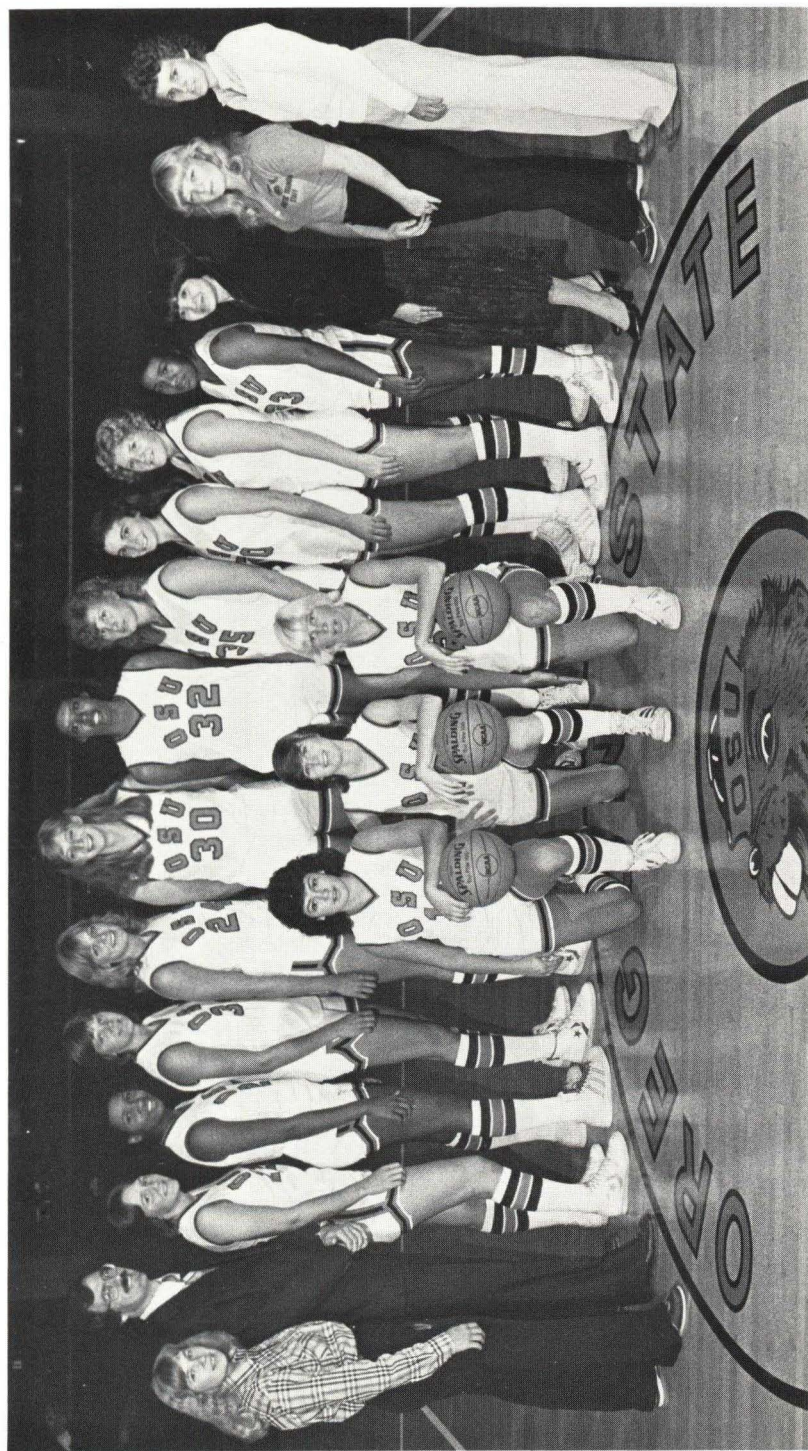

Oregon State University, now in its 113th year, ranks as one of the leading educational and research centers in the United States.

OSU is the oldest state-supported institution of higher learning in the state of Oregon with a charter day of Oct. 27, 1868.

Oregon State is one of just a handful of universities in the United States which is both a Land Grant and Sea Grant institution. OSU, and the other dozen universities, have the responsibility of wisely developing our resources on both land and sea.

The students of Oregon State come from nearly every community in the state of Oregon as well as every state in the nation and from about 75 different countries.

The first class at OSU, in 1870, consisted of a grand total of three persons, two men and one woman. Since that time, the school has grown to where it now confers some 3,300 degrees each June and the enrollment has topped 17,000. But the emphasis remains on the individual.

Oregon State's growth has been organized and carefully charted. A campus of more than 400 acres has helped make that possible but the core of campus consists of classroom buildings, the library and the Memorial Union, or student center. The outer circle of campus consists mainly of residence halls and research buildings.

Many new buildings dot the OSU campus this year. The recently completed veterinary medicine building is one of the finest of its kind in the country and work has just recently finished on a Cultural and Conference Center.

Another major construction project has been the addition of easy access ramps, doors and elevators for the handicapped. Much of the campus is now completely accessible and construction is continuing.

About one out of every six students at Oregon State is in Graduate School, working on master's or doctor's degrees. Bachelor's degrees are offered in about 150 fields; master's in 100; and doctor's in more than 50.

