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PRESS INFORMATION

Gill Coliseum

Gill Coliseum, a modern structure completed in 1949, gives Oregon State one of the finest basketball plants in America. The building was constructed at a cost of \$1,800,000 and has a seating capacity of 10,500, with 85% of the seats on the sides of the playing floor. The Coliseum was the scene of the Western Regional basketball playoffs in the spring of 1952, with Santa Clara, Wyoming, UCLA and Oklahoma City university the competing schools. The athletic department offices are located in the building on the ground level. With absolutely no posts to obstruct their view, patrons can see well no matter where the seat may be located. The home court of the Beavers is easily reached from downtown Corvallis by both public and private transportation.

Press Box and Photography

The press box in Gill Coliseum is located almost directly in the center of the bleachers adjoining the playing floor, and has a capacity of 40 seats. Requests for tickets should be made as far in advance as possible. A working press room is available in the Athletic News Bureau, Room 107. Only daily papers and major wire services are allotted space in the press box. Photographers representing daily papers will be issued floor passes on special request.

Services

The Athletic News Bureau will furnish a play-by-play at half-time and at the conclusion of the game. A full box score also will be issued shortly after the game. Transportation to the downtown area will be made on request. Western Union must be contacted directly for teletype service.

Road Games

Requests for press tickets and other information on Oregon State games away from home should be directed to the various publicity directors. Their names and addresses will be found in the section listed as "The Opponents."

Athletic Staff

ROY S. "SPEC" KEENE, athletic director, is an Oregon Stater of the first degree. The popular department head was a star baseball player in his college days and also served as student body president at OSC in 1921.

Upon graduation from OSC, Keene became head coach at Corvallis high. The next step up was to that of assistant coach at OSC, where he remained until 1926, when he became headman at Willamette university in Salem.

Keene's Willamette athletic teams completely dominated the northwest conference for 15 years. Many of his players won little all-American acclaim and most of them now have coaching jobs in all parts of the country.

"Spec" replaced Percy Locey as athletic director at OSC in 1947 and is the man who should receive credit for an expanded athletic program. Through his guidance, mammoth Gill Coliseum was constructed, giving Oregon State one of the finest basketball plants in the country.

Keene has two daughters, one of whom, Madeline, is married to Jim Swarbrick, ex-Beaver gridder. Jerri is attending high school in Corvallis.

JIM BARRATT, athletic business manager, is one of the newest members of the staff. Originally from Heppner, Barratt finished at OSC in 1950 and accepted the position of assistant alumni director. He left that post at the close of the 1951 football season for his new job. Barratt is a navy veteran of World War II and is married. He has two daughters—Brenda, aged three, and Janet, seven months.

BILL ROBERTSON, athletic trainer, has been in his present position since 1946. After four years of military service in Italy and the Aleutians, Robertson returned to OSC after the war to receive his B. S. degree. He is originally from Vancouver, B. C. Bill is married and has three children—Billy, 5; Nancy, 4; and Penny, 3. Efficient and friendly, he is one of the most popular members of the staff.

JOHN EGGERS, athletic news director, assumed his new post on July 1, 1952, after serving for two years as assistant to his predecessor, Irwin Harris. Originally from Pendleton, Eggers was an all-state basketball player in his high school days. After military service in World War II, he attended OSC from 1945 to 1949 and worked a year on The Oregonian sports staff in Portland. He was married August 16, 1952, to the former Jean Pickens of Salem.

Then----And Now

In Slat's Gill's 25-year stint as head basketball coach at Oregon State college, seven players have won all-American recognition. Members of the press and radio might be interested in learning just what these ex-Beaver stars are now doing professionally.

Ed Lewis, 1933

Ed Lewis was the first of the all-Americans under Slat's Gill. He paced the Beavers to the Pacific Coast conference crown in 1933 and generally is regarded as one of the finest "big men" ever to represent the Orange. Lewis is now a successful radio technician, affiliated with the Tidewater Associated Oil company and located in Portland, Oregon.

