stress."

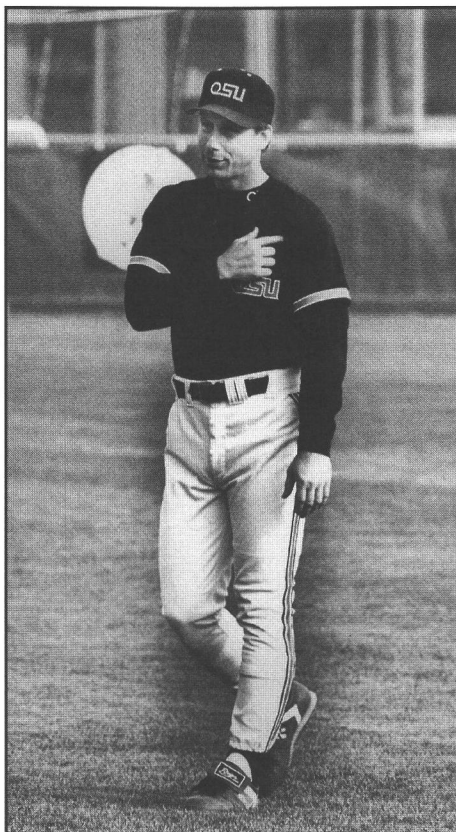
Casey has also been instrumental in the drive to build Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, which will open at Oregon State's longtime ballpark in the spring of 1999.

Casey came to OSU after spending seven seasons at George Fox College, an NAIA school in his native Newberg, Ore. Under Casey, the Bruins went 171-113-1 overall and were 155-54-1 against NAIA competition; they won three District 2 championships, five Metro Valley Conference titles and two Cascade Conference titles.

During his time at George Fox, Casey was named Coach of the Year three times in District 2, four times in the Metro Valley Conference and twice in the Cascade Conference.

Casey earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from George Fox in 1990. He played for the University of Portland from 1978-80 and was a first team All-NorPac Conference outfielder his final two seasons. He was also a second-team All-West Coast Region selection in 1980. He also lettered in basketball one season.

After being drafted in the 10th round by the San Diego Padres in 1980, Casey played seven



professional seasons. He reached Class AAA with the Calgary Cannons in 1985-86 and the Portland Beavers in 1987.

After concluding his playing career, he took over George Fox's baseball program and also played basketball for the Bruins while completing his degree.

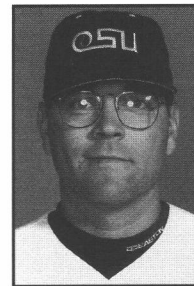
Casey was born March 17, 1959 in McMinnville, Ore. He graduated in 1977 from Newberg High, where he starred in football, basketball and baseball.

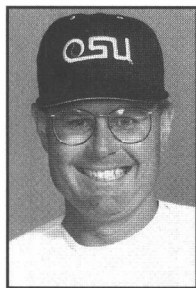

The job at OSU means a move home for Henderson, 37, who graduated from Sheldon High in Eugene and attended Linfield College before transferring to San Diego State.

Henderson was an assistant coach on Florida's teams that reached the College World Series in 1996 and 1998, placing third in 1996 and seventh in 1998. The Gators won the Southeastern Conference title in 1996 and tied for the title in 1998.

While at Florida, Henderson coached players to 13 All-America honors, two Academic All-America honors, nine All-SEC honors and 12 Academic All-SEC honors.

Henderson was named Assistant Coach of the Year by Collegiate Baseball magazine in 1996. Collegiate Baseball also gave national rankings to four of Henderson's recruiting classes at Florida, including a school-best No. 4 ranking in 1996. In the November, 1997 signing period, Florida inked six of the nation's top 50 prospects as rated by Baseball America magazine.

Prior to coaching at Florida, Henderson had been an assistant coach at Pepperdine. With the Waves, he served as recruiting coordinator and pitching coach. He coached players to two All-America honors and seven All-West Coast Conference honors.

Henderson was head coach at Chapman College after serving as an assistant coach there. He helped Chapman to its first national ranking in school history and into NCAA Division I.