Oregon State provides the research base for Oregon's two largest industries—forestry and agriculture. The school's accomplishments in energy, food and environmental science have drawn national attention.



GILL COLISEUM: Home of the Oregon State Beavers

Gill Coliseum, once renowned only as a showplace for men's basketball, has taken on a more versatile role in recent years.

Women's basketball now has a home in Gill, as does gymnastics, wrestling and volleyball, making it a year-round facility.

The Oregon State women's basketball team first began playing its games at Gill Coliseum during the 1976-77 season. Many of those early games were as preliminaries to the men's team, but now the OSU women draw enough spectators to warrant solo events.

The facility was named after the late Slats Gill, an Oregon State basketball coach for 36 years and later the school's athletic director.

Gill Coliseum covers one and one-third acres. The peak of the building is 83 feet above the floor, equivalent to a four-story building. The framework consists of 12 fabricated steel arches. There are no posts, so all the seats at Gill Coliseum provide an unrestricted view of the events. About 85 percent of the seats are located to the sides of the floor, enhancing the view.

Attendance capacity for Gill Coliseum is approximately 10,000 depending on the event. Gill plays host to a number of concerts and other events during the year in addition to sports.

Attendance at women's athletic events has been growing by leaps and bounds at Oregon State University. A total of 23,148 attended women's athletic events at Gill Coliseum during the 1980-81 year.

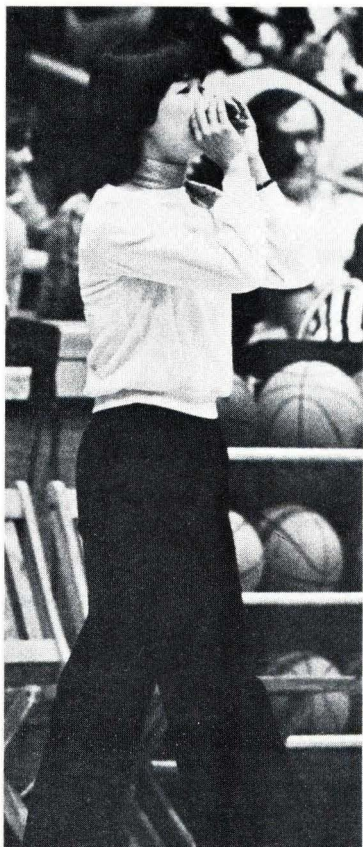

During her three seasons as head women's basketball coach at Oregon State University, Aki Hill has transformed the program from one of mediocrity to one of national prominence.

In her first year as coach at OSU, Hill guided the Beavers to a second place finish in the Northwest Women's Basketball League and an upset of top-seeded Oregon in the finals of the Region IX Championships.

A year later, 1979-80, the Beavers again finished second in the NWBL and finished second behind Oregon in the regionals. But the Beavers impressed enough people during the season to gain an invitation to the National Invitational Tournament and they responded with the NWIT championship.

Last year the Beavers finished again behind Oregon and for the second time in three years, they defeated the Ducks at regionals. The team finished the season ranked 18th in the country.

Hill has accomplished all of that and more in just three years. Oregon State has compiled a record of 60-21 during those three seasons and received national recognition.

Hatsue Aki Hill is a native of Japan. She has trained under some of basketball's most noteworthy authorities, including the legendary UCLA coach John Wooden. Other former mentors of Hill's Hill's are Tatsuo Hata, a leading Japanese authority

on basketball, Pete Newell, former coach of California and general manager of the Los Angeles Lakers, and Stu Inman, director of player personnel for the Portland Trail Blazers.

Hill has spent the last 25 years playing, studying and coaching basketball. She began coaching in the United States in 1976, assisting the women's basketball teams at Foothill Community College and Santa Clara University in California.

Prior to her United States experience, Hill was the first and only woman coach in Japan's 75-team AAU organization in 1970. She coached the Tokyo Marine Insurance teams, guiding one to a second place national finish during her final year of coaching.

In 1972, Hill took a leave of absence from coaching to study in a special program under Wooden at UCLA. She is one of the few women, or Japanese, coaches to have such an extensive background of training in the United States.

As a player, Hill competed for three years in high school basketball, then seven years on an AAU first-division team in Japan. She was a starting guard for the Tokyo Marine Company, the same team she later coached. Her team won the national championship in 1965.

Hill's most recent experience has been as an assistant coach of the United States women's basketball team this summer. The squad competed in a two-week Jones Cup Tournament in Taiwan.

Hill has been nominated twice for the Wade Trophy as Coach of the Year.

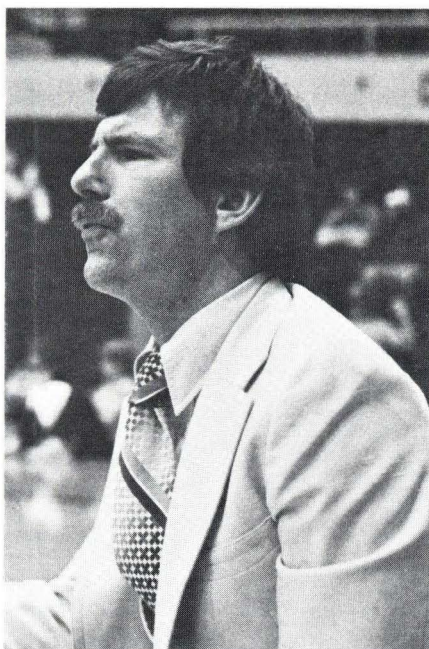
Ross Cook is beginning his fourth season as assistant women's basketball coach to Aki Hill at Oregon State University.