Wally Palmberg, 1936

Wally Palmberg, the southpaw of 1936 vintage, was another high on the list of OSC "bests." A clever play-maker, as well as a great shot, Palmberg had a successful prep coaching career at Astoria, his home town. Palmberg later went into business with his brother, and more recently has entered the Sporting Goods profession in Ontario.

John Mandic, 1942

John Mandic, the big and rugged post man who led the Beavers to a northern division championship in 1942, probably ranks as one of the best rebound men in OSC hoop history. He was a great competitor and fine team man. Mandic played professional basketball with the old Portland Indians and several eastern clubs. He now is with the state of Oregon Tax Commission in Portland.

Don Durdan, 1943

Don Durdan, the greatest all-around athlete in Beaver annals, was an exceptional floor-man and also a good shot. He could do everything well, just as he did on a football or baseball field. Durdan played service ball at Bainbridge during the war, and later was a pro football ace with the San Francisco 49ers. He now has a partnership in the DeMoss-Durdan funeral home in Corvallis and recently was elected County Coroner of Benton County.

Lew Beck, 1947

Here was the "player's player," the fellow who could do everything—and do it well. He was the fastest man in the league, a dead-eye shot, either from outside or inside. A great defensive player. Later made all-American AAU while with the Phillips Oilers and played more minutes than any other member of the U. S. Olympic Games team in London in 1948. Now retired from basketball, but still with Phillips and located in Spokane, Washington.

Red Rocha, 1947

Red Rocha, the transplanted Hawaiian who won fame at OSC as "the High Tower of Hilo," played on what many considered to be the finest team in the school's history. An excellent hook shot with either hand, Rocha has since proven his worth in the professional basketball ranks with St. Louis and Syracuse. He's still with the latter club, one of the best in the business.

Cliff Crandall, 1949

The "whirling dervish" of OSC basketball, the man who almost single-handedly gave the Beavers a 4th place national finish in 1949. A spectacular type of player and a great fan favorite. Certainly the best dribbler ever to wear the orange and black. After graduation, led the Stewart Chevrolet quint of San Francisco to the national AAU title. An all-American there, too. Retired at the end of last season, although he still is employed by Stewart Chevrolet in S.F.

The Coaches

AMORY T. "SLATS" GILL, HEAD COACH

It would be difficult, indeed, for any members of the younger generation to think of Oregon State basketball without Slat Gill as head coach. He's now in his 25th year as Beaver headman, and in those 25 years the veteran mentor has brought Oregon State from an obscure enthusiast right into the national hoop spotlight.

Not only is Gill a successful basketball coach. He's a friend to every boy he coaches—long after that athlete has left college. Slat Gill is a molder of men and has the reputation to prove it.

The "old pro" of northwest hoops came to OSC in the fall of 1920 and has been on the campus ever since—except for a brief one year absence immediately following his graduation. He was a brilliant player in his own right, making the all-coast team as a sophomore in 1922 and again as a senior two years later.

Upon graduation, Slat accepted a coaching job in an Oakland, Calif., high school in 1925 and his first club tied for the city championship. In 1926, he returned to his alma mater as freshman coach, during which time his Rooks beat the Oregon Frosh seven out of eight times. Slat was promoted to the head job in 1928 and since that time his name has been synonymous with basketball success at OSC.

From 1933 through 1949, Gill won six northern division titles, as compared with five for Washington, three for WSC, three for Oregon and one for Idaho. Three times—in 1933, 1947 and 1949—the Beavers went on to win coast championships. The 1949 club took 4th place in the nation, losing to Illinois in a tight battle.

Gill is the type of man everyone respects. Players accept his wise advice without question and his office door is always open. In 1950, he was named to the Helms Foundation basketball hall of fame, along with other great coaches. And the same year, he was chosen to coach the western all-stars against the East in Madison Square Garden. In typical fashion, Gill guided the westerners to an impressive victory.

Oregon Staters everywhere salute Slat Gill on his 25th anniversary year as head Beaver basketball coach.

