DR. JOHN V. BYRNE

On January 1, 1985, John Byrne succeeded Robert MacVicar as President of Oregon State University, Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher education.

Byrne is familiar with the campus. He spent 21 years at Oregon State before he was nominated by President Ronald Reagan and confirmed by the U.S. Senate in 1981 as administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. He returned to Corvallis three years later to lead the university into the latter portion of the 20th century.

Byrne began his science and teaching career as a laboratory instructor at USC in 1953. In 1955, he entered the private sector as a research geologist until he joined the Oregon State faculty in 1960 as an associate professor in what was then the department of oceanography. He became department chairman in 1963, was promoted to full professor in 1965 and was selected dean of the OSU school of oceanography in 1972 (the program is now the college of oceanography).

After four years as dean of research and, concurrently, one year as acting dean of the OSU graduate school, Byrne was appointed vice president for research and graduate studies in 1980. His responsibilities included direction of the OSU research program, which then involved more than 800 separate projects with a total annual support base of \$40 million, and the graduate school with its 2,500 master's and doctoral students.

Byrne and his wife, Shirley, have four children, Donna, Karen, Lisa and Steve.



DR. LYNN J. SNYDER

In 1985, Lynn Snyder replaced Dee Andros as Oregon State's ninth director of intercollegiate athletics after six successful years in the same capacity at Marshall University.

Under Snyder, Marshall doubled the athletic budget in six years through increased revenues from fund raising, radio and TV, despite a 50% reduction in state support.

Snyder appointee Rick Huckabay advanced Marshall basketball to the next level with NCAA Tournament berths in 1984 and 1985. In 1984, the school experienced its first winning football season in 19 years under first-year coach Stan Parrish, another Snyder hiring. Marshall was 39th in the nation in basketball attendance (8,799 avg.) and 15th in 1-AA football attendance (15,650 avg.) in 1984-85, both school records. During his six-year stay at Marshall, Lynn spearheaded several facility improvements, including a new basketball arena, a new baseball facility and a new training table facility.

He started at Illinois in 1966 in the office of admissions and records as a systems and procedures analyst. He held that position until 1969, when he was named assistant dean in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences with primary duties including supervision of a departmental budget totaling \$30 million.

In 1972, Lynn decided to turn to athletics and accepted the position of assistant athletic director at Illinois. He became associate director at Illinois in 1978, a title he held until taking the Marshall job in 1979. As associate director, his duties were expanded to include supervision of budgeting for the ticket office, golf course operations, equipment and laundry operations and training table. He had responsibility for maintenance of all facilities, staging of all events, and football and basketball travel and promotion.

Lynn graduated from Mount Vernon Township High School in Mt. Vernon, Ill., in 1960. There, Lynn earned nine letters while competing in football, basketball, baseball and track and field. At Illinois, he played freshman baseball and was on the golf team his sophomore and junior years.

Upon graduation from Illinois, Lynn spent 1964-66 as a 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Army Quartermaster Corps.

He and his wife, Louesa, have three daughters - Gretchen, Bridget and Erica. Lynn is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, International Rotary and the First Presbyterian Church. He enjoys golf and gardening.

