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After finishing in the top-5 in three out of the five fall tournaments, the Oregon State men's golf team looks to continue their pursuit of excellence going into the 2009 spring campaign.

The Beavers protected their home course for the second straight year and claimed the 2008 Giustina Memorial Classic trophy.

Junior **Diego Velasquez** claimed his first collegiate individual win at the Giustina and it was his birdie on his final hole that propelled Oregon State into a playoff with Nevada where the Beavers ran away with the victory.

Senior co-captain **Alex Williams** (Vancouver, Wash./Skyview HS) is back for his final season at Oregon State and looks to continue what has been a stellar career. He has competed in all five events during the fall season and is third on the team through the fall season with a scoring average of 74.20 per round.

"Alex is a true leader on and off the golf course," head coach **Brian Watts** said. "That is why he's been the captain the past couple of years. He's always played within himself. He's probably day in and day out one of the most consistent golfers we have. He's not the longest by far, but definitely the most consistent. He worked extremely hard on the right things which have enabled him to get the most out of his game. He's a great young man to coach and is very coachable. He always shows up with a great attitude and expects the most out of himself every day."

Junior co-captain **Tyler Simpson** (Portland, Ore./Clackamas HS) played in three out of the five fall tournaments. It was his and co-captain Williams' birdies on a playoff hole at the Giustina that cemented victory for the team.

"Tyler has to be one of the hardest workers I've seen in the years I've been working here," Watts said. "He's a great teammate on and off the courses and is always making the right decisions. Once Tyler gets in the lineup and sees that he belongs out there and knows that he belongs out there and that he can compete with anyone in the country then he's going to be a great player and I think will be a consistent player in our

lineup year in and year out."

Senior **Mike Barry** (Medford, Ore./North Medford HS/University of San Diego) transferred to Oregon State last year from the University of San Diego and will redshirted this year.

"We had an opportunity to recruit Mike right out of high school and unfortunately due to the situation he ended up going down to southern California," Watts said. "It's great to have the opportunity to work with Mike for two years. He'll have to red shirt this year. We'll have him for the 2009-10 season. We're excited to get him in the lineup. He's going to be a great asset to the team and having the experience he has at the college level already, there's a maturity level that he brings to the team."

Junior **Paul Peterson** (Salem, Ore./Sprague HS) leads the team in scoring average coming with a mark of 72.33 strokes per round and competed in all five tournament evens during the fall. He recorded the lowest round out of any Beaver this year with a 67 in the final round at the San Francisco Intercollegiate.

"Paul is a fierce competitor," Watts said. "That's the one attribute that he brings to the program. Any time that he tees it up in a tournament you know that he's going to give you 100 percent. As he gets more tournament experience you're going to see his numbers get lower and lower just because of the experience that he's getting playing at the collegiate level. He was an outstanding junior golfer and now that he has two years of golf under his belt at the collegiate level, I see his game progressing every year. He is always focused during competition. His chin is always up on the golf course and he's always competing. He's a great teammate to have because you know he's out there giving all that he has."

Junior **Diego Velasquez** (Bogota, Colombia/ Gimnasio Los Caobos) is in his third year at Oregon State and has emerged as a spark for the team on the course. He claimed his first ever collegiate victory at the Giustina Memorial Classic this fall where he shot a final round 4-under par 68 to claim victory.

"Diego definitely brings a spice to the program," Watts said. "He brings a lot of laughter and a lot of energy to the program. He's very committed to playing great golf. He's a great competitor; he's a great ball striker and has always been one of the leaders in the country in fairways hit. He's worked hard on his putting and once he gets confidence in his putting his scores are going to be lower, which will give him an opportunity to be an All-American at some point in his career here at Oregon State."

Sophomore **Brandon Taylor** (Corvallis, Ore./Crescent Valley HS) saw limited action during the 2007-08 season and did not see any playing time during the fall.

"Brandon didn't get a whole lot of playing experience last year as a freshman but he worked extremely hard this summer on his course management skills and just slowing things down a bit," Watts said. "Trying to get his misses in control and understanding that the golf swing can't be perfect, that's a big step for him. I look for Brandon to be in the lineup a lot this year and helping the team out."

Redshirt freshman **Alex Moore** (Richland, Wash./Hanford HS) jumped straight into the starting lineup coming off his redshirt year. He is fourth on the team in scoring average so far this year and looks to move up the rankings moving into the spring season.

"Alex had the whole year last year to work on his game and work on the whole transition from high school to college," Watts said. "Now that he's had that year and a whole summer where he competed well he's coming into the season, I feel, that he's going to be a solid player for us. He's able to shoot low scores; he's proven that at the high school level as well as last year."

We're hoping to get a little more consistency out of him. He's a great ball striker, he hits the ball a long way, we have to tone it down at times. He has a tendency to be a little bit too aggressive some times."

Freshman **Morten Madsen** (Silkeborg, Denmark/Silkeborg Gymnasium) joins the team mid season after finally being cleared for competition by the NCAA. He is currently ranked 152nd in the world as an amateur and is looking to make an immediate impact on the team.

"Anytime you have a 20 year old freshman join your lineup it's a good thing," Watts said. "Morten has had a lot of success at the international level and I'm sure it will be an easy transition for him into collegiate golf. He is a mature and powerful player. He is a great teammate and works extremely hard on all aspects of his game. We look forward to working with him and watching his game continue to grow."

Freshman **Jonnie Motomochi** (Delta, BC, Canada/Sands Secondary) has already made an impact on the team competing in three out of the five tournaments during the fall season. He has the third lowest round on the team during the fall with a 69.

"Jonnie comes to us from Vancouver B.C. and is probably one of the best junior golfers in Canada from the age of 12 on," Watts said. "Ball striking wise, he's by far the best ball striker that I've seen as a true freshman. He has another part of his game that he's just phenomenal with and that's his bunker play. The one thing he's been lacking is just his confidence with his putting. Once we work with him on his putting and get his confidence up he has an opportunity to do some great things with his time here at Oregon State. Jonnie has the greatest smile and a great attitude and is a pleasure to be around both on and off the field."