The two have compiled a career record of 60-21 at Oregon State.

Cook came to OSU in September of 1978 to begin work on his master's degree in physical education. Before coming to Oregon State, Cook taught and coached for five years in Caldwell, Idaho.

Cook taught physical education at Lincoln Elementary School in Caldwell and helped coach the boys basketball team at Caldwell High. He also coached the women's tennis team at his alma mater, the College of Idaho.

Cook was also active as an athlete, lettering in basketball and tennis. He played guard for three years on the College of Idaho basketball team.

Dr. Sylvia Moore took charge of the growing Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at Oregon State in July of 1980.

Prior to her appointment as athletic director, Moore spent 14 years on the Oregon State campus as a faculty member and is familiar with all facets of the University. Rebuilding Beavers change style of play

A new era is about to begin in women's basketball at Oregon State University.

No longer will coach Aki Hill and her OSU Beavers be dependent on the scoring talents of just one person, a la Carol Menken, the nation's leader last year in scoring and field goal percentage. Menken is gone now—playing basketball in Italy—and with her went the one-dimensional game.

Hill and assistant coach Ross Cook have a new game plan, a plan to step up the defensive pressure and play more of a team-oriented game. With half of the 1981-82 team being newcomers, that task may take some time.

"We have a lot of new people, so we'll have to make some adjustments," Hill said. "But it will be an opportunity to play my style of basketball. We've tried to change for two years, but we have always had to depend on Carol for scoring."

Hill believes the Beavers have the personnel to adapt to the new Oregon State basketball philosophy. Although a number of players from last year's team are gone, in addition to Menken, OSU has a good nucleus of returning players and a number of transfers and freshmen. In fact, the OSU coaches feel that the Beavers have the potential to be as good, or better, than last year's regional championship team which was ranked 18th in the nation.

The new style of play is based largely on defensive pressure. Hill said she would like to see the Beavers play more man-to-man defense this season, use the fast break more often and apply pressure all over the court. She is also hoping to develop players with more all-around skills.

"Last year we had players who were good at part of the game, but they weren't well-rounded," Hill noted. "We want to change that this season."

Hill would like to develop all of her players into the all-around mold, beginning with the center position. There is no heir apparent to Menken right away, but the Beavers should have plenty of height to compete in the Northwest Women's Basketball League.

Leading the list of center candidates is Jan Martin, a 6-2 junior from Crescent Valley High School in Corvallis. Martin had an average of 4.5 points a game while backing up Menken last year.

Pushing Martin for a starting position will be an impressive freshman from Garden Grove, Calif. Tanya Mothershed, a 6-4 center, averaged 24.3 points and 16.1 rebounds during her senior year at Santiago High School.

The Beavers were counting on a third center, 6-4 junior transfer Cheryl Campbell, but she recently underwent shoulder surgery and won't enroll at Oregon State until winter term. Campbell, formerly of Cal State-Los Angeles, will likely redshirt the 1981-82 season.

Oregon State is loaded at the forward position. The leading returner is Robyn Clark, a 5-11 junior who averaged 8.5 points and 5.5 rebounds a game last year. Clark is one of the team leaders and the OSU coaches expect her to have her best season yet.

A transfer who may step in and provide immediate help to OSU this year is Judy Spoelstra, a 6-foot junior from Washington State. Spoelstra has good court sense and can play the tough aggressive game that Hill likes.

The lone returning senior on the squad fits more into the role of small forward. Margy Becker, 5-7, is the leading returning scorer on the team with an average of 8.7 points a game. Becker will be another team leader and her hard-nosed, aggressive style of play fits right in with Hill's new philosophy.

Freshman Tina Blair of Portland's Marshall High is another of Oregon State's impressive recruits. The 5-10 freshman was an all-state player in high school, averaging 15.5 points and 11.0 rebounds. She had minor knee surgery during the summer, but has since recovered and gives the Beavers a finesse player around the basket.

Another forward on the Beaver roster is 6-foot MaryLou Weinmeister, a transfer from Montana State. The sophomore has high school experience at center, but is making the transition to power forward at the college level.

Forward appears to be the strongest area on the team, but the Beavers aren't hurting at guard either, thanks to the talents of one Cheryl Kelsey.

Kelsey transferred to Oregon State last year, but played in just one game. However, she is back to stay at OSU and her list of credentials is long and impressive. Kelsey, of Killarney Secondary School in Vancouver, B.C., was named to the Canadian All-Star team. She was

also named Canadian Female Basketball Player of the Year in 1980, was a Provincial All-Star two years in a row and was named Most Valuable Player or selected to the all-star team of every tournament she has played in since the 10th grade.

Kelsey was also a member of the 1980 Canadian Olympic team.

