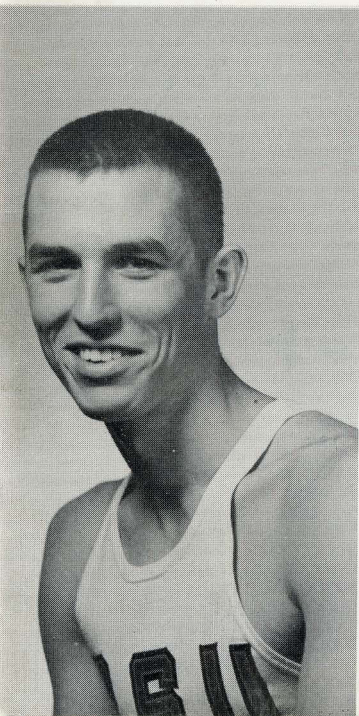

# GENERAL OUTLOOK

A new era begins in Oregon State basketball this winter.

Paul Valenti, a highly-capable and reasonable assistant to Slats Gill the past 17 years, has taken over as head coach and Gill has moved up to athletic director.

And no longer around is All-American Mel Counts, best "big man" ever in Pacific Northwest basketball.

So there are some real challenges ahead. But they are challenges that Valenti welcomes both with enthusiasm and an excellent background to the situation.

Counts is gone, and so is Frank Peters, a regular the last two years. Most of the others return, including standout guard Jim Jarvis, an authentic all-American candidate in his own right. Jarvis was second only to Counts in the scoring department last year and had no peer in accuracy both from the free throw line and in field goal percentages.

Oregon State will have a sound, representative team in 1965, but few can expect it to produce records comparable to the 1962-63-64 seasons. The Beavers lack the good "big man" that it sometimes takes to win championships. On the other hand, OSU will be a quick, sharpshooting outfit that might cause anybody trouble, any time.

The Beavers may be a bit short on backboard strength, for they may have to rely to a large extent on some promising sophomores, such as Ed Fredenberg and Larry French. Help here will have to come from veterans Jim Kraus, Terry Dreisewerd, Dave Fox and Scott Eaton.

Two fine transfers are sure to help the overall cause, and both looked good in early workouts. One is 6-4 Charlie White from Monterrey (Cal.) JC. He's a fine shooter, can jump like someone several inches taller and seems to have good quickness.

The other is Ray Carlile, a sure-shooting guard from American River (Cal.) JC. Carlile, like White, showed a lot of class ever since drills began in October and is a strong candidate for a starting job.

Rick Whelan, too, returns from the veteran list and picked up valuable experience at guard a year ago. He also is a good ball-handler.

So it's hard to tell just how good Oregon State will be in 1965. Obviously the Beavers can't be expected to be as good as they were the last several years (71 wins, 18 defeats). The new coach will do a good job — there is no question about that — but the schedule is tough and a lot of specialized talent is missing.

### FORWARDS

#### Scott Eaton

6-3 and 192. Junior letterman from Medford. Won regular's job last year as sophomore. Scored 127 points. Good speed and can drive. Should be much improved over a year ago.

#### Charlie White

6-4 and 189. Junior transfer from Monterrey (Cal.) JC. Originally from Detroit, Mich. Spent three years in army before enrolling for JC. Quick and can jump. Sure to improve with experience.

**Ed Fredenberg**

6-6 and 202. Sophomore from Coos Bay. Versatile, and can also play center or the outside. Extremely improved over freshman season. Smart ball player, adapts to situations. Due for lots of service.

**Dave Fox**

6-3 and 193. Junior letterman from Coeur D'Alene, Idaho. Strong defensively, and can jump. Good freedom in shooting. Used sparingly as a sophomore, after fine sophomore season.

**Larry French**

6-6 and 206. Sophomore from Pendleton. Works hard on boards and rugged. Lacks experience, but may help as he gains it. First Beaver basketeer from Round-Up city in many a year.

**Randy Rothman**

6-4 and 206. Senior letterman from San Bruno, Cal. Battles well for rebounds, and tough. Has played sparingly through varsity career. Good for spot situations that develop.

