

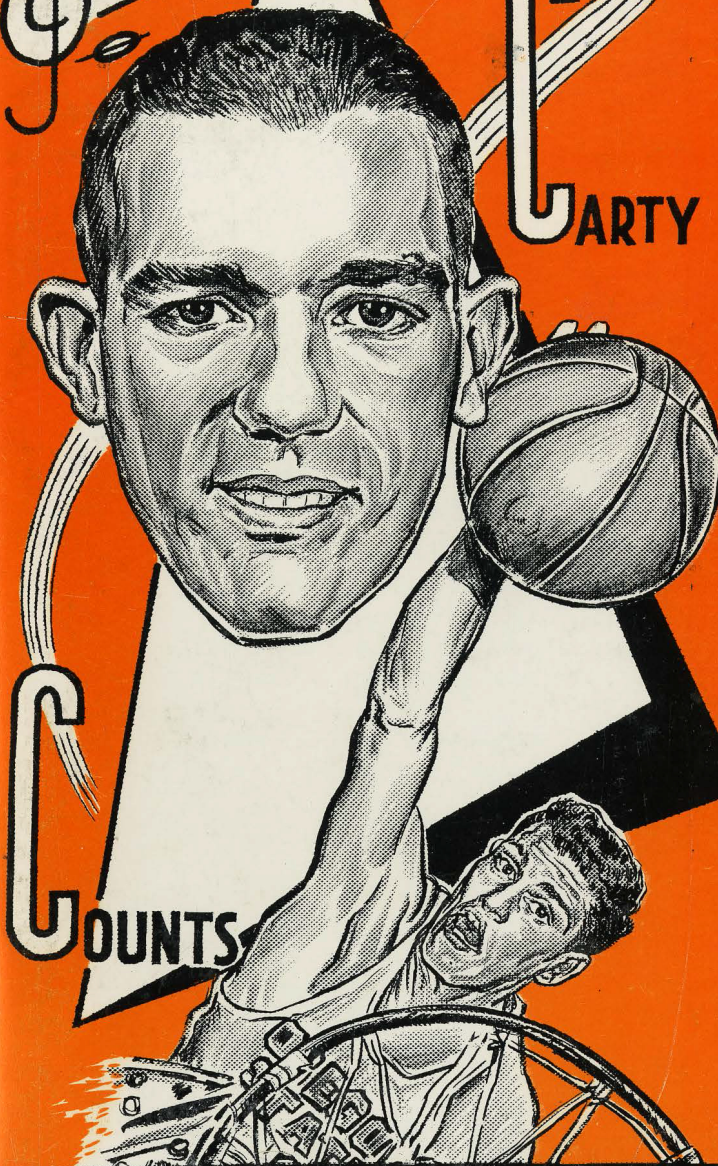

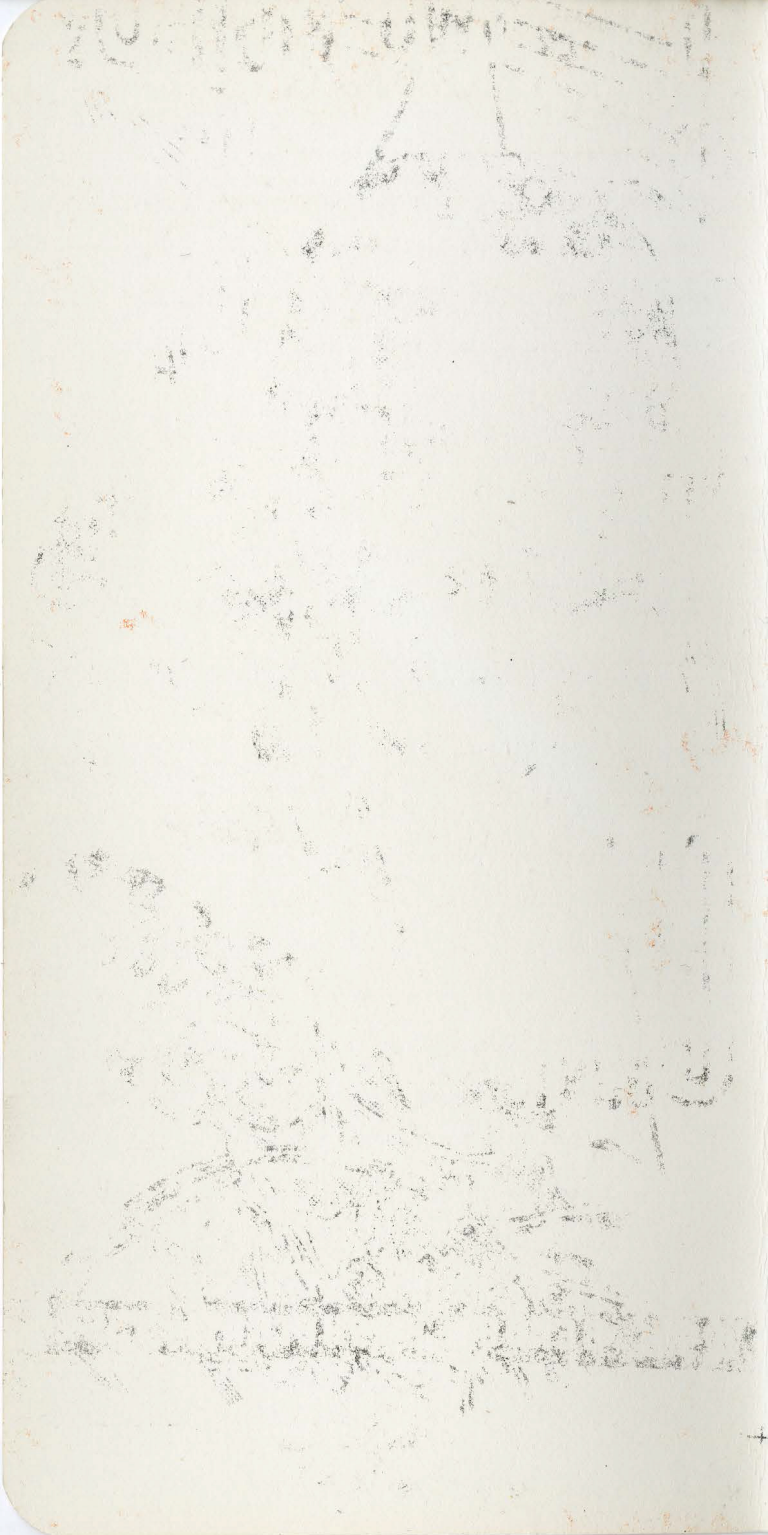

Oregon State University

Oregon State University, the largest institution of higher learning in the state of Oregon, was established as a land-grant school on October 27, 1868, under the provisions of the Morrill Land Grant Act. It was the state's first venture in the field of higher learning, and was originally named Corvallis College.

The state wanted to establish a college as early as 1851, and had selected Corvallis, then known as Marysville, as the site. The legislature then reversed itself and decided to construct the college in Jacksonville in southern Oregon.

However, the people of Corvallis went ahead and erected an academy in 1858, operated by the Methodist church. With the adoption of the Morrill act the state took over partial control, and assumed full control in 1885. In 1868 the name was changed to the State Agricultural College of Oregon, later to Oregon Agricultural College, and in 1953 was changed to Oregon State College, although popular acclaim had brought about that name as early as 1927. Just recently it was changed by the state legislature to Oregon State University.

The university campus proper, as well as adjoining agricultural lands, consists of about 4,000 acres, with increases being made yearly as the institution grows in population and need. In addition to the campus area, the Agricultural Experiment station at the university administers and utilizes approximately 24,000 acres, mostly county and federally owned.