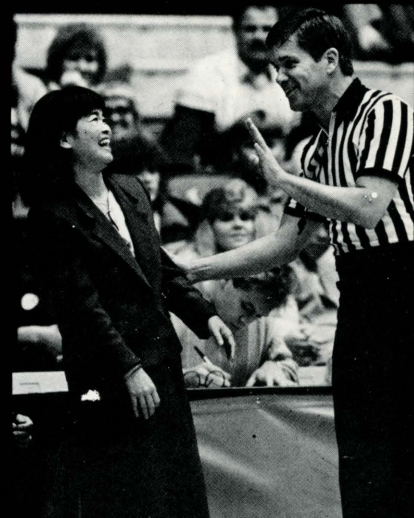

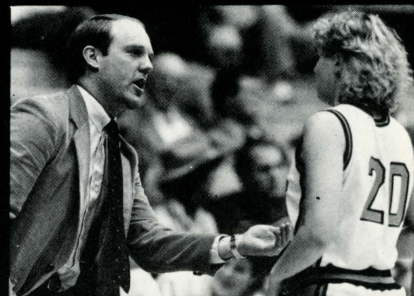
THE COACHING STAFF



The Memorial Union and Memorial Union East are the centers of activity for the OSU community. The "MU" serves as meeting place for students, faculty, alumni and friends of the university. Inside this one building, you can eat lunch, cash a check, mail a letter home, buy books, gifts or other necessities, study, have your hair trimmed, play billiards or bowl, hold a meeting or simply relax with a cup of coffee, a newspaper and possibly a little television.

Oregon State students have numerous choices when it comes to living accommodations. There are 27 national fraternities and 15 sororities on campus, but if that doesn't appeal to you, OSU also offers your pick of 10 residence halls and 13 cooperative houses all within walking distance from your classes. In just 10 seasons at Oregon State University, women's basketball coach Aki Hill has transformed the Beaver program into one of the finest in the country.

Hill has guided the Beavers into post-season play in six of her 10 seasons, including two consecutive NCAA appearances, 1983 and 1984. She has led Oregon State to 20 or more wins in five of the last 10 seasons, a win-loss mark of 178-103 good enough for a .671 winning percentage. She has coached an All-America center, an All-America forward and an All-America guard at OSU. And she was named Coach of the Year by her peers in the Northern Pacific Athletic Conference (NorPac) in both of the league's first two years.

The 48-year-old Hill is regarded as one of the best women's basketball coaches in the country and has a style unique among collegiate women's teams. Her halfcourt press defense is an Oregon State tradition as is the Beavers' 40 minutes of constant pressure.

Hatsue Aki Hill is a native of Japan, born July 7, 1940 in Tsugawa, Niigata. She trained under some of basketball's most noteworthy authorities, including the legendary UCLA coach John Wooden. Other mentors of Hill include Tatsuo Hata, a leading Japanese authority on basketball; Hall of Famer Pete Newell; and Stu Inman, former General Manager for the Portland Trailblazers.

Hill has spent the past 27 years playing, studying and coaching basketball. Her U.S. coaching career began in 1976, when she was an assistant at Foothill Community College and Santa Clara University in California.

In 1970, Hill became the first and only woman coach in Japan's 75-team AAU organization. She coached the Tokyo Marine Insurance teams, guiding one to a second place national finish during her final year.

In 1972, Hill took a leave of absence from coaching to study in a special program under Wooden at UCLA. She is one of the few women, or Japanese, coaches to have such an extensive background of training in the United States.

As a player, Hill competed for three years in high school basketball, then seven years on an AAU first division team in Japan. She was a starting guard for the Tokyo Marine Company, the same team she later coached. Her team won the national championship in 1965.

Hill has been nominated for national Coach of the Year honors four times in her 10 years at Oregon State. She has to her credit a pair of National Women's Invitational Tournament titles, two Northwest Women's Basketball League crowns and a NorPac championship.

THE "AKI" PHILOSOPHY:

- "Our style of basketball is winner's basketball and that has certainly brought us a number of championships here at OSU. We play a sophisticated, aggressive press defense and transition game. We also emphasize taking the highest percentage shot and working our passing game in a controlled situation.

- This style of basketball demands the most out of you, such as intelligence, tough character and quickness, as well as the best body control and highest skill level. We want to pursue the most exciting, sophisticated style of basketball."

- "I don't know of any other woman coach in the United States who has a background of such sophisticated basketball as both a coach and a player for a total of more than 25 years. I have the knowledge of overall concepts, but also of the small details which can change your play.

