FACTS ABOUT OSU

A YEAR TO REMEMBER

The 1968-69 school year will be one to remember. It marks the 100th "Birthday" observance of the university.

It was on Oct. 27, 1868, that OSU as officially designated as the state college of Oregon.

OSU started its 100 year celebration Oct. 27, 1968, with a Charter Day Convocation. A special Centennial Homecoming was held in November and many other events will be held in the next several months.

Big-name speakers, exhibits and demonstrations, and programs sponsored by the various schools have been and will be a part of the Centennial observance. The "Class of the Century" will be graduated in June 1969 with special fanfare.

It all adds up to the most exciting year ever for Oregon State University, the oldest state-supported institution of higher learning in Oregon. In its 100 years, it has become one of the nation's leading educational and research centers.

OSU enrolls more than 14,500 students annually, conducts research programs, and administers the Cooperative Extension Service in all counties of the state. The main campus is in Corvallis, a city of 30,000 people near the center of the Willamette Valley, eighty miles from Portland and fifty miles from the Pacific Ocean. The University also has a Marine Science Center at Newport, a Seafoods Laboratory at Astoria, an ocean-going research vessel docked at Yaquina Bay, thousands of acres of forest lands, and branch agricultural experiment stations at several locations in the state.

A Beautiful Campus

Oregon State has a handsome, well designed campus of about 500 acres—with several thousand acres of farm and forest lands nearby. The wide lawns, shaded walks, and landscaped gardens of the main campus make this a pleasant place in which to live and study. The new Library is one of the finest in western United States. Other new buildings being constructed, and older ones being remodeled, fit into a newly approved long-range plan for campus development. Classroom buildings are so arranged as to be within easy walking distance of one another and of most of the living groups.

Statistical Data on Corvallis, Oregon

Historically, Corvallis—first named Marysville—was settled in 1845, the name changed to Corvallis in 1853 and the city chartered by the legislature in 1857. Benton County was created by an act of the Territorial Legislature on December 23, 1847 and named for Sen. Thomas Benton of Missouri, who was long an advocate for the development of the Oregon Territory. The name Corvallis is said to have been a Latin compound intended to mean "heart of the valley".

LOCATION: Corvallis, the county seat of Benton County, is located at the intersection of U.S. Highways 99-W and 20 on the Willamette River, 80 miles south of Portland and 50 east of the Pacific Ocean in one of the nation's most productive valleys.



JIM RAPPATT __ Athletic Director

Athletic director at Oregon State is personable Jim Barratt, who, over a 15-year period, worked his way up through the ranks of athletic heirarchy at OSU.

Barratt, 43 years of age, was appointed to the post in 1966, following the death of Slats Gill.

Barratt is Oregon State personified, and his roots are deep. As an undergraduate at OSU, he was editor of the school daily paper, The Barometer, and extremely active in campus affairs. Following graduation in 1950, he became assistant alumni director, and a year later moved over to the athletic department as ticket manager.

Next came the role of athletic business manager, and when Gill became athletic director in 1964, Barratt moved up to the post of assistant athletic director. Then, immediately after Gill's death, Jim became acting director, prior to the final permanent appointment.

A native of Heppner, where he was raised and graduated from high school, Barratt later enlisted in the Navy for World War II and saw a lot of overseas duty. In 1946, when he entered OSU, he married his childhood sweetheart, the former Dorotha Wilson. They have two teen-age daughters.

Barratt handled all ticket sales for many years and his neverending enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in the field. As chief aide to a pair of fine athletic directors, Spec Keene and Gill, Jim helped with virtually every affair of the department and learned his apprenticeship well.

The athletic boss for the Beavers has been well-trained for his job and has the personality and business-sense to go with it. Oregon State can look forward to an era of sound athletic accomplishment under his guidance.

COMM HENNESS, athletic business manager, has been with the athletic department since February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. He was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. When he joined the athletic staff, he took on the duties of ticket manager and handled that role until recently, when he was moved up to athletic business manager and top accountant for the department. Henness is well-versed in all financial matters and proved as ticket manager that he has the personality and charm to get along well with people. Among other duties, he is athletic office manager and in charge of grounds and maintenance.

DENNY HEDGES, assistant to the director, is a fine addition to the staff and is a welcome one. Hedges, an OSU graduate, has a solid athletic background, having been a student aide to Barratt while in school. Later, he was manager of Multnomah Civic Stadium and assistant manager of Multnomah Athletic Club. Prior to that, he was assistant admissions control supervisor at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. His responsibilities there included handling of tickets, pay roll, scheduling employees and other management. At OSU, he is in charge of promotions, game management and trayel arrangements.


