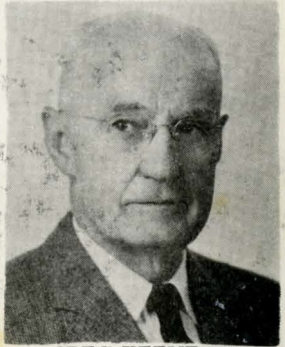

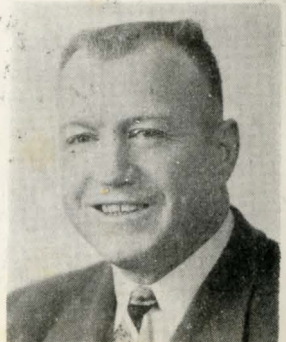

Oregon State College

Oregon State College, the largest institution of higher learning in the state of Oregon, was established as a land-grant school on October 27, 1868, under the provisions of the Morrill Land Grant Act. It was the state's first venture in the field of higher learning, and was originally named Corvallis College.

The state wanted to establish a college as early as 1851, and had selected Corvallis, then known as Marysville, as the site. The legislature then reversed itself and decided to construct the college in Jacksonville in southern Oregon.

However, the people of Corvallis went ahead and erected an academy in 1858, operated by the Methodist church. With the adoption of the Morrill act the state took over partial control, and assumed full control in 1885. In 1868 the name was changed to the State Agricultural College of Oregon, later to Oregon Agricultural College, and in 1953 was changed to the present Oregon State College, although popular acclaim had brought about the present name as early as 1927.

The college campus proper, as well as adjoining agricultural lands, consists of about 4,000 acres, with increases being made yearly as the institution grows in population and need. In addition to the campus area, the Agricultural Experiment station at the college administers and utilizes approximately 24,000 acres, mostly county and federal owned.

The school of forestry owns and administers another 13,300 acres in the Peavy arboretum and the McDonald and other forested areas near Corvallis. These lands are used to teach forestry students actual forest practices through on-the-job training, as well as the research projects for the state and national forest services and the many timber companies located throughout the Northwest.

In addition to the schools of agriculture and forestry the college also offers degrees in Business and Technology, Education, Engineering and Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Pharmacy and Science, and the Graduate school. In addition many liberal arts courses such as journalism, art, English, music, speech, psychology and modern languages under a lower division program.

Also on the campus may be found several units devoted to research such as the cyclotron for nuclear physics and the Oregon Forest Products laboratory devoted to finding new ways to use the vast timber resources of the Oregon forests.

Oregon State College is located in the quiet city of Corvallis, named for its location in the heart of the Willamette valley of western Oregon. Corvallis has a population of 21,000 and is 85 miles south of Portland and 60 miles east of the Pacific ocean. It lies midway between the Cascade and Coast ranges, and its main industries are agriculture and timber.

About 8000 students are enrolled for the 1958-59 college year, and indications are that with the continued increase in population in the Pacific Northwest, along with the general population growth of the nation, the enrollment will top 10,000 within a few years.

To prepare for this the college is in the midst of a vast building program, with emphasis on student housing, a factor which is already resulting in limitations on enrollment.

The most notable structures on the campus include the Memorial Union, built from public subscription in 1928 as the center of student activity; Benton hall, built in 1889 and the oldest structure still standing and in use on the campus; OSC

coliseum, OSC's 11,000-seat basketball pavilion which contains no obstructing posts; 27,000-seat Parker stadium for football; and Sackett hall, erected in 1948 to house women students.

Dr. August L. Strand is the present president of the college, having served in that capacity since 1942. Roy S. (Spec) Keene has served as director of athletics since 1947. Oregon State is a charter member of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Athletic conference which was founded in 1916.

ATHLETIC STAFF

ROY S. "SPEC" KEENE, athletic director at OSC, is one of those rare individuals whose name always has been synonymous with success—whether as a college athlete, public citizen, coach, businessman or head man in Oregon State's vast expanding athletic program.

As top administrator in the athletic department, he must make decisions that affect the future of OSC athletics for years to come. In every case, Keene has used his great experience wisely, and through his efforts Oregon State now has one of the most sound athletic programs in the country—not to mention one of the outstanding all-round sports plants to be found anywhere.