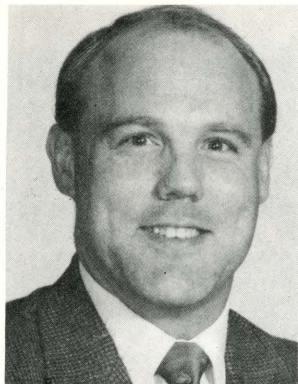
- I am also very fortunate to have had some of the greatest teachers in basketball. I learned from our men's coach Ralph Miller, John Wooden of UCLA, Mr. Hata of Japan, Hall of Famer Pete Newell and, of course, Stu Inman of the Portland Trail Blazers. My association with each of these people has been long and close."

- "We are all together; as a coach I want to motivate and educate my players. They are at a time when they will have just one chance to make the most of an opportunity to play college basketball. It is a special time, a time to place demands upon yourself, not rely on a coach. I get my greatest satisfaction when my team can go out on the court and achieve things without my guidance. This makes me most happy."

- "Our recruiting philosophy may be low-key, but I am not comfortable with the high-pressure recruiting which so many schools seem to be using. We like to be open and honest and try to provide as much information as possible so that prospective students can make the right decision. This is the start of an open communication and, in the long run, people will understand our philosophy and sincerity and it will help our recruiting."

- "The nicest thing about OSU is the excellent academic program the school offers, yet OSU manages to keep to a good size so students can get very special, individualized care. We have excellent academic programs in many fields. There is a warm atmosphere at OSU and caring people is one of the main reasons I took the job here. The people in the community recognize athletes and are very supportive."

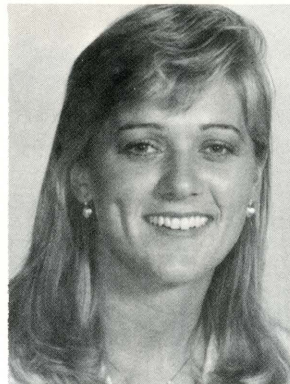
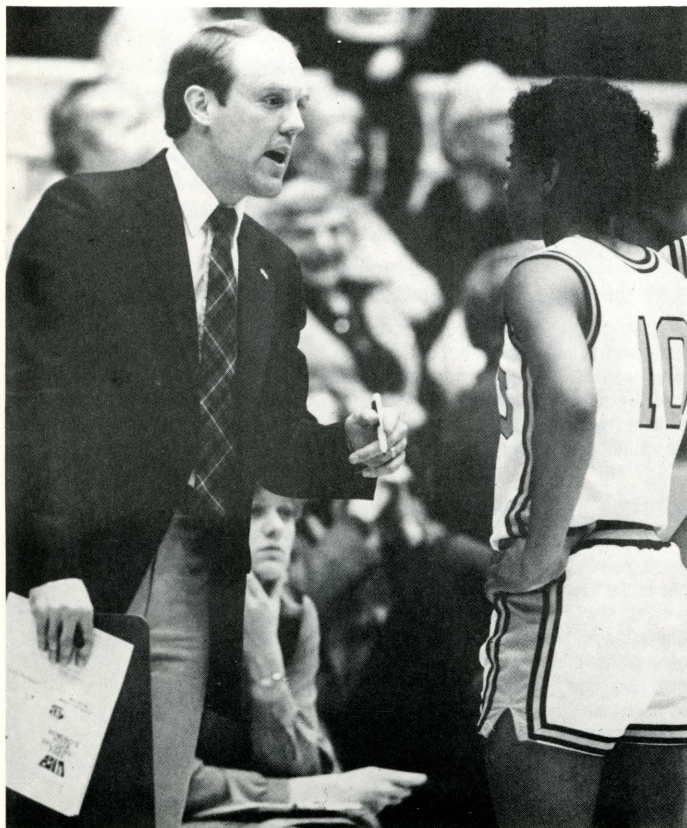
Alan Lambert joined the Beaver basketball program after a year at Penn State University where he served as graduate assistant coach for the Nittany Lions, who ranked ninth nationally in 1985 and won the NCAA Eastern Regional Championship.