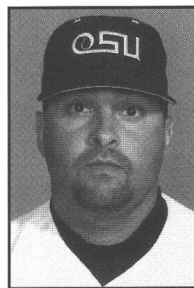
Henderson has also been an assistant coach at Cal State-Fullerton and Riverside Community College, and junior varsity head coach at San Diego State.

At Green River, Jones was named the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges Coach of the Year in 1998 as his team won the Western Region championship.

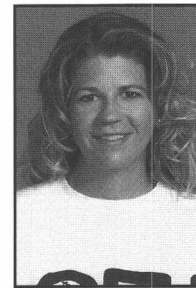
Prior to becoming head coach at GRCC, Jones served two years as an assistant coach. Both years, Green River finished third in the NWAACC tournament.

Jones also coached the Taylor Baseball 18-and-under team, winning four Mickey Mantle regional championships and twice reaching the semifinals of the CABA World Series.

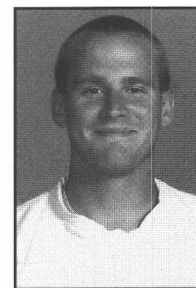

1998 season in review

Beavers are disappointed after great '98

An All-American, an Academic All-American, appearances in the national polls, a win over the eventual national champion - Oregon State had plenty of highlights during the 1998 season. OSU posted its third straight 30-win season, but was again left home when the field for the 48-team NCAA regionals were announced.

That disappointing postscript stayed the same, but there was a big difference from 1997 to 1998 for the Beavers.

"It was more significant that we had the opportunity to play the (Pacific-10) Southern Division and we were successful in that," OSU head coach Pat Casey said, noting his team's 7-2 record against the Southern Division. "That was the difference between last year and this year."

OSU swept 3-game series from Arizona and UCLA at Coleman Field, with the wins over Arizona coming when the Wildcats were ranked 10th nationally in one poll. The Beavers also took 1 of 3 games at Southern California when the Trojans were ranked third in the country; USC went on to win the national title by beating Arizona State in an all-Pacific-10 championship game.

OSU moved into the national polls for the first time in four years in April, eventually moving as high as No. 19 in the rankings. Oregon State led the Northern Division race much of the season before finishing second.

The Beavers were led by an outstanding senior class that included pitcher Andrew Checketts and catcher Ben Bertrand. Checketts was named to All-America teams by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association and by Collegiate Baseball newspaper; Bertrand was named second team Academic All-America.

"These guys played well, and it was good to see them rewarded," Casey said, pointing out that OSU had 4 players drafted and another sign as a free agent.

The Beavers managed their outstanding season despite a thumb injury that sidelined senior centerfielder Jason Stranberg for over a month, an illness that kept senior third baseman Ryan Lipe out of the lineup for 10 key games, and an elbow injury that shelved junior pitcher and returning All-American Mark Newell in the season-opener.

"We had some guys get some opportunities,

and it was nice to see guys respond to the chances they got," Casey said.

After losing several key players from an outstanding 1997 team, the performance of the 1998 Beavers was critical in showing that OSU intends to make a run at the postseason on an annual basis.

"It was nice for us to be able to do that, and

I thought we definitely upgraded our schedule," Casey said.

OSU's record of 20-4 at Coleman Field was the best home mark in the Pacific-10, and the success didn't go unnoticed by Beaver fans. Oregon State's average home attendance of 684 fans per date ranked 44th nationally among NCAA Division I schools.