Kelsey's backcourt mate this year may turn out to be 5-5 Cheryl Sturzenegger, who saw some starting time last season. Sturzenegger averaged 5.0 points a game and was the catalyst in the Beavers' press and fast break.

Another guard with experience is Belinda Lopez, a 5-7 sophomore who saw limited action last year, but knows the OSU system. Lopez has a good shooting touch and can play point guard, a position the OSU coaches expressed concern about during the off-season.

Two other guard candidates should also see playing time this season. Senior Cheryl Cady red-shirted last year after suffering a knee injury and many need some more rehabilitation work. But Hill is also high on a freshman, 5-8 speedster Juli Coleman of Issaquah, Wash. Coleman was the leading scorer in the state of Washington last year with a 36-point average.

Another guard, 5-6 Jessica Williams of Sonoma State in California, has been injured and sat out most of the preseason, but has recovered and will give the Beavers depth.

Hill feels that she has the personnel to accomplish Oregon State's change in basketball philosophy. Her returning athletes are solid basketball players; her new players are good athletes who know how to play basketball.

Now the task is to get the Beavers to play the team style of basketball—running, pressing and being more aggressive.

"I feel that we will be able to match up reasonably well this year so we'll try a full court or half court man-to-man press," Hill said. "I would like to see everyone hounding the ball. The direction our team is taking right now is okay, we just need to develop a little more quickness and develop some of our taller players into all-around players."

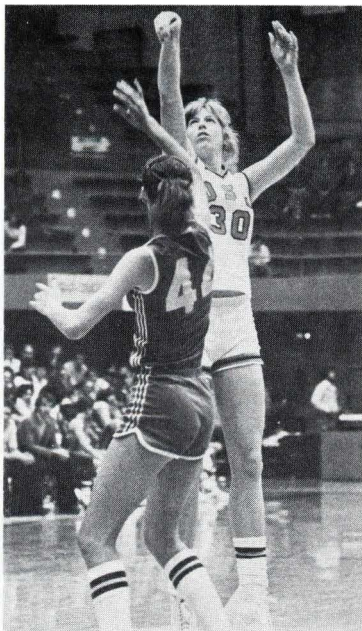
The 1981-82 season will be a tough one, especially with the adjustments to a new team and a new philosophy. The Beavers open at the Queen's Classic in Plainview, Texas, in an eight-team tournament which features all-ranked teams, including defending national champ Louisiana Tech. Other tournaments include San Francisco, Giusti in Portland and the Nike in Los Angeles.

The top league foe for Oregon State, as it has been for the past few years, should be the University of Oregon. The Ducks have won the league the last three years, but OSU has defeated Oregon in two of those years for the regional championships.

Hill feels that the potential is definitely there for a strong team, perhaps another nationally ranked team. But there are certain hurdles the Beavers must first clear.

"Everyone has to make the transition to a faster, more aggressive style of basketball," she said. "It will take a lot of mental intensity to play pressure defense. And we're going to have to mold all the new people into a team.

"It's going to be a challenge for everybody—the freshmen, the transfers, the returners and the coaches," she said. "But I really believe that this team will be more dynamic and better all-around than last year's team."

MARGY BECKER, 5-7, G-F, 21, Sr., Newport, OR

Returning for her senior year, Margy Becker becomes the first player at OSU to compete for all four years under coach Aki Hill. Becker is the leading returning scorer on the Beavers this year with an 8.7 average. She is also the top returner in steals from last year's team and led the NWBL in assists.

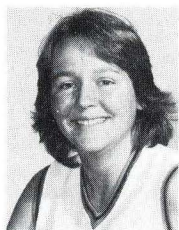
A tough, aggressive player, Becker is also a fine shooter and has a career field goal percentage of better than 50 percent. Becker has always been a good shooter, playing three years of prep ball at Newport High School, a Class AA school. During her senior year, Becker led her team to a 24-1 record and a state championship. In the title game, she scored 32 points, a state tournament record. Becker won all-state and all-coast honors and was named American Scholar-Athlete for excellence in athletics and scholastic pursuits.

As a sophomore, Becker was named to the National Women's Invitational Tournament All-Star team in 1979.

Becker is a physical education and business major...she is the daughter of Tom and Silvia Becker and one of 10 children...she was born May 12, 1960 in Newport, Oregon.

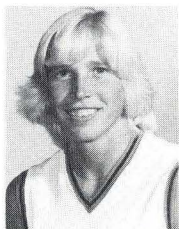
Knee injuries have hampered Cheryl Cady since she transferred from Brigham Young University, but the 5-5 guard seems healthy now and should make a solid contribution to the Beaver backcourt.

Cady averaged eight points and five assists her freshman year at BYU and five points and five rebounds her sophomore year. She redshirted last year at Oregon State and is now a junior in eligibility status. Cady played prep ball at Huntington Beach High School in California, where she was a guard on teams that went 22-1 and 25-2. She was an all-tournament selection at the CIF Tournament, all-league in 1977 and 1978 and was selected to play in the Orange County All-Star game in 1978. Cady was also an all-league volleyball player in high school.