BRIAN WATTS

Brian Watts is in his eighth season as the head men's golf coach at Oregon State University, and his 11th season overall with the program. Over the past two years, Watts has led the Beavers to the NCAA West Regional where in 2007 they finished tied for ninth and lost out on a chance to go to the National Championships in a playoff.

In the fall of 2007, Oregon State changed the name of its home event from the Northwest Collegiate Classic to the Giustina Memorial and since the change Oregon State has taken home the first place trophy.

Under the leadership of Coach Watts the men of Oregon State golf have not only achieved on the course but in the classroom. Since Watts was named head coach at least one Beaver has been named to the Pac-10 All-Academic team. Over the seven year stretch there have been nine named to the first team All-Academic, eight named to the second team, and nine honorable mentions.

Watts led the Beavers to the NCAA West Regional three out of the seven years as head coach. The last two appearances have been in the past two seasons, 2006-07 and 2007-08. In the 2006-07 season they finished tied for ninth at the regional and missed out on a chance to compete at nationals due to a playoff.

Watts led the Beavers to a third-place finish in the highly competitive Pacific-10 Conference in 2002 and the team qualified for the 2003 NCAA West Regional. His players have earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors 24 times in the last five seasons. During the 2004-05 season, his squad won two tournaments and posted the best three-round team score in school history, and the 2005-06 squad successfully defended its Northwest Collegiate Classic title. In the 2007-08 campaign his team won two tournaments, one at the inaugural Giustina Memorial Classic which was followed up by the second at the Husky Invitational.

Prior to taking the reins at OSU, Watts was an assistant coach for both the men's and women's teams from 1995-97 and 1999-2001. The highlight came at the end of the 2000-01 campaign, when the men's squad used a run late in the year to advance to the NCAA Championships, where they finished in a tie for 12th.

During Watts' tenure as assistant coach, the men's and women's programs enjoyed great results. The women advanced to the NCAA West Regional all three years of his second stint. The men's squad did the same and won three tournaments over that span and placed in the top three in four other events.

Prior to his first tour as assistant coach at OSU, Watts spent four years on various professional tours, including the Golden State Tour, the Space Coast Tour and the Canadian PGA Tour.

Watts brings a wealth of experience to the program from his years on professional tours, but equally important is his familiarity with Northwest recruiting and the use of OSU's state-of-the-art facilities.

"Having the opportunity to coach Division I student-athletes is great," he said. "Our goal is to help develop their talent and skills in the classroom and on the golf course. If they choose to play professional golf, they will be prepared for the next level. If they decide another path, then Oregon State University has prepared them for success off the course."

Hard work, believing in yourself and a burning desire to succeed are the three elements that lie in the core of Watts' coaching philosophy and approach to life.

"If you look at anyone who has success, they have all three of these characteristics," Watts said. "These three things will make you successful not only on the golf course, but in life."

After attending Oregon State for one year, Watts earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Oregon State College (now Western Oregon University) in 1989.

Watts and his wife Carrie have three daughters: Madeline (13), Olivia (11) and Alexandra (7).

"Tim graduated two years ago and was a volunteer coach for us," Watts said. "He knows my philosophy as a head coach and has been very supportive of that throughout his career at Oregon State. Being familiar with our program and being a graduate of Oregon State as well as his experience, his maturity, his talent on the golf course and just an overall great person has been a great addition to the team."

Sundseth played at McNary High School in Keizer, Ore., where he earned three letters and was named to the All-Valley League first team his junior year. He graduated from Redmond High School in Redmond, Ore. in 2001. At Redmond he earned an additional letter and was named All-State first team after helping lead the team to the state championship that year.

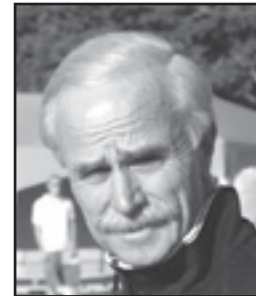
Central Oregon Community College in Bend, Ore. is where Sundseth began his collegiate golfing career, starting two years (2001-02 and 2002-03 seasons). From COCC, Sundseth enrolled at Oregon State in Sept. 2004 and joined the Oregon State golf team where he played for two seasons (2004-05 and 2005-06).

Sundseth is a 2007 graduate of Oregon State where he earned a bachelor of science degree in exercise and sport science with an option in physical education.

"This is really his first coaching opportunity," Watts said. "He's someone who I look at five years down the road and see that he could be a great coach. He's one of those special guys that come along in a coach's career as a student-athlete and as a player. He was a great leader on and off the golf course. All of the players in the program have always respected him off and on the golf course. He leads by example."

Dr. Jerry Lynch is in his third year aiding the Oregon State men's golf team as the squad's sport psychologist. He also works with the OSU men's soccer team. Dr. Lynch is an internationally recognized expert and has written eight books about athletes and performance. Based in Santa Cruz, Calif., he runs TaoSports, a consulting group dedicated to helping athletes reach their peak performance.

He has worked with athletes at numerous other universities, including Maryland, Duke, Missouri, Arkansas, Colorado, Iowa and Stanford, as well as in the professional ranks (NBA, NFL and PGA). In the past 17 years, he has helped 38 teams reach a final four, and 23 have won national championships.

He has taught classes at Penn State, Colorado, Stanford and Santa Clara.

Dr. Lynch is a national-class distance runner and cyclist, and has been a coach at the AAU, high school and junior high levels.

Giustina Memorial

In the September of 2007 the Oregon State men and women's golf teams started a new tradition with the inaugural Giustina Memorial Classic held at Trysting Tree Golf Club.

The classic is named after Natale B. "Nat" Giustina who played a fundamental role in the creation of Trysting Tree Golf Club. The Oregon State alumnus was a prominent figure in the OSU community, serving on the OSU Alumni Association board and the Board of Intercollegiate Athletics. The format for the classic is a one of a kind creation by Oregon State men's head coach Brian Watts and women's head coach Risë Lakowske in Nat's honor.

"I think the other schools and players are excited about the new format," Lakowske said. "It's a unique way of playing a collegiate tournament. It should provide a lot of interest locally."

The classic plays host to both a men and women's tournament simultaneously. It matches a mixed pair from each competing school with another school's mixed pair. The men and women's tournaments are scored separately but a combined school champion is awarded an overall winning trophy.

