COACH HOLLINGBERY



"BABE" HOLLINGBERY

Spectacular has been the rise of "Babe" Hollingbery, one of the few non-college men who has coached successfully a major college football team. In his seven seasons as head football coach at Washington State college "Babe" has brought the Cougars from a comparatively unknown team to the highest honors in the west — Champion of the Pacific coast conference. Hard play coupled with real sportsmanship feature Hollingbery - coached teams.

"Babe's" playing days were spent with the Olympic club of San Francisco where he played almost every position on the team. His first coaching job was with Lick High and Bates prep school. He coached both these schools and added the Olympic club to his coaching duties in 1921. He coached only the Olympic club in 1924 and '25. In 1925 his team went through the season undefeated, turning in 11 victories including wins over both Stanford and California. It was California's first defeat in five seasons and the breaking of a string of victories which had reached 45 straight wins.

Coach Hollingbery's assistants are "Buck" Bailey and Karl Schlademan.



Although in his first season as head football coach at Oregon State college, Lon Stiner has caused a complete upheaval in football circles. He has changed completely, and with marked success, the style of football which has been in vogue on the Orange campus for the last decade. He has adopted the best parts of several systems and worked them into a system of his own and has developed a spirit among his players and students which has brought new life to Oregon State college.


Lon started his colorful athletic career at Hastings high school in Nebraska where he starred in football, basketball and track. He played tackle for the University of Nebraska in 1925 and '26. He was captain of his team in 1926 and won the honor of being picked on the All-American team. The Nebraska team of 1925 defeated Notre Dame by the score

of 17 to 0. After being graduated from Nebraska, Lon was appointed line coach at the University of Colorado, where he remained one year before accepting the position as assistant coach at Oregon State in the fall of 1928. He was appointed head coach of the Orangemen late last spring.

Coach Stiner's assistants are Jim Dixon and George Scott.


