

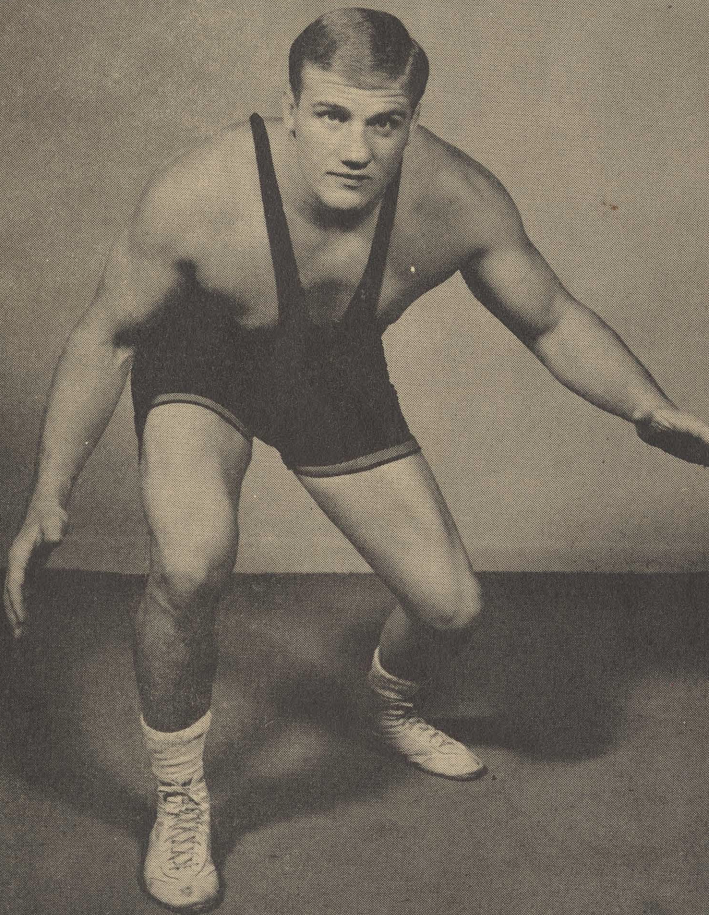

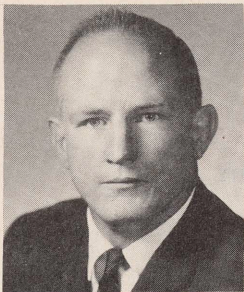

## DALE THOMAS



One of the foremost, and winningest, college coaches in America is Dale Thomas, now entering his 14th season as head coach at Oregon State. Beaver teams have completely dominated Pacific Coast mat circles in all but one season since he came to OSU. Since OSU joined the Pacific-8 conference six years ago, Oregon State has never lost a championship. In

1961, he was named "Coach of The Year" nationally, and countless individuals he coached have swept national and world crowns. In 1969, Dale led the Beavers to third place in the NCAA Tournament, the highest place an Oregon State wrestling team has even taken.

As a wrestler, Dale was captain of the Cornell, Iowa team which captured the NCAA Championships in 1947. He has wrestled on three U.S. teams, and he has captured no less than nine national championships in collegiate, freestyle, and Greco-Roman competition.

Two of Thomas's current wrestlers, Jess Lewis and Henk Schenk, placed high in national meets this last season. Lewis was champion in the heavyweight division at the NCAA tournament, and Schenk, in the 213.5 pound class, was runner-up in freestyle and Greco-Roman in AAU competition.

Coach Thomas is a member of the Helms Wrestling Hall of Fame, and officiated in three different Olympic Games and in several world championships. He developed and directs one of the largest wrestling tournaments in the world--the Oregon High School Tournament. Dale founded the "Kid Wrestling" program that is known both in Oregon and nationally. He also founded and directs the Oregon Cultural Exchange, a program that brings foreign high school wrestlers to this state, and in return it sends Oregon high school wrestlers overseas.



## LEN KAUFFMAN

Assistant wrestling coach Len Kauffman is one of the all-time great Beaver grapplers. A graduate of OSU in 1965, Kauffman is a member of the wrestling Hall of Fame and has won numerous honors, including the 1969 National AAU Freestyle "Outstanding Wrestler" award.

A veteran of Viet Nam, where he was a helicopter pilot, Kauffman was three time conference champion, twice in the Old PCC and as a senior in the Pacific-8 (then called the AAUW) conference.

He finished second in the collegiates as a senior and third as a junior and was the NAAU Champion in 1964. Kauffman was also fourth in the world in Freestyle in 1966. During his final two years at Oregon State, Kauffman was known as the "Pinningest Wrestler in America," much to the delight of the Beaver fans. He recorded the most pins at both the NCAA finals and the AAUW championships, and during his senior year he pinned every opponent met in dual meet competition.

