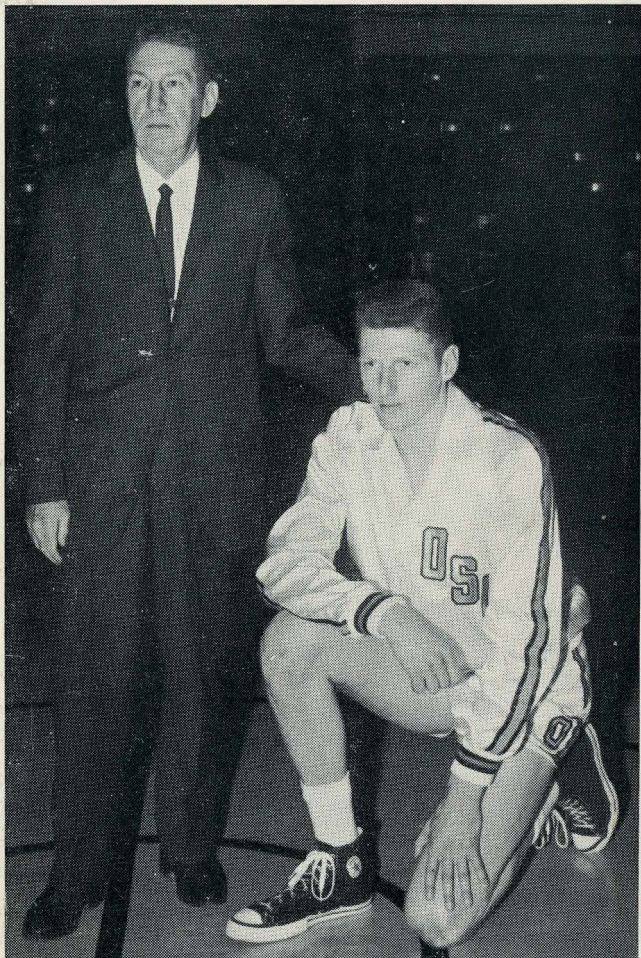

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GENERAL OUTLOOK

Oregon State should have a good basketball team in the 1962-63 season—possibly one of the best in the school's long and illustrious court history. But with one of the toughest schedules ever ahead, the Beavers may well have trouble equalling their 1961-62 record which brought 24 victories in 29 games.

Slats Gill has always coached winning basketball, and this season figures to be no exception. He lost only two men off his 1962 squad that won the Pacific Northwest NCAA championship—starting forwards Jay Carty and Bob Jacobson—and he has 10 returning lettermen to carry OSU hopes into another campaign.

Heading the list of returnees is 7-foot center Mel Counts, who won unanimous all-coast honors as a sophomore last year. Extremely agile for a man his size, and a deadly shooter from many spots on the floor, Counts appears headed for all-America acclaim before his college days are over. It might even come this season.

Steve Pauly, 6-4 forward, teamed up with Terry Baker at guard last year in OSU's vaunted fast break attack, but this time will operate out of the corner. Baker, too, is back as "field general" for the Beavers. And other lettermen on hand are Tim Campbell, 6-6 forward; Ray Torgerson, 6-4; Grant Harter, 6-11; Rex Benner, 6-3; Gary Rossi, 6-1; Dave Hayward, 5-10; and Lynn Baxter, 5-10.

Much help, too, is expected to come from a fine crop of sophomores who completed such a successful freshman season. Foremost of these is much-heralded Jim Jarvis, out of Roseburg high in southern Oregon, who won all-America prep honors and wowed fans last year with his Bob Cousy type play.

His running mate with the Rooks, Frank Peters, could also step right into a starting job—or at least give the veterans a battle for it. Jim Kraus, a 6-7 forward, also has great promise and is lacking only in experience. Personnel-wise, the cagey Gill has the nucleus to win plenty of games this winter. Needless to say, the Beavers will profit from the coaching end of it.

Oregon State will have plenty of height, good experience and reasonably good speed. Baker, Jarvis, Peters and Rossi can "go" as they say in hoop circles, and the Beavers beat many an opponent with their fast break last year. When they get a chance to run, they'll run, and they hope to improve on their set-offense, too.