Under Keene's leadership and planning, OSC built a beautiful basketball Coliseum that seats 11,000 fans. Five years ago, again with Keene at the helm, Parker stadium for football was constructed. The stadium can accommodate 28,000 spectators and ties in perfectly with Keene's wish for a separate field for each separate sport."

It was no wonder that Oregon Staters from all walks of life staged a night in his honor at the OSC-USC football game in Portland last fall. They called it "Ten Keene Years," in reference to his 10 years as OSC athletic director.

Keene has always been an Oregon Stater, in one way or another. He was student body president here, becoming head coach at Corvallis high following graduation. His next step up was that of assistant coach for the Beavers, where he remained until 1926.

At that time, "Spec" became head football coach at Willamette university in Salem, where he also served as athletic director. His Bearcat grid elevens completely dominated the Northwest conference for 15 years and many players won little all-America berths. He's almost as much of an institution to Willamette as he is to Oregon State.

Keene was in the army in World War I, and in the navy as a lieutenant-commander in World War II. For years, he was on the state of Oregon parole board. In 1947, he replaced Percy Locey as athletic director at OSC and has been on the job ever since.

JIM BARRATT, athletic business manager, is Keene's right-hand man in all phases of the athletic program. He has the rugged task of trying to keep all ticketseekers happy and works overtime to accomplish that goal. Firm in his belief that good public relations are vital to any program, Jim wears a big smile at all times and is patience personified. No customer is too big or too small to escape Barratt's undivided attention. Originally from Heppner, he graduated from OSC in 1950 and became assistant alumni director. Jim left that post at the close of the 1951 football season campaign for his present job and has remained there ever since. He is a navy veteran of World War II and assists with coaching the Beaver golf team.

Bill Neland, administrative assistant, is "Mr. Versatile" of the athletic department. He does everything, and does it well. In short, he's the top troubleshooter for the department, spending three-fourths of his time with Jim Barratt and one-fourth of it with John Eggers. Witty and intelligent, Bill has an answer for almost any question or problem that arises. He came to OSC as a student in the fall of 1947, prior to military service with the Marine Corps. One of those three military years was spent in war-torn Korea. Bill returned to OSC after discharge and joined the staff on a full-time basis three years ago.

BILL ROBERTSON, athletic trainer, is fast-becoming an institution in himself at OSC. For 11 years, he's headed the tape-brigade here and in that time probably has come to know more athletes better than anyone else in the department. Extremely adept at poetry and humorous recitations, Bill is oft called upon for bits of oratory at both private and public functions. Beaver coaches praise him as one of the top trainers in the nation. After service in Italy and the Aleutians in World War II, Bill returned to OSC and has long been one of the most popular members of the Corvallis community.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, is now in his 8th football season on the staff at OSC, the last six of which under his present title. Eggers took over the job on July 1, 1952, after serving two years as assistant to his predecessor, Irwin Harris. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later became an OSC all-American. He played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSC from the fall of 1946 through the spring of 1949. Eggers worked for a year as sports writer for The Oregonian in Portland before returning to his alma mater.

General Outlook, 1959

When you lose two outstanding players, one of them the best point-producer in the school's history, your team the following season is sure to suffer somewhat, even with what many refer to as a "basketball genius" at the coaching end.

Such is the case the winter of 1958-59 at Oregon State, as Coach Slats Gill's defending co-champions of the Pacific Coast conference ready themselves for another campaign.

Not even the most rabid OSC fan gives the **Beavers much** of a chance to repeat as champions. They lost all-American Dave Gambee, steady Kenny Nanson is no longer around and dependable reserves Wayne Moss and Gary Haynes are among the missing. When they departed, 12 years of experience went too.

But this won't be one of the weak sisters of the league, either. Slats Gill teams never are and never will be. Fans probably will like to watch the '59 Beavers, for they'll play with a lot of dash and abandon. Chances are they'll win more than they lose, if determinatoin and pride can be called indicative.

If OSC has a strength this winter, it probably will be overall team balance. Early indications were that the scoring load likely will be shared more than it was last year, when the brilliant Gambee and Nanson combined for most of the Beaver Points.

Driving guard Lee Harman scored 21 as OSC routed the Oregon Ducks in their 1959 opener, but forward Ted Miller managed 19 and forward Gary Goble counted 14. That's the balance we referred to, and though still too early to evaluate matters clearly, it may be the good omen Gill was waiting for.

