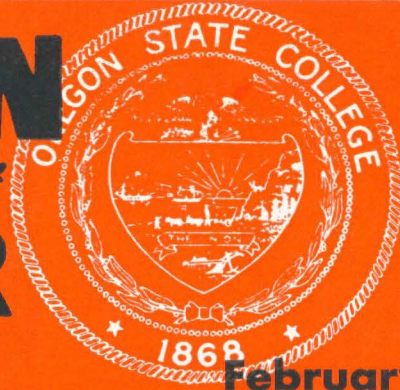

Happenings on the Hill

Football Awards: Joe Francis, star tailback, won the most valuable player award at the annual football banquet honoring the Pacific Coast Conference co-champions. Guard Bob McKittrick won the Attitude and Scholarship award. The Otto Sitton plaque for the outstanding lineman went to tackle Ted Bates, End Dwayne Fournier was presented the R. J. Chrisman trophy for the most improved player on the squad. Rookie of the Year award was presented to tackle George Enderle. The Miller Huggins trophy for the outstanding Rookie went to Tony Ankerson. Master of Ceremonies for the banquet was former California football coach, Pappy Waldorf, now supervisor of personnel for the San Francisco 49'ers professional team.

Fear of Science Plagues U.S. Students

FEAR OF SCIENCE is keeping vast numbers of able American youths out of science classes and careers today and constitutes one of the big obstacles faced by this country in science training, according to the dean of science at Oregon State.

Dr. F. A. Gilfillan insists that thousands of students "steer away from science courses in high school and college because they have the mistaken notion that science courses are too hard for them and too demanding in study time."

Girls, especially, hesitate to take science classes because they are "scared," he says. "In reality, of course, there is no reason why girls shouldn't do just as well as boys in science fields, he emphasized.

Gilfillan is quick to point out that students must put forth "real effort" in science studies but is convinced that the "overwhelming majority" of students should be able to pass and enjoy science studies.

"Some of them will find new worlds and new work opened to them," he says.

The problem, however, is that the "fear of science" is resulting in a tremendous waste of talent American youngsters possess along science lines, Gilfillan believes.

"We're to the point that some of our youths have been conditioned against science

instead of being encouraged to find out for themselves if they have the makings of a scientist," he adds.

Gilfillan is of the opinion that high school students should be required to take at least one year of biology, one year of a physical science—physics or chemistry—and "more than one year" of mathematics if they are going on with college studies.

In college, the "well-rounded" and "liberal" educations ought to include liberal amounts of science too, he continues.

High school and college teachers must assume some of the blame for the fear of science, according to Gilfillan. Some of them, lacking any science background themselves, are quite unsympathetic with science and the scientific method, and some of them simply let students take "the easy way out without ever letting them test themselves in science," he adds.

Basically, the fear is a "fear of the unknown" and once students find that science is not "out of this world or beyond their talents, the battle is pretty well won," he continues.

For America, the shift in thinking will lead to better and more scientists, the OSC leader concludes.

lished on the Beaver campus that interested alumni could very well give support to such a project.

Popular: More than 700 high school science and mathematics teachers from 47 states have inquired about the special 10-month teacher training program scheduled for Oregon State in 1958-59. OSC is one of only 16 colleges offering the special program this year and will be one of 17 next year. It is the only West Coast university named for 1958-59. This year Oregon State is training 54 teachers under a \$270,000 grant from the National Science Foundation and will be assigned 50 teachers next year with a \$248,000 grant.

Violations: During fall term 3552 student cars were on the campus. This means that 46.3 percent of Oregon State's students had cars. In the matter of violations the Rooks took honors with 528 violations out of 1824 citations. Income through the collection of fines totaled \$7,007 the past term. Purchase of stickers for car registration totaled \$6,656 and fines collected totaled \$2,351.

Getting Ready: The Associated Independent Students Mayhem production for this year will be *The King and I*. More than 100 students are actively engaged in organizing and rehearsing the musical play to be held spring term.

