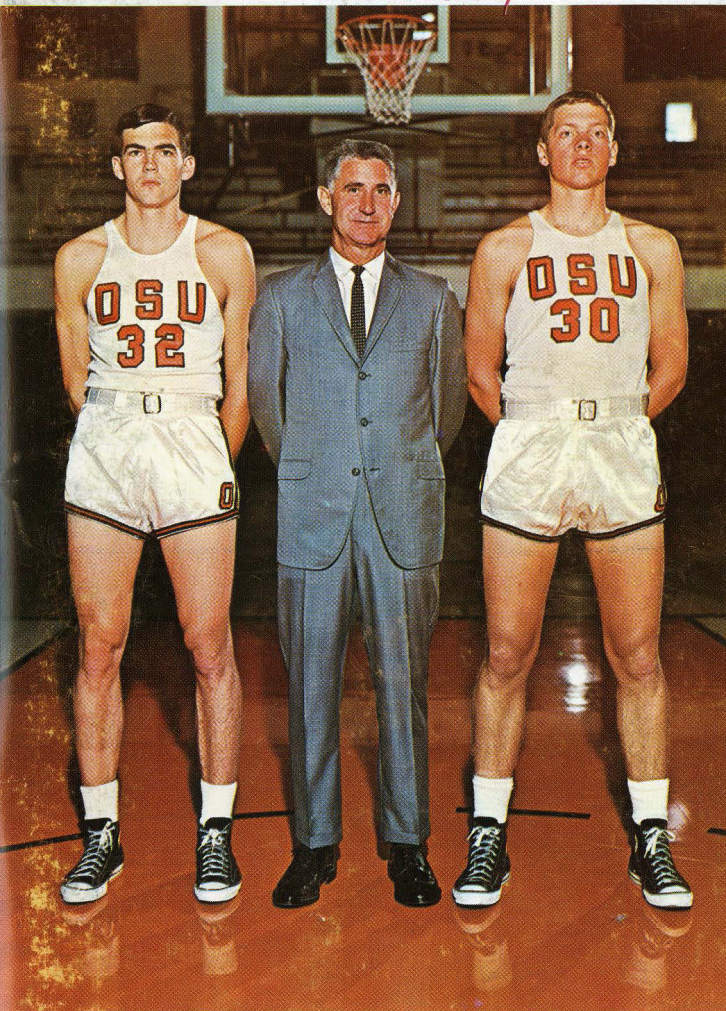

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FACTS ABOUT OSU

Oregon State is the oldest state-assisted institution of higher learning in Oregon. It began as Corvallis College, a Methodist school, in 1858 and came under state control in 1868 when designated Oregon's land-grant school by the state legislature.

The main 400-acre campus has more than 80 major buildings. Another 4000 acres adjoining the campus are used for research and instruction. In addition, the School of Forestry uses another 14,300 acres and the School of Agriculture uses 24,000 acres.

With 12,000 students enrolled, Oregon State University is in a period of record growth. There are 14 residence halls, 16 cooperatives, 16 sororities and 33 fraternities.

OSU was a pioneer in work in Food Science. Its School of Home Economics is the fourth oldest in the nation. Its Departments of Fisheries and Wildlife and Forest Engineering are highly regarded.

OSU is part of a world-wide system of seismograph stations reporting and studying earthquakes. The seismograph can be viewed in the Oceanography building.

OSU operates on a "year-round" basis. Summer classes make it possible for a student to graduate in three years.

Oregon State's oceanographic research program is one of the best in the nation and the oceanography teaching program ranks fourth nationally. The 800-ton research vessel "Yaquina" operates out of OSU's Marine Science Laboratory at Newport, Oregon.

OSU offers 125 fields of study in 11 schools and divisions. Masters degrees are offered in about 100 fields and doctor of philosophy degrees in 75 fields. The first advanced degree, a master of arts, was awarded in 1876.

The William Jasper Kerr Library, built in 1963, recently acquired its 500,000th volume. Reading and study rooms accommodate 1,600 students at one time.

OSU is the West's top center for science-mathematics teacher institutes sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

A \$2,500,000 U.S. Public Health Service Northwest Water Research Laboratory completed in 1966 serves the region in water supply and quality programs. The U.S. Forest Sciences Laboratory, with University research units, makes OSU one of the important forestry research centers in the U.S.