The school of forestry owns and administers another 13,300 acres in the Peavy arboretum and the McDonald and other forested areas near Corvallis. These lands are used to teach forestry students actual forest practices through on-the-job training, as well as the research projects for the state and national forest services and the many timber companies located throughout the Northwest.

In addition to the schools of agriculture and forestry, degrees also are given in Humanities and Social Science, Business and Technology, Education, Engineering, Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Pharmacy, Agriculture, Science and the Graduate school. A student indeed has a wide choice of curriculum at OSU, with allied subjects in all fields.

Oregon State University is located in the picturesque city of Corvallis, named for its location in the heart of the Willamette valley of western Oregon. Most recent population (1960) of Corvallis was 21,353, making it Oregon's 5th largest city. Metropolitan Portland is only 80 miles to the north and the Pacific ocean 60 miles west. Corvallis lies in between the Cascade and Coast ranges; with agriculture and lumber forming the chief industries.

Some 9,039 students are enrolled for the 1961-62 school year, with an enrollment of 10,000 predicted within several years. The university is in the midst of a vast building program, with many new dormitories and other structures spread throughout the beautiful campus.

Some of the better-known buildings include the Memorial Union (student union), Benton Hall, the Coliseum, and Agriculture hall, although newer structures such as Cordley Hall are just as eye-catching. Parker stadium, built in 1953 for football, seats 28,000 fans. Dr. James H. Jensen is the new president of OSU, while R. S. Keene has been the athletic director since 1947.

ATHLETIC STAFF

ROY S. "SPEC" KEENE, Oregon State's foremost exponent of good-will and understanding in athletics, long has been recognized as one of the top men in his field. As athletic director at OSU since 1947, he has spearheaded an expansion program that has resulted in this school having an overall athletic program rivaled by few nationally.

Probably nobody ever connected with athletics here has had more friends and fewer enemies than Spec Keene. He combines his vast experience and background with a warm, personal touch, and through the year's he's won a lot of friends for Oregon State.

Keene serves on the executive committee of the NCAA, once was president of the Pacific Coast conference athletic directors association and is chairman of the regional NCAA selection committee in basketball. All one has to do is take a glance at OSU athletic schedules, and they'll find Keene is well-known and well-liked nationally.

Under his direction and planning, OSU built 28,000 seating Parker stadium for football and 11,000 seating Coliseum for basketball. The Beavers have a separate field for every sport, and through Keene's efforts, major awards are now given in football, basketball, baseball, track, wrestling, swimming, golf and tennis.

It's just natural that Keene would be serving his alma mater so well, for he's an Oregon Stater from way back. He was student body president here in 1921, as well as an outstanding baseball player, and at one time even served as an assistant coach for the Beavers.

His first job out of college was that of head coach at Corvallis high, before joining the OSU staff. Next step was OSU where he remained until 1926. Then came assignment as head football coach and athletic director at Willamette university in Salem, where he remained 15 years. At Willamette, his grid machines were the scourge of the Northwest conference and many of his players won little All-America honors.

Spec returned to OSU in 1947 as athletic director and has been on the job ever since. He's a past member of the state of Oregon parole board and served his country well in both World War I and World War II. In the first conflict, he was an army lieutenant, and in the last war was a lieutenant-commander in the navy.

JIM BARRATT, athletic business manager and Keene's top aide, year in and year out tackles one of the toughest assignments of all—making people happy. He's overseer of all ticket sales and various other promotions connected with the athletic program. His unbounding enthusiasm and attention to details helps establish Jim as one of the top men in his field. He wears a broad smile at all times and is a firm believer in strong public relations. Barratt originally is from Heppner where he was a high school star in football, basketball, tennis and track, winning 10 varsity awards. Jim served in the navy in World War II, and graduated from OSU in 1950. He was editor of the Daily Barometer, official school publication at OSU, his senior year and a member of virtually every honor organization on campus. Jim first became assistant alumni director in 1950, moving to the athletic department at the close of the 1951 football season. He still keeps a hand in the coaching line, however, as golf coach.