Academically, Cady is a senior in pre-therapy...she is the daughter of Joe and Mary Cady and one of three children...she was born December 29, 1959 in Newport Beach, California.

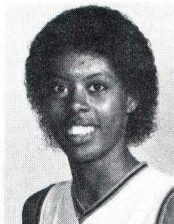


TANYA MOTHERSHED, 6-4, C, 18, Fr., Garden Grove, CA

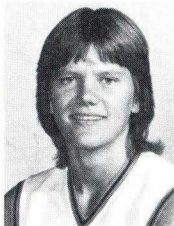


JUDY SPOELSTRA, 6-0, F, 21, Jr., East Wenatchee, WA

The Opponents

TOURNAMENTS

Oregon State will play the toughest tournament schedule in its history during the 1981-82 season. The Beavers will play in a record four tournaments during the regular season, then compete in regionals and, hopefully, nationals.

The regular season tourney schedule is a strong one. OSU will open its season at the Queen's Classic Nov. 26-28 at Plainview, Texas. The Classic is one of the strongest women's basketball tournaments in the country and this year features a number of nationally ranked teams.

Second on the schedule is the popular Giusti Tournament in Portland Dec. 16-18. Eight teams from all over the United States will participate in the Northwest's finest tournament.

The Beavers will open the new year at the University of San Francisco Tournament Jan. 1-2. It will feature four western teams traditionally strong in women's basketball.

The final regular season tournament for Oregon State will be Jan. 22-23 at the Nike Tournament in Los Angeles, Calif. The Nike is also a four-team tournament featuring strong teams from the western United States.

QUEEN'S CLASSIC, NOV. 26-28

1ST ROUND: Oregon State (22-6) vs. Wayland Baptist (19-10)
Kansas (27-5) vs. Clemson (23-8)
Missouri (21-12) vs. Stephen F. Austin (24-11)
Louisiana Tech (34-0) vs. Illinois State (28-8)

The 1981-82 Queen's Classic in Plainview, Texas may just be the toughest regular season tournament in the nation this season. The tournament, scheduled for Nov. 26-28, features eight teams which have a combined record from last season of 198-60, a .767 winning percentage.

At the top of the list is defending national champion Louisiana Tech. The Lady Techsters breezed to the national title last year without a defeat and didn't lose a starter to graduation. In fact, they lost just one letterman, return 12, and had one of the top recruiting years of any team in the nation. Tech has four returning starters averaging in double figures, led by Pam Kelly's 17.5 points and 9.5 rebounds. Others are Janice Lawrence (14.9, 8.3), Angela Turner (13.6, 5.4) and Lori Scott (10.1, 7.4).

There are other strong teams, however, who could mount a threat to the Lady Techsters. Oregon State's first opponent will be Wayland Baptist, the host school in this powerful tournament. The Flying Queens return four starters, led by 6-1 Terri Henry (11.6, 6.1). In the other matchup in OSU's bracket, powerful Kansas will tangle with Clemson. Kansas was ranked 10th in the nation last year, but returns just two starters, led by 6-foot sophomore Tracy Claxton (14.1, 11.6). The Jayhawks will face Clemson, winners of the Atlantic Coast Conference and ranked 20th in the nation last year. The Lady Tigers have a number of returning players, led by All-American Barbara Kennedy, who averaged 26.2 points a game last year.

In the opposite bracket is Louisiana Tech, which will open against Illinois State. ISU has an unenviable task, but the Redbirds won't go into the game empty-handed. They were ranked 15th in the nation last year, although they have since lost three starters to graduation. They do return 5-11 junior Kathy Boswell (18.5, 9.5) and have a 6-4 freshman recruit, Melody Adams, to plug up the middle.

The other matchup will pit perennial power Stephen F. Austin against Missouri. Stephen F. Austin had 11 losses last year, but that is a misleading statistic since the Ladyjacks played one of the nation's toughest schedules. SFA returns three starters, led by jumping jack Pam Crawford, who averaged 12.1 points a game and was named to the World University Games team. Missouri will be one of the tallest teams in the country this year with seven players taller than 6-feet. The Tigers will be led by 6-1 forward Lorraine Ferret, who averaged 15.5 points and 8.1 rebounds a game last year.

GIUSTI TOURNAMENT, DEC. 16-18

1ST ROUND: Tennessee (25-6) vs. Washington State (12-16)

Ohio State (17-15) vs. Portland State (7-17)

Oregon State (22-6) vs. California (23-13)

Oregon (25-7) vs. Louisiana State (17-15)

OSU will open the Giusti Tournament against the University of California, a team which the Beavers defeated 82-78 last year. The Bears went on to place first in the NorCal Conference, however, and post a 23-13 season record. They return three starters and other lettermen, led by 6-2 junior Chris Sellin (10.2, 7.0).

In the other matchup in OSU's bracket, the Oregon Ducks will take on Louisiana State. Oregon posted a 25-7 record last year and was ranked 12th in the AP poll. The Ducks return just two starters, but they are good ones—All-American Bev Smith (19.8, 11.8), a 6-1 senior, and 6-3 sophomore Alison Lang (12.5, 7.0) who was a member of the Canadian National team. LSU had a 17-15 record last season and was led by Joyce Walker, now a sophomore, who averaged 20.7 points a game last year.