Voted: Students were scheduled to vote on carillon bells for the campus at a special election held late January. The students will be asked to contribute several thousand dollars toward the \$30,000 needed to install the bells. Several alumni have met with the students and have indicated that a number of OSC alumni interested in the project will solicit money for the bells.

There was some confusion at the beginning of the bell project and a number of students wrote to the student newspaper that they thought the bell project was waste of time and that the \$30,000 could be put to better use . . . for instance into a scholarship fund.

It looks as if the Beaver campus might have a melodic ring wafting over it before graduation time in June.

TV Star: Slats Gill, veteran basketball coach, took time off from drilling his varsity team to personally scout PCC basketball teams in Los Angeles in early January. While he was down in the southland Slats participated on the Bob Richard's sports show and discussed basketball styles of play. Mr. and Mrs. Gill also visited the 20th Century Fox movie studios and watched actor Gary Cooper practice a scene with a young starlet. Gill commented that the girl wasn't as pretty as many girls he'd seen. Said the veteran basketball coach with a chuckle: "I suppose those movie scouts see in those people the same things Paul (Valenti, Rook coach) and I see in a good basketball prospect."

Grants: Eight OSC students are attending school this year on full-tuition scholarships sponsored by the OSC Dads Club and another 36 promising freshmen have been given \$25 awards. Full tuition winners are Janice Turel, Dennis Salvon, Portland; Sue Wilson, Salem; Sheryl Youde, Grants Pass;

Martin Kerns, Klamath Falls; James Craig, Odell; Theodore Sakano, Ontario; James Muhonen, Boise.

Steps Out: Howard Raabe, resigned in January as director of the OSC intramural program in the physical education department to enter private business in Portland. Raabe is a member of the 1935 class. Jim Dixon, former Beaver football line coach and now on the physical education department staff, has been named director of intramurals. Raabe had been director since 1945.

Breakdown: Fall term registration at Oregon State showed that all of Oregon's 36 counties, 37 other states, and 37 foreign countries were represented. Of the record 7676 students enrolled, 6076 were from Oregon; 1170 from other states; 248 from U. S. territories; 182 from foreign countries.

Benton county had the most students, 1215, of any county. Multnomah was second with 1139, followed by Marion, 532; Linn, 354; Lane, 310; Clackamas, 271; Washington, 230. Portland students totaled 1094.

California topped the other states with 697. There were 205 students registered from Washington, and 69 from Idaho. Nineteen were from Illinois, 16 from Montana, 10 from Colorado, New York, Pennsylvania, and Utah. Hawaii had 198 students enrolled and 50 students were from Alaska.

Jammed Next Fall: About the only additional housing the college will be able to secure before 1959 will be the Acacia fraternity house on Monroe street. Recent purchase of the fraternity was authorized by the state board of higher education recently and it is expected to be used for male student housing accommodating 40 or more men. Acacia has purchased the Chi Omega sorority house at Van Buren street. The sorority has a new house under construction at 23rd and Van Buren.

Recent announcement of a new women's dormitory for 1959 perked up plans for increasing coed enrollment. The new dorm and cafeteria will be constructed on a sloping hill east of Waldo Hall. The building will have a five-story structure with a daylight basement on the east side, thus giving it six floors. It will be of new type construction, the general design resembling the two new dormitories occupied this fall behind Main dorm, but the exterior of insulated aluminum sheets. The aluminum will be faced with colored porcelain panels.

Helpful: A "frustration" car was placed in the middle of the Memorial Union quad during final week. The purpose was to help raise money for the United Fund and also give students a chance to blow off steam. Large sledge hammers were provided for the men and smaller ones for the women. Surprisingly enough, within a few days the old car was battered and ripped apart ready for the junk pile. The students seemed to take great delight in taking out their frustrating academic experiences on the car. Not a bad idea.