BILL ROBERTSON, head trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 22 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole", and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

EDDIE FERRELL, assistant trainer, just joined the staff a year ago, replacing Bill Semon who resigned. He is a graduate of the University of Arkansas, where he was an assistant four years prior to coming to OSU. Ferrell also was a trainer's aide with the Minnesota Vikings of the NFL. He grew up in Fayetteville and graduated from high school there. While on the staff at Arkansas, he traveled with the varsity and freshman football squads, the varsity track squad and the freshman basketball team.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 18th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

ROD COMMONS, assistant sports publicity director, is a 1966 graduate of OSU and for the past year was editor of the Newberg (Ore.) Graphic. He also specializes in photography. Originally from Nashville, Ore., Commons graduated from Siletz high school. He just joined the OSU staff on May 1, and will assist Eggers in all phases of the Athletic News Bureau operation, in addition to taking all department pictures. Commons will be in charge of a new photography dark room located right next to the office of he and Eggers in Gill Coliseum.

THE COACHES . . .

PAUL VALENTI - Head Coach

Now beginning his fifth season as OSU headman in basketball is personable and hard-working Paul Valenti, who in his previous Pacific-8 conference competition already has won a championship, finished second once and fourth once.

Three years ago, nobody gave OSU even a remote chance to win the PAC-8 crown, but Valenti and his Beavers surprised all and reached the finals of the Western Regional NCAA tournament. While named "West Coast Coach of The Year", he should have been the national coach of the year.

Valenti had a big job to fill when he took over the head coaching reins at OSU in 1965, for he was replacing the late Slats Gill, on his retirement from coaching. Paul had loyally served as Slats' top assistant for 18 years and was well prepared for his new venture.

With mediocre material, Valenti guided his first team to a respectable 16-10 overall campaign and fourth place PAC-8 finish (7-7). Then a year later, he went for the big bundle and brought

home the conference crown. The Beavers were 21-7 overall and

12-2 in league play.

In 1966, OSU wound up at 14-14 overall, but tied for second in the conference race with an 8-6 mark. Last year the Beavers were 12-13 overall and a disappointing 5-9 in PAC-8 play, finishing in a tie for fifth place. In four seasons Valenti has a lotty 63-44 won and lost record. Few coaches anywhere ever got such a fine start, and nobody ever deserved it more.

Valenti isn't a native of this state through birth, but the state is quick to claim him by adoption. He came to Corvallis as a freshman basketball player out of Larkspur, Cal., in the fall of 1938, and but for navy service in World War II, has been on the

campus ever since.

The Beaver coach gained a winning touch his first year at OSU. He led the Rooks to an undefeated season in 1939 over a 16-game slate, and was top scorer on a club that included such future varsity greats as John Mandic, Sam Dement, Don Durdan and Jack Mulder. Valenti scored 142 points for top honors.

Paul Stepped right into a varsity berth as a sophomore and remained there for the campaigns of 1940, 1941 and 1942. Northern division championships were recorded in 1940 and 1942. Stanford edged the Beavers in a close three-game series in 1942 and

later went on to win the NCAA title in a breeze.

Valenti was regarded as one of the best long-distance shooters ever to wear the orange and black. Following his graduation in 1942, Paul served in the Navy in World War II, returning to OSU in the fall of 1946 to become freshman coach. His Rooks won 14 out of 15 games and in 1951, his junior varsity crew swept 16 in a row without a loss. In 1955, Paul's club went undefeated with 15 straight.

When Gill resigned as basketball coach to become athletic director at OSU on July 1, 1964, Valenti was named headman for the Beavers and promptly began to administer the same sound

basketball program begun years previously.

JIM ANDERSON - Assistant Coach

Young and capable Jimmy Anderson, who was a star guard at Oregon State in 1957-58-59, is Paul Valenti's right-hand man and now is in his fifth season as top aide. Anderson was one-half of that great guard combination that also included all-American Lee Harman and together they helped lead OSU to a tie for the Pacific Coast conference championship in 1958. Another key member of that team was Dave Gambee, still playing pro ball with the San Diego Rockets.

Anderson came to OSU as a transfer from Grays Harbor JC, after a great prep career at Hoquiam, Wash. Jim went on to gain his master's degree following graduation and coached the OSU Rooks in 1960, 1961 and 1962. Among his proteges were Terry Baker, Mel Counts and Jim Jarvis. In those years he compiled a 45-8 record. Jim coached two years at Newberg (Ore.) high be-

iore returning to his alma mater as assistant coach.

BILL HARPER — Freshman Coach

Another ex-OSU basketball and baseball star, Bill Harper, is in his fourth season as freshman coach. He was a star basketball guard in 1949-50-51, and as a sophomore played on a Pacific Coast conference championship squad that placed 4th in the NCAA finals. Bill coached both basketball and baseball for many years at Roseburg high school, and also had a great record as coach of the Roseburg American Legion junior baseball team. He returned to OSU three years ago as a member of the physical education staff.