Horner Museum, in the Coliseum, has one of the best collections in the Northwest. It contains over 14,000 historical, scientific and artistic items. More than 65,000 visitors tour the Museum yearly.

Statistical Data on Corvallis, Oregon

Historically, Corvallis—first named Marysville—was settled in 1845, the name changed to Corvallis in 1853 and the city chartered by the legislature in 1857. Benton County was created by an act of the Territorial Legislature on December 23, 1847 and named for Sen. Thomas Benton of Missouri, who was long an advocate for the development of the Oregon Territory. The name Corvallis is said to have been a Latin compound intended to mean "heart of the valley".

LOCATION: Corvallis, the county seat, is located at the intersection of U.S. Highways 99-W and 20 on the Willamette River, 85 miles south of Portland and 55 east of the Pacific Ocean in one of the nation's most productive valleys.

POPULATION: Corvallis—30,000, Benton County—45,800

FORM OF GOVERNMENT: Mayor, city manager and nine councilmen.

TRADE AREA: All of Benton County and parts of Lincoln, Polk and Linn Counties, which includes approximately 150,000 people.

ALTITUDE: 224 feet above sea level.

CLIMATE: Average annual temperature—53.6; average annual rainfall—38.66; (less than Miami, Chicago, or New York); average annual snowfall—8.1"; growing season 183 days. Corvallis has mild, subcoastal type weather with moist, open winters and dry, warm summers. Electrical storms, hail, high winds and other phenomena of nature seldom experienced.

ASSESSED VALUATION (True Value): Corvallis—\$128,233,736.

Property assessments based on 25% of true value.

TAX RATE: 1965-1966: 92.9 mills; county - 6.1 mills; special school 71.8 mills; city - 15.0 mills.

CITY WATER SYSTEM: Daily average consumption - 4,651,000 gallons; capacity - 13,500,000 gallons. Construction program underway to double capacity in next 5 years. Softness - 2.3 grains of hardness, flouridated.

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS: Citizens' Bank of Corvallis; Equitable Savings and Loan Association; First Federal Savings & Loan Association; First National Bank of Oregon; U.S. National of Oregon.

NEWSPAPERS: Corvallis Gazette-Times (daily except Sunday) ABC - 10,058, Barometer (university, 4 times weekly).

RADIO STATIONS: KFLY (1240 kc); KLOO (1340 kc); KOAC (550 kc).

TV RECEPTION: KOAC-TV (7) ETV; Six channels received from Portland (2-6-8-12) Eugene (9-13). TV and FM Cable reception is available.

TRANSPORTATION: West Coast Airlines; Greyhound Bus Lines; Southern Pacific Railroad freight service; local bus and taxi service.

AIR SERVICE: Corvallis Municipal Airport is one of the better airport facilities outside Portland; 3 runways, lighted, paved 150 feet wide and all more than 5,000 feet long. Charter flights, sales and service, instruction and crop dusting service available. West Coast Airlines serves the city with two northbound and two southbound flights daily.

HOTELS-MOTELS: Three hotels, 7 motels with a total of 367 commercial living units.

LIBRARY: Corvallis Public Library, 7th and Monroe Streets; 51,491 volumes—annual circulation 269,825. A new wing has expanded the library two and a half times its original size. Library service is available to Corvallis and Benton County.

MEDICAL FACILITIES: Corvallis is fortunate to have one of the best medical-dental reputations in Oregon. Virtually every specialized medical skill is practiced among the 48 physicians and surgeons; there are 28 dentists, including three orthodontists; five optometrists; two orthopedic physicians and surgeons and several chiropractors. The Good Samaritan Hospital is a 131-bed installation with modern equipment and an exceptionally high rating. A new and modern wing has added a 50-bed extensive care facility.

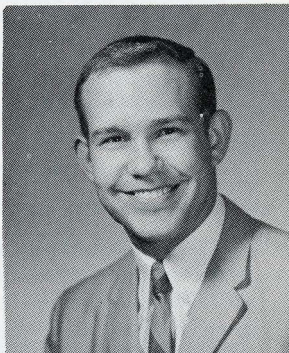

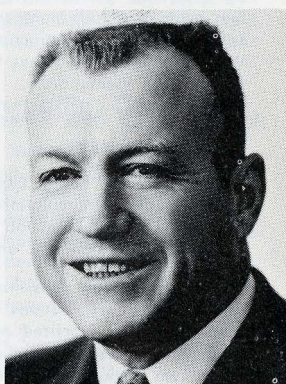

ATHLETIC STAFF

JIM BARRATT — Athletic Director

The hustling new athletic director at Oregon State is personable Jim Barratt, who over a 15-year period worked his way up through the ranks of athletic heirarchy at OSU.