BILL ROBERTSON, trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 15 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole," and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 11th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

COMM HENNESS, athletic ticket manager, is one of the newest members of the OSU athletic department. He joined the staff on February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. The last three years were spent as an accountant for that department. Henness was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. He has lived in Corvallis most of the time since. Comm is an extremely diligent worker and a top specialist in accounting or bookkeeping duties of any nature. As Jim Barratt's right-hand man, he also handles all ticket sales to free Barratt for more promotional administrative work.

OSU's NEW PREXY

Dr. James H. Jensen, vice-president of Iowa State University for the past eight years, is the newly-appointed president of Oregon State University and will be guiding this institution for the first time in the 1961-62 school year.

He replaced Dr. A. L. Strand, who retired on September 1 after 19 years at Oregon State. Dr. Jensen was selected by the State Board of Higher Education, after an intricate screening process.

Dr. Jensen was born at Madison, Neb., June 16, 1906. He received his bachelor's degree in plant sciences from the University of Nebraska in 1928, and his master's degree from Nebraska in 1930 with a major in plant pathology. He earned his Ph.D. degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1934.

As provost, or executive vice president of Iowa State, Dr. Jensen served as dean of the faculty and also was executive officer of the university in the absence of the president.

In addition to his normal administrative and research duties, he has been a member of the board of directors since 1954 of the Associated Mid-west Universities. He was president of this corporation of 31 mid-western universities in 1959.

He was one of three members of the Interinstitutional Committee on Education Coordination of the Iowa State Board of Regents and has also served as a member of the commission of the North Central Commission of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

An internationally known botanist and plant pathologist, Dr. Jensen brings to OSU a broad background of experience in University teaching, research, federal government work and foreign assignments.

Chancellor's Trophy

In 1953, Dr. Charles D. Byrne, then-chancellor of higher education in the state of Oregon and an avowed sports fan, originated the Chancellor's Trophy to be awarded annually to winner of the basketball series between Oregon State University and the University of Oregon.

It was to be retired at the end of 11 years, with the team ahead in years won to retain permanent possession. In years where there were four games instead of three, and a tie resulted, the team that had won the season before retained the trophy for its showcase.

General Outlook

By the time this press, radio and TV booklet reaches readers, the Beavers may be well on their way into another basketball season. They were due to open the hoop season even before football had ended, which of course presented a publication problem.

The Beaver basketeers of 1961-62 should be a fine, interesting team—perhaps not championship calibre, but still formidable enough to make it tough on any opponent they may face.

The key to the situation is Mel Counts, a fabulous 7-foot sophomore from Coos Bay, Oregon. The future is his, to be sure, but whether he can develop enough as a sophomore to lead Oregon State to the heights it hopes for, still remains to be seen.

He's good, real good. Quite possibly, he could be the best "big man" ever to enroll here. But sophomores seldom are good enough to carry the load. He'll need a lot of help from all if Oregon State is to improve a great deal on its 14-12 record of last year.

Slats Gill lost five seasoned veterans through graduation, including his starting center, Karl Anderson, and the first-line guard duo of Jim Woodland and Bill Wold. But he still has some talented help around.

Jay Carty, a 6-7 senior forward, is probably the best shooter on the squad. He gave the opposition fits towards the end of last year, and was OSU's No. 2 point-producer with 262 points. Steve Pauly, another veteran who never quite found himself despite scoring 161 points, could be a mainstay this winter. He looked mighty improved in early drills.

Outside of those three, the competition is wide open for starting berths. It could be Bob Jacobson, a senior with lots of experience. Roger Johnson and Terry Baker, the football aces, conceivably could be what Gill is searching for. And he has speed in Gary Rossi and Lynn Baxter, plus rugged determination in Rex Benner. Tim Campbell, who laid out of competition last winter after lettering as a sophomore, might fill the bill, too.

The inside strength will be good, there's no question of that. If the outside men play as well, Oregon State may be in for another highly successful season—which in a way is simply characteristic of Slats Gill.