Counts is rather unique as tall players go. He can shoot from anywhere—not just underneath the basket. Extremely accurate from outside and corners with his jump shot, he also has developed a good hook shot with either hand. And one of his greatest assets is the ability to clear the ball off the boards and get it moving for the fast break offense.

This may not ultimately become the best team ever at OSU, for Slats Gill has turned out some real machines in the 35 years he has been on the job here.

But it certainly will be one of the most interesting.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

FORWARDS

Steve Pauly

6-4 and 200. Sr. let. from Beaverton. 3rd high scorer on squad last year with 323 points. Shot .426 in field goal percentage and grabbed 148 rebounds. No. 2 ranking decathlon man in America in track. All-State in football, basketball and track as prepper and set national prep high hurdles record. Fine all-around athlete with lots of experience. Can go either at forward or guard. In school of Science.

Tim Campbell

6-6 and 196. Sr. let. from Vancouver, Wash. Scored 66 points in 1962, mainly as understudy to Mel Counts. Posted .418 field goal percentage and .667 at charity line, in addition to 55 rebounds. Effective in close under basket, has good moves and fakes. Accurate hook-shooter. Hard worker with plenty of desire. In school of Forestry.

Ray Torgerson

6-4 and 197. Sr. let. from Winnepeg, Manitoba (Canada). Transferred here from Portland State College and had to lay out a year before joining squad last year. Played well, with .436 shooting percentage and 47 rebounds. Tough on boards and strong defensively. Needs to improve on shooting and gain more confidence. In school of Engineering.

Rex Benner

6-3 and 185. Junior letterman from Grants Pass. Had planned to lay out last year after accident that cost him sight in one eye, but decided to play anyway and did good job. Extremely quick for his size, can play either forward or guard. In school of Education.

Jim Kraus

6-7 and 180. Soph. from Los Altos, Cal. One of "Big Three" on Rook team last year, along with Jim Jarvis and Frank Peters. Left-handed and good scorer, especially in close around basket. Lots of promise for sophomore and lacking only in experience. Willing to work and should progress rapidly as he sees more and more action. In school of Education.

CENTERS

Mel Counts

7-0 and 228. Jr. let. from Coos Bay. A true all-America candidate, after winning unanimous all-coast honors in sophomore year. Scored 537 points last year, second highest in school's history for one season, and broke school record for rebounds with 401. Shot .803 at foul line, with 151 of 188. Very agile for man his size and different from most big men in that he can shoot from anywhere, not just underneath the basket. Deadly on jump shots from outside or corners. Tireless worker with great enthusiasm for basketball. Fine team man, getting better on defense all the time. Could be headed for all-time national greatness. In school of Humanities and Social Science.

Grant Harter

6-11 and 230. Jr. let. from Salem. Hard and willing worker, good competition for Counts in rugged daily practice sessions. Has been slow in developing, but with gradual improvement. Coach Gill often has toyed with idea of using both big lads in same lineup. School of Humanities and Social Science.

GUARDS

Lynn Baxter

5-10 and 155. Jr. let. from Roseburg. Saw barely enough service to letter as sophomore, but performed well when he did play. Good speed and has passing ability. Needs more work on shooting. Fine team man, aids greatly in excellent squad morale. In school of Education.

Terry Baker

6-3 and 196. Sr. let. from Portland. Better known as all-America football quarterback, best in OSU history, but also fine hoop star. Regular past two years. Playmaker and leader of fast break offense. 4th high scorer on squad last season with 277 points. Shot .688 at free throw line and .447 in field goals. Won spot on all-Western Regional NCAA five at Provo. In school of Engineering.

Jim Jarvis

6-0 and 160. Soph. from Roseburg. Probably most sensational freshman guard ever to perform at OSU, after gaining all-America prep honors. Bob Cousy type playmaker, but also great shooter with wide variety of shots. Averaged 26 points as freshman. Fine dribbler and passer. Could give OSU much-needed outside shooting and take pressure off Counts. Great crowd pleaser. In school of Education.

Frank Peters

6-2 and 195. Soph. from Anaheim, Cal. Running mate of Jarvis on Rooks last year and almost as effective. Extremely good shooter who could go either at forward or guard. Plays boards much tougher than man his size normally would. Could be good defensive player. Will be strong contender for starting job. Son of Norm Peters, starting end on 1942 Rose Bowl team. In school of Business and Technology.