Barratt, 41 years of age, was appointed to the post in late spring, following the death of Slats Gill.

Barratt is Oregon State personified, and his roots are deep. As an undergraduate at OSU, he was editor of the school daily paper, The Barometer, and extremely active in campus affairs. Following graduation in 1950, he became assistant alumni director, and a year later moved over to the athletic department as ticket manager.

Next came the role of athletic business manager, and when Gill became athletic director in 1964, Barratt moved up to the post of assistant athletic director. Then, immediately after Gill's death, Jim became acting director, prior to the final permanent appointment.

A native of Heppner, where he was raised and graduated from high school, Barratt later enlisted in the Navy for World War II and saw a lot of overseas duty. In 1946, when he entered OSU, he married his childhood sweetheart, the former Dorothea Wilson. They have two teen-age daughters.

Barratt handled all ticket sales for many years and his never-ending enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in the field. As chief aide to a pair of fine athletic directors, Spec Keene and Gill, Jim helped with virtually every affair of the department and learned his apprenticeship well.

The new athletic boss for the Beavers has been well-trained for his job and has the personality and business-sense to go with it. Oregon State can look forward to an era of sound athletic accomplishment under his guidance.

COMM HENNESS, athletic business manager, has been with the athletic department since February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. He was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. When he joined the athletic staff, he took on the duties of ticket manager and handled that role until recently, when he was moved up to athletic business manager and top accountant for the department. Henness is well-versed in all financial matters and proved as ticket manager that he has the personality and charm to get along well with people. Among other duties, he is athletic office manager and in charge of grounds and maintenance.

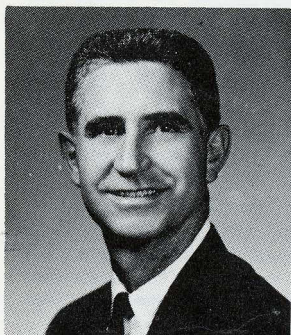
DENNY HEDGES, assistant to the director, is the newest addition to the staff and is sure to be a welcome one. Hedges, an OSU graduate, has a solid athletic background, having been a student aide to Barratt while in school. Later, he was manager of Multnomah Civic Stadium and assistant manager of Multnomah Athletic Club. Prior to that, he was assistant admissions control supervisor at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. His responsibilities there included handling of tickets, pay roll, scheduling employees and other management. At OSU, he will be in charge of promotions, game management and travel arrangements.

BILL ROBERTSON, Head Trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 20 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole," and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

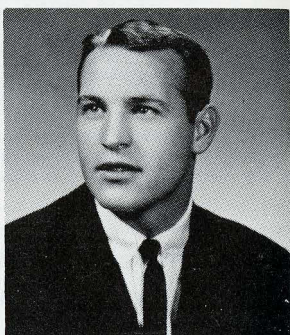
JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 16th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

BILL SEMON, football trainer, is now in his third season with the Beavers, following an experienced career. He graduated from Enumclaw, Washington high school, prior to three and one-half years in the Navy in World War II. Graduated from Central Washington State College and was trainer for all sports at Central for three years. Served as trainer for the Seattle Ramblers pro team eight years and one year was football trainer at Lewis & Clark College in Portland. Was on the staff at Stanford for a short period of time, before coming to OSU for the 1964 season. Semon is inventor of the patented Palmer Knee Brace used by professional, college and high school football players.

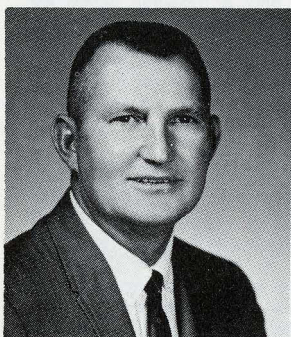

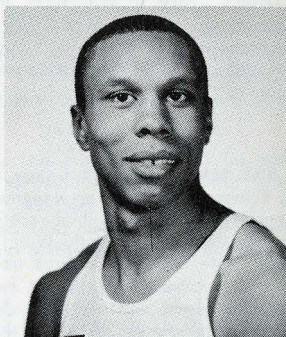

THE COACHES

PAUL VALENTI — Head Coach

"West Coast Coach Of The Year" was the title appropriately given Paul Valenti last year as he so unexpectedly led Oregon State to the Pacific-8 conference basketball championship.