Tennessee is the class of the upper bracket. The Volunteers were ranked second in the nation last year and had a 25-6 record. Tennessee returns just two starters, led by 5-4 guard Lea Henry (10.6, 167 assists), but came up with three good freshmen, including 6-5 center Tammy Larkey. The Volunteers will open against Washington State, a team from the Northwest Women's Basketball League and an annual foe of OSU. The Cougars struggled to a 12-16 record a year ago, but will be an experienced team with four returning starters, including Jeanne Eggart, a 5-8 senior (22.6, 6.6).

In the other game, Ohio State will tangle with Portland State. PSU had a tough season last year with a 7-17 record, but the Vikings return four players who will form a solid nucleus and have two recruits who should step in and make an immediate contribution. C.J. Sealey could be the top player—she was a three-time all-region selection at Seattle University before transferring to PSU. The Vikings' opponent, Ohio State, had a 17-15 record last year and the Buckeyes return two impressive starters. They are 5-11 Amy Tucker (17.1, 6.4) and Mary Sivak (16.8, 9.1). Ohio State also has a number of new players, including three six-footers.

UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO TOURNAMENT, JAN. 1-2

1ST ROUND: Oregon State (22-6) vs. Hawaii (11-16)

San Francisco (22-8) vs. Pepperdine (24-10)

Oregon State will open its third tournament of the season against the Hawaii Rainbows (or Wahines). The Rainbows had a tough 11-16 record last year, but return four starters, including 6-0 Aurora Adams (11.7, 8.2). Hawaii also recruited 6-foot junior center Ann Wise.

In the other bracket, the University of San Francisco will take on Pepperdine. Host USF lost four starters, including an All-American, and return just one player from last year's 24-10 team, 5-11 junior Lisa Baptista (8.0, 3.0). The Lady Dons did recruit a pair of strong freshmen and a junior college transfer. Pepperdine is on the other end of the spectrum with four returning starters, led by Fannie Allen (20.3, 9.9). Kelli Johnson and Gigi Staggers both averaged 13 points a game for Pepperdine. The Waves, 24-10 last year, also picked up two JC transfers including 6-2 center Joann Smith of Santa Barbara City College.

NIKE TOURNAMENT, JAN. 22-23

1ST ROUND: Oregon State (22-6) vs. California (23-13)

UCLA (29-7) vs. Nevada-Las Vegas (12-12)

For the second time this year, OSU will open a tournament against the Golden Bears of California (see Giusti Tournament).

In the other bracket, powerful UCLA will tangle with the Lady Rebels of Nevada-Las Vegas. UCLA, always one of the top schools in the country, placed fifth in the NCAA last season and had a 29-7 record. The Bruins have three returning starters this season, led by Necie Thompson, a 6-1 sophomore (14.3, 8.7). UCLA lost All-American Denise Curry, but have five lettermen in addition to the three returning starters, and UCLA had its usual strong recruiting year with three high-scoring freshmen.

UNLV has four returning starters, including two who have been starters for the last three years. They are Kathie Calloway (15.5, 12.3) and Tina Glover (13.1 points). The Rebels, 12-12 last season, added a pair of 6-footers from high school to bolster their inside attack.

CONFERENCE OPPONENTS

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON

Dec. 20, Hec Edmundson Pavilion, Seattle, Wash.;

Jan. 30, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon.

This is supposed to be a building year for the Huskies and coach Sue Kruszewski but the University of Washington returns six lettermen and has a number of good recruits.

Washington's leading returner is senior Carlin McClary, a 6-foot forward who averaged 11.6 points and 9.6 rebounds a game last year. This will be her fourth year on varsity. Two other players who averaged in double figures return—6-2 junior Liz Chicane (14.3, 8.5) and 5-9 sophomore Karen Murray (13.3, 6.2). The Huskies also have a number of top recruits from all over the country. 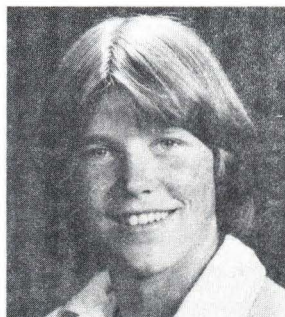

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Jan. 15, MacArthur Court, Eugene, Oregon;

Feb. 11, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon.

Oregon coach Elwin Heiny returns just two starters from last year's 25-7 team, but the pair of Ducks that do return are good enough to ensure another successful season for that team that has won the NWBL the last three years. All-American Bev Smith, a 6-1 senior, (19.8, 11.8) is one of the top players in the nation and she has plenty of help from 6-3 sophomore center Alison Lang, (12.5, 7.0) who was a member of the Canadian National team. The Ducks also have a top recruit in Chris Metzger, a 6-foot freshman from Fremont, Calif., who was a Parade All-American in high school. She averaged 30.9 points a game as a senior. Oregon also recruited 5-10 guard Tracy Beckes, the Northwest Player of the Year, who hails from Mt. Vernon, Wash.

