ATHLETIC STAFF

JIM BARRATT — Athletic Director

Athletic Director at Oregon State University since 1966 is versatile Jim Barratt, who worked his way "through the chairs" into the top athletic post of the school.

Barratt, 47 was appointed in 1966, following the death of Slats Gill.

Barratt is Oregon State personified, and his roots are deep. As an undergraduate at OSU, he was editor of the school daily paper The Barometer, and extremely active in campus affairs. Following graduation in 1950, he became assistant alumni director, and a year later moved over to the athletic department as ticket manager.

Next came the role of athletic business manager and when Gill became athletic director in 1964, Barratt moved up to the post of assistant athletic director. Then, immediately after Gill's death, Jim became acting director prior to the final permanent appointment.

A native of Heppner where he was raised and graduated from high school, Barratt later enlisted in the Navy for World War II and saw a lot of overseas duty. In 1946, when he entered OSU, he married his childhood sweetheart, the former Dorothea Wilson. They have two daughters and one granddaughter.

Barratt handled all ticket sales for many years and his never-ending enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in the field. As chief aide to a pair of fine athletic directors, Spec Keene and Gill, Jim helped with virtually every affair of the department and learned his apprenticeship well.

The athletic boss for the Beavers has been well-trained for his job and has the personality and business-sense to go with it. Oregon State can look forward to an era of sound athletic accomplishment under his guidance. He is extremely active in the PAC-8 Conference and in the NCAA, being a member of the NCAA TV committee.

COMM HENNESS — Business Manager

Comm has been with the athletic department since February 1 1961 after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. He was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. When he joined the athletic staff, he took on the duties of ticket manager and handled that role for some time. Later he was moved up to athletic business manager and top accountant for the department. Hennes is well-versed in all financial matters and proved himself as ticket manager that he has the personality and charm to get along well with people. Among other duties, he is athletic office manager and in charge of grounds and maintenance.

DENNY HEDGES — Assistant Athletic Director

Denny is a fine addition to the staff and is a welcome one. Hedges, an OSU graduate, has a solid athletic background, having been a student aide to Barratt while in school. Later, he was manager of Multnomah Civic Stadium and assistant manager of Multnomah Athletic Club. Prior to that he was assistant admissions supervisor at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. His responsibilities there included handling of tickets, pay roll, scheduling employees and other management. At OSU, he is in charge of promotions, game management and travel arrangements.

PAUL VALENTI — Assistant to the Director

Paul is now on the administrative end of the athletic department and is the head tennis coach. Paul came to OSU in the fall of 1938 as a student, and except for World War II service in the Navy, has been a Beaver ever since. He played basketball under the late Slats Gill from 1940-42., and then returned as his assistant in 1946, following discharge. When Gill retired from coaching in 1965, Valenti took over as head coach at OSU and promptly led the Beavers to a Pacific-8 championship. Valenti voluntarily resigned at the close of the 1970 campaign, and coached the tennis team to a fine 18-4 record last year.

BILL ROBERTSON — Head Trainer

Bill has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 26 years, and long one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole" and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU. He recently was voted into the Helms Hall of Fame for athletic trainers.

LOREN SOLUM — Assistant Trainer

Loren is a 1965 graduate of the University of Idaho. He also obtained his master's degree at OSU two years ago. Originally from Wallace, Idaho, Solum played football at Idaho and later was assistant trainer for the Vandals. He coached three sports at Wallace high following graduating, in addition to teaching biology and physical education. He replaces Eddie Ferrell, who resigned in order to return to his home state of Arkansas.

JOHN EGGERS — Sports Publicity Director

John recently observed his 22nd anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

ROD COMMONS — Ass't Sports Publicity Director

Rod is a 1966 graduate of OSU and was editor of the Newberg (Ore.) Graphic. He also specializes in photography. Originally from Nashville, Ore., Commons graduated from Siletz high school. He joined the OSU staff on May 1 1968, and assists Eggers in all phases of the Athletic News Bureau operation, in addition to taking to all department pictures. Commons is in charge of a new photography dark room located right next to the office of he and Eggers in Gill Coliseum.

GILL COLISEUM

“A Basketball Showplace”

Gill Coliseum, home of Oregon State basketball, first opened its doors in the winter of 1949-50, and for many years has been one of the premier hoop plants in America.

Named after the late Slat Gill, who was head basketball coach at OSU for 36 years and later the school's athletic director, the building is perfect for basketball. It is not a fieldhouse. There are no posts.

Gill Coliseum was the site of the Western Regional NCAA tournament in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957 1964 and 1967 and it also was where the now-famous Far West Classic began. Later, OSU officials moved the holiday tournament to Portland's more populous area.