"To my knowledge this will be the first time that a format like this has ever been played in collegiate golf. We wanted to do something unique that combined the men's and women's programs together. It should be a lot of fun for the players as well as the spectators," Watts said.

For the men's golf team the creation of the Giustina Memorial sees the end to the Northwest Collegiate Classic which was the home tournament for the Beavers for the last 17 years. Over that 17 year history the tournament was played 18 times in which Oregon State claimed six victories. Since the change in 2007 the men's team has claimed one victory as a team and they combined with the women's team to win two university championships.

2007-08 Tournament Results

The Oregon State men's golf team started the 2007-08 season with two consecutive wins. The first came at the inaugural Giustina Memorial Classic hosted by the Beavers. The unique format, which consisted of a men's and women's tournament to be played at the same time and then a combined winner, worked well for the Beavers who won the men's event by eight strokes.

Seniors Vincent Johnson and James Allenby finished second and third respectively leading the Beavers to a 21-under par finish. Oregon State followed up their first place performance with another won two weeks later at the Husky Invitational. Allenby recorded his first individual collegiate win after shooting a two round 6-under par 138. The tournament was called after two rounds due to inclement weather.

The Beavers started off the spring season with a sixth place tie at the UH Hilo Invitational. They followed that up with a first place finish at their junior varsity tournament the NW Winter Shootout.

The Oregon Duck Invitational supplied the Beavers with their last opportunity as a team to contribute to the NW Dodge Dealers Civil War series and they capitalized. They finished in second place behind the stellar play of Tyler Simpson and his best tournament of the year. Simpson shot a 1-over 217 to finish in fourth place.

The Beavers then took third place at the Wyoming Cowboy Classic behind the Allenby who finished tied for fifth with a 5-under 205 performances. Paul Peterson, playing as an individual, had his best performance of the year finishing tied for second at 203.

Oregon State took eighth at both the U.S. Intercollegiate and Pac-10 Championships leading up to the NCAA Western Regional. They finished outside of the top-10 at the regional and missed a chance to compete for the national championship.

Being so close to nationals but missing out is nothing but inspiration for the Beavers as they head into the 2008-09 season.

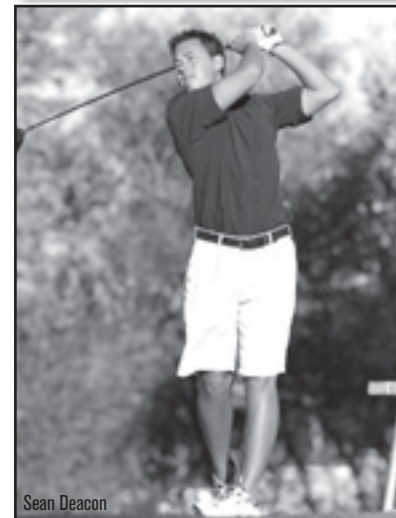


Year-By-Year Results

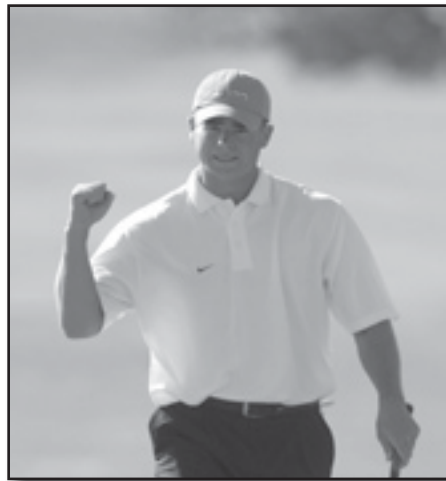

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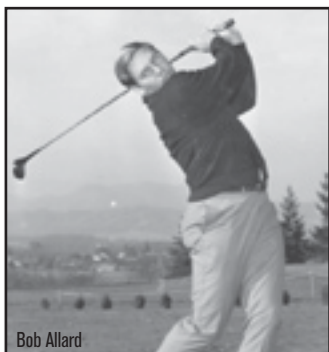
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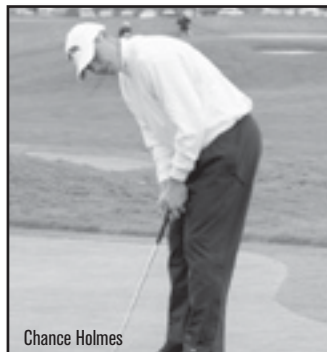

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Since its grand opening in the summer of 1988, the spacious Trysting Tree Golf Club has quickly developed into one of the Northwest's finest public golf courses and one of the nation's premier collegiate facilities.

The Oregon State men's and women's golf programs are fortunate to have one of the best practice facilities on the West Coast. Playing consistently on a championship course, OSU golfers have the tools to improve their games every day.

Both coaches stress the importance of playing quality golf from within 100 yards, which is why the players have their own short-game practice area. The teams constantly work at hitting target nets placed at different yardages. The players are able to take advantage of technology along with the private facilities at Trysting Tree.

In addition, the OSU teams have access to their own covered end of the driving range, with over 300 yards of fairway.

Each fall, Trysting Tree plays host to the men's Northwest Collegiate Classic and the women's Salbasgeon Suites Invitational, each of which attracts top-flight schools from around the country.

Trysting Tree capped off the 2001 season with perhaps the biggest two-week stretch of golf in its history by hosting the men's and women's NCAA West Regional Championships, becoming the first course in NCAA history to host both in the same season. Trysting Tree also hosted the men's and women's Pac-10 Championships in 2002 and 2003, respectively.

In recent years, teams such as USC, UCLA, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Pacific, UNLV, California, Stanford, Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, Pepperdine, San Francisco, Kansas, Wake Forest, and San Diego State, among others, have participated in the Northwest Collegiate Classic or the Salbasgeon Suites Invitational.

Despite being only 17 years old, the idea of building an 18-hole golf course just off Highway 34 and along the Willamette River dates back to 1951.

Oregon State University purchased 175 acres in 1951 solely for the purpose of building a public golf course, but funding difficulties and debates with local farmers and Linn County commissioners prevented its beginning stages. Finally, Trysting Tree was granted approval and has been the home of the Beavers ever since.