Oregon was 25-7 last year and the champs of the NWBL, but the Ducks lost to OSU in regionals. They were ranked 12th in the nation at the end of the season by AP. Coach Elwin Heiny is one of the top coaches in the Northwest with a five-year record at UO of 97-28.

BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Feb. 5, BSU Fieldhouse, Boise, Idaho.

Bronco coach Carol J. Ladwig has four returning starters from a team that went 8-19 last year and finished the Mountain Division of the NWBL with a 3-9 mark.

A year of experience should help Boise State. The Broncos return Karla Meier, a 5-11 senior who averaged 15.9 points and 8.6 rebounds a game last year. BSU also has Cheron Moyle, a 5-6 sophomore, (7.5, 2.1), Jodi Osborn, a 5-8 sophomore (6.2, 2.8), and Connie Sandland, a 5-10 sophomore, (8.6, 6.4). Boise State recruited three high school centers this season, all 6-feet tall. They are Marla Curtis of Baker, Dona McCanlies of Seattle, Wash. and Tami Stuart of Vancouver, Wash.

The Broncos are a team of the future with the three freshmen recruits and three returning sophomores. Meier is the only Bronco of note with more than one year of experience.

EASTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY

Feb. 19, Reese Court, Cheney, Wash.

Eagle coach Bill Smithpeters returns four solid players from a team that went 4-8 last year in the NWBL and 11-18 overall. The top returning player is Maria Loos, a 6-2 senior who averaged 10.5 points and 12 rebounds a game last year. She was an honorable mention NWBL choice as was teammate Teresa Willard, a 6-1 junior forward (12.0, 5.0).

Other returners are Neil Ann Massie, a 6-0 senior (5.1, 4.5) who is making a comeback after an automobile injury. She was the Eagles' leading scorer in 1979-80. Among the newcomers on the EWU roster are Darlene Winter, a 5-9 sophomore transfer from San Diego State; Monica Van Riper, a 5-8 freshman from Clallum Bay, Wash.; and Jan Armstrong, a 6-foot freshman from Renton, Wash.

Smithpeters, who has spent all five years of his coaching career at EWU, has a record of 108-52.

WASHINGTON STATE UNIVERSITY
Feb. 20, Bohler Gym, Pullman, Washington.

Cougar coach Sue Durrant returns four starters from last year's WSU team which went 4-8 in the NWBL and tied for second in the division. Leading the list of returners is Jeanne Eggart, a 5-8 senior who averaged 22.6 points and 6.6 rebounds a game last year. Other returning starters include Carrie Riener, 5-9 senior (10.4, 4.9); 6-foot sophomore Cassandra Overby (9.2, 8.1); and Shelley Patterson, a 5-4 junior (3.0, 2.4). The Cougars will also have the services of JoBe Smith, a starter last season for Mt. Hood Community College in Gresham. Smith averaged 9.4 points and 5.6 rebounds for MHCC.

The Cougars also added some newcomers, including 6-4 freshman center Holly Bertus out of Lewiston, Mont. Other recruits are Angie Adger, 6-foot junior, from Santa Monica Junior College; Kim Larsen, a 6-foot freshman from Gig Harbor, Wash.; and Linda Fisher, a 5-9 freshman from Bend.

The Cougars had a 12-16 record last year, but lost just one starter and added a pair of JC transfers. Four of the WSU newcomers are 6-feet or taller.

Lady Grizzly coach Robin Selvig will face somewhat of a rebuilding season after losing three starters off last year's 22-8 team. Montana does return two starters and seven lettermen overall, including 6-2 sophomore center Doris Deden (9.8, 7.0). The other returning starter is also a sophomore, 5-10 guard Cheri Bratt (8.6, 5.7). Montana also has three other lettermen, all juniors, who should play a big role in this year's Grizzlies' plans. Bobcat coach Kathy Harte will have three starters back from the MSU team which finished last season with a 14-11 record in Harte's first year at the helm. Those starters include Vicki Heenber, a 5-8 sophomore, who came on last year to average 15.6 points, 4.4 rebounds and 5.0 assists a game. Other returning starters are 6-1 sophomore Theresa O'Donnell (5.6, 7.8) and 5-8 sophomore Kathie Roos (10.8, 6.3).

The Bobcats also had a strong recruiting year, with three freshmen all over 6-feet in height. They are Lynda Nelsen, 6-0, of Frenchtown, Mont.; Lisa Volker, 6-0, of Casper, Wyo.; and Evelyn Baldrige, 6-2, of Huntley Project, Mont. MSU also lured 6-1 junior college transfer Robin Parisa out of San Diego Mesa College.

Montana State was 5-7 last year in the NWBL. Harte is one of the youngest coaches the Beavers will face this year—she graduated from MSU in 1980 and is beginning just her second year of coaching.

Longhorn coach Jody Conradt returns three starters and 10 lettermen off last year's 18th-ranked 28-8 team. Top returners include Cheryl Hartman, 9.8 points and 6.6 rebounds, Sherryl Hauglum, a 5-10 sophomore (9.1, 2.8), and Terri Mackey, a 5-7 sophomore guard (5.4 and 4.5 assists). Top newcomers for the Longhorns are 5-11 freshman center Annette Smith, 6-2 freshman center Shell Bollin and 5-4 freshman guard Kriss Ethridge.