The Gill Coliseum building project actually got underway in June of 1948 when excavation for the huge building was started. Two unusually severe winters put the building considerably behind schedule, but the Coliseum was completed enough for the first regularly scheduled game in December of 1949.

Gill Coliseum covers one and one-third acres. Peak of the building is 83 feet above the floor, equivalent of a four-story building. Framework of the structure consists of 12 fabricated steel arches. In all, there are 1000 tons of structural steel in the building, and 85 percent of the seats are on the sides.

Some 14,000 cubic yards of concrete, which amounts to 70,000 sacks of cement, went into the structure. In addition, more than 100,000 pumic blocks have been used inside for partitions and finishing work. Last summer a brand new floor of the best wood variety was installed.

Attendance capacity is somewhere between 10,500 and 11,000. Actually, the largest throng ever to see a game at Gill Coliseum was in 1962 when 11,709 viewed the OSU-Oregon game. Because of fire marshall regulations, that figure can never be reached again.

Ralph H. Miller Oregon State's head basketball coach, is now in his third season as Beaver headman and already has begun to demonstrate the class that has established him as one of the best in the business.

Last season, for example, OSU finished the season in fine fashion and wound up with a respectable 18-10 overall record and 3rd place Pacific-8 conference finish. The Beavers won eight of their last 10 games.

Large crowds have turned out to watch Miller's "pressure" style of basketball that features a fast break, pressing defense and rugged rebounding. When he was head coach at Iowa, he coached one Big 10 championship team and had another co-champion. And prior to that, his clubs at Wichita State were always strong.

His all-time college coaching record now stands at 345-208, and he has experienced only two losing seasons in 21 years. One was in 1952, when he first started at Wichita State and the other was in 1971 at OSU. While at Wichita, three of his teams (1954, 1962 and 1963) earned bids to the National Invitation tournament. His 1964 Wichita club won an NCAA berth.

A native of Chanute, Kansas, Miller was an all-conference forward on a University of Kansas basketball team that won the Big Eight championship. He also was a star triple-threat back for the Jayhawk football team, graduating from KU in 1942.

After military service in World War II, he began his illustrious coaching career. At Wichita high school, he won a state championship in 1951, was runner-up in 1949 and took third in 1950. While there, his teams won 63 and lost 17. That's when Wichita State stepped in and signed him as head coach. He was at Wichita for 13 years prior to going to Iowa.

A dedicated disciple of pressure basketball, the astute Beaver headman employs a harrassing defense and a fast-break offense. He firmly believes that the two basic goals of any basketball team are to (1) win and (2) entertain. His fine teams from Wichita and Iowa were always among the most interesting to watch in the country and sell-out crowds were commonplace. Ralph's 1970 Iowa team was the epitome of entertainment: it averaged 103 points en route to 14 straight victories.

Miller was born on Mar. 9, 1919 at Chanute, KS, and on Sept. 5, 1942, married Jean Milam of Topeka. Their children include Susan, 27; Ralph Jr., 25; Paul, 16; and Shannon, 13.

JIM ANDERSON — Assistant Coach

One of Oregon State's finest guards of the late 1950's, Jimmy Anderson, is now in his 9th season as assistant coach at OSU, but it is his third under Ralph Miller. Anderson was top aide to Paul Valenti for six campaigns, and, at Miller's invitation, elected to remain on the Beaver staff as an assistant coach.

Anderson played his college basketball at OSU in 1957-58-59 and among his teammates were All-Americans Dave Gambie and Lee Harman. The 1958 OSU team tied for the PCC Title.

Jimmy came to OSU from Grays Harbor JC, after a great prep career at Hoquiam, Wash. He went on to obtain his master's degree following graduation and coached the OSU Rooks in 1960-61-62. Among those he coached were Terry Baker, Mel Counts and Jim Jarvis. In those years, his team compiled a 45-8 record. Jim coached two years at Newberg (Ore.) high before returning to his alma mater as a full-time assistant.

DAVE LEACH — Assistant Coach

Dave Leach, 29-year old ex-Wichita State star and more recently head coach at Burlington, Iowa junior college, moved west with his old college coach Ralph Miller as an assistant coach at OSU.

Leach, while at Wichita State, was elected student body president and was captain of the basketball team. He graduated from Wichita State in 1965 and got a master's degree two years later.

A native of McPherson, Kansas, he was an all-state prep player in 1961. Leach was head coach at Wichita high school Southeast from 1967 through 1969 and had a 56-8 won and lost record. In 1969 his club was runner-up for the Class AA state championship. At Burlington, his team had an 18-12 record.

Among other honors, he was recipient of a \$1000 post-graduate NCAA scholarship.