FORWARDS

Jay Carty

6-7 and 205. Senior letterman from China Lake, Cal. Runner-up in OSU scoring last year with 262 points, an average of 10.1. Versatile shooter, with wide variety of shots from anywhere. President of Varsity O, letterman's organization at OSU. Always impressive, now appears headed for best year.

Bob Jacobson

6-6 and 170. Senior letterman from North Bend. Tallied 183 points as a junior. Fine competitor. Experienced tragic accident while working last summer, and lost three fingers off his right hand. Has worked hard against handicap, displaying usual fine talents and determination. Can play either outside or inside, and does the job well.

Tim Campbell

6-6 and 196. Junior letterman from Vancouver, Wash. Lettered two seasons ago, but remained out of competition last year. Moves well in deep near the basket. Good hook-shooter, and hard worker. Can improve on defense. Tough on boards and sure to see lots of action.

Roger Johnson

6-2 and 190. Senior from Coos Bay. An all-stater in both football and basketball while in high school, competed briefly for OSU two years ago before leaving school. Getting late start because of football, where he is star end, but could help squad considerably if he rounds into form. Good competitor.

CENTERS

Mel Counts

7-0 and 225. Sophomore from Coos Bay. One of the finest "big man" prospects ever to enroll at OSU. Sought after by everyone after brilliant prep career, matriculated here and averaged better than 27 points per game as freshman. Extremely hard-worker, willing to learn. Good poise for neophyte, and shoots well away from basket. Fine jump shot. In time, sure to be one of Slat's all-time bests.

Grant Harter

6-11 and 230. Sophomore from North Salem of Salem. Fine prep record, and did fairly well as a freshman. Laid out of competition last winter, while working on fundamentals and timing. May still be a year away, but considered a prospect.

GUARDS

Steve Pauly

6-4 and 198. Junior letterman from Beaverton. Scored 161 points as a sophomore last year, and at times, looked like he would eventually become one of the all-time greats here. Had bad moments, too, however, and hopes to rectify them this season. Highly impressive in fall workouts. Big, fairly quick and can shoot. Can also play defense with best of 'em. A decathlon prospect in track.

Gary Rossi

6-1 and 175. Junior letterman from Coos Bay. Speedboy of Beaver squad, and fine high jumper and broadjumper in track. Still has to prove worth as shooter, but considered by his coach as a great prospect. Tough defensively, largely because of extreme quickness. Should get better with more experience.

Lynn Baxter

5-10 and 155. Sophomore from Roseburg. A 9.9 sprinter in high school track, one of fastest men on squad. Looked good on Rooks, and may be the playmaker his coach is searching for. Periodically, has been good shooter, but not with the consistence that is desirable. Sure to play a lot of ball his first year.

Terry Baker

6-3 and 195. Junior letterman from Portland. Referred to by Sports Illustrated as the "Best Athlete in College." Great football quarterback, who excelled as prep basketballer, winning all-state honors. Played well at times for OSU last winter, and scored 147 points in 20 games. Fine passer and playmaker, who has not yet lived up to full potential.

Dave Hayward

5-10 and 170. Junior holdover reserve from Downey, Calif. Didn't come along as fast as expected a year ago, but perhaps destined for better things this time around. Fine baseball catcher. Methodical and smart, but still has room for improvement in some categories.

The Coaches

Amory T. "Slats" Gill, Head Coach

In this game of basketball, and the accompanying honors that go with it, there just isn't much that hasn't been accorded to Slats Gill.

He's experienced the good years (many of 'em), and the bad ones, too—though the latter have been far and few between.

In his 33 years as OSU headman, he's managed to be on the victorious side 529 times, as compared with 374 on the losing end.

His teams have figured in 10 championships of one sort or another—not to mention five straight titles at the annual Far West Classic.

Past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches . . . selected member of the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame . . . East-West game coach . . . dean of western cage tutors . . . Hayward Award winner . . . coach of an OSU team that has defeated traditional rival Oregon in 22 of the last 34 games played and swept the Chancellor's trophy eight straight times before finally losing it.