## 1970 PROSPECTUS

Last year, Oregon State became the first team from the West Coast to finish among the top three wrestling teams at the NCAA Championships. Their third place finish was also the highest an OSU team has ever placed in major sports competition.

Although it may be hard to believe, the Beavers could well outshine their 1969 performance. After all, NCAA heavyweight champion Jess Lewis is back for his senior year and returning with Lewis are six of eight Beavers who scored points at the NCAA finals last year.

Jim Vandehey (167) finished fourth, Bob Hawkins (137) fifth and Kim Snider (152) sixth at the NCAA tourney. All three are seniors and will be out to propel OSU into the championship this coming year. Others returning for another shot at the finals are Bob Tomasovic (160) and Mike Donovan (191), both juniors.

Beaver forces have also been bolstered by the return of Henk Schenk, one of the nation's best heavyweights the past two years while serving in the Army. Schenk is returning for his senior year and is expected to wrestle at 191, giving the Beavers a great one-two punch at the top weights.

The 1969-70 wrestling season will be the first time freshmen athletes have been eligible for varsity competition and Coach Dale Thomas has lined up some good ones, including several state high school champions.

The addition of these fine freshmen, plus numerous returning lettermen (10) will give the Beavers great depth at all positions, something they will need if they are to uphold their lofty second in the national rating they have been tagged with this season.

### OSU OPPONENTS

#### ARIZONA STATE

Ted Bredehoft has four returning lettermen and should get help from five junior college transfers. Should improve on last year's 4-10-1 record.

#### ARIZONA

Coach William Nelson has seven returning lettermen and seven others figure as possible starters. Should be strong second semester. Last year finished 3-5-1.



## BRIGHAM YOUNG

Lost seven through graduation, but have seven lettermen returning. Fred Davis is in a rebuilding year after 10-4 last season. Beavers won 22-9 in 1969.

## CALIFORNIA

Cal is expected to have best team in recent years after 8-6 last year. Coach Bill Martell is counting on several newcomers to give the Bears strength at all spots. Lost to OSU 42-2 last season. Rated eighth in pre-season polls.

## CAL POLY

Vaugh Hitchcock should have another fine team, seeking their third straight College Division title. Lost heavily through graduation, but have nine returning lettermen with some outstanding new material. Last year finished 17-2, including 16-15 win over OSU.

## CENTRAL WASHINGTON

Coach Eric Beardsley's squad won the Evergreen Conference title last year, despite a 3-7 dual meet record. Have seven returning lettermen including four conference champs. Should get good help from at least one junior college transfer.

## COLORADO

Eight returning lettermen should help improve over last year's 5-6-1 record for coach Shelby Wilson. Defeated by OSU 21-12 last year.

## COLORADO STATE COLLEGE

Rebuilding year for coach Jack LaBonde. Lost most of RMAC and MIWA championship team, with only four returning lettermen. Freshmen and JC transfers should make them tough, however.

## COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY

Ten returning lettermen should provide great improvement over a 2-9 season one year ago for coach Don Mullison.

## EASTERN OREGON COLLEGE

Finished sixth in NAIA last year at 7-6. Erling Odegaard has 12 returning lettermen, but squad will be young and inexperienced. NAIA champ at 160 pounds, Brick Woodard, is back.

## FRESNO

Dick Francis's squad, 6-8-1 last year, should be stronger with the return of six lettermen, including Ken Oyer, winner of two championships last year in the unlimited division. Roger Castaneda weights 300 pounds and may be unstoppable.

#### MANKATO

Rummy Macias will depend on development of three transfers and lettermen from previous years for improvement over a 10-7 season last year. Eight lettermen returning.

#### MULTNOMAH ATHLETIC CLUB

Cyril Mitchell is expected to field another tough team of outstanding wrestlers, all experienced. Led by Garry Stensland and ex-Beaver, Don Conway.

#### OREGON

Led by NCAA champion, John Miller, Ducks will have great depth and experienced leadership. Dr. Arthur Keith has 13 lettermen returning. Could win conference. Downed by Beavers 30-8 and 35-6 last year. Rated eighth in nation in pre-season poll.

#### PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY

Howard Westcott's squad finished fourth in College Division last year, a building season. Six returning lettermen and some outstanding newcomers should make PSU stronger. Last year finished 9-7. Beavers won 16-13 and 20-8 in 1969.

#### SAN JOSE STATE

Coach Bill Smith has seven returning lettermen from last year's PCAA champions, including Art Stone (115) and Walt Thatcher (167), both PCAA title holders.