Nobody gave OSU a chance to win the league crown a year ago, and based strictly on personnel, one could see why. The Beavers didn't have great size, and really not too much experience. They did have heart though, and they had a great coach.

When Valenti took over the head coaching reins three years ago after serving 18 years as top aide to the late Slats Gill, even some of his closest friends worried a little about Paul. They wondered how tough it might be to replace a man like Slats, and to try and duplicate such a great record.

Paul proved he had the stuff in his first year. Starting strictly from scratch, he posted a respectable 16-10 overall season and 4th place Pacific-8 finish. Then came the big one last year, a 21-7 record and 12-2 in the Pacific-8 race. It was such a fantastic coaching job that many writers felt Valenti should have been named "National Coach Of The Year." Several opposing coaches

described his 1966 club as the "best disciplined" team they had ever seen. Discipline, desire and defense seem to be three big Valenti trademarks.

Valenti isn't a native of this state through birth, but the state is quick to claim him by adoption. He came to Corvallis as a freshman basketball player out of Larkspur, Cal., in the fall of 1938, and but for navy service in World War II, has been on the campus ever since.

The Beaver coach gained a winning touch his first year at OSU. He led the Rooks to an undefeated season in 1939 over a 16-game slate, and was top scorer on a club that included such future varsity greats as John Mandic, Sam Dement, Don Durdan and Jack Mulder. Valenti scored 142 points for top honors.

Paul stepped right into a varsity berth as a sophomore and remained there for the campaigns of 1940, 1941 and 1942. Northern division championships were recorded in 1940 and 1942. Stanford edged the Beavers in a close three-game series in 1942 and later went on to win the NCAA title in a breeze.

Valenti was regarded as one of the best long-distance shooters ever to wear the orange and black. Following his graduation in 1942, Paul served in the Navy in World War II, returning to OSU in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His Rooks won 14 out of 15 games and in 1951, his junior varsity crew swept 16 in a row without a loss. In 1955, Paul's club went undefeated with 15 straight.

When Gill resigned as basketball coach to become athletic director at OSU on July 1, 1964, Valenti was named headman for the Beavers and promptly began to administer the same sound basketball program begun years previously.

JIM ANDERSON — Assistant Coach

Young and capable Jimmy Anderson, who was a star guard at Oregon State in 1957-58-59, is Paul Valenti's right-hand man and now is in his third season as top aide. Anderson was one-half of that great guard combination that also included all-American Lee Harman and together they helped lead OSU to a tie for the Pacific Coast conference championship in 1958. Another key member of that team was Dave Gambee, still playing pro ball with the Philadelphia 76ers.

Anderson came to OSU as a transfer from Grays Harbor JC, after a great prep career at Hoquiam, Wash. Jim went on to gain his master's degree following graduation and coached the OSU Rooks in 1960, 1961 and 1962. Among his proteges were Terry Baker, Mel Counts and Jim Jarvis. In those years he compiled a 45-8 record. Jim coached two years at Newberg (Ore.) high before returning to his alma mater as assistant coach.

BILL HARPER — Freshman Coach

Another ex-OSU basketball and baseball star, Bill Harper, is in his second season as freshman coach. He was a star basketball guard in 1949-50-51, and as a sophomore played on a Pacific Coast conference championship squad that placed 4th in the NCAA finals. Bill coached both basketball and baseball for many years at Roseburg high school, and also had a great record as coach of the Roseburg American Legion junior baseball team. He returned to OSU three years ago as a member of the physical education staff.

CHARLIE WHITE — Asst. Freshman Coach

Assisting Harper this winter is the floor leader and captain of OSU's Pacific-8 conference championship team of 1966, Charlie White.

GENERAL OUTLOOK

It was a big, big year for Oregon State in basketball last season, highlighted by a Pacific-8 conference championship and west coast "Coach Of The Year" title for Paul Valenti.

But you'll find that Paul and his hard-working Beavers won't be resting on their laurels as another campaign approaches, and they well realize what a challenge lies ahead.

Oregon State lost three starters off that surprising 1966 well-oiled machine, with only Loy Petersen and Ed Fredenburg returning. It's a good start, however, to have a pair like that around, for there aren't many better ones anywhere, and additional back-up strength should come from lettermen Harry Gunner, Karl Weide, Bob Franz, Gary Wilken and Larry French.

