JACK RILEY

(Head Baseball Coach)

Jack Riley just joined the Oregon State University staff in 1972, and he's turned the Beaver baseball program completely around.

The head baseball mentor from Linfield College led his team to more victories than any other team in OSU history last spring. His Beavers won 28 and lost 10, moving ahead of a mark that had withstood all challenges since 1952. Coach Ralph Coleman's squad of 1952 had a 27-12 mark.

Riley has a wide coaching background. Prior to coming to OSU, he was head baseball and basketball coach at Lower Columbia College in Longview, Washington. He is a 1960 graduate of Linfield, and earned a master's degree from OSU in 1971. He attended Grant High in Portland and gained all-state honors in basketball and was second leading scorer in the state his senior year.

Later, at Linfield, he became the first player in history to be named to the Northwest conference All-Star team four straight years. He also was named to four all-America teams. Jack was three times all-conference in baseball and as a senior led the NAIA in stolen bases. Following graduation, he was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers and played with the Salem Dodgers from 1961 through 1963. Prior to going to Lower Columbia, Riley coached at Portland's Jefferson High. He was assistant baseball and basketball coach from 1960-62, at which time he was named head basketball coach. His teams placed fourth and third in State AAA tournaments.

During his time at L-C, his baseball teams won four straight Coastal division championships, swept the state title in 1970 and also finished second, third and fourth. Overall, his record was 97 wins against 31 losses. At OSU, he posted a 15-20 season in 1973, was 18-21 in 1974 and then last year stormed to a tie for the northern division championship (13-5) and record-breaking 28-10 overall season.

DEL KERBER

Assistant Coach

Del Kerber, originally from Salem, is a graduate of Oregon State University, with a B.S. degree in Physical Education in 1964. He got his master's degree at OSU in 1967.

Kerber was a four-sport letterman for three years at Serra High School in Salem, 1955-1959. At OSU, he played two years of varsity baseball, as a third baseman and pitcher.

He taught at Dallas High from 1964-70, and was at Grants Pass High from 1971-75. His coaching experience includes handling of the OSU junior varsity baseball program in 1970-71. He also was coach of the American Legion team in Grants Pass, 1965-74.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

TOM CHAMBERLAIN P Junior 6-6 225 1/21/55 R-R

Prep Career: Pitched Mark Morris High of Longview, Washington to state AA championship. Was outstanding football quarterback, but has been moved to defensive linebacker at Oregon State. **College Career:** Has won two football letters and two in baseball. Last spring, posted 3-3 won and lost record and earned run average of 2.62 for 55- $\frac{1}{3}$ innings. Co-leader on squad in strikeouts (48).

RICH DODGE OF Junior 5-10 178 10/3/54 R-R

Prep Career: One of most widely known all-around athletes in Portland history. From Wilson High, was outstanding in both football and baseball, earning all-state honors in both sports. Key player on Watco Electric team that placed 3rd nationally in Legion ball. **College Career:** Has earned two awards as a football tailback, and posted best yard-per-carry average on OSU team last fall. In baseball, was second leading hitter on squad with .333 average for 38 games.

JEFF DOYLE INF Sophomore 5-9 155 10/2/56 S-R

Prep Career: Had outstanding record at Junction City High, where he also excelled in basketball. Was an all-state baseball player his senior year. **College Career:** Has won starting spot at second base. Excellent fielder and good arm. Hit only .245 last year, but likely to improve on that this spring.

ROB DRAHN INF Sr. 6-0 195 1/26/54 R-R

Prep Career: An All-Stater from nearby Philomath High School who played in the State-Metro all-star game. **College Career:** Attended Scottsdale (Arizona) Community College, where he started at third base. Transferred to OSU and made all Northern Division first time around. Hit .357 for all games. As a junior last year, hit .314 and batted in 27 runs.

KIM HURLEY INF Senior 5-11 180 3/4/54 R-R

Prep Career: Led Helena, Montana American Legion team for three years, with outstanding career. Was drafted by California Angels professional baseball team out of high school. **College Career:** All-conference and captain of the Arizona State Community College champions from Scottsdale. Led team in hitting with .365 average. For Oregon State last spring, hit .317 and batted in 23 runs.

BILL MARTINEZ INF Junior 6-0 195 4/23/55 R-R

Prep Career: Three-sports prep star in football, basketball and baseball at Highlands High School in Sacramento. Named to all-conference baseball team three straight times. **College Career:** First year on varsity, led team in home runs (five) and had 24 RBI's. Hit .273. Last year as sophomore, hit .287, and also had four homers and 35 runs batted in. Had six doubles and a triple.

GAIL MEIER P Senior 6-3 190 10/18/53 R-L

Prep Career: Graduated from Wilson High of Portland, where he compiled fine record in both football and baseball. Pitched Watko Electric to state title and regional runner-up. Member of National Honor Society and senior class president. **College Career:** Has been a three-year mainstay for Beavers, capped off by his selection to all-northern division team last spring. In 1975, Meier pitched 60 innings, posted a 5-2 record and had a 3.30 earned run average. He had 33 strikeouts and walked 21 batters.

KEN NOBLE P Sophomore 6-4 205 4/10/56 R-R

Prep Career: From nearby Philomath High School, one who has shown fast improvement each year. **College Career:** As a freshman at OSU, pitched more innings (72) than anyone on mound staff. Tied with Tom Chamberlain for most strikeouts (48), and had 3.13 earned run average. Good control, too, with only 17 walks all season. Should be headed for terrific season in 1976. Big, has good variety of pitches.

PETE ROWE C Sophomore 6-0 175 4/29/55 R-R

Prep Career: All-State prepper, and led his team, South Umpqua, to state class AA championship. **College Career:** Won all-northern division honors as a freshman, and repeated last spring as a sophomore. One of the better catchers in OSU history. Freshman year hit .325 and batted in 14 runs. As junior, hit .270 and had 22 RBI's. Great leadership, and versatility. Can play catcher, first base or the outfield.

STEVE WILKINS OF Senior 6-1 180 ? L-R

Prep Career: From The Dalles, Oregon, was all-league three times and all-state in his senior year. Was drafted by San Francisco Giants out of high school. **College Career:** Followed his high school coach, Noel Aarousan to Treasure Valley CC, where he was named 2nd team all-American, hitting .358 and leading team to 33-9 record. Hit only .235 for the Beavers last spring, but coaching staff feels he'll have a banner year this spring.

The Beavers of that campaign won 18 straight, before finally losing to Washington State at Pullman, 7-3. Gene Tanselli, former head coach at OSU, was a star senior shortstop on that 1951 club.