The Coaches

Paul Valenti, Assistant Basketball Coach

Slats Gill has thousands of admirers the country over, but certainly one of the most ardent—and loyal—is friendly Paul Valenti, the assistant basketball coach at Oregon State.

Valenti has handled either the freshman or junior varsity quints since 1947, and quickly adopted the winning complex of his boss. Always an optimist, Valenti always has confidence that his team has an equal chance against any opponent.

Paul came to OSC as a freshman from Larkspur, Calif., in 1938, leading all scorers on the Rook quint with 142 points. He led the club to an undefeated record in 16 games.

Gill's present assistant was a varsity mainstay for three years and had the honor of playing on two northern division championships—in 1940 and 1942. Not exceptionally fast, Valenti nevertheless was a fine defensive player and clever ball-handler. He shot equally well with either hand and excelled in long set shots.

Valenti has had unusual coaching success at OSC. His 1949 Rook outfit won 14 out of 15, and last year his jayvees made it 16 in a row without a loss.

A keen knowledge of the game, along with boundless enthusiasm, establishes Valenti as one of the up and coming young coaches in the country. One of the youngest members of the athletic staff at OSC, Valenti is also one of the most popular.

AL PATSEL

A sophomore letterman from San Francisco. Is 6-5 and fast for his size. Good rebound man and plays well on defense. Was all-city at Lincoln high in S.F. as a prepper. Started slowly last year but came fast toward end of season. From indications in early drills, will be hard to keep out of starting slot.

JIM SUGRUE

One of the best all-around players on the squad. Was counted on to be mainstay last season, but missed out because of academic deficiencies. Raised grades and now eligible for final year. Saw AAU service with Stewart Chevrolet last winter. Best backboard man on squad and highly aggressive. Stands 6-5.

TEX WHITEMAN

A sophomore letterman who can play either forward or center. Was all-state as prepper in Colorado. Won a regular varsity job as a freshman at OSC and improved rapidly as season progressed. Good hook shot with either hand. A hard worker who puts his 6-6 frame to good use.

TED ROMANOFF

Tallest man on the squad at 6-8½. A junior letterman who developed slowly last winter. Good outside shot, but needs more aggressiveness. Fairly agile and hard worker. Hails from Alameda, Calif., home town of Sugrue. Would be big help if he comes as expected.

JOHN THOMAS

Better known for feats on the gridiron. Out for basketball here for the first time, but shows promise. Extremely rugged on backboard and a fair shot. Was all-state as Newark, N.J., prepper. Is 6-3, weighs 215.

DICK BRUST

A junior who lettered in a reserve role last season. Tireless worker and rough on the boards. Lacking in speed. Came to OSC from LaPorte City, Iowa. Stands 6-4.

CENTERS

TONY VLASTELICA

One of the most sought-after junior college players in the country. Transferred to OSC from Grays Harbor JC in Aberdeen, Washington. Re-wrote the Washington prep record book and did the same thing in his two-year Marine Corps stint at Camp Pendleton. Will need seasoning in northern division basketball, but has all the qualifications and attitude to make good. Great hook shot with either hand and loves the game. Is 6-5 and weighs around 200. A sophomore.

BOB EDWARDS

One of four seniors on the squad. Was all-state from Corvallis high in 1948. Has already earned two varsity letters. Shoots very well, particularly on hook shots, but in the past never quite lived up to expectations. Could be a valuable man this season. Is 6-6 and plays the boards well.

GUARDS

DANNY JOHNSTON

A senior who won unanimous all-northern division honors last season. First player under 6 feet ever to score 200 points for the Beavers in northern division play. Has great variety of shots, and can play at either forward or guard, depending on the situation. Good ball-handler and has the necessary speed. If he plays up to his potential, could be one of the all-time bests in OSC history. Stands 5-11, and is from Whittier, Calif.

BILL TOOLE

Another sophomore letterman with a bright future. An all-stater at Klamath Falls. Fastest man in the northern division last year, but weak in the pointmaking department. Excellent defensive player. If he improves on his shooting, could be another Lew Beck. Wonderful attitude and works hard. Height is 5-11.