Harman and Jimmy Anderson should be two of the better guards on the coast, and Center Karl Anderson, at 6-9, could be one of the league's best sophomores. Goble and Miller with all their experience, should be able to get the job done.

The Beaver bench one of the real weak points last year, looks better than before. Larry Copple is a proven "fireman," and junior college transfers Jim Woodland and Ron Critchfield have proved they can help. Sophomore forwards Steve Flynn and Ernie Johnson are inexperienced but both are fine prospects for the future.

Oregon State has no illusions about sweeping any titles in this, the final season of PCC basketball on a coastwide basis. That situation is reserved for power-laden clubs like Washington, Stanford and USC. On the other hand, Oregon State could have a good year, and even might cause some of the contenders trouble on a given night.

6-2 and 180. Senior from Milwaukie, Ore. Twice all-state in high school. Developed early as prepper, but slow in making adjustment to PCC ball. Has looked good in early workouts this fall, and in season opener against Oregon collected 19 points. Good poise, hard worker and adapts to situations well. Originally a guard, but gets the job done better at forward. A key man, if Beavers are to go far. Member of Delta Tau Delta social fraternity. „

Gary Goble

6-8 and 210. Senior from Toutle Lake, Wash. Plenty of experience and should be ready for best season. Fine rebounder, lots of fight. Playing now with more abandon than ever before and shooting better. Has fairly good hook shot and scores well close in. Quick for his size and plays the defense tough. Greatly sought-after as prepper and made all-state B team in Washington. Can go either at forward or center, depending on situation. Member of Phi Gamma Delta social fraternity.

Steve Flynn

6-5 and 180. Sophomore from Mountain View, Cal. One of top men on Rooks last year. Considered to be great prospect with a bit more experience. Good shooter and aggressive. Plays good defense, and very quick for his size. Left-handed, but becoming more ambidextrous all the time. Beta Theta Pi fraternity.

Ernie Johnson

6-6 and 190. Sophomore from Valsetz, Ore. Came from small school, but considered fine prospect when he gets more experience. Had some good nights with Rooks last winter, but not an effective scorer yet. Works hard on boards and probably will be first-line replacement at forward. Still a year away- actually. Phi Delta Theta.

CENTERS

Karl Anderson

6-9 and 190. Sophomore from Oakland, Cal. Likely to be regular first year on varsity. In time, is headed for greatness if he continues to improve. A bit sophomorphish now, lacking only in experience. Scored well on Rooks, and getting tougher on the boards. Long and lean, reminding fans of Red Rocha when he first came here. Fast for his size. Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity.

GUARDS

Lee Harman

6-0 and 190. Senior from Los Angeles, Cal. Just a step away from becoming one of best in OSC history. Smooth playmaker, seldom gets ruffled. Makes the passes only the great ones can make. Needs only to improve on his shooting, but in Oregon opener hit for 21 points and may be on the way. Aggressive on boards and can play forward when necessary. Player of Year as a senior in Los Angeles prepdom. Excellent dribbler. Might well be best guard in the west this winter. Fraternity is Sigma Nu.

Jim Anderson

5-9 and 155. Senior from Hoquiam, Wash. Came here as transfer from Grays Harbor (Wash.) JC and caught on fast. A two-year regular with lots of court savvy. Extremely quick and good dribbler. Excels in jump shot from outside when defense collapses around keyhole. One of three left-handers on OSC squad. Great desire and never quits. He and Harman give OSC two of best back-court men in league. Phi Kappa fraternity.

Larry Copple

5-10 and 165. Junior from Medford, Ore. Often called best "fireman" in league, as a result of his ability to come in off the bench and get points in a hurry. Excellent shooter, probably best on squad. Not as fast as the others defensively, but getting better all the time. Specialty is jump shot from anywhere. All-state in high school.

Ron Critchfield

5-10 and 155. Junior transfer from Salinas, Cal., where he played two years at Hartnell JC. Speed is main asset, and not a bad shooter. When he gets accustomed to tougher PCC circuit, should be big help to squad. Fine competitor with lots of hustle. Due for a lot of action his first year in Beaver uniform.

Jim Woodland

6-1 and 170. Sophomore transfer from Menlo JC of Menlo Park, Cal., where he played one season. Surprisingly adept, for new man, and lots of speed. Could become top defensive ace in time. May see action at forward, too, and will get the job done anywhere he plays. Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

The Coaches

Amory T. "Slats" Gill, Head Coach

It was 31 years ago this season that a young, personable man named Slats Gill took over the duties of head basketball coach at Oregon State.