"This is a great golf course," BYU head coach Bruce Brockbank said. "This facility is as good as I've seen — it's very comparable to Arizona State's facility (Karsten Golf Course). Oregon State has done a great job with this facility and the city of Corvallis ought to be very proud of what it has here."

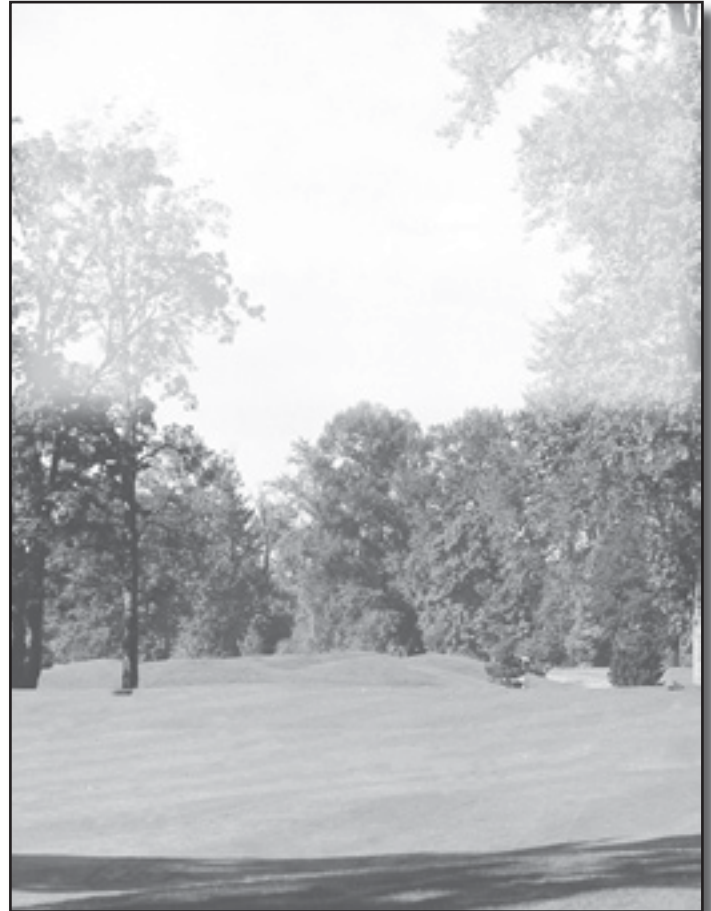
Brockbank's comments are echoed by other coaches and players who marvel at Trysting Tree's appearance.

"It's fun to bring a team to a course where the people in charge show a lot of pride," former Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin said. "I thought the fairways at Stanford were in great shape until I saw these. This course is unbelievable; it's a tribute to Corvallis."

Thanks to a very particular grounds crew, under the supervision of greens superintendent Pat Dorn, the course is in superb shape year-round, unusual for a public golf course. The course is in such good shape that in 1998 Golfweek Magazine named it the third-best college golf course on the West Coast.

Just five minutes away from the OSU campus, Trysting Tree is a versatile golf course varying in length from 5,500-7,000 yards and carries a par of 72. Trysting Tree offers a variety of shots, and golfers can experience all types of weather conditions. Because of its superb drainage, Trysting Tree is an excellent winter course.

It's no secret in golf circles that Trysting Tree Golf Club is part of the reason why the men's and women's golf programs at Oregon State University are nationally recognized.



The Oregon State men's golf team received a generous donation from Don and Grace Archer in honor of their son who graduated from Oregon State in 1969. The gift was made on his behalf because of his enjoyment for the game of golf as well as his appreciation for everything the game of golf stands for.

"One of the things we struggle with day in and day out is trying to find ways to improve our facilities," men's golf head coach Brian Watts said. "With this very generous donation, our student-athletes will now have the opportunity to have an easily accessible putting surface to practice on every day. For the Archers to step up to the plate and help out the golf programs speaks volumes about their dedication to Oregon State. It's a very important gift for the Oregon State golf programs."



In the August 2005 issue of Golf Digest, Corvallis was ranked as the #1 area to play golf in the state of Oregon, and #28 nationally. The magazine's formula factored in access to golf (45 percent), weather (25 percent), value of golf (15 percent), and quality of golf (15 percent).

Other Oregon metro areas and their national rankings include Salem (#147), Eugene-Springfield (#193), Medford-Ashland (#298) and Portland-Vancouver (#302).



Other Courses

Oregon State golfers play on seven courses in the immediate vicinity on a regular basis. Trysting Tree, Corvallis Country Club, Diamond Woods, Mallard Creek, Spring Hill, Illahee Hills and Creekside each offer unique challenges and rewarding surroundings.

"We have the opportunity to utilize each of these golf courses," OSU Coach Brian Watts said. "So, depending on what tournament we're going to, we have different courses to prepare ourselves."

