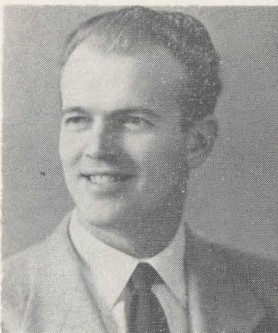

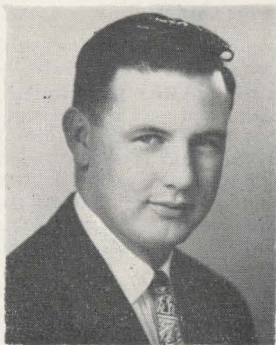

# Athletic Staff

**ROY S. "SPEC" KEENE**, athletic director, has long been one of the most respected citizens in the state of Oregon. And since he came to OSC in 1947, Beaver athletic have reached a stature never previously attained. Through his wide contacts with sports personalities, Keene has brought bigger and better athletic schedules to OSC, and, at the same time, managed to keep his school well within bounds of conference regulations.

When Keene graduated from OSC, he become head coach at Corvallis high. The next step was to that of assistant coach for the Beavers, where he remained until 1926, when he became headman at Willamette university in Salem. His Willamette athletic teams completely dominated the Northwest conference for 15 years and many of his players were named to little all-America teams. Willamette became the strongest small-college team in the northwest.

Keene replaced Percy Locey as athletic director in 1947. Through his careful planning and foresight, the beautiful OSC basketball Coliseum became a reality in the winter of 1949-50. Then last fall, Keene saw a long-cherished dream come true when Parker stadium was dedicated as Oregon State's new football plant. Because Keene had faith that it could be done, Oregon State now has one of the best all-around athletic plants in the nation.

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**JIM BARRATT**, athletic business manager, is Keene's loyal right-hand man in departmental duties. Operating on the theory that a constant smile stimulates ticket business, Barratt is one of the more popular members of the staff. Originally from Heppner, he finished at OSC in 1950 and became the assistant alumni manager. He left that position at the close of the 1951 grid season for his present job. He is a navy veteran of World War II, and coaches the OSC golf team each spring.

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**BILL ROBERTSON**, athletic trainer, has been in his present post since 1946 and has almost become a tradition with Beaver athletes. After four years of military service in Italy and the Aleutians in World War II, he returned to OSC to complete his schooling after discharge. Robertson shows no partiality in dealing with OSC athletes, and as a result is popular with all of them. Great at reciting poems, Bill often is called upon for his rendition of "Casey At The Bat."

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**JOHN EGGERS**, publicity director, assumed his post on July 1, 1952, after serving two years as assistant to his predecessor, Irwin Harris. From Pendleton, Eggers was an all-state basketball player in his prep days as a teammate of Lew Beck and played one varsity season for Willamette before entering the navy in World War II. He attended OSC from 1946-1949 and worked a year on the sports staff of The Oregonian in Portland before returning to his alma mater.

# The Coaches

## LeVerne H. "Kip" Taylor, Head Coach

Kip Taylor, head football coach for the Beavers since 1949, combines a strong personality with a vast background of grid knowledge to lead Oregon State into the football wars each fall. One of the hardest-working coaches to be found anywhere, Taylor can always be counted on to spur his proteges to great heights at a given moment.

Just as an example of Taylor's ability to get his players "up" for certain contests, look at his record against Oregon State's traditional rival, the University of Oregon. In five years, Oregon has never defeated a team coached by Taylor, and in at least three of those five years, the Webfoots were heavily favored to win.

His charges whipped the Webfoots, 20-10, in 1949 as Ken Carpenter and Dick Twenge ran rampant. Then, the following three seasons, Fullback Sam Baker led the way to impressive victories. Oregon State won by a 14-2 count in 1950, by 14-7 in 1951 and by 22-19 in 1952. The 1953 decision over Oregon was probably Taylor's most memorable, however. Oregon earlier had downed mighty USC and was tabbed as a three-touchdown favorite, but Taylor's Beavers gained a well-earned 7-0 verdict.