Gary Rossi

6-1 and 175. Sr. let. from Coos Bay. Speed-boy of squad, also a high jumper and broadjumper in track. Great potential and at times has proved it. Scored 82 points last year and key man in certain victories. Not consistent enough in shooting, but scrappy performer and strong in many other phases. In school of Humanities and Social Science.

Dave Hayward

5-10 and 170. Sr. let. from Downey, Cal. Star baseball catcher, who excels defensively. Proved worth in checking Seattle's Eddie Miles last year. Shoots well on occasion, but not consistent enough. Sure to see lots of action. Scored 57 points last year. In school of Humanities and Social Science.

THE COACHES

AMORY T. "SLATS" GILL,
Head Coach

One of the most respected basketball coaches in America . . .

That short sentence pretty well describes the stature of Coach Slats Gill, a man who has been giving Oregon State winning basketball teams since he first took over the reins 35 years ago.

This is Gill's 35th season as Beaver headman. In that time, he's won 553 times and lost 379. But the true worth of Slats Gill to Oregon State, and to basketball in general, can't be measured purely in terms of his victories. In a sense, he's almost an institution in himself.

His teams have figured in 11 championships of one sort or another—not to mention six consecutive crowns in the annual Far West Classic. And look at some of his other accolades: past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, member of the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame, East-West game coach. Hayward Award winner, respected author of a basketball work-book, and coach of an OSU team that has defeated traditional rival Oregon 27 times in 39 meetings.

The Chancellor's trophy, given annually to the state school winning the annual series, has been at OSU nine times out of the 10 years of its existence. Last year, for example, Gill padded the total with five straight over the Ducks from Eugene.

Slats Gill's roots are deep with Oregon State. He was an all-American basketball player here in 1924, coached the Beaver Rooks for a short time, and then took on the head coaching reins at the start of the 1928-29 campaign. From that day forward, OSU has been a national hoop power.

The Beavers won northern division championships in 1933, 1935, 1940, 1942, 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, while tying for the top spot in 1948. They swept Pacific Coast conference crowns in 1933, 1947, 1949 and 1955, and were tied in 1958. The 1949 club placed fourth nationally, while OSU was tied for 5th in 1957, 1955 and 1962.

Gill's most recent club, the 1962 outfit, won the Pacific Northwest NCAA title, and eventually lost in the finals of the Western Regional NCAA tourney at Provo, Utah. The overall record was 24-5, another landmark in Gill's glorious court history.

An illness temporarily sidelined him in 1960 when his team was playing in Seattle, but Slats bounced back stronger than ever and appears to be in top health again. Nobody enjoys being associated with young men more than Slats Gill, and whether they are winners or losers, they are still tops in his basketball book.

In all his coaching years, just one prime goal has eluded Gill—a national championship for his school in basketball. The Beavers came close several times, and even last year conceivably were in the running. Best best, probably was in 1947, when Lew Beck, Red Rocha, Cliff Crandall, Morrie Silver and company dropped a two-pointer to Oklahoma at Kansas City when many felt they could have gone all the way.

Then again in 1955, University of San Francisco edged the Beavers, 57-56, in the Western Regional NCAA finals at Corvallis, and later went on to win the nationals in a breeze. Even in 1942, when OSU dropped a best of three-game series to Stanford by the narrowest of margins, the Beavers had a good chance. After that tough series, Stanford went on to sweep the NCAA title.

Slats Gill is a credit not only to basketball, but to the university itself and to the state of Oregon.

May all his hopes be fulfilled in the 1962-63 season.



PAUL VALENTI
Assistant Coach

A head coach would have to go a long way to find an assistant to compare with Paul Valenti.

That's one of the many reasons Oregon State's chief hoop assistant rates so high with his boss, Slats Gill, and with everyone with whom he comes in contact.

Paul has been a coaching aide to Slats since the 1947 season. For years he worked with the freshmen, in addition to his varsity chores, and also turned out some top-flight junior varsity quints.

Valenti first came to OSU from Larkspur, Cal., and led the OSU Rooks in scoring for the 1939 season. The Rooks of that year were undefeated over a 16-game slate, and most of them later became varsity stars under Slats.

Valenti was a regular on the varsity three straight seasons, in 1940, 1941 and 1942. He played on two championship teams and was regarded as the best two-handed set-shooter ever to wear the school colors. Dick Strite, veteran and able sports editor of the Eugene Register-Guard where traditional rival Oregon is located, picked Valenti on his all-time northern division team.