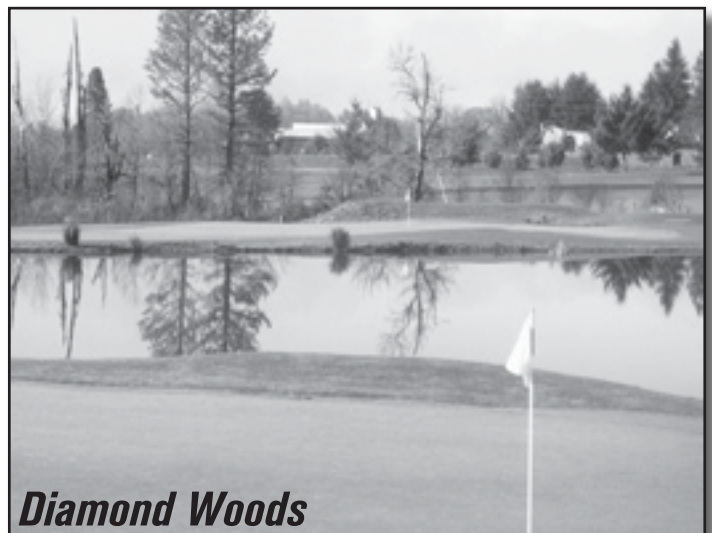

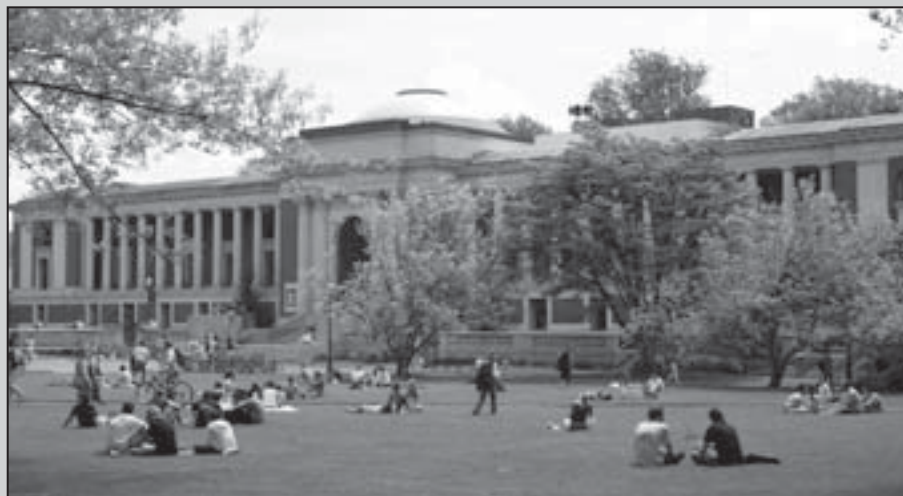

CORVALLIS, OREGON

CORVALLIS is in the heart of the beautiful Willamette Valley. Home to Oregon State University, the city of just over 50,000 is the quintessential college town.

The wide streets are sheltered by ancient trees and lined by red brick or white masonry buildings. The city's location along the Willamette River makes Corvallis an attractive place to live, work and study. This central location makes Corvallis an ideal place to stay while exploring nearby areas such as the Coast Range, Pacific Ocean beaches and wildlife areas.

You can fish, boat or water ski less than a block from downtown Corvallis. You can walk the Pacific Ocean coastline an hour away, or you can snow ski in the Cascade Mountains just over two hours to the east.

You can experience a delightful lunch overlooking the river or dine before a warm fire. Corvallis offers a wide variety of restaurants, ranging from traditional American fare to Japanese, English, Thai, Irish, Vietnamese and many others.

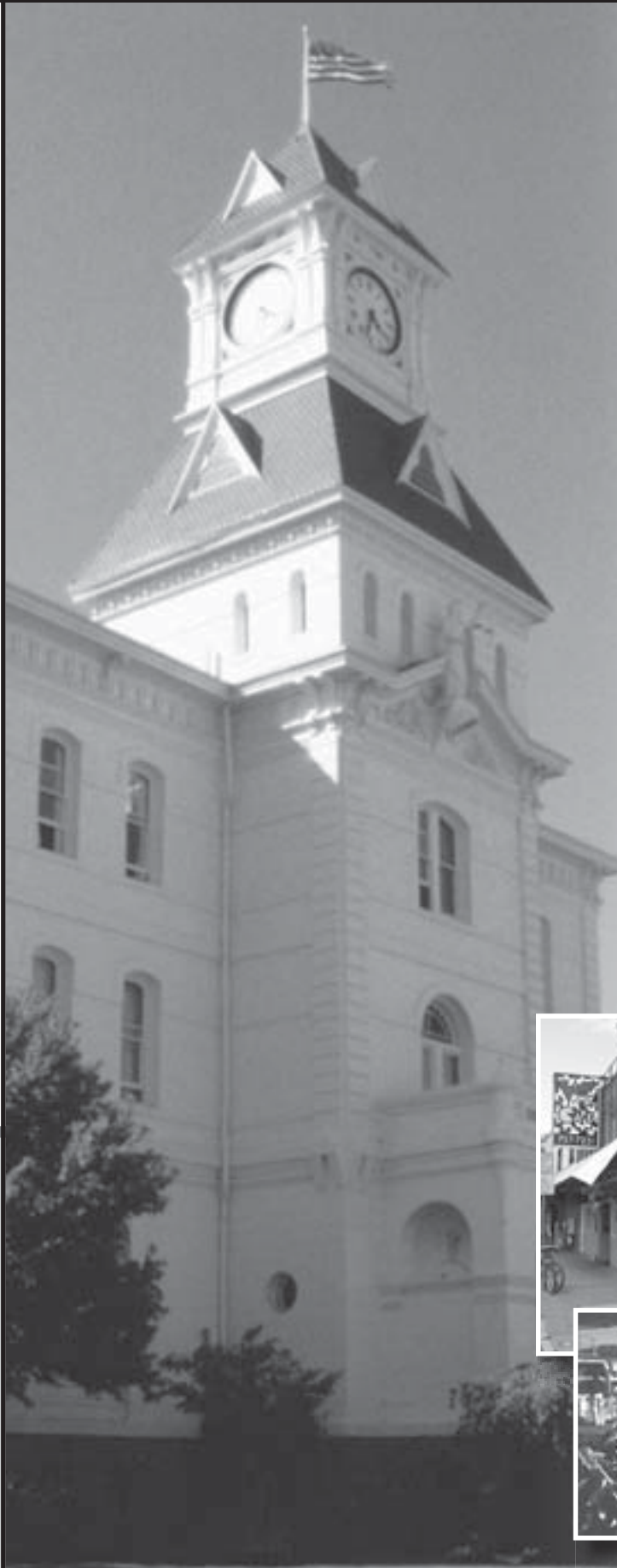
Da Vinci Days is a three-day festival held each summer to celebrate arts, science and technology. Activities include kinetic sculpture races, interactive exhibits and great musical performers.

Running and biking are favorite pastimes in Corvallis. Bike lanes are included on most streets and there are routes along the Willamette River and Marys River. Trails for hiking or biking are available in Avery Park, which is located close to the OSU campus, or in OSU's Peavy Arboretum, a few miles north.

Corvallis is also close to the Siuslaw National Forest, a 630,000-acre forest that includes the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area. Areas for hiking, picnicking, fishing, hunting and many more activities are available.

Not only is Corvallis the home of OSU, it is also a business community that includes several industrial parks with an emphasis on research and computer technology.