Lambert, 33, is a 1978 graduate of Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado. He earned two letters in basketball at Western State earning All Rocky Mountain Conference Honorable Mention. He captained his team in 1978 and led the team in assists while shooting 53% from the field. Lambert also attended Cuesta Community College in San Luis Obispo, California for two years again lettering twice in basketball.

For four seasons he worked as an assistant men's coach at Cuesta after graduation, helping his team to the California State Junior College Playoffs three of those seasons. The 1975-76 Cuesta team finished as league champions and reached the Final Four of the California JC championships.

Lambert received a master's degree from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1981 in Physical Education and will finish Ph.D. work from Penn State University sometime in the near future. While pursuing his Ph.D. at Penn State he assisted the Lady Lions basketball team to their best ever finish and a 28-5 record.

A graduate of San Luis Obispo High School, Lambert was second team All-Northern League. Alan is single.



Robyn Clark

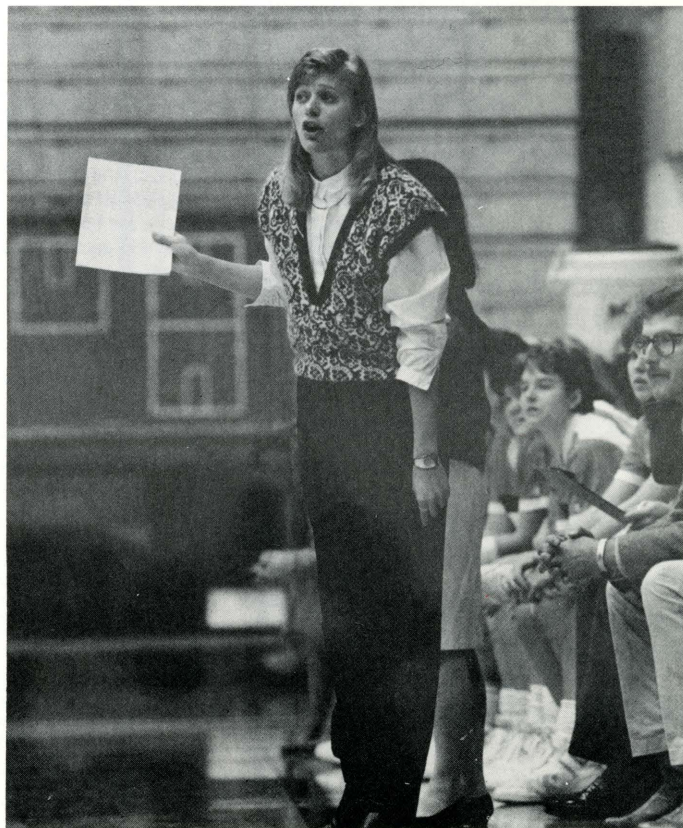

One of Oregon State's all-time top players returned to the Beaver program in 1985 as an assistant. Robyn Clark, 27, who ranks among the Beaver career leaders in several major categories, is back with the Beavers after playing a year of professional basketball in Belgium.

A 1984 graduate of Oregon State with a B.S. degree in Business Administration, Clark is the fourth leading scorer in OSU women's basketball history with 1009 points to her credit. She also ranks in the top 10 for the Beavers in rebounding (2nd with 612), assists (4th with 258) and steals (4th with 238). She averaged 8.7 points a game during her four seasons with the Beavers and earned Honorable Mention to the NorPac Conference All-Star team her senior season (1984). She was also Beaver co-captain as a senior and played on two NWIT championship teams and the 1984 NorPac championship team.

She played professionally for the Moneau Sur Sambre Belgium team that won the national championship of Belgium in 1985.

Originally from Waco, Texas, Clark attended Clover Park High School in Tacoma, Washington before attending Oregon State. At Clover Park she competed in volleyball, basketball and track. She was twice an All-Conference player in basketball and finished third in the state high jump in 1979. Robyn is single.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS WITH HEAD COACH AKI HILL

(The following is a question and answer session with head coach Aki Hill regarding her evaluation of the 1988-89 Oregon State Women's basketball team.)