RON ROBINS

Smallest man on the squad at 5-8. Was all-state prepper twice at Marshfield high. Probably the best long, two-handed set shot on the team. Very fast and plays defense well. Polished type of player who makes few mistakes in a ball game. Saw service in 27 varsity games while only a freshman.

JOHNNY JARBOE

Biggest surprise in pre-season drills. Showed remarkable improvement. Efficient playmaker, who gets the job done. Spent freshman year on the jayvees. Was all-city prepper at Franklin high in Portland. A good shot, though not the spectacular type. Height is 6-2. A sophomore.

REGGIE HALLIGAN

Like Jarboe, a mainstay on the jayvees last year. Saw service in several varsity games. One of the better young prospects on the squad, only a sophomore. Loose and lanky type of player, somewhat on Cliff Crandall style. Works hard and a good competitor. Is 6-3 and from Bend.

BUD SHIRTCLIFF

A senior from Myrtle Creek. Better known as a baseball outfielder, but a good, sound basketball player, as well. Led Paul Valenti's undefeated junior varsity in scoring last year. Can play either forward or guard. Rough on boards and fast for his size. He's 6-3.

General Prospects

Much improved over last season, but perhaps still a year away from a championship—that best describes the potential of the 1952-53 Oregon State basketball team.

The Beavers suffered their worst hoop campaign in history last winter, finishing last in the northern division for the first time and winning only three out of 16 league games. The club was sprinkled with freshmen and sophomores and naturally lacked the experience to compete with Washington and Idaho.

The Huskies, of course, will be favored to repeat, with Idaho a strong darkhorse. But look for Oregon State to be much stronger than a year ago. With nine lettermen to go along with Transfer Tony Vlastelica and Jim Sugrue, it's very unlikely that OSC will occupy a cellar berth.

Back for his final season in Orange toggery is Danny Johnston, a unanimous all-northern division choice in 1952. The blond bomber bucketed 200 points in ND warfare a year ago, which is an all-time record for an OSC player under six feet. He was the highest-scoring "little man" in Orange history.

Other returning lettermen include Bob Edwards, a senior; Ted Romanoff, Dick Brust and Don Fundingsland, juniors; and Al Patsel, Bill Toole, Ron Robins, and Tex Whitman, sophomores.

Chief reason for the expected improvement, however, stems from the addition of Vlastelica and Sugrue to the roster. Sugrue was expected to be the mainstay last winter, but ran into scholastic difficulties and never saw action. He since has raised his grades and will be hard to keep out of a starting job. He's big, fast and rough on the boards, in addition to being a good shot.

Most Pacific Northwest hoop fans probably have heard more about Vlastelica than any of the other Beavers—even though he's never played in an OSC game. The 6 foot 5 inch hook shot artist re-wrote the state of Washington prep record book while at Aberdeen high. Then followed a two-year stint in the Marine Corps at Camp Pendleton where he averaged 28 points per game. And last season, Big Tony was a sensation at Grays Harbor (Washington) junior college. He transferred to OSC last spring, with three years of varsity competition remaining. If Vlastelica can make the grade in the tough northern division—and he has all the qualifications to do it—the Beavers might win a share of games.

Coach Slats Gill, now starting his 25th season as Orange headman, will have some unexpected help from several ex-junior varsity performers. Three JV graduates are Reggie Halligan and Johnny Jarboe, sophomores; and Bud Shirtcliff, a senior. Halligan saw brief varsity service last year, but showed great possibilities for the future. Jarboe looked good in pre-season drills, as did Shirtcliff.

Still another newcomer—to basketball, anyway—is John Thomas, the ex-Beaver grid captain. Thomas decided to turn out for basketball in his senior year. He's big, at 6-3 and 215, and might give the Beavers additional backboard help.

Gill, like everyone else, figures Washington is the team to beat. But as in the past, Slats never will award a championship to another team before that club has proved it is a champion.