Kip's first experience in grid circles came at Ann Arbor, Mich., high school, where he was a star all-around athlete. What loomed as a great college career at Michigan was cut short in his sophomore year, when he suffered a broken neck in a game against Wisconsin. He was credited, however, with scoring the first touchdown in the new Michigan stadium. After graduation from Michigan, Kip became assistant at Ann Arbor high, leaving in 1934 to take over the head reins at George Rogers Clark high in Hammond, Indiana. He returned to Ann Arbor in 1940 and in the following six-year period his teams won 37 games while losing only five and tying the same number. By this time, he also had gained a master's degree from Columbia.

When Biggie Munn took over the coaching chores at Syracuse university in 1946, he signed Taylor as an assistant. A year later, Munn moved to Michigan State and took the Kipper as end coach and head scout. Taylor replaced Lon Stiner as Beaver headman in the fall of 1949, and in his first season here, won seven and lost only three. Among the victories was that great 25-20 nod over nationally-ranked Michigan State in Portland that fall. Then again, in 1952, Taylor scared Michigan State's national champions, losing a heartbreaking 17-14 decision in the final second of play. His teams have always been at their best against Oregon and Michigan State.

Taylor, in the past, has used the Michigan single-wing offense to advantage, but possibly will shift more to the split-T this coming season. He believes in changing his offense to cope with material on hand.

# The Coaches

**LEN YOUNCE**, line coach, carries a name synonymous with football success—both as player and coach. While comparatively young in years, Younce has won a mountain of grid honors, dating way back to his high school days.

Younce won all-city honors at Roosevelt high in Portland and started at OSC in 1937. He won all-coast acclaim in both his junior and senior seasons here and was listed on numerous all-American rosters, too. A natural all-around athlete, Younce also earned two letters as a baseball third baseman.

After finishing college, Younce began a great professional career with the New York Giants and Coach Steve Owen. He played for the Giants in 1941, 1943, 1944, 1946, 1947 and 1948. The sturdy Portlander was an all-professional choice three times, was team field captain in 1947 and team captain in 1948.

Probably Younce's greatest honor came several years ago, when professional coaches voted him on the first team, all-time professional all-star team. Among the elite Younce joined were Sammy Baugh, Mel Hein, Don Hutson, Bronko Nagurski, etc. When the Giants trained in nearby Salem this past summer, Younce was invited to help out with coaching drills and assist in scrimmage game officiating.

Younce has been line coach for the Beavers since 1949, when he joined forces with Kip Taylor. He is an excellent golfer and outdoor enthusiast and is known as a competent umpire, both in softball and baseball.

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**WARD CUFF**, backfield coach, is another who made a great name in the college and professional ranks as a player. Like Younce, who at one time was his pro teammate with the New York Giants, Cuff is a veteran campaigner. He played 11 seasons of pro football and was an all-pro choice on six occasions. He was with the Giants from 1937-1945, with the Chicago Cardinals in 1946 and with the Green Bay Packers in 1947.

Steve Owen, ex-Giant coach, calls Cuff one of the best all-around backs he ever coached. Ward was a standout on defense, as well as offense, and thought nothing of going the full 60 minutes. He also was an excellent place-kicker and won many games for the Giants with his educated toe.

Cuff was born in Redwood Falls, Minnesota, and was an all-stater in three sports while in high school. He won all-American honors at Marquette in 1937 as a halfback, and was also a great javelin thrower.

Oregon State's backfield tutor compiled an impressive coaching record, dating back to 1948. While at Central Catholic high in Green Bay, his teams won 25 and lost only three games. They were state (Wisconsin) Catholic champions three consecutive years. Cuff replaced Bump Elliott as Beaver backfield coach in 1951, when the latter left to join Forest Evashevski at Iowa.

# The Coaches

**HAL MOE**, end coach, is one of those versatile fellows who can do everything—and do it well. He has a long and successful career, both as a player and coach, and has always been extremely popular at Oregon State.

Moe's athletic career at Oregon State was climaxed in 1932, when he was named as an all-coast halfback. A great blocker as well as runner, Moe was a Beaver standout for three years and later played with the Chicago Cardinals of the pro circuit, in 1933. He was freshman coach here first, and later was backfield coach from 1936 to 1941.