#### UTAH

Eight lettermen returning from last year's conference championship team. Marvin Hess was 12-4-1 last year. Tied Beavers 14-14 early in season.

#### WASHINGTON

Four tough lettermen and outstanding sophomores should make Huskies tough. Coach James Smith's team was 12-5 last year. They lost to OSU 30-1 last season.

#### WASHINGTON STATE UNIVERSITY

Will have eight lettermen returning, including three conference champs. Finished 7-7 last year under Coach Roger James. Should be stronger this year with the help of five outstanding freshmen. Beavers won 36-2 last year.



## WYOMING

Seven experienced lettermen, plus some good newcomers should propel Wyoming past last year's record of 7-8-2. Coach is Joe McDaniel. Beavers won 27-6 last year.

### BEAVER THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

118 Lee Garoian, former state high school champion from Corvallis, is capable of beating anyone and could place in the NCAA finals. Was 13-6-1 in dual meets as a sophomore. Ron Castles, freshman from Wilson High of Portland should make good push for starting spot. Also, watch Dave Kalams, freshman from Medford.

126 Senior Ken Larsen was second in the Pac-8 last year and third as a sophomore. Had a 9-7 record last year in dual meets. Sophomore Mike Jones will give Larsen stiff competition, as will Dan Keuter, freshman from Albany. Keuter was on the Japanese wrestling exchange last year.

134 Pac-8 champ, Roger Weigel should repeat as a junior. Won 17, lost three and tied one as a rookie last year. Noted for cradle and for rolling from the bottom position. Will be pushed by sophomore Jim Fry and senior John Cooluris. The latter had a 6-5-1 record last year.

142 Bob Hawkins finished third in conference last year and had a dual meet record of 10-5-1. He was also third as a sophomore and fifth in the collegiates last year. Nick Pasely, Jim Dort, Scott Lewis, and Bob Grim will provide Hawkins with ample competition.

150 Bob Tomasovic, former state high school champ from Corvallis, was second in the Pac-8 meet last year and scored in the NCAA finals. Could go all the way as a junior, but will be hard pressed by teammates Steve Thomas, another Corvallis product, and sophomore Jim Postelwait. Thomas, a very capable performer in the middle weights, is the son of the OSU coach. Rob Brown, state champ from Medford, has also looked good.

156 Kim Snider won the conference title and was sixth in the NCAA last year. Has great wrestling fundamentals, winning 14 while losing two and tying one as a junior. Senior Lauren Johnson and Postlewait will push Snider.

167 Jim Vandenev was third in the Pac-8 meet as a junior, but finished fourth in the NCAA finals. One of the hardest workers on the squad. Will be hard pushed by state high school champ Mike Jones, a freshman from Lebanon, and Ken Thomas, another of coach Thomas' sons. Thomas will be competing as a sophomore after being sidelined with an injury last year. Has great potential.

177 Sophomore Jim Crumley will be hard pressed to keep his starting spot away from John Wisti, freshman from North Bend, and Ron Sather, frosh from Corvallis. This weight is up for grabs by any of the three.

190 Mike Donovan finished third in the conference as a sophomore and has shown great improvement this fall. Will be hard pressed by state high school champ Jim Hagen, freshman from Prineville, and Mark Webber, freshman from Corvallis.

Hvwt. Jess Lewis will be back after his second NCAA title at the top weight. Was a member of US Olympic team in 1968, finishing sixth in the world. Has won numerous national and world-wide honors and ranks as one of the best heavyweights ever. Will be pushed by the return of Henk Schenk, who spent the past two years in the service. Was a teammate of Lewis' at the Olympic Games, and one of the few able to give Lewis a real battle. Will try to make 190 by the time the collegiate finals arrive. Other Beaver heavyweights include Ken Smalley, Medford, and Fred Stewart, Woodland, California. The latter was Northern California heavyweight champion last year. Both are outstanding freshmen.

How Hustle Award is Scored

The "Hustle" score is found by multiplying the individual's average dual meet score by the wrestler's accumulative grade point average.

The G.P.A. (grade point average) is based on this point distribution:

A=4.0, B=3.0, C=2.0, D=1.0, F=0

To be eligible for the "Hustle Award," the wrestler must wrestle 60% of the dual meets.