BILLY NICKLEBERRY — Grad. Ass't. Coach

Billy Nickleberry, OSU's graduate assistant coach, was one of the most popular players ever to perform in basketball at Oregon State. Only 5-8, he played three seasons of varsity ball under two coaches, Paul Valenti and Ralph Miller.

Nickleberry set a Portland Interscholastic scoring record at Jefferson high and was an all-state performer. He also was an excellent long-jumper in track. After his sophomore year at OSU, he was in the Army for two years, later returning to OSU.

AWARDS AND HONORS

Chancellor's Trophy

In 1953, Dr. Charles D. Byrne, then-chancellor at higher education in the state of Oregon and an avowed sports fan, originated the Chancellor's Trophy to be awarded annually to winner of the basketball series between Oregon State University and the University of Oregon.

It was retired at the end of 11 years, with the team ahead in years won retaining permanent possession. In the years where there were four games instead of three, and a tie resulted, the team that had won the season before retained the trophy for its showcase.

Chancellor Roy Lieuallen started a new trophy eight years ago.

Fritz, Ericksen, Counts Best Freshmen

Most of the freshman scoring marks at Oregon State belong to Vince Fritz, Mel Counts, Steve Ericksen and Swede Halbrook.

Fritz, for example, holds the single game record of 48 points against the Linfield jayvees. He hit 19 of 32 shots from the field and added 10 of 12 free throws. He had 35 points in the first half and played only 32 minutes in the game.

Counts owns the freshman season record of 534 points in 20 games for a 26.7 average, with his high being 41 against Clark College. Ericksen, now an OSU junior scored 519 points. Halbrook once scored 42 points against Moore's U-Drive AAU team of Vancouver.

1972 OSU Team Sets Point Record

Oregon State's 1971-72 basketball team finished the season as the highest scoring outfit in the school's history.

The Beavers averaged 77.3 points per contest over the 28 game span. This eclipses the one-year old mark of 76.3 set by another Ralph Miller squad, the 1970-71 Beavers.

The Beavers won 10 straight championships. They were 2-0 in 1956, 1957 and 1958, before the tournament was increased to eight teams instead of four. From 1959 through 1965 they were 3-0 each year en route to the title. OSU returned as champion in 1970.

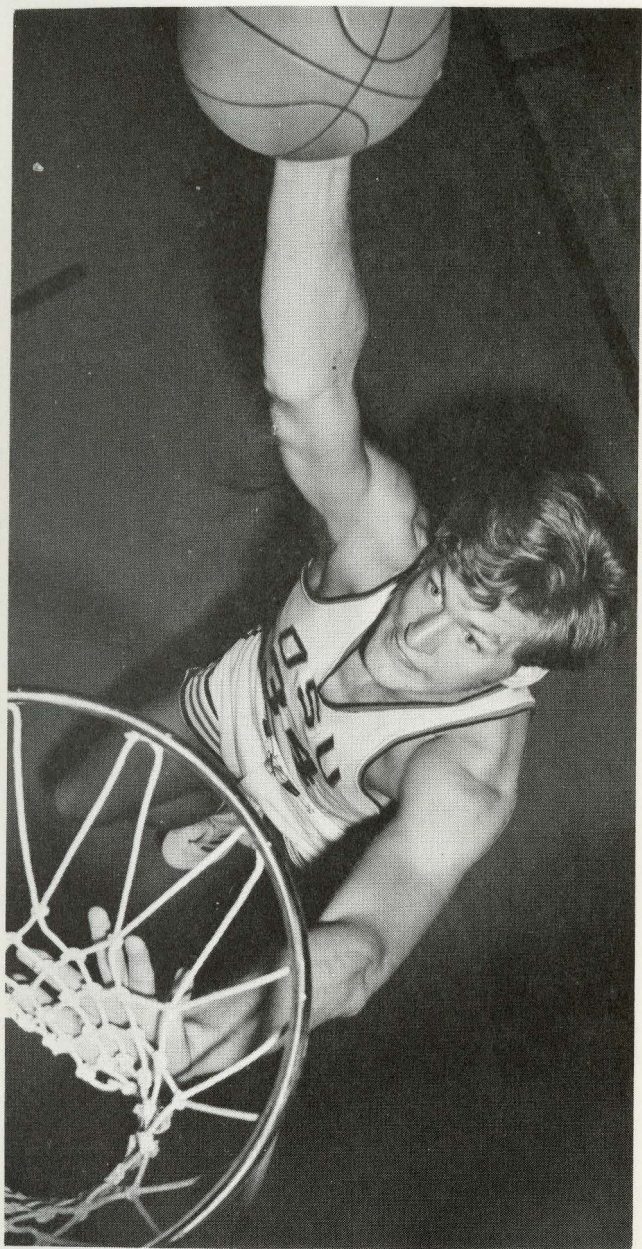