The leading quality of Corvallis is its people: athletic-minded, friendly, and proud of their city and its top resource — Oregon State University.



OREGON - THE BEAVER STATE

Oregon is known as the Beaver State, and the Beavers of the Oregon State University community enjoy living in one of the most beautiful and geographically diverse areas in the world.

The legendary liveability of the Pacific Northwest has long been known to natives, but the secret is getting out. From Pacific Ocean beaches to the Cascade Mountains, from the Columbia River Gorge to the Eastern Oregon desert, from downtown Portland to the resorts of Central Oregon, the Beaver State offers environments for every taste.

Of Oregon's approximately 3 million residents, just over half live in the Portland metropolitan area. Only a 90-minute drive from Corvallis, Portland offers entertainment choices for every interest – major concerts, touring stage shows, the Oregon Symphony, museums, art exhibits and many others. The Portland Trail Blazers of the National Basketball Association head a professional sports lineup that also includes baseball, soccer, hockey and lacrosse.

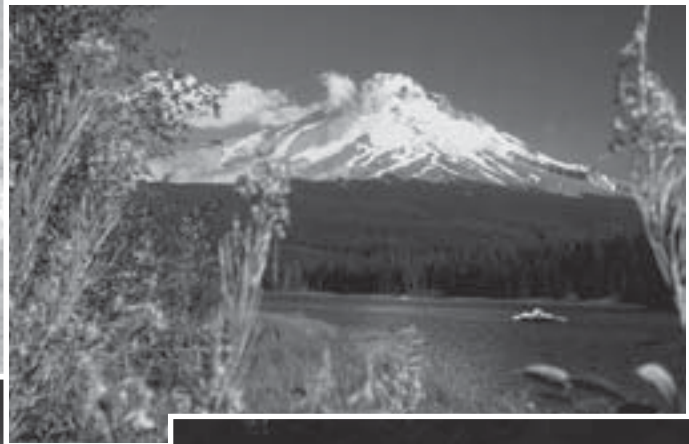
Outside the metropolitan area, Oregon's natural assets and recreational opportunities take center stage.

The Oregon Coast offers the chance for beachcombing, wading, surfing and seaside walks. The Oregon Coast Aquarium, located only an hour's drive from Corvallis, opens a window into the life of the Pacific Ocean.

Just 90 minutes east of the OSU campus, the Cascade Mountains contain a number of alternatives for both downhill and cross country skiing. The Cascades and the Coast Range, located between Corvallis and the Pacific Ocean, are ideal for picnicking, hiking, camping, fishing and hunting.

Oregon's hundreds of lakes and rivers give water sports enthusiasts ample room for boating, waterskiing, swimming and jetskiing. The Columbia River Gorge has gained international renown as one of the world's top spots for boardsailing.

Other famous Oregon landmarks include Crater Lake, the ancient volcanic formation filled with crystal-clear water; Multnomah Falls, a spectacular waterfall nestled into the Cascades; and the Oregon Shakespearean Festival in Ashland, which draws talent and theatergoers from around the world.



OREGON STATE TRADITIONS

THE BEAVER NICKNAME

Oregon State University, like many other universities in the United States, takes its nickname from its home state's official animal. In the school's early days as Oregon Agricultural College, the athletic teams were known as the Aggies. When orange uniforms replaced the drab sweatshirt-gray and tan jerseys, the teams were often referred to as the Orangemen. In 1916, when the school yearbook was renamed the Beaver, the name Beaver became associated with the school. It is believed the press also had some influence in changing the name. Whatever its origin, the name Beavers gained instant popularity.

THE COLORS ORANGE AND BLACK

Oregon State played its first football game in 1893 and orange was adopted as the school color. The school's yearbook, in fact, was originally known as the Orange. Oregon State teams have generally worn uniforms using orange, black and white as the base colors. However, orange is still the school's official color. Former men's basketball coach Slat's Gill and former football coach Tommy Prothro both popularized all-black uniforms during their careers at Oregon State, though, and some teams still wear black jerseys.

BENNY BEAVER

Oregon State's mascot is Benny Beaver, who can be found at most OSU athletic events. He's especially adored by Oregon State's youngest fans, as Benny is usually surrounded by kids. Benny was introduced to the student body Sept. 18, 1952, in an effort to pick up school spirit.

OSU MARCHING BAND

Gameday wouldn't be the same without the Oregon State Marching Band. The 150-member strong group performs at home football games under the direction of Dr. Brad Townsend. The band, known as The Spirit and Sound of OSU, was the first band formed in the Pac-10 and can trace its history back to 1890. Members of the band also perform at basketball games, volleyball matches and gymnastics meets as well as other special events. STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

SPORTS PERFORMANCE CENTER

The newest facility in the Athletics family is the spacious Sports Performance Center, located immediately next to the Tommy Prothro Football Complex.

The \$16 million dollar facility opened May 1, 2008, to rave reviews from the entire roster of student-athletes on campus. There is over 46,000 pounds of new equipment in the facility and a 60-yard four-lane sprint track to build speed.

"It's as good a facility as you will see on any campus," according to veteran strength and conditioning coach Bryan Miller. "Efficiency was a goal when we designed the facility."

The Sports Performance Center has a state-of-the-art video and sound system, including individual portals at its conditioning stations.

THE NEW FACILITY INCLUDES:

- 24 lifting platforms with 24 self-contained power racks and adjustable benches with a total of over 45,000 pounds of free weights and dumbbells.
- Four-lane, 60-yard indoor rubber sprinting track.
- Nutritional and body composition areas led by nutritionist Ingrid Skoog.
- State-of-the-art video and sound systems.
- Cardiovascular area.

"MAXIMIZING PERFORMANCE AND DEVELOPING STUDENT-ATHLETES"

The Oregon State University men's golf team prides itself on being among the best conditioned teams in the country.

Strength and Conditioning coach Bryan Miller oversees the entire strength program. He is certified through the National Strength and Conditioning Association and US Weightlifting.