**CENTERS****Jim Kraus**

6-7 and 194. Senior letterman from Los Gatos. Scored 108 points last year and had .449 field goal shooting percentage. Lots of experience, following soph year in which he started many times. Also can play forward. Suffered achilles heel pulled muscle in early drills and got late start.

**Terry Dreisewerd**

6-5 and 218. Senior letterman from West Covina, Cal. Grabbed 67 rebounds and scored 74 points in junior year, shooting .556 in field goal percentage. Strong on boards and handles ball well off the post.

**Maury Stevens**

6-8 and 192. Senior letterman from St. Francis high of Eugene. Had little chance to play last couple of years because of All-American Mel Counts. Has done creditable job at times, however.

**GUARDS****Jim Jarvis**

6-0 and 172. Senior letterman from Roseburg. An authentic all-American candidate. Second only to Mel Counts in OSU scoring parade last year and first Beaver regular ever to post .500 field goal shooting percentage. Also connected on 71 of 88 free throws for .807 percentage. Great ball-handler and passer, and fine outside shooter. Should be good team leader. Scored in double figures 20 times in 29 games last year. Tallied total of 403 points.

**Ray Carlile**

5-11 and 159. Junior transfer from American River (Cal.) JC, home town is Sacramento. Extremely quick and good shooter from outside. Likely will make strong bid for starting berth in his first year at OSU.

**Rick Whelan**

6-0 and 184. Junior letterman from Milwaukie, Ore. Played in all 29 games as sophomore and scored 111 points. Like Jarvis, all-stater in high school. Good shooter from outside and corners.

**Jeff Cudworth**

6-2 and 172. Sophomore from Redwood City, Cal. One of stars on freshman squad last winter, and consistent scorer. Lacks experience, but sure to help in time.

# ATHLETIC STAFF

## SLATS GILL — Athletic Director

One of the most successful and respected athletic personalities in America is now starting his first year as Athletic Director at Oregon State University.

He's Slats Gill, who resigned as basketball coach at OSU after 36 seasons to become head of Oregon State's athletic program that has grown so steadily. Gill replaces well-known Spec Keene, who retired on July 1. Keene had been Beaver athletic boss since 1947.

It was natural that a man of Gill's stature would step into the shoes filled so ably by Keene. Slats was an all-American basketball player at OSU in 1924 and his roots to the school have been extremely close ever since. And in that time, he helped elevate Oregon State into the role as a national basketball power.

Under Gill's tutelage, OSU won northern division hoop crowns in 1933, 1935, 1940, 1942, 1947, 1949, 1954 and 1955, and tied for the top spot in 1948. The Beavers swept outright Pacific Coast conference titles in 1933, 1947, 1949 and 1955, and tied with California in 1958. Oregon State was 4th in the NCAA in both 1949 and 1963, and tied for 5th in 1947, 1955 and 1962.

Eight players won all-America recognition under Gill, including Buck Grayson, Ed Lewis, Wally Palmberg, John Mandic, Lew Beck, Red Rocha, Cliff Crandall, Swede Halbrook, Dave Gambee, Lee Harman, and Mel Counts. Beck was captain of the U.S. Olympic team in 1948 and Counts made the squad this year.

Gill's teams never lost a game in winning eight consecutive Far West Classic championships. They swept the Chancellor's trophy from Oregon 11 out of the last 12 years. Slats is past president of the National Basketball Coaches Association and a member of the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame. Twice he has coached in the East-West game, and one year he won the Hayward Award as the state's top sports figure. About the only goal that ever eluded him was an NCAA title, and he came close to that three times.

Slats and his wife Helen are parents of two children, Jane (Mrs. Jack Stephenson) and John, and they have three grand-children.

## JIM BARRATT — Assistant Athletic Director

Moving up from the post of athletic business manager to that of assistant athletic director is capable Jim Barratt, who has been on the athletic staff at OSU since 1951.

Jim originally is from Heppner, Oregon, where he was a four-sports star. Following navy duty in World War II, he enrolled at OSU and was extremely active in campus affairs, being editor of the Daily Barometer his senior year. He graduated in 1950 and became assistant alumni director. In 1951, he switched over to athletics.

Barratt handled ticket sales for many years, and his unbounding enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in his field. He proved to be a top-notch aide to Spec Keene through the years, just as he is sure to be to new Athletic Director Slats Gill.