Following his basketball days, Paul served in the Navy during World War II, returning to OSU in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His Rooks won 14 of 15 games, and in 1951, his jayvees swept 16 in a row without a loss. He had won 17 of 18 seasons, and then in 1955, Paul's club went undefeated with 15 straight.

When Slats Gill was taken ill unexpectedly in 1960, Valenti took over for his close friend and boss, and as usual did an exceptional job. Just like Slats, he acquired a winning habit early in life.

Together, they make quite a winning pair in basketball.

JIM WOODLAND
Freshman Coach

In his first season as Rook coach, while completing work towards a degree, is personable Jim Woodland, who played for Oregon State in the 1959-60-61 seasons.

A fine jump shooter while in school, Woodland also proved to be one of Oregon State's finest competitors. He had some "hot" nights, and also a few "cold" ones, but in keeping with so many Gill-coached basketeers, he was always behind his coach and the team 100 per cent.

Woodland was second high scorer on the team in 1959 with 229 points, and in 1960, he emerged first with 272 points. In 1961, he was tied with 243 tallies.

Chancellor's Trophy

In 1953, Dr. Charles D. Byrne, then-chancellor of higher education in the state of Oregon and an avowed sports fan, originated the Chancellor's Trophy to be awarded annually to winner of the basketball series between Oregon State University and the University of Oregon.

It was to be retired at the end of 11 years, with the team ahead in years won to retain permanent possession. In years where there were four games instead of three, and a tie resulted, the team that had won the season before retained the trophy for its showcase.

Editor's Note—Oregon State's Slat Gill, despite compiling a great pre-war record, actually has been even more impressive at winning titles since the war. He led the Beavers to northern division crowns in 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, in addition to gaining a tie with Washington for the top spot in 1948. Under his tutelage, the Beavers went all the way to PCC championships in 1947, 1949 and 1955, while winding up in a first-place tie with California in 1958. His 1947 club finished 5th nationally, in 1949 Oregon State placed fourth and in 1955 the Beavers again were fifth under NCAA rankings. The 1962 OSU team won the Pacific Northwest NCAA title, and reached the finals of the Western Regional NCAA tourney at Provo.

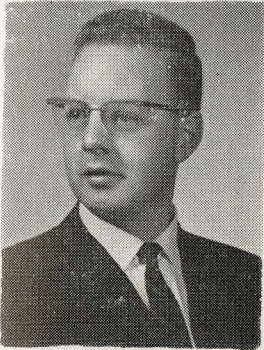

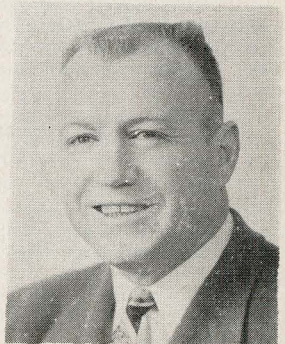

Oregon State University

Oregon State University, the oldest, largest and finest institution of higher learning in the state of Oregon, was established as a land-grant school on October 27, 1868, under the provisions of the Morrill Land Grant Act. It was the state's first venture in the field of higher learning and was originally named Corvallis College.

The state wanted to establish a college as early as 1851, and had selected Corvallis, then known as Marysville, as the site. The legislature then reversed itself and decided to construct the college in Jacksonville in southern Oregon.

However, the people of Corvallis went ahead and erected an academy in 1858, operated by the Methodist church. With the adoption of the Morrill act the state took over partial control, and assumed full control in 1885. In 1868 the name was changed to the State Agricultural College of Oregon, later to Oregon Agricultural College, and in 1953 was changed to Oregon State College, although popular acclaim had brought about that name as early as 1927. Just recently it was changed by the state legislature to Oregon State University.

The university campus proper, as well as adjoining agricultural lands, consists of about 4,000 acres, with increases being made yearly as the institution grows in population and need. In addition to the campus area, the Agricultural Experiment station at the university administers and utilizes approximately 24,000 acres, mostly county and federally owned.

The school of forestry owns and administers another 13,300 acres in the Peavy arboretum and the McDonald and other forested areas near Corvallis. These lands are used to teach forestry students actual forest practices through on-the-job training, as well as the research projects for the state and national forest services and the many timber companies located throughout the Northwest.