The wrestler's dual meet score is figured as follows:

Win by fall, forfeit, or default	5 points
Win by decision	3
Draw	2
Loss by decision	1
Loss by fall, forfeit or default	0

SUMMARY OF THE 1970  
NCAA WRESTLING RULES

The individual match point system in wrestling is an evaluation of the activity used to determine a winner in case there is no fall. It is the referee's duty, among other things, to analyze the situation and signal the points to the scorer. The points signaled by the referee are usually a reward to a wrestler for his action. Once in a while a wrestler is penalized and points are awarded to his opponent for infractions such as illegal holds and/or unnecessary roughness as well as for various technical violations relating mainly to stalling. First, let us consider the rewards or positive legislation of the rules. There are actually only seven things that a wrestler tries to do including the fall, and he is given points for all except the latter. The fall terminates the bout. Keep in mind, also, the wrestler must be on defense at the same time he is on offense. Sometimes he may counter moves made by his opponent rather than just stop them.

Individual Match Points

Take-down	2 (scored only from a neutral or up position)
Escape	1 (scored only from position of disadvantage)
Reversal	2 (scored only from position of disadvantage)
Near Fall	3 (scored only from position of advantage)
Predicament	2 (scored only from position of advantage)
Time Advantage	1 or 2 (scored only from position of advantage)

Following is the definition of the six maneuvers for which a wrestler is awarded points and also the definition of the fall. (note key words are underlined)

**TAKE DOWN** From a neutral position wrestler gains control of opponent on the mat.

**ESCAPE** Defensive wrestler gains a neutral position.

REVERSAL	<u>Defensive wrestler gains control without first breaking neutral.</u>
NEAR FALL	Situation in which <u>offensive wrestler has control of his opponent in a pinning situation with both shoulders or the scapula held in contact with the mat for less than one second or when one shoulder of the defensive wrestler is touching the mat, and the other shoulder is held within one inch or less of the mat for two seconds.</u>
PREDICAMENT	Situation in which the <u>offensive wrestler has control of his opponent in a pinning situation holding both shoulders momentarily (stopped) within 4 inches of the mat or one shoulder down and the other within a 45 degree angle for one second.</u> A continuous roll-through is not to be considered a predicament.
TIME ADVANTAGE	The <u>difference in time accumulated by each wrestler in the position of advantage. One point for each minute up to 2 minutes.</u>
FALL	Any part of <u>both shoulders or area of both scapula held in contact with mat for one second.</u> Can be made from any position.

Now let us consider penalty points on the things that a wrestler should not do. These come, for the main part, under two categories. First, illegal holds and unnecessary roughness which is for the safety of the wrestlers. Second, technical violations. These are put in for the main part to discourage the wrestlers from being purely defensive. The rule whereby the wrestler in the position of advantage cannot lock his hands or arms around his opponent's body or both legs, unless his opponent has all of his weight supported entirely on his feet or has him in a pinning situation is an example. Such things as leaving mat without permission, delaying match, intentional forcing opponent off mat, intentional going off mat, stalling and grasping clothing are all considered technical violations. Illegal holds are such things as the hammerlock above the right angle; the twisting hammerlock; front headlock; headlock without the arm; the straight head scissors (even though the arm is included); over-scissors; flying mare with the palm up full (double) nelson; strangle holds; all body slams; toe holds; twisting knee lock; key lock; overhead double arm bar; the bending, twisting, or forcing of the head or any limb beyond its



normal limits of movement; locking the hands behind the back in a double arm bar from a neutral position and any hold used for punishment alone.

The referee shall caution the user of a potentially dangerous hold in order to prevent possible injury. Such holds should be stopped by the referee, if possible, before reaching the dangerous stage.

Note: A warning is given for stalling, but not for other infractions. Stalling warning given after maximum of 10 seconds. Subsequent violations will be called within a maximum of five seconds.

It is the responsibility of contestants, officials and coaches to avoid the use of stalling tactics or allowing the use thereof and action is to be maintained throughout the match by the contestants making an honest attempt to stay in the circle and to wrestle aggressively whether on the top, bottom, or neutral positions. This concept shall be demonstrated by those responsible with strict enforcement by officials.

One of the most important rules and misunderstood rules is the Out-of-Bounds rule. The following is a direct quote from the rule book: "Contestants are considered in-bounds if the supporting parts of either wrestler are inside the boundary lines. When a fall is imminent, wrestling shall continue as long as both shoulders of the wrestler being pinned are in-bounds. Intersection of the vertical plane of this boundary line by the shoulders of the wrestler being pinned is considered out-of-bounds."

EACH MATCH IS OF 8 MINUTES DURATION WITH PERIODS of 2 - 3 - 3. The referee will allow a maximum time-out of 3 minutes which is cumulative throughout the match for injury or equipment problems. No time-out is allowed for rest or consultation.

First period starts with both wrestlers neutral or standing--Second period starts with one wrestler in the position of advantage--Third period starts with the other wrestler in the position of advantage.