QUESTION: YOUR THOUGHTS ON RETURNING VETERANS?

"When you talk about proven veterans, you are actually only talking about two people now — Chelle Flamoe and Cynthia Jackson. We lost Kari Parriott who decided to transfer to Long Beach State. We do have two players returning who have started for us in the past who did not play last year because of injuries, Monica Raspberry and Debbie Dalluge. Cynthia Jackson struggled last year with injuries and is still struggling with a rib problem. I would like to see her have a good senior year. We had three freshmen who started at one time or another last year, Mireille Smits, Shanna Daniels and Angela Ernst, but they all suffered injuries during the season that forced them out of the lineup. As a result, they have to prove themselves once again. Chelle Flamoe is the only proven veteran going into the season as I see it. We must get a better performance from Jackson this year. So the field is wide open as I see it."

QUESTION: YOUR THOUGHTS ON NEWCOMERS?

"The impact player out of our recruits should be Audrey Moore because of her experience and age. Moore should help us right away because she has had two years of junior college experience and she has good quickness which will help our fast break game. Because of Kari Parriott's absence somebody has to come forward to play the center-forward position, but I think our two freshman recruits, Jennifer Sharp and Barbara Tanner, will be projects this year. Because of Kari's absence, everyone will have an opportunity at the center and forward spots, so they (Sharp and Tanner) might surprise us." (A fourth OSU recruit, Julia Shands, will be a Prop 48 player this fall.)

QUESTION: DO YOU FEEL THIS YEAR'S TEAM WILL BE IMPROVED?

"We want to improve and we would like to improve enough to move out of the middle of the Pac-10 pack. However, we couldn't recruit the kind of an impact player who would provide quickness and experience right away. We have to work hard step by step, which will take a little more time, in order to get back to the championship contender level once again. We are determined to improve, but we

will not be championship contenders right away with this group. We will have to just keep working hard. We don't care what kind of numbers we have this year, but we do have to improve, period."

QUESTION: WHAT DO YOU FEEL YOUR STRENGTHS WILL BE THIS YEAR?

"We will have some tall people this year so I would say our strength is our balance in personnel."

QUESTION: WHAT ARE YOUR CONCERNS GOING INTO THE SEASON?

"I am concerned about our quickness and experience. Because of our injury situation last year we did not get as much experience out of our freshman class as we wanted. At one time or another, Mireille Smits, Shanna Daniels and Angela Ernst were out of the lineup with injuries. They all had opportunities to start, but none of them had enough experience to prove themselves. Lack of quickness is our number one concern."

QUESTION: YOUR THOUGHTS ON CHELLE FLAMOE?

"Chelle has great consistency and that is her strongest point. She has good scoring ability. What we would like for Chelle is for her to be able to play as just one of the five players on the floor and not be in a situation where we have to depend on her to do everything. We don't want to put everything on her shoulders. Chelle is a much more effective player if she is not in a role where we have to depend on her to do everything. She is a tremendous floor leader. It is really dependent upon how much the sophomore group improves and contributes to the game as to just what type of player Chelle will be this year. We do expect Chelle to have a big year once again as she seems to improve more than we could possibly expect each year."

QUESTION: HOW WOULD YOU RATE THIS YEAR'S RECRUITING CLASS?

"I think we did okay, but I wouldn't say it was outstanding."

A Rich Athletic Tradition

Women's basketball has averaged 20 wins a season with annual post-season tournament invites in the 1980's, but Oregon State Athletics, as a whole, is accustomed to a winning tradition.