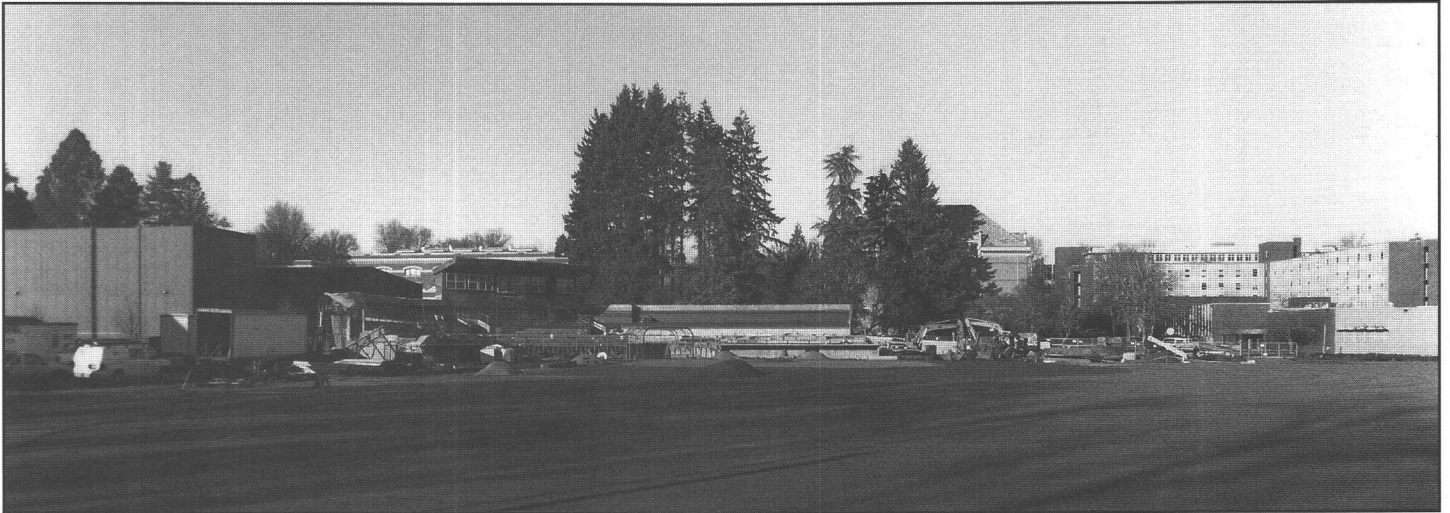

Beavers have a true original

Goss Stadium at Coleman Field has been OSU's only baseball home since 1907

When Oregon State began fielding a varsity baseball team in 1907, the school laid out a diamond on a lot just south of the main campus. Over 90 years later, that same site still serves as the home of the Beavers, making Goss Stadium at Coleman Field the oldest diamond in the Pacific-10 Conference and one of the oldest college ballparks in the country.

Over the past nine decades, the campus has grown around Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, making it one of the most picturesque settings in college baseball. The 2,000-capacity ballpark is a short walk down Waldo Place from the Memorial Union and OSU's central campus area, making it easy for students to stop by a game between classes.

The field is named for former Oregon State player and coach Ralph Coleman, who guided the Beaver program for 35 seasons from 1923-66. The stadium is named for the family of John and Eline Goss, who were major contributors to the project.

OSU's all-time record at Goss Stadium Coleman Field is 847-352-1 (.706). OSU's 20-4 record in 1998 was the best home mark in the Pacific-10, and the Beavers are 95-23 (.805) at home since the start of the 1993 season.

The park is symmetrical, measuring 330 feet

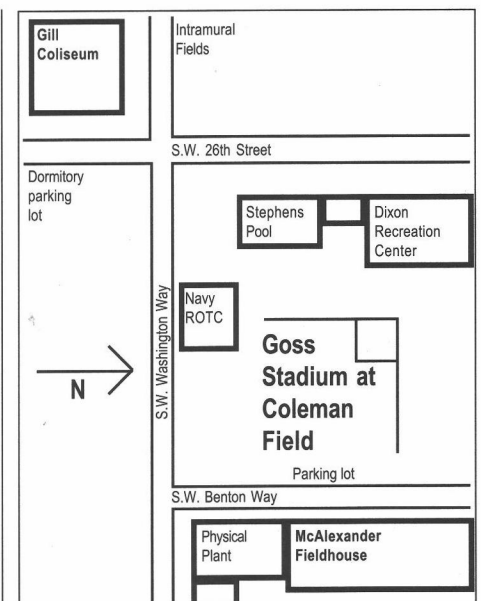


down the foul lines, 365 to the power alleys and 400 to center.