"The goal of our strength and conditioning program is to provide athlete-specific functional training to prepare each student-athlete the opportunity to develop and succeed in their sport. As student-athletes continue to evolve, their training must continue to utilize progressively demanding exercises to maximize performance enhancement and injury reduction." - Bryan Miller



ATHLETIC TRAINING

Part of the success of any athletic team is its sports medicine program, particularly in college athletics. Oregon State is blessed to have a committed and stable staff to ensure its student-athletes' needs are being met.

Each Oregon State team is assigned a certified athletic trainer to oversee a program of injury prevention, treatment and rehabilitation throughout its season as well as during the offseason. This allows the athletic trainer to become familiar with each athlete and their particular year-round sports medicine needs.

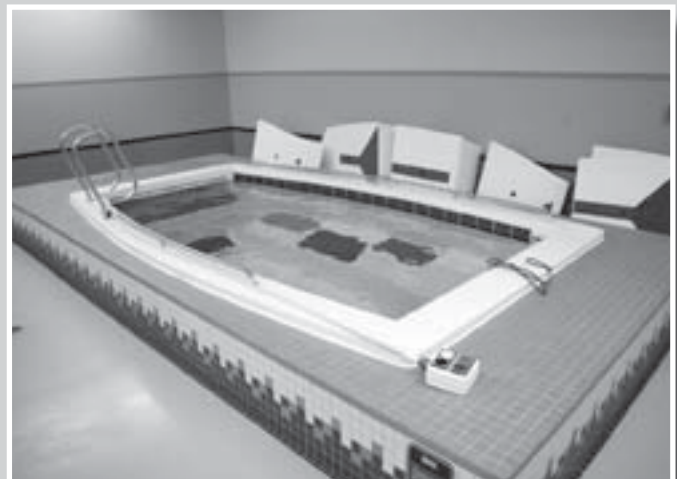
The sports medicine staff has daily interaction with the strength and conditioning staff as well as the athletic department nutritionist.

One of the most important aspects of any successful athlete is proper nutrition. OSU is fortunate to have popular Culinary Director Raul Vera and his staff coordinate nutritional meals on a daily basis.

Currently, construction is ongoing for another state-of-the-art sports medicine facility in legendary Gill Coliseum.

In addition to the benefits listed above, the athletic training department offers:

- Seven full-time athletic trainers and seven certified graduate assistant athletic trainers on staff.
- On-site radiology equipment is available at the Valley Football Center, enabling student-athletes to stay on campus for diagnostic testing.
- On-site access to the latest in aqua-therapy in a state-of-the-art SwimEx rehabilitation pool a Cybex isokinetic testing machine.
- Team physicians for evaluation in the athletic training room.

BRIDGE PROGRAM - HP LEARNING CENTER

Oregon State University developed and offered the inaugural "bridge" program to incoming student-athletes during the summer of 2006. The BEST (Bridge Encouraging Successful Transition) program is geared toward making the transition easier for incoming freshmen and transfers to OSU through a comprehensive array of programs and services for incoming student-athletes.

The program includes the following:

ORIENTATION: All student-athletes participate in an intensive orientation to the campus, community and college life. In addition, student-athletes participate in a START session to meet academic advisors and register for fall classes as well as receive orientation to academic procedures, study loads, resources, student services and campus buildings.

ASSESSMENT: OSU offers a variety of assessments so we can design a program of support appropriate for each student. Assessment may include academic evaluation of math, writing and reading levels; learning styles inventory; and an inventory that measures wellness, life planning, leadership, and physical, social and emotional well-being. These early and comprehensive assessments will allow advisors and athletic counselors to guide students into appropriate programs and classes.

ENRICHED LEARNING EXPERIENCES: Because the entire BEST program is highly structured and covers day and evening hours, OSU offers unique learning experiences that may include some of the following: confidence and team building at the OSU Challenge Ropes Course, training at the OSU Climbing Wall and a visit to the Hatfield Marine Science Center.

ACADEMIC COURSE WORK: Student-athletes earn credits in required courses such as math, writing and sociology from engaging instructors. They also earn credits in a course designed to enhance academic/ athletic leadership, retention and success. Students are supported from residence hall assistants, learning assistants and tutors, and instructors.

SOME STUDENT COMMENTS FROM LAST YEAR:

"It has helped me get a head start - get a feel for college, how the teachers teach, what the resources are, and getting to know the campus."

"I was concerned to adjusting to being on a time schedule . . . we get six credits that will give us a jump, a head start."



STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

Oregon State students will soon have the benefit of new academic building adjacent to Gill Coliseum and near Reser Stadium. The \$10 million-plus Student Success Center is in the planning stages with over half the necessary construction funds secured. The new facility is a collaboration between athletic and campus academic services and will also provide opportunities for interaction and shared learning between student-athletes and other campus students in a state-of-the-art tutoring center.

OREGON STATE ADMINISTRATION

Dr. Edward J. Ray assumed the position of Oregon State University's President on July 31, 2003. Prior to coming to Oregon State, Ray was executive vice president and provost of The Ohio State University.

Under his leadership, OSU has completed a visionary campus-wide strategic plan that is serving as the framework for the university's development in profound and historic ways. Research funding has grown to \$209 million since Dr. Ray's arrival, and the university has opened such key scientific facilities as the Kelley Engineering Center and the Lois Bates Acheson Veterinary Teaching Hospital.

Mindful of OSU's commitment to the people of Oregon, Dr. Ray has overseen the expansion of the Degree Partnership Program (DPP) with 11 of the state's community colleges, making it easier for students to complete four-year degrees. He has also taken a leadership role in fostering a more seamless P-20 system, working with area school superintendents, community college leaders and university colleagues to strengthen institutional connections and enhance the student experience. Dr. Ray has also helped to usher in a new era of partnership and cooperation between Oregon's public universities.

Dr. Ray was a member of the economics faculty at Ohio State from 1970-2003, serving as economics department chair from 1976 to 1992. He served as an associate provost from May 1992 until May 1993, senior vice provost and chief information officer from 1993-1998, and executive vice president and provost from 1998-2003.

His research interests include the history of protectionism in the United States, the determinants of U.S. foreign direct investment and foreign direct investment in the United States, the structure of tariff and non tariff trade barriers in the United States and abroad and the adoption of Social Security. His work has been published in *The American Economic Review*, *The Journal of Political Economy*, *The Quarterly Journal of Economics*, *The Review of Economic Studies* and other leading journals. He has co-authored a principles text, and his book, "U. S. Protectionism and the World Debt Crisis" was published by Quorum Press in 1989.