Now, 31 years later that same Slats Gill still leads the Beavers, after compiling one of the truly great coaching records in the history of basketball. He's won just about every honor that can come to a coach, and chances are he'll sweep a great many more in the years ahead.

Past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches . . . honored member of the Helms Foundation Hall of fame . . . East-West game coach . . . dean of PCC cage mentors . . . eighth winningest coach in America of those still active . . . coach of 10 various championship quints . . . Hayward Award winner.

Those are just a few.

Slats Gill's true value to the school he loves so dearly can be measured in many other ways. The joy he has brought thousands of fans . . . the mark of distinction men who played under Slats now have. Builder of men, maker of champions, they say.

Probably nobody connected with OSC has more of an OSC background, with the possible exception of his boss, Athletic Director Spec Keene. Slats Gill was an all-American basketball player here in 1924 and kept right on going in his favorite sport.

Right out of college, he accepted a coaching job in Oakland, Cal., and his only prep team tied for city championship there. In 1926, he was called back to OSC as freshman coach, and soon gave promise of things yet to come by beating Oregon Frosh seven out of eight times.

When the 1928-29 season rolled around, Gill was promoted to head coach. His first championship came in 1933, when the Beavers won the PCC title, and from that time on Oregon State became one of the national basketball powers. The Beavers won titles in 1933, 1935, 1940, 1942, 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, and tied for championships in 1948 and 1958. OSC won PCC crowns in 1933, 1947, 1949 and 1955, tying for the top spot just last winter. They were among the top five nationally in 1947, 1949 and 1955.

Although Gill hates to "rate" his own teams—he liked them all—it most generally is agreed the 1947 and 1955 clubs were his greatest. In 1947, OSC lost a heartbreaking two-pointer to Oklahoma at Kansas City in its bid for the national crown, and then in '55 the University of San Francisco edged the Beavers, 57-56, in the NCAA regionals and then went on to win the championship in a breeze.

Few coaches take much personal interest in their proteges as does Gill. He's their friend for life, the man they can always turn to when they have a problem. The substitute who seldom played gets just as much personal attention from Slats as one of his many all-Americans.

If you're interested in the game of basketball, Slats Gill is always available for discussion. His office door is always open, and he's always willing to listen.

The Coaches

Paul Valenti, Assistant Coach

Completely efficient, totally loyal and well-liked by everyone.

That, in a nutshell, describes Oregon State's popular assistant basketball coach, Paul Valenti.

Slats Gill is one of those head coaches who believe in the theory that selection of assistants is an important matter. Since the 1947 season, Paul has been the No. 1 Gill aide, and in addition has turned out some top-notch freshman teams through the years.

Paul first came to OSC from Larkspur, Cal., and led the OSC Rooks in scoring in the 1939 season, which incidentally was one of the best first-year units ever. The Rooks of that season were undefeated over a 16-game slate.

Valenti was a regular on the varsity three straight seasons, in 1940, 1941 and 1942. He played on two championship teams and was regarded as the best two-handed set shooter ever to wear the Orange and Black.

Following his basketball days, he served in the Navy during World War II, returning to OSC in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His 1949 Rooks won 14 out of 15 games, and in 1951, his junior varsity swept 16 in a row without a loss. The squad notched 17 wins in 18 tries, and in 1955, he was undefeated with a record of 15 straight victories.

Just like his boss, he acquired a winning complex soon and kept right on going in that direction. There just isn't much that Paul can't handle in basketball. He's a top-rung scout, works well with young men and is respected by all.

Editor's Note—Oregon State's Slat Gill, despite compiling a great pre-war record, actually has been even more impressive at winning titles since the war. He led the Beavers to northern division crowns in 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, in addition to gaining a tie with Washington for the top spot in 1948. Under his tutelage, the Beavers went all the way to PCC championships in 1947, 1949 and 1955, while winding up in a first-place tie with California in 1958. His 1947 club finished 5th nationally, in 1949 Oregon State placed fourth and in 1955 the Beavers again were fifth under NCAA rankings.

Chancellor's Trophy

In 1953, Dr. Charles D. Byrne, then-chancellor of higher education in the state of Oregon and an avowed sports fan, originated the Chancellor's Trophy to be awarded annually to winner of the basketball series between Oregon State college and the University of Oregon.