Best of the sophomores appears to be Vince Fritz, a 6-3 sharpshooter from Central Catholic, and he conceivably could crack the starting lineup the first time around.

Dean Duistemars is a 6-3 forward-guard transfer from Cerritos junior college in Bellflower, Cal., and comes to OSU with a fine reputation behind him. Other candidates up from the freshman squad include Jeff Kuter, Vancouver, Wash.; Mike Markham, Riddle; Dave Moore, Dallas, Texas; Bill More, Portland; Brian Zacharias, Sacramento; and Elliott Levin, Los Angeles.

The Beavers will have fair size except for the real "big man." And you can bet their defense will be stingy, as it has always been under Valenti. As for spirit, well, there's sure to be no question about that, for no one is more spirited than Valenti himself and it carries right over to his ball players.

The schedule is rough—perhaps the toughest in OSU history—but that doesn't worry the Beavers. They'll just prepare for one at a time and see what happens.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

LOY PETERSEN

6-5 and 205, junior letterman from Anaheim, Cal. Topped OSU squad in scoring as sophomore with 359 points, after transferring from Pepperdine. Tremendous possibilities and could become one of OSU all-time greats if he continues to improve. Has wide variety of shots, great physical ability and tremendous strength.

ED FREDENBURG

6-6 and 210, senior letterman from Coos Bay, Ore. Regular past two years and squad captain this winter. Scored 260 points last year, but even more valuable as team man and defensive player. Deadly push-shooter if given room and tremendous attitude. Best scholarship record of any present OSU athlete in any sport.

VINCE FRITZ

6-4 and 192, sophomore from Central Catholic of Portland. An ex-All-Stater who topped Rooks in points last year. Scored 48 points in one game for all-time Rook record. Extremely quick, good shooter and could become fine defensive player and ball handler.

LARRY FRENCH

6-6 and 200, senior letterman from Pendleton. Has lettered twice previously but never a regular. Showed marked improvement in drills this fall and may be top candidate for forward berth. Rugged on boards, and can shoot on occasion.

OSU Tops Nation In Defense In 1966

Oregon State's Pacific-8 conference champions not only dominated defensive proceedings in their own league, but topped the entire nation. They limited the opposition to 54.5 average points per game, one of the lowest figures in the history of the NCAA.

After finishing among the nation's top 20 on defense 11 times in 12 years, the Beavers earned the No. 1 defensive crown by the stingiest margin of victory in 16 years. Closest to OSU was Tennessee, at 57.7.

OSU Record at Far West Classic Termed "Phenomenal"

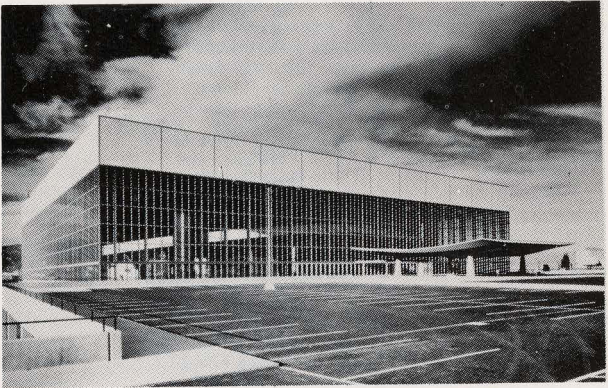
One of the most fantastic records anywhere in basketball has been Oregon State's 27-game winning streak at the annual Far West Classic.

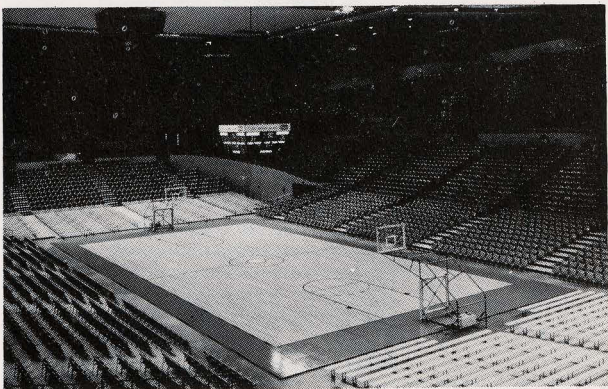