When Comm Hennessey took over the ticket duties, Barratt was free to concentrate more on various other promotions connected with the athletic department, and with game scheduling.

He and wife Dorothea are the parents of two daughters, Brenda and Janet.

# THE COACHES

## **PAUL VALENTI — Head Basketball Coach**

Starting his first season as head basketball coach of the Oregon State Beavers is popular Paul Valenti, who served as assistant to Slat's Gill for 18 years and thus was partner in one of the most successful hoop stories in America.

Valenti isn't a native of this state by birth, but the state is quick to claim him by adoption. Paul came to Corvallis as a freshman basketball player out of Larkspur, Cal. in the fall of 1938, and but for naval duty in World War II has been on the campus ever since. He's an Oregon Stater all the way.

The new headman gained a winning touch his first year as a Beaver. Paul led the Rooks of 1939 to an undefeated season over a 16-game slate. He was top pointmaker on a club that included such future varsity greats as John Mandic, Sam Demet, Don Durdan and Jack Mulder. Valenti scored 142 points for top honors..

Paul stepped right into a varsity berth as a sophomore and remained there for the campaigns of 1940, 1941 and 1942. Northern Division championships were recorded in 1940 and 1942. Stanford edged the Beavers in a close three-game series in 1942 and later went on to win the NCAA title in a breeze.

Valenti was regarded as one of the best long-distance shooters ever to wear the orange and black. Dick Strite, veteran sports editor of the Eugene Register-Guard, placed Valenti on his all-time northern division first team, and through the years has been one of Paul's greatest boosters.

Following his graduation in 1942, Paul served in the Navy in World War II, returning to OSU in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His Rooks won 14 of 15 games and in 1951, his junior varsity crew swept 16 in a row without a loss. In 1955, Paul's club went undefeated with 15 straight. After many successful seasons as Rook coach, Valenti then became varsity assistant under Slat's Gill.

When Gill was unexpectedly taken ill in 1960, Valenti took over for his close friend and boss, and did an exceptional job in finishing out that season. Just like Slat's, he acquired a winning habit early in life.

Gill resigned as basketball coach last July 1 in order to become Athletic Director at OSU, and on the same day the head basketball coaching reins went to Valenti. Those who know Valenti are confident those reins are in good hands.

## **JIM ANDERSON — Asst. Basketball Coach**

New assistant varsity coach at OSU is young and capable Jim Anderson, who was a star guard for the Beavers in 1957-58-59. Anderson was one-half of the great guard combination that also included all-American Lee Harman, and together they helped lead OSU to a tie for the Pacific Coast conference championship in 1958. Another key member of that team was Dave Gambee, now with the Philadelphia pro team.

Anderson came to OSU as a transfer from Grays Harbor JC, after a great prep career at Hoquiam, Wash. Transfers don't often step right into a starting varsity job, but he did. He had great speed and outside shooting, and was one of the toughest defensive guards in the business. Jim went on to gain his master's degree following graduation and coached the OSU Rooks in 1960, 1961 and 1962. Among his proteges were Tery Baker, Mel Counts and Jim Jarvis. In those three years, he compiled a 45-8 record.

Jim coached two seasons at Newberg high school before returning to his alma mater.

## **JAY CARTY — Freshman Basketball Coach**

Jay Carty starts his second season as freshman coach. He, too, was a top performer at OSU in 1960-61-62, and he ranks 4th among the all-time varsity career pointmakers. He was captain of the 1962 squad that won the Pacific Northwest NCAA crown and was runner-up at the regionals. He is from China Lake, Cal.

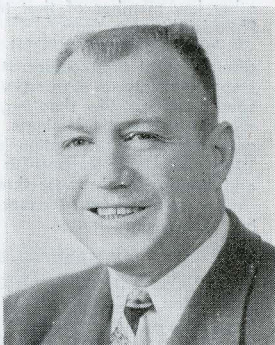

# Oregon State University

Oregon State University is the oldest state-supported institution of higher learning in Oregon. It is now in its 96th year with a record enrollment of approximately 10,533. This is 1000 more than a year ago and 2000 more than 1960. OSU is one of the nation's Land-Grant Colleges, started by the Morrill Act of 1862 to make educational opportunities available to all Americans who have the will and ability to learn.