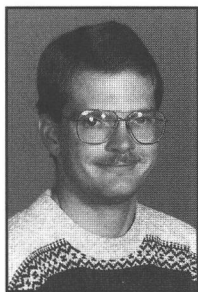
Goss Stadium extends roughly from first to third base. The concrete, steel and brick grandstand has approximately 1,500 seats, a press box, a lobby/concession area, restrooms, locker rooms, dugouts and storage areas. The stadium was designed to complement the architecture of the surrounding campus, and to evoke the aura of baseball's historic parks.

The field itself has been upgraded in recent years. The outfield was completely rebuilt in the fall of 1998; the infield was rebuilt in 1996. State-of-the-art drainage systems were installed in both areas, and the infield was covered with Turface for improved consistency.

Goss Stadium at Coleman Field has batting cages behind the left-field fence. When conditions call for indoor practice, the Beavers head for nearby McAlexander Fieldhouse, which has batting cages and an artificial turf surface.

Several OSU games will be televised, live and via tape delay, on Fox Sports Northwest. Scott Lynn and former Major League pitcher Bill Krueger will call the action.

Parking is limited at Coleman Field. Oregon State campus parking passes are required on weekdays, but not weekends. Free one-day visitors passes are available at the Parking Services Office just east of McAlexander Fieldhouse. Passes are good for the student/visitor lots behind the left-field fence and the lots next to the dormitories just south of Washington Way. Unrestricted parking is available at Parker Stadium.

Oregon State: Giving students a real education for the real world

Oregon State University provides real education for the real world. Innovative academic programs, cutting-edge research and exceptional facilities offer a compelling learning experience for success in life and career work.

Within the secure setting of one of the most beautiful campuses in the United States, OSU is Oregon's oldest state-assisted institution of higher education. Founded in 1868, OSU is Oregon's only Carnegie 1 comprehensive research university.

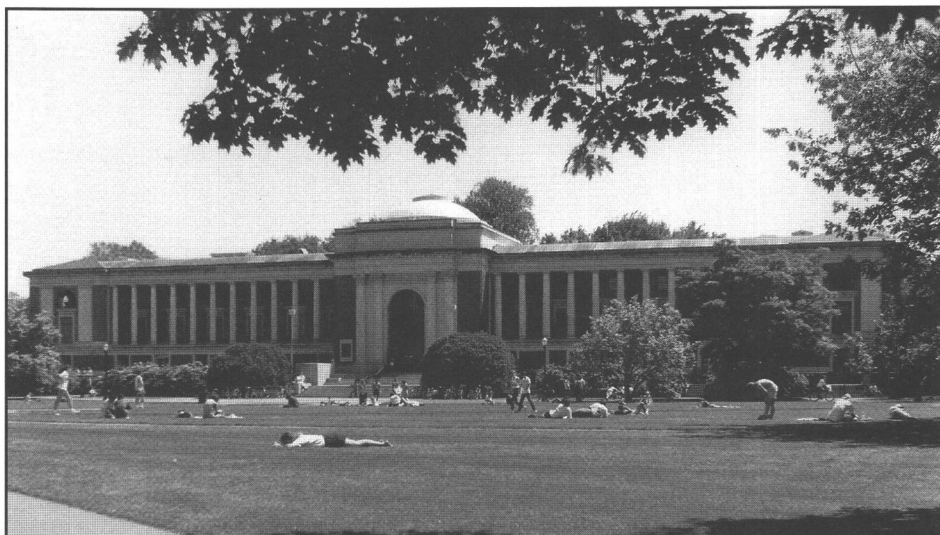
The university is internationally respected for teaching, research and public service as a Land Grant, Sea Grant and Space Grant university. Students come to OSU from every state in the nation and more than 100 countries to pursue undergraduate and graduate degrees in more than 200 distinct academic programs.

Preparing students for the future is Oregon State's top priority. With an enrollment of 14,500, OSU prepares students to achieve success in agricultural sciences, business, engineering, forestry, health and human performance, home economics and education, liberal arts, oceanography and atmospheric sciences, pharmacy, science and veterinary medicine.

