RESUME

Born (7/7/49) and raised in the hills just across the Mississippi River from Mark Twain's birthplace, St. Maur has established one American studio there. When not in the States, he sculpts in Florence, Carrara, or Pietrasanta, Italy. He had his first one-man show at the Art Center in Quincy, Illinois in 1974 and since then has had two shows in the United States and four in Italy.

After producing abstract art in a number of media in the U. S., he went to Italy for further experience in figurative and naturalistic art. He has studied with or assisted nine sculptors, particularly Raimondo Puccinelli and Oscar Gallo (in Florence) and Enrico Man-Frini (head of sculpture at La Brera in Milan). After receiving his M. A. in sculpture under Manfrini, he taught for a year as Professor of Sculpture at Gonzaga University's program in Florence. In addition to ongoing anatomical studies he spent better than three years drawing and painting with Professor Nerini Simi in Florence.

Since 1977 he devoted much time to his commission for a heroic-sized St. Michael Archangel to go on a tower in the piazza in front of the Church of St. Michael Archangel at Buriano, Italy. This piece was installed April 25, 1979 and received a special blessing by Pope John Paul II the following month. Present for the installation, besides the Archbishop and church officials, was Lelio Lagorio, then President of Tuscany and currently Minister of Defense for Italy, who had followed St. Maur's career with interest for several years.

In the meantime, in November of 1978, a bronze bust cast from a study for St. Michael Archangel won the Therese Richard Memorial Award for religious art at the Allied Artists of America annual competition in New York. This bronze remained on display at the National Academy of Design for six weeks.

Since 1979 his work has ranged from small action pieces, such as the Flying Torchbearer, to life-size or heroic size realistic or symbolic works. The life-size bronze of Oregon State University's first woman graduate commissioned in 1982 and installed in 1983 is realistic while "Against Tyranny," "Womanhood," and "News from the Pass at Thermopylae" are examples of his heroic sculpture.

St. Maur's work can be seen in the United States in San Francisco (The John Pence Gallery), Chicago (Guildhall Gallery), Washington, D. C. (Venable-Neslage Galleries), Cold Spring Harbor, N. Y. (The Harbor Gallery), and Charlotte, N. C. (McKenna Gallery). His work can be found in several public collections: the Hinkhouse collection at Stephens College, Villa Schifanoia, American Chianina Association, and 'eymour Library, Indianola, Miss. Private collectors include William B. Saxbee (former attorney general of the U. S.), The Honorable Lelio Lagorio of Italy, and others in the U. S., England, India, Italy, Mexico and Switzerland.

His latest commission is for a heroic Indian for Richmond, California.