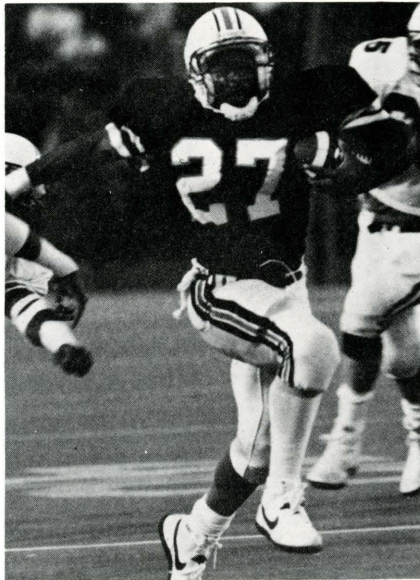
Football at Oregon State has included a Heisman Trophy, two Rose Bowls and a Liberty Bowl appearance under head coach Tommy Prothro, who went on to coach the Los Angeles Rams and San Diego Chargers after posting a 63-37-2 mark in nine Corvallis seasons. Men's basketball, dubbed the Orange Express, boasts America's winningest active major college coach in Ralph Miller. His recent teams have captured four of the last eight Pacific-10 Conference championships and been part of the NCAA post-season tournament, while compiling one of the nation's best records within the 1980's, the fifth best in collegiate basketball history.

Beaver baseball is also a regular in the NCAA Playoffs in recent years and head coach Jack Riley has 12-15 players in pro baseball. Several world class athletes and Olympic athletes have contributed to the Beaver track cause. Women's gymnastics is perennially ranked among the nation's Top 10 with its share of national champions. Wrestling has an equally rich tradition that includes two of the last five Pac-10 titles. OSU crew has been represented on the majority of the United States national teams competing in Europe. 15 sports at Oregon State, all with their own loyal followings and noteworthy achievements.

Many graduates from OSU and Aki Hill's program have gone on to coach at the NCAA Division I level or continue their playing days abroad in Italy, Japan and northern Europe. OSU's current coaching staff boasts one of Aki's best in Robyn Clark, Judy Spoelstra is in the same capacity at Idaho and Cindy Johnston-Riley is now coaching and playing in Australia. Carol Menken-Schaudt (on inside back cover) has prospered in Italian and Japanese basketball leagues for several years and represented the United States on the gold medal team of the 1984 Los Angeles games. Menken-Schaudt has been joined by Spoelstra and Juli Coleman as recent All-Americans from the Beaver roster. Coleman made the Academic All-American list as well.

The opportunities to make an early difference are here at Oregon State.

The Aki Hill Era of OSU basketball has seen its share of success — numerous team and individual honors and the memories that are cherished long after the college days are over:

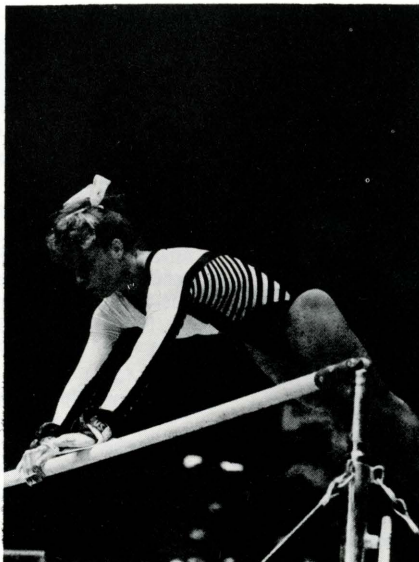
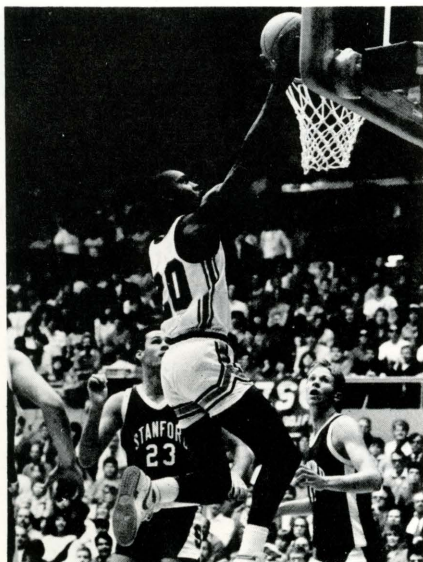
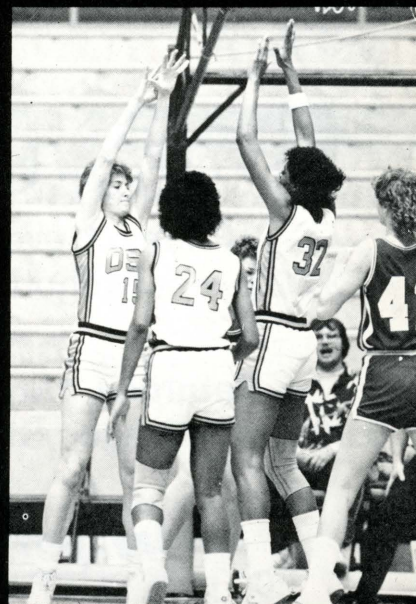