Scholarly research is an important part of OSU's mission. A distinguished faculty of 2,000 scholars attracts more than \$130 million each year in external research grants. OSU's faculty members are at the forefront of development in information processing and networking, biotechnology, computer and marine science, advanced materials, family studies and human and environmental health.

The university operates academic and research programs in all 36 counties of the state and administers the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport, a seafood laboratory in Astoria and a fisheries culture station in Netarts Bay. OSU directs 10 branch agricultural research and development stations, manages two research forests, and has conference/education centers in both Portland and Medford.

Research done by OSU's Agricultural Experiment Station and branch stations throughout the state adds practical value for students and society. Through Extended Education, OSU reaches across the state to work with

citizens in such areas as energy conservation, home improvement, agriculture and forestry, community development and the 4-H youth program.

OSU is a leader in international education. The university has agreements, contracts and exchange programs with more than 75 foreign countries, and its innovative international degree program has attracted national attention.

Unique programs and facilities add to OSU's reputation for academic excellence. OSU is the only university in the Northwest involved in the National Science Foundation's national supercomputing infrastructure.

OSU's modern Communications Center and

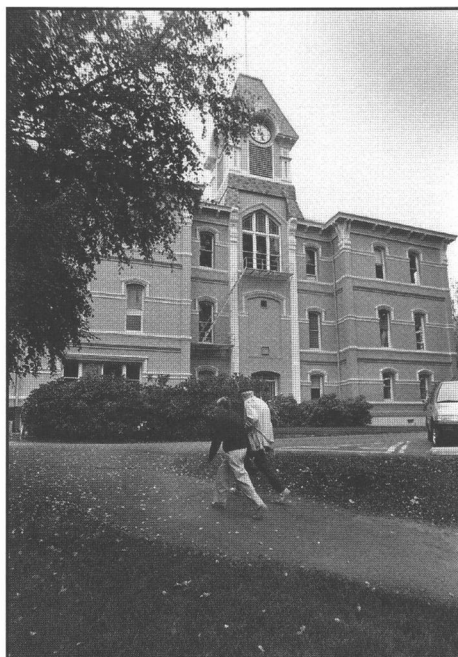
its three on-campus supercomputers - the largest concentration in Oregon - offer unique support for educational and research programs. Additionally, Oregon State is the only university in the country with two national centers supported by National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences.

The Alumni College offers an innovative program that allows all OSU students to take courses from the university for life without having to reapply for admission. Another innovation is "OSU Statewide," an initiative that will allow all Oregonians access to more than a dozen different degree programs with the convenience of a home computer, telephone or mailbox. Together, they illustrate the university's curricular innovation and educational leadership.

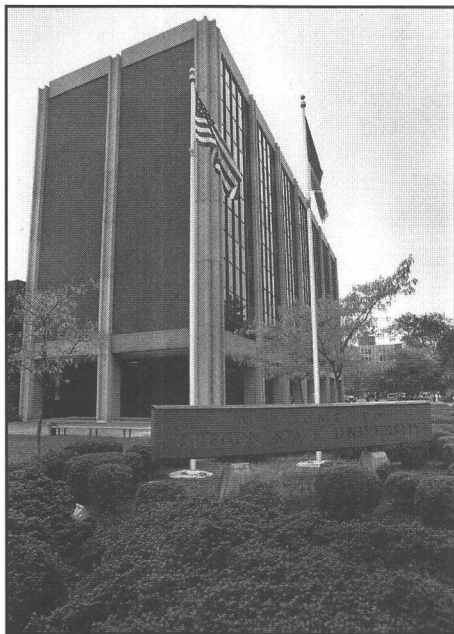
Since its inception, Oregon State has graduated young men and women who have gone on to lead the way in improving our world.

Perhaps the school's most notable graduate is Linus Pauling, the only person ever to win two unshared Nobel Prizes in different fields (chemistry, 1954; peace, 1962). Other Beavers include M. Lowell Edwards, the co-inventor of the first artificial heart valve and inventor of the Lande-Edwards artificial lung; Doug Englebart, inventor of the computer mouse and other pioneering computer technologies; Mercedes Bates, vice-president of the Betty Crocker division of General Mills who is generally regarded as the person behind "Betty Crocker"; and George E. Bruns, musical director for Walt Disney Productions and producer of music for 101 Dalmatians, Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer and other motion pictures.