Bigger: Plans to enlarge the 1958 Junior Engineers and Scientists summer institute at Oregon State to include more than 300 high school boys have been announced. The program is designed to give promising high



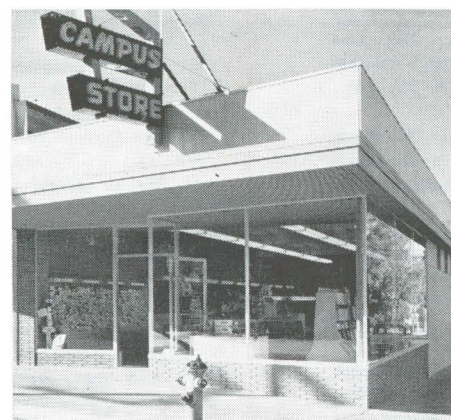

school juniors and seniors a two-week orientation on careers, opportunities and course requirements in engineering and science fields. The OSC institute was the first held in the nation and its success has prompted scheduling of seven other regional programs this year.

Given: Books valued at \$7000 have been placed in the Oregon State Kerr library since 1943 through a book plan sponsored by the Friends of the Library. By the plan, books are given to the library in memory of deceased faculty members, students, and friends of OSC.

Grades: Sixty-nine students made straight A grades during fall term. Another 455 students are listed on the 3.5 honor roll. Three freshmen, seven sophomores, 16 juniors, and 18 seniors made the straight A record. The remaining top students were in the graduate school.

Faculty Notes: Dallas Norton, assistant registrar and personnel coordinator of OSC

is now on a four month sabbatical leave. He is continuing his studies for a doctors degree in education.

Dr. Edouard Bourbousson, professor of modern languages, has announced plans to conduct a summer tour to Europe for the seventh straight year. Countries to be visited this year are France, England, Holland, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, Monaco, Spain, and Portugal.

Dr. D. D. Hill, head of farm crops, flew to Santiago, Chile on New Year's day to attend a South American seed seminar.

A \$17,700 grant has been awarded to **Dr. E. F. Kurth**, professor in chemistry, to study the chemical composition of tree bark. The grant is from the National Science Foundation. Dr. Kurth will study lignin, a little-known substance which makes up about 50 percent of the dry weight of most barks.

Four Oregon State staff members were recently elected for committee appointment at the American Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities in Denver. Dean of Home Economics **Miriam Scholl**, **Miss Mabel Mack**, assistant director, federal cooperative extension service, **Miss Clara Storvick**, professor of foods and nutrition, and **Miss Frances Clinton**, state leader of home economics extension, were the members elected.

Dr. Ivan Pratt, professor of zoology, has been awarded a \$11,237 grant by the U. S. public health service to continue research on fish parasites.

Kline R. Swygard, professor of political science, has returned to the campus after 27 months in Thailand. Professor Swygard lectured at two universities in Thailand under a Fulbright grant.

OSC students gave 763 pints of blood in the annual campus blood drive.

Alumni on Spot

Without half trying the alumni of Oregon State have really been put on the spot by OSC students. The story goes back a few years.

Several years ago a few alumni began thinking about a chapel for Oregon State. To make a long story short a chapel at this time was considered out of the question for several reasons . . . the biggest being the amount of money that had to be raised.

Chimes or bells were considered a necessary part of a chapel and thus the idea grew that since a chapel could not be built then at least the bells would be a step in the right direction. The alumni behind this idea felt that beautiful carillon bell music ringing out over the campus and city would help create a wholesome and memorable college atmosphere.

Well the bell idea struggled along uneventfully even though some money had been collected. Then the project received impetus this past year when a few alumni started a more active campaign.

All along the alumni interested in the project have indicated that student acceptance of the bells would be the prime factor in whether to go ahead. Meetings with the student leaders followed and explanations were given of carillon bells and costs.

The student senate finally decided to hold an all-school vote on whether students wanted bells. Unfortunately, several articles and letters in the student newspaper contained some mistaken ideas about the project and also the notion grew that there was some fund totaling \$32,000 just waiting to be spent.