GENERAL OUTLOOK

Oregon State's 1968-69 basketball team will be without the services of its top pointmaker, Vince Fritz, and that, in itself, will present a change in the type attack the Beavers will use.

Because of a back injury that requires inactivity from basketball, Fritz will forego the present campaign and hope to be back next season for his senior year. That's great for the future, of

course, but presents an immediate problem now.

Coach Paul Valenti, now in his fifth year as OSU headman, feels the Beavers will still have a good, representative basketball team. Forming the front line as we went to press was the trio of 7-0 Vic Bartolome, 6-9 Gary Freeman and 6-5 Tim Perkins. The leading guard candidates were 5-11 Gary Carroll, 5-9 Mike Markham and 6-1 Brady Stewart.


Bartolome had a fine sophomore season a year ago, improving steadily with each game. There's no reason to believe he won't be a lot better now. An excellent shooter with a soft touch for the basket, Vic needs to work most on his defense and backboard play. Valenti believes he has the talent and desire to make the arrade

Freeman, too, can shoot with the best of 'em, and consistency on the boards could make him one of the top forwards in the Pacific-8 conference . Perkins, high scorer on the freshman team a year ago, replaces Loy Petersen and has shown the potential of being able to bring the ball down the floor as well as score.


Carroll, Markham and Stewart all have good speed and ball handling ability. Stewart is a husky transfer from Contra Costa JC in the San Francisco Bay area. Among others looking good in practice were Bruce Bertrand, 6-5; Jeff Kuter, 6-6; Bill More, 6-3; Dave Moore, 6-1; Gary Arbelbide, 6-7; Larry Webber, 6-6; and Tom Phipps, 6-0. Bertrand, Kuter, More and Moore all are lettermen, Arbelbide is a transfer from Utah. Sophomores are Webber and Phipps.

All in all, it should be an interesting season for the Beavers.


Thumbnail Sketches




Jeff Kuter, 6-6 senior forward-center. Saw limited action last year, but improved near end of season and is expected to give strength up front. Good backboard man.








Bill More, 6-3 senior forward. Limited action last year but has looked good in early practice. Lacks speed but overcomes with eagerness and desire.




Mike Markham, 5-9 senior guard. Small but very aggressive, tough on defense. Shooting has improved. Was a regular much of last season and could be first string this year.






Brady Stewart, 6-1 junior guard. Transfer from Contra Costa Junior College. Will give added strength to backcourt. Good shooter and ball handler.




Tom Phipps, 6-0 sophomore guard. Started slow as a freshman but showed good improvement as season progressed.




Dave Moore, 6-1 senior guard. Saw limited action last year but has shown marked improvement in early drills, adding strength to backcourt.




Larry Webber, 6-6 sophomore forward. Regular as a Rook last year. Strong, with lots of desire. Lacks experience, but could see action as a sophomore.




Jeff Haller, 6-6 sophomore forward. Played lots of freshman ball but may be redshirted this year.

GILL COLISEUM "A Basketball Showplace"

Gill Coliseum, home of Oregon State basketball, first opened its doors in the winter of 1949-50, and for many years has been one of the premier hoop plants in America.

Named after the late Slats Gill, who was head basketball coach at OSU for 36 years and later the school's athletic director, the building is perfect for basketball. It is not a fieldhouse. There are no posts.

Gill Coliseum was the site of the Western Regional NCAA tournament in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1964 and 1967, and it also was where the now-famous Far West Classic began. Later, OSU officials moved the holiday tournament to Portland's more populous area.

The Gill Coliseum building project actually got underway in June of 1948 when excavation for the huge building was started. Two unusually severe winters put the building considerably behind schedule, but the Coliseum was completed enough for the first regularly scheduled game in Decembebr of 1949.

Gill Coliseum covers one and one-third acres. Peak of the building is 83 feet above the floor, equivalent of a four-story building. Framework of the structure consists of 12 fabricated steel arches. In all, there are 1000 tons of structural steel in the building, and 85 per cent of the seats are on the sides.

Some 14,000 cubic yards of concrete, which amounts to 70,000 sacks of cement, went into the structure. In addition, more than 100,000 pumic blocks have been used inside for partitions and finishing work. The main playing floor, consisting of the finest grade maple, is large enough to put three full-size basketball courts if they run withwise.

Attendance capacity is somewhere between 10,500 and 11,000. Actually, the largest throng ever to see a game at Gill Coliseum was in 1962 when 11,709 viewed the OSU-Oregon game. Because of fire marshal regulations, that figure can never be reached again.




