Wrestling Outlook

A pessimist, according to the dictionary, is one who has a gloomy or cynical view of affairs, while optimists are those who look on the right side of things.

Oregon State wrestling coach Dr. Dale Thomas, whose teams at OSU have won 243 of 286 dual meets during the past 16 seasons, is noted as a genuine pessimist, in fact some have even gone so far as to say Webster was thinking of Thomas when he wrote the dictionary.

The former Cornell of Iowa graduate and two-time Olympic grappler seldom approaches a season or match with optimism. He expects the toughest from any given situation and his teams are ready, always. Perhaps that is why his squads have won 86 percent of their dual meets and why they are among the top teams in the Nation each year.

At any rate, it really is news when Thomas looks forward to a coming season in an optimistic approach. It's not that he doesn't look forward to each season with genuine enthusiasm, just that he normally expects situations to be much tougher than they usually are.

Take note, Thomas has shed image and is viewing the 1972-73 season with a "lets get going and see how good we are" optimistic approach.

It is the first time in 16 seasons that he has admitted Oregon State just might have a chance at a national title, if everything goes right, that is. "For the first time I think we really have the guns to go after the NCAA title," Thomas notes, but is quick to add, "but everything must go just right, no injuries, everybody performing at 110 percent, maybe even a little help from the other teams."

Even a quick glance at the OSU roster indicates support to Thomas' statement. There are 10 weight divisions. In five of those, the Beavers should put national NCAA placewinners on the mat. If all five do as well in 1973 as they have the ability to do, the Beavers will be strong.

The BIG FIVE are All-Americans Tom Phillips (118), Mike R. Jones (158), Jim Crumley (177), Greg Strobel (190) and Jim Hagen (Hwt).

Phillips and Strobel captured fifth place honors last year and Hagen was sixth. Jones was runnerup in 1971 and Crumley is a two-time winner, second in 1970 and fifth in 1971. He missed last year with an early season injury and mono.

Oregon State's roster includes 16 returning lettermen, plus several who did not earn letters last year but have performed on the varsity squad.

In addition to the five regulars returning, several others are back from last season's "top 10" group. Rob Brown returns at 142 and Gordon liams is back at 134, along with Ron Sather at 177. All three were regulars last year, however, Sather is expected to sit out the season, providing Crumley stays healthy, a problem he has had every season.

Other lettermen back include Steve Ballard, a junior at 167; Joe Bold, junior at 134 who lettered two years ago but missed last season; Bill Dickson, junior at 126 and a regular when healthy for the past two seasons; Dan Elliott, junior at 134; Ben Gerding, junior at 150; Mike A. Jones, senior at 126-134; Jim Postlewait, also a senior at 167; and Jim Thorpe, junior at 150.

The Beavers only lost two members of last year's squad, one a senior, the other a junior who will go on to medical school, rather than stay on for a final year. Both were regulars, however. The two are also brothers and both are the sons of the coach; Steve and Ken Thomas.

OSU should have a veteran at each of the 10 weights, and in some cases veteran letterwinners two and three deep. However, Thomas had an excellent recruiting year and several freshman have made their presence known, including Mike Palmer, a three-time Oregon prep champ; Joe Kittel, twice Oregon prep champ; Ron Boucher, Ken Williams and Paul Jackson, all prep standouts in Oregon last year. Palmer is battling for a spot at 150, Kittel is number two at 118, Boucher is at 142, and 134, Williams right behind Mike R. Jones at 158 and Jackson behind Hagen at heavyweight.

The Coaching Staff

DALE THOMAS

Oregon State University Wrestling Coach

Dale Thomas is entering his 17th season at Oregon State, during which time he has become one of the winningest collegiate coaches in America. Twice he has been named College Coach of the Year in wrestling (1961 and 1970) and his teams nave dominated wrestling circles on the West Coast. In 16 years the Beavers have won 13 Coast championships and only once have they not won the Pacific-8 title.

A former Olympian himself, Thomas has also officiated in two different Olympic Games and several world championships. He participated in both the 1952 and 1956 Olympics. He was a freestyler in 1952 and in 1956 he was a member of the first U.S. Greco-Roman team sent to the Olympics.

In 1970 he coached the U.S. Wrestling Federation team which toured two European countries for dual meets and tournaments.

Thomas' accomplishments include:

- * Captain of Cornell of Iowa's 1947 NCAA and National AAU Championship team;
- * Recently named (1970) to Cornell of Iowa's Sports Hall of Fame;
- Winner of nine national championships in collegiate, freestyle and Greco-Roman competition and competed on two U.S. Olympic teams (1952 and 1956);
- * Coach of the only West Coast team to finish in the top three at the NCAA championships (OSU was tied for fourth in 1971, fourth in 1961;
- * Started Oregon high school AAU freestyle tournament in 1962. Since then State has added freestyle and G-R tournaments.
- * Conducts and participates in numerous clinics in collegiate, freestyle and Greco-Roman, including high school and college camps and Olympic development programs;
- * Coached Oregon State to a record 109 points scored in the 1967 Pacific-8 championships;
- Has coached four NCAA champions, five runnerups, three thirds, five fourths, six fifths and three sixths while at Oregon State;
- * Developed and directs one of the largest wrestling tournaments in the world in the annual Oregon high school meet, with over 400 contestants using eight mats—52 matches per hour;
- * Brought the NCAA championships to the West Coast for the first time in 1961 (hosted by OSU):
- * Started and developed the Kid's Wrestling program in Oregon and now nationally;
- * National Collegiate Clinic staff in 1958 at Laramie, Wyoming; 1962 at Stillwater, Oklahoma; and 1965 at Laramie;
- * Taught and studied wrestling in Yugoslavia and Poland in 1963 and in Mexico in 1965 and South Africa during the summer of 1968;
- * Voted College Coach of the Year by his fellow coaches in 1961 and 1970;