As one of America's top-tier universities, Oregon State is shaping new directions for the future of higher education.

Beavers making grade in classroom as well as on field

When it comes to combining academics with athletics, Oregon State has a national reputation for success. Just take a look in *Sports Illustrated*, or any of the other publications that carried the news about the Beavers' national academic championship.

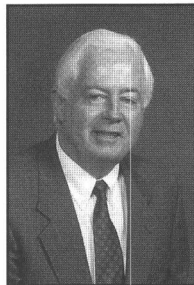
In July, 1996, OSU was named as having the highest graduation rate among NCAA Division I-A schools for scholarship athletes - 95 percent. The six-year study, which tracked students entering school in the fall of 1989, showed 42 of 44 graduating; OSU's 95 percent compared favorably to the 58 percent for Division I nationally.

Oregon State's support for athletes isn't limited to the classroom. The athletic department's BALANCE program - standing for Beaver Athletes for Lifeskills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence - has been recognized as a national leader in giving athletes a chance to mature in the areas of career skills, community service and personal development.

All of OSU's student-athletes are involved in some aspect of the program

Topics include time and stress management, communication skills, interviewing skills, networking, resume and cover letter writing, community outreach and public speaking, alcohol education, diversity, ethics, fiscal responsibility, manners and etiquette, nutrition and values clarification.

Dr. Paul G. Risser

Dr. Paul G. Risser, the 13th president of Oregon State University, began his tenure Jan. 1, 1996. Risser can often be found watching Beaver teams in action and has made a commitment to university support for athletics.

During his time at Oregon State, Risser has launched several initiatives aimed at making OSU an even more effective and respected institution in the 21st Century.

Risser came to OSU from Miami University of Ohio, where he had been president since 1992. Previously, he had been provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of New Mexico; he had arrived at UNM as vice president for research in 1986.

Honors bestowed upon Risser include being appointed a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1985 and the American Academy of Arts

and Sciences in 1994. He served as president of the American Institute of Biological Sciences in 1991-92; he is currently Secretary General to the Paris-based Scientific Committee on Problems of the Environment.

An internationally-known biologist, Risser's research interests include the structure and function of grassland and forest ecosystems, environmental planning and management, landscape ecology and global change.

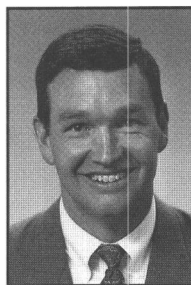
Risser has been a consultant to numerous organizations and agencies, including the Argonne National Laboratory, the National Academy of Sciences, the National Science Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.

Born Sept. 14, 1939 in Blackwell, Okla., Risser received his bachelor's degree in biology from Grinnell College in Iowa in 1961. He earned a master's degree in botany in 1965 and a doctorate in botany and soils in 1967 at the University of Wisconsin.

Risser worked as a research assistant at the Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine. He began his teaching career at Wisconsin in 1963 and joined the University of Oklahoma faculty in 1967.

Risser's wife is Les Risser; he has four sons.

Mitch Barnhart

Oregon State's athletic department made a big step in improving its profile on both a regional and national basis when it hired Mitch Barnhart as athletic director. Barnhart was named to the position in February, 1998, after serving 12 years as senior associate athletic director at Tennessee.

Barnhart has already begun many programs designed to make attending contests more fun for Beaver fans. Fan Fair and several other innovations were unveiled during football season, and coming seasons promise more activities to add to the good times.

Barnhart, who has a solid background in marketing and fundraising, earned high marks for management and fundraising during his years at Tennessee. He helped the athletic budget grow from \$11 million to \$38 million, and also contributed to full certification review for the athletic department. Barnhart also helped to hire all of the Volunteers' current head coaches.