In addition to the schools of agriculture and forestry, degrees also are given in Humanities and Social Science, Business and Technology, Education, Engineering, Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Pharmacy, Agriculture, Science and the Graduate school. A student indeed has a wide choice of curriculum at OSU, with allied subjects in all fields.

Oregon State University is located in the picturesque city of Corvallis, named for its location in the heart of the Willamette valley of western Oregon. Most recent population (1962) of Corvallis was 24,471, making it Oregon's 5th largest city. Metropolitan Portland is only 80 miles to the north and the Pacific ocean 60 miles west. Corvallis lies in between the Cascade and Coast ranges; with agriculture and lumber forming the chief industries.

Over 10,000 students are enrolled for the 1962-63 school year. The university is in the midst of a vast building program with many new dormitories and other structures spread throughout the beautiful campus.

Some of the better-known buildings include the Memorial Union (student union), Benton Hall, the Coliseum, and Agriculture hall, although newer structures such as Cordley Hall are just as eye-catching. Parker stadium, built in 1953 for football, seats 28,000 fans. Dr. James H. Jensen is the president of OSU, while R. S. Keene has been the athletic director since 1947.

ROY S. KEENE

Athletic Director

It takes a man well-versed in sports, full of enthusiasm and stocked with background to successfully administrate an athletic department in this fast-stepping modern era of sports.

Such a man is Roy S. "Spec" Keene, athletic director at Oregon State since 1947.

Keene possibly knows more people and has more friends than anybody connected with athletics at OSU. And he has demonstrated administrative sharpness by developing Oregon State's vast athletic program into one of the finest in the nation.

"Spec" of course, is an Oregon Stater from the word go. He was student body president here in 1921, started on the baseball team and was an assistant coach at OSU before he moved on to Willamette University in Salem. At Willamette, his teams were the scourge of the Northwest conference, winning one championship after another.

His loyalty to school, and nation, could never be questioned. Keene was an army lieutenant in World War I and a naval lieutenant-commander in World War II, and served his country well in both cases. Even so, he never lost interest in athletics.

"Spec" became athletic director at OSU in 1947 when the Beavers were experiencing a natural expansion trend in athletics. One important problem was lack of facilities to carry on a program that would rate high nationally. Under his direction and planning, spacious OSU Coliseum was constructed, giving this school one of the finest to be found anywhere. The building opened in December of 1949 and has attracted thousands of people since.

Football needed something better than ancient Bell field, too, and there again Keene recognized the problem. Even better, he did something about it, and spearheaded a drive to obtain a new stadium with seating for 28,000. With contributions from boosters, alums and friends, Oregon State was able to open picturesque Parker stadium in 1953 at no debt to the taxpayers. The plant was paid for when it was built.

Keene, meanwhile, became a key figure nationally in athletics, being on the executive committee of the NCAA, and also chairman of the selection committee for the Western Regional NCAA basketball tournament. In addition, he was a past president of the Pacific Coast conference athletic directors association.

JIM BARRATT, athletic business manager and Keene's top aide, year in and year out tackles one of the toughest assignments of all—making people happy. He's overseer of all ticket sales and various other promotions connected with the athletic program. His unbounding enthusiasm and attention to details helps establish Jim as one of the top men in his field. He wears a broad smile at all times and is a firm believer in strong public relations. Barratt originally is from Heppner where he was a high school star in football, basketball, tennis and track, winning 10 varsity awards. Jim served in the navy in World War II, and graduated from OSU in 1950. He was editor of the Daily Barometer, official school publication at OSU, his senior year and a member of virtually every honor organization on campus. Jim first became assistant alumni director in 1950, moving to the athletic department at the close of the 1951 football season. He still keeps a hand in the coaching line, however, as golf coach.

BILL ROBERTSON, trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 16 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole," and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 12th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

COMM HENNESS, athletic ticket manager, is one of the newest members of the OSU athletic department. He joined the staff on February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. The last three years were spent as an accountant for that department. Henness was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. He has lived in Corvallis most of the time since. Comm is an extremely diligent worker and a top specialist in accounting or bookkeeping duties of any nature. As Jim Barratt's right-hand man, he also handles all ticket sales to free Barratt for more promotional administrative work.