Those are just a few highlights, and spotlights, in the successful coaching career of a man who has been connected with Oregon State a major portion of his life.

Slats Gill's roots are deep with Oregon State. He was an all-American basketball player here in 1924, coached the Beaver Rooks for a short period of time and then took on the head reins at the start of the 1928-29 campaign.

From that day forward, Oregon State has been a national hoop power.

The Beavers won northern division crowns in 1933, 1935, 1940, 1942, 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, while tying for the top spot in 1948. They swept PCC titles in 1933, 1947, 1949 and 1955, and were in a tie for first in 1958. The 1949 club placed fourth nationally, while Oregon State was 5th in 1947 and in 1955.

An illness temporarily sidelined Slats in 1960, when his team was playing in Seattle, but in his own characteristic fashion, he made a fine recovery and was given the doctor's go-ahead to continue his cherished profession.

In all his coaching years, and despite all his success, one big goal has eluded him—a national championship for his school in basketball. The Beavers came close at least three times. In 1942, Stanford beat OSU in two-out-of-three games for the PCC title, then went on to an NCAA crown.

Then again in 1947, it just missed his grasp as the Beavers dropped a two-pointer to Oklahoma at Kansas City. Many felt that Oregon State could have gone all the way had they won that game.

Most heartbreaking of all, probably, was in 1955 when the University of San Francisco gained a thrilling 57-56 win over the Beavers in the finals of the Western Regionals and then went on to slaughter all opposition the rest of the way. "We won—and you would have, too," wired San Francisco sports-writer Bob Brachman to Corvallis friends after the NCAA finals.

So now, it's another season ahead for Slats Gill—his 34th. It may be one of his best.

Paul Valenti, Assistant Coach

Completely efficient, totally loyal and well-liked by everyone. That, in a nutshell, describes Oregon State's popular assistant basketball coach, Paul Valenti.

Slats Gill is one of those head coaches who believes in the theory that selection of assistants is an important matter. Since the 1947 season, Paul has been the No. 1 Gill aide, and in addition has turned out some top-notch freshman teams through the years.

Paul first came to OSU from Larkspur, Cal., and led the OSU Rooks in scoring on the 1939 season, which incidentally was one of the best first-year units ever. The Rooks of that season were undefeated over a 16-game slate.

Valenti was a regular on the varsity three straight seasons, in 1940, 1941 and 1942. He played on two championship teams and was regarded as the best two-handed set shooter ever to wear the Orange and Black.

Following his basketball days, he served in the Navy during World War II, returning to OSU in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His Rooks won 14 out of 15 games, and in 1951, his junior varsity swept 16 in a row without a loss. The squad notched 17 wins in 18 tries, and in 1955, he was undefeated with a record of 15 straight victories.

Just like his boss, he acquired a winning complex soon and kept right on going in that direction. There just isn't much that Paul can't handle in basketball. He's a top-rung scout, works well with young men and is respected by all.

Paul is recognized as one of the fine young coaches in America.

Jimmy Anderson, Freshman Coach

While working towards his Doctor's degree at OSU, Jimmy Anderson will again be in charge of the OSU freshman squad. Anderson was a three-year regular with the Beavers in 1957-58-59, after transferring here from Grays Harbor JC in Aberdeen, Wash. Jim served as running mate to Lee Harman and they formed one of the better guard duos on the west coast.

Editor's Note—Oregon State's Slat Gill, despite compiling a great pre-war record, actually has been even more impressive at winning titles since the war. He led the Beavers to northern division crowns in 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, in addition to gaining a tie with Washington for the top spot in 1948. Under his tutelage, the Beavers went all the way to PCC championships in 1947, 1949 and 1955, while winding up in a first-place tie with California in 1958. His 1947 club finished 5th nationally. In 1949 Oregon State placed fourth and in 1955 the Beavers again were fifth under NCAA rankings.