It was to be retired at the end of 11 years, with the team ahead in years won to retain permanent possession. In years where there were four games instead of three, and a tie resulted, the team that had won the season before retained the trophy for its showcase.

Since 1953, the Chancellor's trophy has never left Oregon State. The Beavers won it outright every season except 1954, when the clubs split in four games, and they retained it then because they had won in 1953.

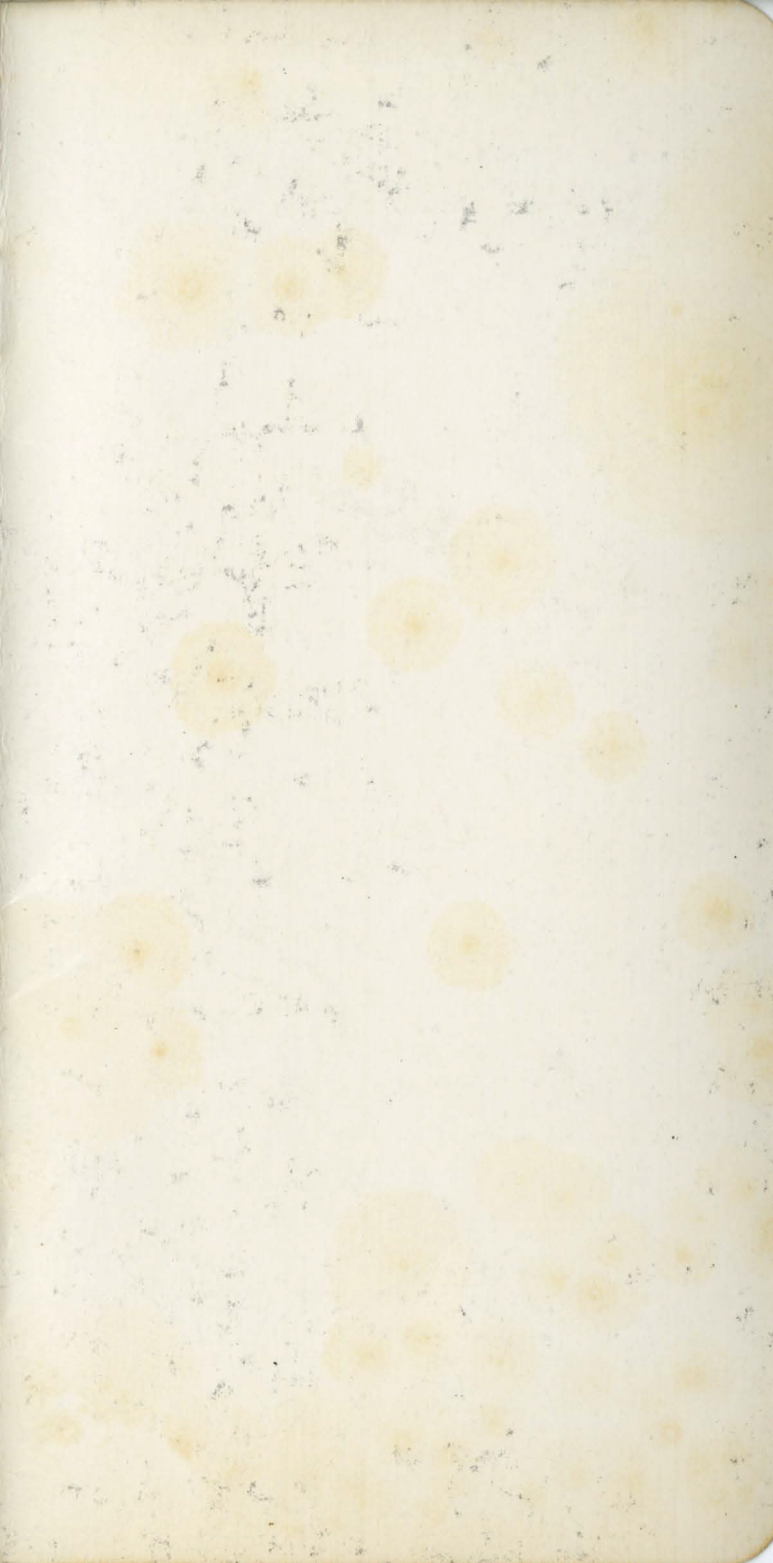