With all the publicity about the lack of scientists these days, many students wondered why the \$32,000 should go into such a "frivolous" project as buying bells when so many deserving students needed scholarships.

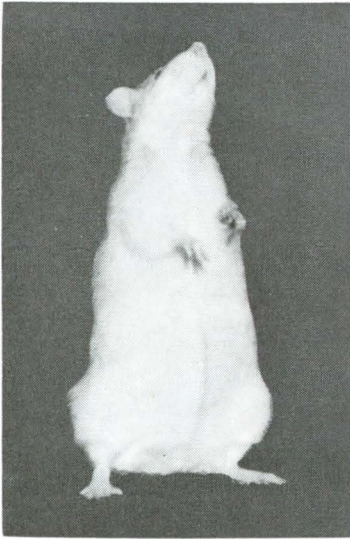
One student wrote to the Barometer saying "*Do we really need carillon bells? Granted, they would be a nice addition to our campus, but so would gold-plated sidewalks . . . from our universities come leaders of tomorrow, and I hardly think carillon bells will help them get the education they need.*"

Another student said: *Personally, I think the alums as well as the students should be entitled to vote on a question of this nature.*" Another letter stated that . . . "*as close as we can find, the Alumni Association as a group is not putting up the money for the bells as is popularly believed. It is a select few alums that are backing the bells and many of the alumni, even in the Corvallis area, are not aware that it is being done in the name of the Alumni Association. If a few alums will back the bells we feel that many more would back the center (International Student Center).*"

To have bells or not to have bells. That is the question on campus. The alumni are in the middle whether they know it or not.

"Hot" Food Makes Fat Rats

Irradiated Food May Be Product of Atomic Age



Please sir, none of that plain stuff . . . it's irradiated food for me.

A ROOMFUL of 1200 white rats at Oregon State is helping to answer questions about the wholesomeness and safety of irradiated foods that some day may be on tables in homes across America.

The irradiated foods—promising new product of the atomic age—are being fed to the rats to see whether they affect length of life, gains, or number of offspring.

To date, no differences have been found between rats on irradiated and non-irradiated foods, according to Dr. Edward C. Bubl, leader of the project started in September 1954. Foods under test are pork, peaches, carrots and jam.

The foods are irradiated for preservation at the Idaho Falls, Idaho atomic energy installation and then shipped to Oregon State in cans. They are stored for at least six months at room temperature as part of the test of the effectiveness of the food treatment.

Ten other U. S. research centers are also working on other phases of the research that is sponsored by the surgeon general's office, department of army.

Since OSC started its diet studies with rats in 1954, it has been awarded \$128,000 by the surgeon general's office. A new grant of \$33,600 was received recently to continue the work through the fall of 1958.

The white rats that are the test animals are carefully picked and observed. Brothers and sisters are used in comparisons with one

third receiving untreated foods, one third receiving normal dosage level irradiated foods, and one third receiving a double dose irradiated food diet.

When the rats die, body tissues are examined by Dr. Jesse F. Bone, agricultural experiment station veterinarian to see if they have been changed by the irradiated diet. No differences in body tissues have been noted in tests to date. Some of the rats have been on test two years, long past the usual life span of ordinary rats.

Dr. Bubl and other agricultural chemists at Oregon State are also studying problems of flavor changes that develop in irradiated foods.

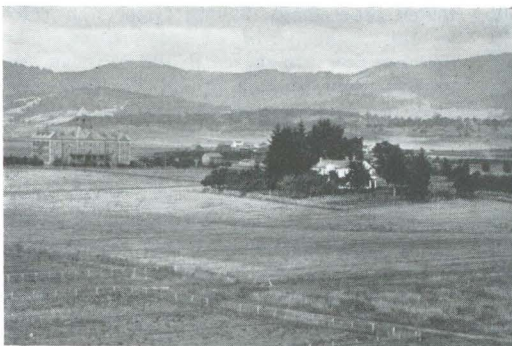
For example it has been found that some foods, such as beef, take on a different flavor when irradiated. The flavor changes result from extremely small amounts of an unknown compound formed in the ionizing treatment. The scientists are trying to isolate the compound in the treated meats and then find ways to "block" or "bind it up" so flavor is not affected.