As backfield mentor for Oregon State's only Rose Bowl team, in 1942, Moe developed such great ball-toters as Don Durdan, Bob Dethman and Gene Gray. That was the year that the Beavers upset Duke university in the transplanted Rose Bowl game at Durham, N.C.

After discharge from military service following World War II, Moe became head football coach and athletic director at the University of Portland. Although the Pilots were undermanned for the major competition they faced, Moe always turned out colorful teams. He resigned his post there in 1949, in order to return to his alma mater as freshman coach.

Moe also has handled the junior varsity eleven at OSC, and, in addition to numerous scouting duties, is in charge of the ends. He is a regular member of the physical education staff at OSC, and is head varsity coach in track.

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**DICK TWENGE**, freshman coach, is the newest and youngest member of the OSC staff. Remembered best for his great fullbacking with the Beavers from 1946 through 1949, Twenge also compiled an exceptional prep coaching record at Tigard and Corvallis high schools.

The Newberg redhead came to Oregon State in the fall of 1946, after two years of military service. Freshmen were eligible for varsity competition that season, and Twenge quickly won a spot as starting left halfback. That season the Beavers finished second, behind UCLA, in Pacific conference standings.

Probably Dick's best season was his last—in 1949—when Oregon State won seven and lost only three, and managed that great upset over Michigan State in Portland. The blockbusting type of fullback, Twenge always could be counted on for those extra few yards, and made a great running teammate for Kenny Carpenter. To this day, Carpenter still praises the work of Twenge at fullback, a position he played his last three years in school.

Still young enough to be remembered by most youngsters, Twenge is a valuable addition to the OSC coaching staff. He has boundless enthusiasm for the game of football, and is an Oregon Stater in the first degree.

# General Outlook

One of the most improved teams in the Pacific Coast conference . . . the best passing attack in several years . . . inexperienced, but eager personnel . . . a club that may start slowly and develop a little more each Saturday.

Those descriptions seem to fit the 1954 Oregon State football team perfectly, as Coach Kip Taylor starts his sixth season as headman for the Beavers. There's no talk of Rose Bowl in Beaverville, nor is there a defeat complex filling the air. Oregon State is sure to win some football games in '54, and a cinch to make it tough on the opponents they may lose to. The Beavers definitely are on the upswing, after one of the most peculiar seasons in history last fall.

Recall, for a moment, what happened in 1953. Oregon State failed to score a point in its first five games, then rallied to win three out of the last four contests and finish ahead of Washington, Oregon and Idaho in Pacific Coast conference standings. Unofficially, Oregon State was the "northern division" champion—even with one of its worst records ever.

Taylor lost a lot of good men off that heartwarming club—fellows like Ralph Carr, Kenny Brown, LaVerne Ferguson and Joe Fulwyler. All told, 16 lettermen from last season are no longer present. But when noses were counted on opening day, there were still 16 returning letter winners available, plus one of the truly fine sophomore crops of recent years.

Biggest Orange improvement will come in the all-important passing department. OSC's aerial game last year was nil; the team relied mainly on the running of Carr. It's a new look this time, however, for Taylor has three good passers instead of one. Veteran Jim Withrow, with three seasons of varsity play behind him, is sure to have his best year. And he'll be pressed all the way by those two bullet-arm sophomores—Bob Clark and Ray Westfall.

Clark and Westfall are both inexperienced, but have the size and throwing ability to make the Beavers a lot stronger in '54. Keep those names in mind—you'll be hearing a lot about Bob Clark and Ray Westfall. In the 1954 season, and on through 1955 and 1956.

Briefly, the overall picture sums up like this. A lot of experience and good depth at ends, and practically the same at tackle. One proven guard in Bill Johnson and some other promising ones, but not too much depth. Just fair strength at center. Exceptionally strong at quarterback, as aforementioned, and much improved at left half, where Veteran Jack Peterson will be pressed by Transfer Bob Sutton from Valley junior college of Los Angeles.

At right half, inexperience all the way. A good sophomore in Ernie Zwahlen and a promising transfer in Tom Berry from Valley JC. Either might develop, and if so, give Oregon State a diversified running attack. When practice started, Taylor planned to use the multiple offense—meaning they would alternate at Split-T, straight-T and Michigan single-wing.