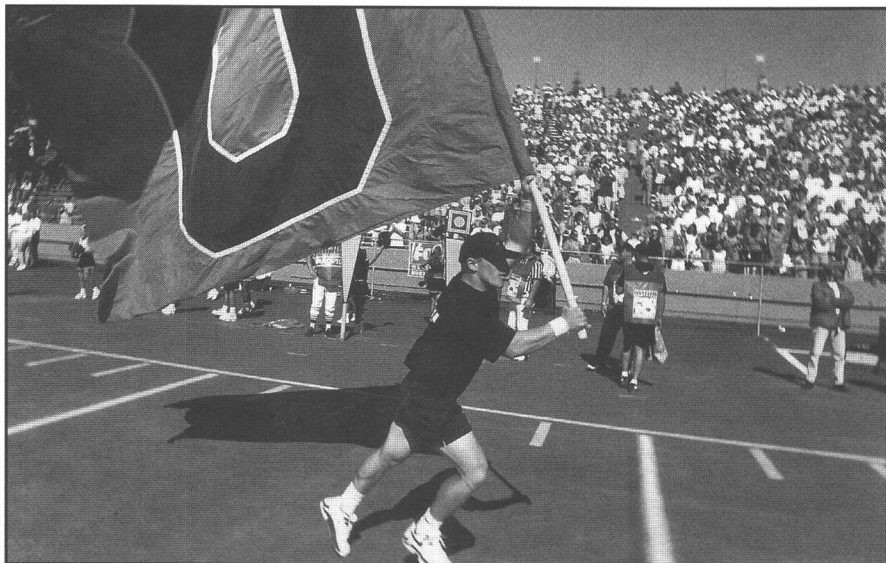
Born Aug. 27, 1959, in Kansas City, Barnhart has been associated with college athletics since his undergraduate days at Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kansas.

Barnhart started his climb up the collegiate administrative ladder in 1982 when he joined the staff at San Diego State. He moved to Oregon in 1983 and was in charge of Portland-area fundraising for the Ducks.

Barnhart went to Southern Methodist in 1983 and was assistant athletic director of the SMU Mustang Club fundraising group.

Barnhart's wife is the former Connie Brown, and they have three children: Kirby (10), Blaire (7) and Scott (4).

THE BEAVER NICKNAME: Oregon State University, like many other universities in the United States, takes its nickname from its home state's official animal.

In the school's early days as Oregon Agricultural College, the athletic teams were known as the Aggies. When orange uniforms replaced the drab sweatshirt-gray and tan jerseys, the teams were often referred to as the Orangemen.

In 1916, when the school yearbook was renamed the Beaver, the name Beaver became associated with the school. It is believed the press also had some influence in changing the name, particularly L.H. Gregory of The Oregonian newspaper in Portland. Whatever its origin, the name Beavers gained instant popularity among alumni and students.

THE COLORS ORANGE AND BLACK: Oregon State played its first football game in 1893 and orange was adopted as the school color. The school's yearbook, in fact, was originally known as the Orange.

Oregon State teams have generally worn uniforms using orange, black and white as the base colors.

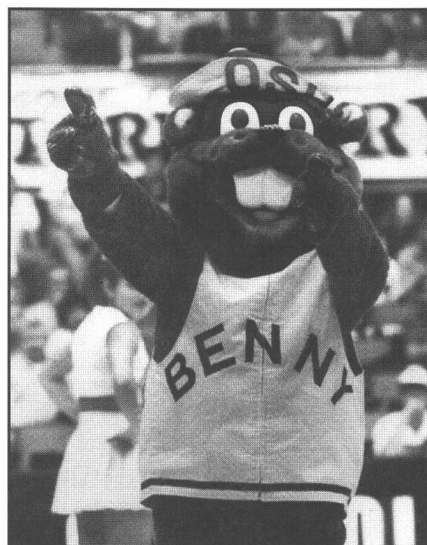
However, orange is still the school's official color. Former men's basketball coach Slats Gill and former football coach Tommy Prothro both popularized all-black uniforms during their careers at Oregon State, though, and some teams still wear black jerseys.