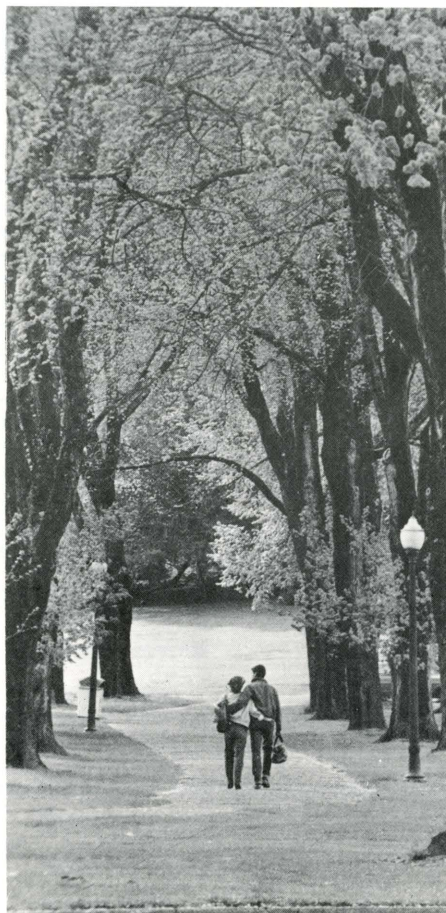
There is something about the town — small and unencumbered, revolving around the university, yet conveniently possessing the "city life" — that makes it extremely attractive.

THE EVOLUTION OF OSU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Women's basketball at Oregon State actually got its start before organized men's competition began. The first women's game was played in 1898; the first men's contest in 1901.

That game bore little resemblance to modern day basketball, however. The court was divided into three zones, each containing two players from the two teams. The divisions included areas for guards, centers and forwards. A center jump was held after every basket and no one was allowed to leave their zone.

Scores were low in that era — in 1914, for example, Oregon State beat Oregon by a 10-8 score.

By the 1930's, there was a change in philosophy in women's sports. Competition, per se, was discouraged. On the other hand, mass participation via class instruction and intramurals was encouraged. That philosophy prevailed until the early 1970's although women's basketball was organized as an extramural and club sport in the late 1950's.

No school in the Northwest was quite as successful as Oregon State University. Competing against clubs from other schools, Oregon State teams went undefeated from 1959 to 1966.

Basketball became an intercollegiate sport for women in 1972, when the newly organized women's athletic department started competition as a charter member of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIWA). Teams competed in the Northwest College Women's Sports Association (NCWSA), Region 9 of the nine-division AIWA.

Accurate records, however, were not kept in women's basketball until the 1976-77 season, when Mary Covington coached the Beavers.

CAROL MENKEN-SCHAUDT: OSU'S Golden All-American

Carol Menken came to Oregon State unrecruited by anyone else in the state. She had grown up in nearby Jefferson, Oregon, played a year of junior college ball at Linn-Benton Community College and was ready to move up to the NCAA level. No one was willing to take a chance with her except the OSU coaching staff of Aki Hill and Ross Cook.