Flavor changes are much more pronounced in some foods than others. Flavor of pork is almost unchanged by irradiation while beef shows marked flavor change.

Still other studies on irradiated foods are underway at Oregon State in the food technology and bacteriology department. Special grants have been received for all of the various projects.

Waldo Hall: Mansion of Memories





From the book on OSC history, the Orange and Black, this view showed "a boarding house for girls, razed when Waldo Hall was built on the same spot. Because it was owned and operated by a family by the name of Hogg, boys dating its inmates were accused of pigging. Unaccountably, this expression has been used at the University of Oregon and fussing has replaced it at Oregon State."

"They just don't seem to make buildings like that anymore," seems to be a typical comment heard often when talk centers around Waldo Hall, girl's dormitory now 50 years old this year.

Whether this is praise or condemnation of good old Waldo is sometimes hard to distinguish. But the fact that the building is half a century old and always used as a dormitory, is still in good shape, and probably will be used for many more years, all adds up to its credit.

Many alumni can still remember when the horse drawn wagons slipped through the mud up the small hill to the site of Waldo Hall loaded with timbers, bricks, and mortar. The time was during the 1906-07 year. Waldo Hall, named for Clara H. Waldo, former regent of the college, was opened for the 1908 school year.

The dimensions of the building were an impressive 96 by 240 feet. It contained 115 rooms for students when first constructed with space for 300 girls. With all the remodeling the past half-century it is remarkable that the number of rooms have been reduced by just one, leaving 114 rooms. At the present time there are also three hostess apartments.

In 1908, the new dormitory also included a kitchen, dining room, parlors, and Domestic Science laboratories. The laboratories have long since disappeared and the bottom floor has been converted into needed storage areas.

Of course remodeling of Waldo has almost continually been carried on over the past 50 years. The largest change came just

a few years ago when all wash basins were ripped out of the rooms, bathroom facilities increased, an enclosed fire escape and entrance was constructed on the north end of the building, and the roof rebuilt.

But basically Waldo Hall still remains a large, yellow brick structure and from the outside its appearance has changed little. A number of years ago the thick, tenacious growth of ivy was removed and much of the shrubbery cut back.

At the start of the 1957-58 school year 287 coeds called Waldo home. During this term there are 246 girls living there out of a possible 300 living spaces. For many years Waldo has been designated as the Oregon State freshman dorm for women. Now the Rookesses are also placed in other, newer dormitories.

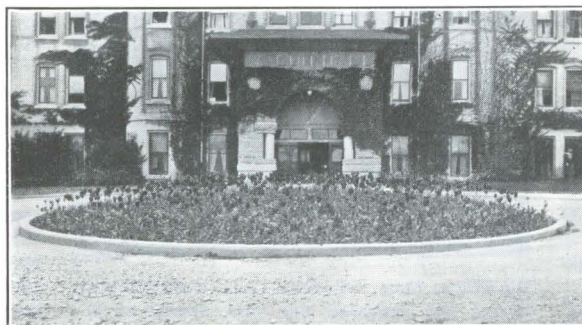
In 1905 the state appropriated \$65,000 to build Waldo. By the time construction could begin the cost of the building had been raised to \$76,000 and the \$11,000 had to be added by the state from the miscellaneous fund. (Sounds much like today's costs.)