OSU schools of study, in order of student enrollment, include Sciences, Engineering, Education, Business and Technology, Humanities and Social Sciences, Agriculture, Home Economics, Pharmacy and Forestry. Eighty separate departments are included in the nine schools.

The number of students working for advanced degrees — masters and doctors degrees—has doubled in the past 10 years. Today, about 11 percent of the students at Oregon State are in the Graduate School. National reports of two years ago showed that OSU ranked 7th in the West and 41st in the U. S. in the number of doctors degrees awarded during each of the past five years.

Eighty major buildings are located on the 400-acre main Oregon State University campus. Approximately 4,000 acres adjoining the main campus are owned and used by the University for research and instruction, and 24,000 acres more are utilized by Branch Experiment Stations for research. The School of Forestry owns and administers 14,300 acres of forest land within seven miles of the campus for instructional and research purposes.

Value of the Oregon State University plant is estimated at approximately \$60,000,000 — compared with about \$8,000,000 thirty years ago.

Oregon State University is nationally-known for many of its major specialized fields. OSU was one of the first colleges to establish work in Food Science; its departments of Fish and Game Management and Forest Engineering are unique and highly regarded; all of the schools and departments are fully accredited.

Students from every county in Oregon, 47 states and 63 other countries are attending Oregon State this year.

OSU is a part of a world-wide system of seismograph stations reporting and studying earthquakes.

Oregon State University has become one of the foremost ocean research centers in America. Its oceanography teaching program is the fourth largest in the nation. OSU has its own "navy" too. At least that is what the students call the university's \$300,000 ocean research vessel, "Acona." It operates out of Newport.

OSU has the only nuclear reactor in Oregon, a \$165,000 gift from the Atomic Energy Commission. It is used to train students in physics, chemistry, chemical engineering, mechanical engineering, and other technical fields for careers in nuclear science.

OSU has the only cyclotron in the State of Oregon. It was built by OSU scientists. A gigantic electronic computer is now under construction by the Departments of Mathematics and Electrical Engineering. It will be capable of solving the most complex research problems (aided, of course, by the highly trained scientists in the two departments).

Oregon State is one of the only 34 institutions in the country that offers ROTC work in all branches of the military services — army, navy, air force and marine corps. ROTC training is voluntary.

Oregon State University is the West's top center for science-mathematics teacher institutes sponsored by the National Science Foundation. It was one of the first 16 U. S. universities selected to give the teacher training.



OSU operates on a "year-round" school basis. During the summer, 12 weeks of classes are offered for those who want to attend, making possible for students to earn a full term's credit, and to graduate in three full years rather than the four school years if they choose.

Only 16 schools in the nation prepare students for jobs as professional meteorologists. OSU is one of them.

The Natural History collection in the Natural History building contains 34,000 specimens of terrestrial vertebrates and nearly 800 mounts of birds and mammals. The Herbarium in Cordley Hall contains about 152,000 named specimens of seed plants, ferns, mosses, algae and fungi. The Entomological Collection in Cordley Hall has about 275,000 specimens. More than 2,400 mineral specimens are included in the Geological Collection housed in Education Hall. The William Henry Price memorial collection in the Memorial Union contains 53 paintings.

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## Oregon Forest Facts

The State of Oregon ranks No. 1 in the United States in standing timber and production of lumber, plywood and particle board. It has over 21 per cent of the nation's commercial timber volume. It produces 22 per cent of the nation's lumber and 55 per cent of its plywood.

Almost half of Oregon's 62 million acres are in forests (30 million acres). Of these, 26 million acres are classified as commercial forest land. The federal government controls about 15 million acres of the commercial forest land, the state and counties about 1 million acres and 10 million acres are held by some 36,000 private owners. The gross state forest product is valued in excess of \$1.3 billion per year.

The forest industry employs about 75,000 full time workers each year. In 1961, they earned about \$400 million. In addition, several thousand non-manufacturing workers derive their income directly or indirectly from the forest resources. Overall, forests account for almost 60 per cent of Oregon's economy.

In Benton County, where Oregon State University is located, 35 per cent of the total number of industrial persons employed derive their living from wood products. In Benton County, nearly 30 per cent of all income comes from forestry.

Oregon, indeed, is the "land of the tall timber."