Dr. Ray received his undergraduate degree in mathematics from Queens College (CUNY) in June 1966, graduating cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. He earned his master's in economics from Stanford University in 1969 and his doctorate in economics from Stanford in June 1971.

His wife Beth was a counselor and assistant dean in the College of Arts and Sciences while at Ohio State. They have three children and two grandchildren.



DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS BOB DE CAROLIS

Bob De Carolis became the 12th director of athletics at Oregon State University when then-President Dr. Paul Risser appointed him to the position on August 28, 2002. He signed a five-year contract extension in May of 2006.

De Carolis originally joined the OSU staff on April 20, 1998 as associate athletic director of internal operations; he was promoted to senior associate athletic director on July 1, 1999. Prior to coming to Oregon State, he spent 19 years on the athletic department staff at the University of Michigan.

Since arriving at OSU, De Carolis has developed and executed the financial recovery plan that helped the OSU Department of Athletics eliminate a \$12.5 million accumulated deficit and grow the overall budget by more than \$20 million. At the same time, the department was able to not only maintain competitive teams, but also had its first winning football season in nearly three decades, its first winning men's basketball season in 15 years, the softball program made its first appearance ever in the College World Series and the baseball team competed in the College World Series for the first time in over five decades — capturing the 2006 and 2007 national championships. With him in a leadership role, the football program has played in seven bowl games and overall 16 of the 17 intercollegiate programs sponsored by OSU have participated in postseason.

De Carolis has been responsible for hiring some of the most high profile coaches in OSU history, including Mike Riley (football), former U.S. Olympic coach Taras Liskevych (volleyball), two-time NCAA Coach of the Year Jim Zalesky (wrestling), former standout assistant coach LaVonda Wagner (women's basketball), Craig Robinson (men's basketball), Kelly Sullivan (women's track/cross country), Larry Liebowitz (women's swimming), Linus Rhode (women's soccer), Steve Todd (men's rowing) and Emily Ford (women's rowing). All of his hires have or are building record-setting programs at OSU.

It's not all about wins or losses or about new facilities; De Carolis has stressed the importance of being a total student-athlete and being a part of the community. With his leadership, nearly 47 percent of the entire athletic roster sports a cumulative GPA of 3.00 or higher. Community service hours have increased nearly 300 percent during his tenure and contributions for scholarships to the Beaver Athletic Student Fund have increased from \$5 million to over \$11 million.

He spearheaded the feasibility study for a plan that has expanded and renovated Reser Stadium to its current capacity of nearly 46,000. Improvements at the Stadium since the beginning of 2005 have included a new east side structure that houses some of the best amenities in all of college football, construction of the largest video board in the Pac-10 (as of 2007 season) and new seating in the south end zone. In all, approximately \$115 million in improvements to the football facility alone has enabled "Beaver Nation" to create one of the best home field advantages in the nation. Beaver fans have responded with record ticket purchases.

The latest addition to the OSU facilities landscape is the Sports Performance Center (included in the Reser Stadium improvements). The new building, adjacent to legendary Gill Coliseum, houses a 17,000-square foot strength training area and a 7,000-square foot wrestling practice facility. Meanwhile, the final touches were made in spring (2008) to expand the home of the two-time national champion baseball team — Goss Stadium at Coleman Field. In addition, under his guidance, OSU has built the Merritt Truax Indoor Center, the OSU Softball Complex, expanded the Tommy Prothro Football Complex and renovated several locker rooms.

De Carolis' fundraising goals continue for the upcoming academic year and beyond. Current projects in development include a \$16 million Student Academic Success Center that will be shared with the entire OSU campus, \$4 million in exterior improvements to Gill Coliseum, a \$4 million sports medicine facility and women's basketball locker room, the remodeling the Valley Football Center, construction of a \$10 million

practice facility for the basketball and volleyball teams, a \$2.5 million crew facility on the banks of the Willamette River and a \$4 million track and field complex.

De Carolis is also actively involved in national and conference level committees, and just completed a three-year stint on the NCAA Division I Management Council (MANCO). He recently chaired the Pac-10 Conference Budget and Finance Committee, and sits on the Pac-10 Television and Bowl Committees. He also was recently selected to serve on the NCAA Student-Athlete Benefits Cabinet.

He started his Michigan career in 1979 as an administrative assistant. He was promoted to assistant business manager in 1980; at the same time, he was also named the head softball coach. De Carolis was Michigan's softball coach from 1980 to 1984 and his Wolverines had a third-place finish at the AIAW national championships.

De Carolis was promoted from assistant business manager to business manager in 1983; in 1987 to assistant athletic director for business; in 1990 to associate athletic director for internal operations; in 1994 to senior director for financial operations; in 1996 to senior associate athletic director and became responsible for all athletic facilities and venues at Michigan (encompassed the strategic planning of all capital improvements). In addition, he managed the department's information technology system and ancillary business operations. He was also responsible for the overall event management of football, men's and women's basketball, and ice hockey.

Under his leadership as senior director for financial operations, De Carolis led negotiations with Nike for an all-school contract for athletic shoes and apparel. He established a long-term relationship with Pepsi-Cola for beverage rights, and led a capital improvement project for Yost Ice Arena, Michigan Stadium and the soccer/field hockey complex.

De Carolis also spearheaded a "gift brick" donor program for Michigan Stadium, developed a comprehensive capital improvement program and coordinated the development of a master plan for the expansion of Michigan Stadium.

De Carolis is a 1976 graduate of Bloomsburg State College in Bloomsburg, Pa., with a B.S. in business education. He received a Master's of Science degree in sports management in 1979 from the University of Massachusetts. During his undergraduate days at Bloomsburg, he was a two-year letterwinner in football and baseball from 1973-75.

He got his first taste of coaching at Bloomsburg State when he served as an assistant coach in baseball and football from 1976-78.

Bob is married to the former Sandra Taylor and they have three children, daughter Lyndsay and twin daughters Lauren and Hayley. Lyndsay is a sophomore at the University of Michigan and is a member of the Wolverines' soccer team.