Someday Waldo Hall will have lived its

usefulness. At the present time Oregon State has plans for a new five-story girl's dorm just east of the building. There will also be a new cafeteria with connecting tunnel to Waldo. Thus Waldo's existing cafeteria area will be converted into a much needed storage area. This new dormitory will be ready for the 1959 school year and will then offer graphic comparison between the old and the new. One thing is sure. There will be many landscaping changes in front of Waldo soon. The old turn-around that has plagued autos and drivers for many years will finally be removed and a street put through.

During the last half century over 12,000 Oregon State women have lived in Waldo. Interesting experiences and lasting memories have become a part of the 50 year old building.

What stories Waldo Hall could tell if it could only speak. Perhaps some of Waldo's former residents will speak for it. The Oregon Stater alumni magazine would be interested in hearing and keeping for the record some of Waldo Hall's most memorable events.

IT WAS A LITTLE AMAZING to us, the way Oregon State's basketball team started off the season. The Beavers figured to be strong, but with virtually the same lads returning from last year's club that wound up with only a 11-15 won and lost record we saw little chance of any Pacific Coast Conference title ahead.

After the first 11 games of the season, however, Oregon State had won 10—losing only to Iowa in overtime back at Iowa City in mid-December, and our men had polished off both California and UCLA in their only league tussles. So consequently, the Beavers suddenly loomed as a full-fledged championship contender in the PCC.

This all may change after a couple of important road trips ahead, but at this writing the situation looks good. And it might be interesting to analyze, in part, just why the Beavers apparently are so much stronger than most everyone earlier anticipated.

Sure, Dave Gambee is one of the all-time greats—everybody knew that. But even with Dave throwing in more than his share, the team still wound up sixth in league play in 1957. The main strength of Slats Gill's current crop stems around the fact they have far more balance, and have been getting some great performances out of the two starting guards—Lee Harman and Jim Anderson.

Harman seems to have "found" himself in his junior year, after an only mediocre sophomore campaign. He's a popular one with the fans, too, because of his drive and aggressiveness. If Lee ever becomes a top shooter, you can start comparing him with some of those back-court greats of the past.

Anderson has been somewhat of a surprise, too—especially on defense. The ability of Kenny Nanson to hit from almost anywhere when they collapse on Gambee has been another big factor, and the two big men—Gary Goble and Wayne Moss—have carried the load well at the post position. True, we haven't much bench strength outside of Larry Copple, but if the Beavers keep going like they have thus far they might not need it.

Wouldn't it be something if the astute Mr. Gill surprised them all with his fifth Pacific Coast Conference championship. A long way off, but a possibility.