Three years later, Menken left Oregon State as one of the top basketball players in the country. She was named a Kodak All-American during her senior year and led OSU to a sparkling 22-6 record in 1980-81. Menken also led the country in field goal percentage, hitting 363 of 484 shots, an incredible .750 shooting percentage.

Menken still maintains her amateur status and was selected for the U.S. team at the 1984 Olympics. She contributed to the U.S. gold medal winning team at Los Angeles.

The honors go on and on and Carol Menken is still making a name for herself. She played AAU basket-

ball in Turin, Italy, where she was among league leaders in scoring and rebounding. After six seasons in Italy, Carol has been playing in Tokyo. International basketball is nothing new to Menken, however, she played in the World University Games for the United States in the summer of 1981 and toured Romania, Yugoslavia and Cuba.

Home of the Beavers

10,400-SEAT GILL COLISEUM

The 10,000-seat house that Slat Gill built is the house that Ralph Miller filled to the point of mandatory expansion.

Gill Coliseum, Home of the Beavers since the 1949-50 season, expanded 400 vital seats and a wholesale sprucing up in 1984 giving Oregon State one of the most ideal facilities for the viewing of college basketball.



New lighting, floor and wall coverings, additional, more comfortable seating and improvements in meeting rooms, concession stands and rest rooms were all part of the 1.6 million dollar project. No state funds were used for the renovation as all the money was raised through seat options and booster donations.

The site of the NCAA Western Regionals in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1964, 1967 and 1983 (nine times total) was named after the late Slat Gill, head basketball coach at Oregon State for 36 years (1929-1964) and later the school's athletic director. The building is perfectly suited for basketball. It is not a fieldhouse. There are no posts obstructing vantage points and 85% of the seating is along the sidelines.

The structure covers one and one-third acres. The peak of the coliseum is 83 feet above the floor; equivalent to a four-story building. The framework consists of 12 fabricated steel arches. In all, there are 1,000 tons of structural steel and 14,000 cubic yards (over 70,000 sacks of cement) of concrete in Gill Coliseum. In addition, more than 14,000 pumice blocks were used for partitions and finishing work.

Some of those blocks have been knocked out with the renovation enabling Gill Coliseum to accommodate approximately 10,400 fans now and host many more events with additional meeting rooms behind the new collapsible theater seats on the arena floor.



The largest crowd to witness a game at Gill Coliseum arrived in 1962 to watch the Oregon State men defeat rival Oregon, 82-66. 11,709 showed up that day, but fire marshall regulations prevent that figure from being surpassed unless additional expansion occurs.

The playing surface now in use is 10 years old and made of the best wood variety.

Conference of Champions

THE PAC-10 CONFERENCE



The Pacific-10 Conference has long enjoyed the reputation of being the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate athletic conference in the country. The reputation is well deserved.

Indicative of the strength of the Conference is the fact that Pac-10 members have won 187 NCAA team championships in men's sports, far and away more than any other conference (the Big Ten is runnerup with 131). Pac-10 men's programs have won at least four NCAA team titles in 16 of the last 18 years, a feat

unprecedented in intercollegiate athletics.

The NCAA has been conducting women's championships for six years and Pac-10 members have won four team titles four times. The total of 21 NCAA team titles by Pac-10 members far outdistances any other conference (the Southwest Conference is runnerup with 12). Included in the NCAA team titles are all seven tennis crowns, and three out of six championships in track and field and softball.

The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference go back over 70 years. On December 9, 1915, the Pacific Coast Conference was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Oregon. Original membership consisted of four schools — University of California, University of Washington, University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University).

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916. One year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the PCC, and Stanford University joined in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California and the University of Idaho. Montana joined the Conference in 1924 and in 1928 the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-team league until 1950 with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II somewhat curtailed athletic competition at the university level. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC dissolved and a new conference was formed called the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Original AAUW membership consisted of California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State became a member in 1962 with Oregon and Oregon State joining in 1964. In 1968, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality.