Fullback presents a major problem, although the situation could change. Sophomore Dan Naranche is the best bet to fill gap created when Tommy Little left for Dental School.

So, generally, it will be a building year for the Beavers in '54. A few mistakes along the way, perhaps—sophomores are sure to contribute the miscues. But fans will see one of the most colorful and offensive-minded Beaver teams in many years.

## Did You Know . . . .

1. **That . . .** when UCLA's Bruins trounced Oregon State, 57-0, in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum in 1952, it was the worst defeat in Beaver football history—dating back to 1893? Other high scores recorded against OSC were: UCLA, 50-7, in 1946; USC, 48-6, in 1947; California, 42-0, in 1948; and UCLA, 41-0, in 1949.
2. **That . . .** Oregon State's highest score in its grid history was recorded against Willamette in 1931, when the Beavers triumphed, 76-0? Hal Moe, present assistant OSC coach, was on that club. Other highest Beaver scores were: 75-6 against the Chemawa Indians, in 1911; 64-0 against Willamette, in 1914; 68-7 against the OSC Rooks, in 1921; 68-0 against the Chemawa Indians, in 1921; and 67-0 against Multnomah Athletic Club in 1926. In modern football at OSC, top scoring mark was set against Montana in 1949, when Kip Taylor's Beavers won, 63-14.
3. **That . . .** Oregon State has never met the University of Minnesota on the gridiron, though the Beavers have tangled with such well-known international opponents as Michigan State, Nebraska, Syracuse, NYU, Fordham, Duke, Colorado, Utah, Detroit, Carnegie Tech and West Virginia? The Gophers and Beavers meet for the first time this fall, on November 6, at Minneapolis.
4. **That . . .** the last undefeated football season for OSC was back in 1914, when the Beavers won seven and tied two? E. J. Stewart then was coach, and OSC scored 172 points, against only 15 for the opposition. Lon Stiner compiled a 9-1-1 season in 1939, and in 1941, the Rose Bowl year, it was nine wins and two losses.
5. **That . . .** Oregon State played before its largest crowd in history against USC in Los Angeles on October 18, 1947? Attendance was 61,301, and the Trojans triumphed, 21-6. When the Beavers upset Duke, 20-16, in the "transplanted" Rose Bowl game in 1942 at Durham, N. C., attendance was 55,000, which was capacity for that stadium.

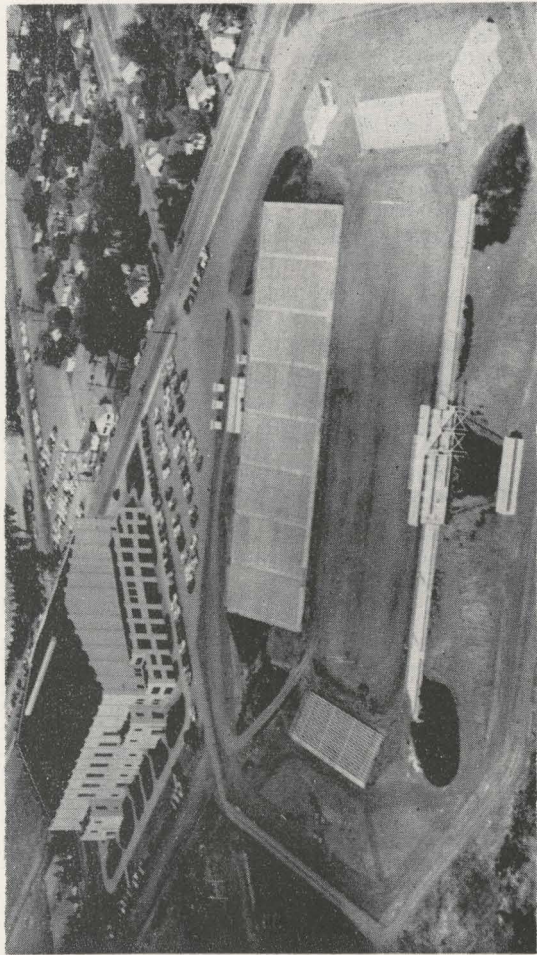