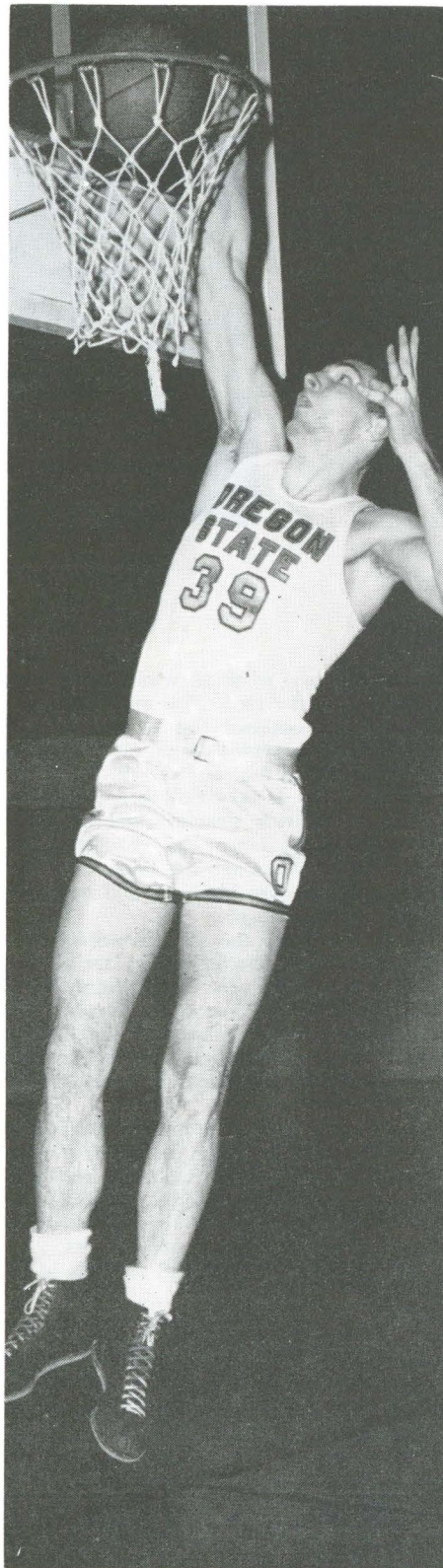
After Fourth Straight Title

Dale Thomas has another potent wrestling squad going full blast, and frankly, we doubt if anyone will halt their drive to a fourth consecutive Pacific Coast title. Thomas might not agree—few coaches would—but there's a lot of class on this one, and the boys get a lot of fine coaching from Thomas and his assistant, Bill Koll, who incidentally was formerly head coach at Iowa State Teachers college.

Lettermen back are Jake Connelly, John Dustin, Bob Kennedy, Joel Neuschwander, Ken Noteboom and Larry Wright, and four of those are past coast titlists in their respective weight classes. Who could go the farthest in national competition? Probably Dustin, who last year placed fourth nationally in the 191 pound class.

Wrestling has continued to grow at OSC since coastwide tournaments were started in 1950. One might say Oregon State has dom-

inated proceedings, having swept four titles in the eight years of competition. The matches now are staged in the coliseum and crowds seem to pick up all the time—last year, we had some 4000 fans for a match with Oregon.

Swimmers Still Strong

Art Koski's swimmers, who finally shattered that Washington domination of northern division swimming in 1957, will be in a fairly good position to defend their crown. But look for the Huskies to bounce back strongly. Swimming is one sport the Huskies have always taken a lot of pride in, and they want that title back.

Veterans returning are Mike Clark, Gary Hubbard, Martin Harms, Ben Jensen, Jerry Marti, Ken Shaw, Dale Sweatt, Art Welch and John Welch, and that gives the hard-working Koski a pretty fair nucleus to build around as another season approaches. As this went to press, the OSC mermen had not yet faced any dual competition.

Rooks

Looks as though Paul Valenti came up with the best freshman basketball potential Oregon State has experienced in several years. At least five men are considered good varsity prospects for future years, and five is a better than average number.

The best ones appear to be Steve Flynn, 6-5, Mountain View, Calif; Ernie Johnson, 6-6, Valsetz; Karl Anderson, 6-9, Oakland, Calif; Roger Johnson, 6-2, Coos Bay; and Mike Carson, 5-7, San Francisco, Calif. Keep your eye peeled on Anderson, for he's a real comer. He moves extremely well for a man that size, and reminds one a little of Red Rocha when he was first starting out.

As Paul says, the principal task of the freshmen coach is to develop future varsity prospects—not just win every game he plays, although Valenti certainly loves to win as much as the next guy. We think a lot of these Rooks are sure to help in seasons yet ahead, and after all, that's the important point.

The Rose Bowl

We were the first to admit the University of Oregon did a magnificent job at the Rose Bowl. Len Casanova is a fine coach and a real gentleman, and so are most of the assistants down at Eugene. But we are getting tired reading about Oregon's "moral victory" in the newspapers, weeks after it all happened.

It's interesting to note, too, that the Portland Chamber of Commerce plans to fete the Ducks for their great effort against Ohio State. Nothing like that happened when Oregon State lost by two touchdowns to what we think was a better Iowa team a year ago at the Rose Bowl. Sure, we didn't win, but neither did Oregon.

Oregon Staters can always point with pride to the fact that the Beavers beat Oregon in Oregon's greatest year, and wound up with a better season record, too. Not to mention that Oregon wouldn't ever have seen Pasadena, had Oregon State been eligible to return.