THE MASCOT, BENNY BEAVER: Oregon State's mascot is Benny Beaver, who can be found at most OSU athletic events.

Benny was introduced to the student body Sept. 18, 1952, in an effort to pick up sagging school spirit.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI: Oregon State athletes have produced numerous success stories through the years. Terry Baker, football's 1962 Heisman Trophy winner and Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year, is now an attorney in Portland. Gary Payton, who was named national men's basketball Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated in 1990, is currently an all-star for the Seattle SuperSonics.

Other notable former Beavers are Dick Fosbury, the creator of the "Fosbury Flop" style of high jumping; Carol Menken-Schautd, a gold medalist on the 1984 U.S. Olympic women's basketball team; and Steve Lyons, a noted broadcaster for Fox Sports.



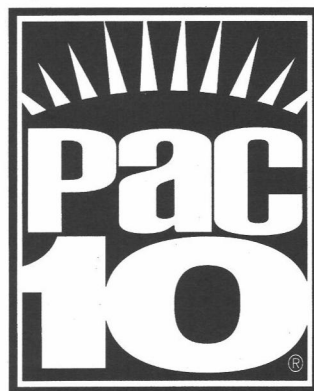

Beavers get to test themselves vs. nation's best

Athletes at Oregon State get to test themselves against the best collegiate competition in the country. Oregon State is a charter member of the Pacific-10 Conference, which also includes Arizona, Arizona State, California, Oregon, Southern California, Stanford, UCLA, Washington and Washington State.

During the 1997-98 academic year, Pacific-10 schools won 11 NCAA team national championships. The conference now has 236 all-time NCAA team national championships, by far the most of any conference in the country.

Besides baseball, Oregon State also fields varsity teams in football, volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, women's gymnastics, wrestling, women's swimming, softball, men's golf, women's golf, men's crew and women's crew.

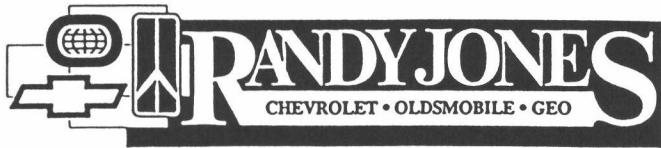


In the past five years, Oregon State has sent teams or athletes to national championship meets in women's soccer, women's basketball, women's gymnastics, women's swimming, wrestling, men's golf, women's golf, men's crew and women's crew. During that time, OSU has earned top-10 team finishes in women's gymnastics, wrestling, men's crew and women's crew. The Beavers were also nationally-ranked in baseball and softball last spring.

A wide variety of club sports are offered at Oregon State, including track and field and rugby. Intramural sports are also a big part of student life.

Oregon State's athletic facilities include 35,362-seat Parker Stadium for football; 10,400-seat Gill Coliseum for men's basketball, women's basketball, women's gymnastics, wrestling and volleyball; 2,000-capacity Goss Stadium at Coleman Field for baseball; and 1,500-seat Lorenz Field at Valley Stadium for men's soccer and women's soccer.

Offices, training facilities and meeting areas for most sports are also housed in Gill Coliseum, and teams also take advantage of the weight room and training area in the newly-expanded Valley Football Center.



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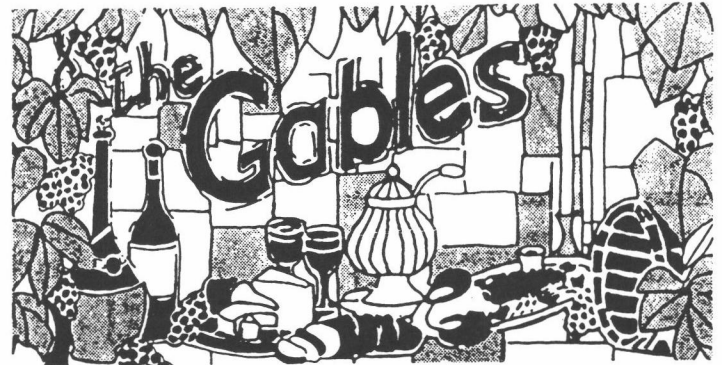
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
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