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

Dec. 11, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon

Lady Ute coach Fern Gardner returns two starters and seven lettermen from last year's 24-9 team. Top returners for Utah include 6-3 junior Sandy Kovach (13.7, 8.0), 6-1 sophomore Debbie Asper (11.6, 7.0), and three-year starting guard Monica Starrett, a 5-1 senior playmaker who averaged 4.3 points a game. Top newcomers include former Oregon State player Chris Acarregui, a 5-10 junior, Mary Tebbs, a 5-10 transfer from Brigham Young, and Anne Handy, a 6-2 freshman from Ogden, Utah.

SAN JOSE STATE UNIVERSITY

Dec. 30, Spartan Gymnasium, San Jose, CA.

Lady Spartan coach Sharon Chatman is facing a building year at San Jose State. The Spartans lost three starters who hold every single scoring and rebounding record at the school. San Jose State does return Cindy Galarza, a 5-9 senior (5.2, 5.6) and sophomore guard Shelia Brown, 5-7, (4.6, 2.0). A good recruiting year has kept the Spartans hopeful that they can top last year's 14-13 record. DRAKE UNIVERSITY

Jan. 3, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon

Bulldog coach Carole Baumgarten has a talented, experienced group of returners this year at Drake. The Bulldogs were 26-7 last year and return sensational sophomore Lorri Bauman, who averaged 26.4 points and 8.9 rebounds as a freshman last year. Drake also has three seniors who have been on varsity all four years. Jan Krieger (13.0, 9.5), Connie Newlin, (9.0, 2.5) and Amy McDermott (9.0, 7.8) will all see plenty of playing time as will sophomore Kay Riek, a 6-1 starter (15.7, 4.9). Drake also recruited a 6-3 freshman, Toni Brewer of Woodside, New York.

PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY

Jan. 8, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon

Viking coach Wendy Hawley returns three starters from the PSU team that struggled to a 7-17 record last year. Delores Krumm, a 5-5 senior guard (9.2, 2.1), Judy Miller, a 5-10 senior forward (6.6, 6.0) and Karen Johnson, a 6-foot sophomore center will all see plenty of playing time this year. But they may be pushed by a couple of strong newcomers the Vikings recruited who should help make Portland State a stronger team this year. C.J. Sealey transferred to PSU from Seattle University, where she averaged 18 points a game.

PACIFIC CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

Jan. 9, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon

Crusader coach Jim Sturgeon is facing the season with no returning starters and no returning lettermen. It's no surprise, really, this is the first team Pacific Christian has ever had. The Crusaders have a number of transfers and new students, but will be an unproven commodity this year. One of Sturgeon's hopes is Susan (Tiny) Turner, a 6-1 sophomore out of Anchorage, Alaska. A pair of 5-9 players out of Yavapai Junior College in Arizona should also help. Janet Hanks and Ramona Shake should see plenty of playing time this year as will Hanks' sister, Julie, a 5-10 freshman.

History

Carol Menken came to Oregon State unrecruited by anyone else in the state. She had grown up in nearby Jefferson, Oregon, played a year of junior college ball at Linn-Benton Community College and was ready to move up to the NCAA level. No one was willing to take a chance with her except the OSU coaching staff of Aki Hill and Ross Cook.

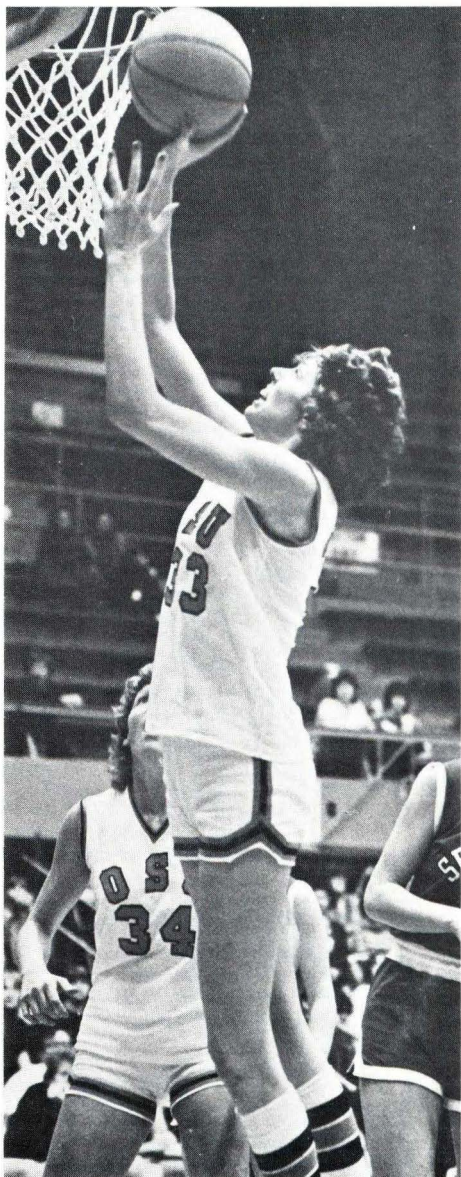
Three years later, Menken left Oregon State as one of the top basketball players in the country.