In the great hub-bub that followed the Rose Bowl game, a lot of statewide fans seem to forget that Tommy Prothro beat the man they're all talking about. Eight victories in 10 games normally would be considered a pretty fair season, the best since

Tommy took over three years ago. We wonder if those who forget all too soon would have been impressed had Tommy won all 10 games on his schedule.

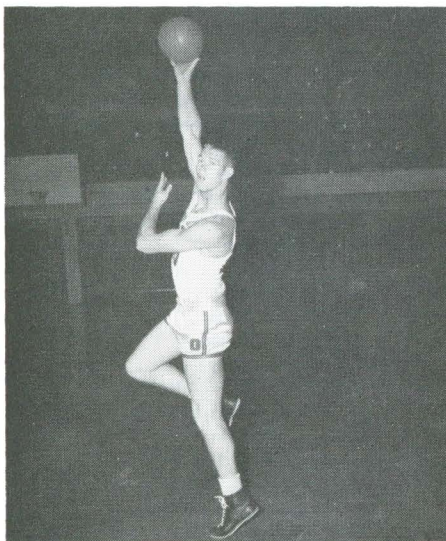

Gary Goble, 6-8 junior from Toutle Lake, Wash., changes in the center position with Moss. Has good agility but lacks scoring ability.

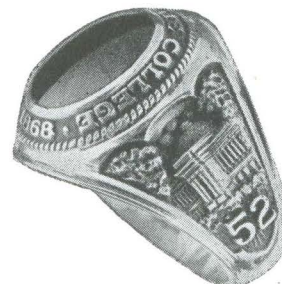
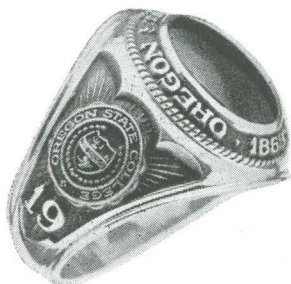

Dear Oregon Stater:

Do you ever search for the "right" word? There has been much in the press lately of President Eisenhower's "groping" for words, supposedly caused by his recent illness, and much is made of it. (It is supposed to be news). I find that without an illness, I, too, grope for the right word at the right place to express just exactly what I want to say and some times I find it very difficult. I have been in this state for some months now over the proper designation of

the listing of those individuals who have contributed to the Foundation's efforts during the past calendar year.

Other institutions of learning use the term Honor Roll in connection with the listing of names of contributors. I understand that the University of Oregon Development Fund is about to come out with such a title. That so many schools use it must make it acceptable if not actually factually correct.

Perhaps because I spent part of my life in the Marine Corps and am now spending a good share of it in the Memorial Union, Honor Roll means to me a draped flag with red and blue stars on it, plaques of names of those "who gave the last full measure of devotion", and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier; (someone once remarked irreverently that it could not be a Marine buried there; whoever heard of an unknown Marine). On the other hand there is another distinctive meaning to the term honor roll and that is for the recognition of those who achieve scholastic distinction. This, too, is time honored and accepted.

So, it is with some reluctance that I look upon the use of the title Honor Roll to describe a list of names of contributors to an educational effort. Of course, unless I can come up with a better word, perhaps I may have to use it. My Webster's dictionary tells me what honor, n., really means and none of them exactly fit. My Webster's dictionary of synonyms lists also recognition, acknowledgment, adulation, compliment, tribute, panegyric, and encomium. Of them all, the meaning of the word acknowledgment in the sense of sending a message, indicating the receipt and acceptance of a gift of one's gratitude, seems to me to fit the proper word to the idea to be expressed. So, without in any way attempting to downgrade my appreciation for the contributions received, I think that I shall use the word ACKNOWLEDGMENT instead of Honor Roll. That will leave the term Honor Roll free and unsullied for use in its proper place.