- * Organized and directs the Oregon high school Wrestling Cultural Exchange which started in 1962. Has included exchanges with Japan, Europe, Mexico, New Zealand and South Africa;
- Officiated in 1960 and 1964 Olympic Games and several World Championships and is ranked in the highest officiating category;
- * Coached the U.S. Greco-Roman teams in 1961 and 1966.

LEN KAUFFMAN

Assistant wrestling coach Len Kauffman is one of the all-time great Beaver grapplers. A graduate of OSU in 1965, Kauffman is a member of the wrestling Hall of Fame and has won numerous honors, including the 1969 National AAU freestyle "Outstanding Wrestler" award.

A veteran of Viet Nam, where he was a helicopter pilot, Kauffman was three times conference champion, twice in the old PCC and as a senior in the Pacific-8 (then called the AAWU) conference.

He finished second in the collegiates in his senior year (1965) and third as a junior. Kauffman, in 1964, won the National AAU championship. He was also fourth in the world in freestyle in 1966. During his final two years at Oregon State, Kauffman was known as the "Pinningest" wrestler in America, much to the delight of Beaver fans. He recorded the most pins at both the NCAA finals and the AAWU championships, and during his senior year ne pinned every opponent met in dual competition.

HOW THE HUSTLE AWARD IS SCORED

The "Hustle" score is found by multiplying the individual's average dual meet score by the wrestler's accumulative grade point average.

The GPA (grade point average) is based on this point distribution:

A-4.0, B-3.0, C-2.0, D-1.0, F-0.

To be eligible for the "Hustle Award", the wrestler must wrestle 60% of the dual meets.

The wrestler's dual meet score is figured as follows:

Win by fall, forfeit, or default	5 points
Win by decision	3 points
Draw	2 points
Loss by decision	1 point
Loss by fall, forfeit or default	0 points

OSU Opponents

BRIGHAM YOUNG - January 5 at Corvallis, 7:30 p.m.

Coach Fred Davis, in his ninth year at BYU, expects to have one of his best team's ever. He has last year's team back, with the exception of All-American Rhondo Fehlberg. Lettermen returning number 13 and include conference champs Laron Hanson 134, and Randy Macy, 167. In 1971, Hansen was fifth in NCAA meet and conference champ. Macy is only a sophomore. Other conference placewinners include Mike Hansen 177, and Gil Keith 118, second; and Ken Westfall 190, and Kerry Anderson 126, third. Ray Vincent was fourth at 150. Two red shirts back are Ben Ohai and Pat Kelly. Ohai was fifth in Olympic trials last year at 190 and Kelley is former Oregon prep champ. Record in duals last year was 7-5-2, including 23-12 loss to OSU. Tied for conference title. Davis' career record is 92-28-5. OSU leads series 5-3-1.

CALIFORNIA — January 10 at Berkeley

Bill Martell, in his ninth year at Cal, has a 52-63-3 lifetime record. The Bears were 7-5 last year, fifth in the Pacific-8 and lost to OSU 19-11. Eight lettermen return, including Frank Cuthbert at 118; Cesar Vasquez, Pacific-8 runnerup at 134; Chris Hurchanik, third in conference at 167 last year; and Kirk Thorburn, third at 190 a year ago. Newcomers to watch include Carlos Rodriquez 126; Bob Oretga 118; and Paul Fritz 190. OSU leads series 14-0-0.

CAL POLY - January 11 at SLO

Vaughn Hitchcock, owner of a 149-29-2 career record in 10 years at Cal Poly, will be going after his fourth straight college division title. Lettermen back number 12, enough to make Cal Poly again the CD favorite. Larry Morgan, fifth at 134 in the NCAA University tourney last year, is a senior. College Division place winners Gary McBride, fourth at 118; Mike Wassum, fourth at 126; Morgan, second at 134; Glen Anderson, first at 142; Allyn Cooke, third at 158; and Keith Leland, fourth at 190, return, along with Pat Farmer, second at 177 in 1971. Cal Poly did not lose any of their national placewinners. Last year in dual meets, CP was 14-5, including a 18-17 win over the Beavers at SLO and a 17-14 loss at Corvallis. OSU leads series 10-4-0.

EASTERN OREGON — February 10 at Corvallis, 10 a.m.

Erling Odegaard has been at EOC for 11 years, with a record of 76-38-2. He returns five lettermen from a 6-8-0 dual meet team of 1972 that lost to the Beavers 49-2. Returning lettermen include captain Dave Robinson, conference champion last year at 118; Steve Delashmutt, runnerup at 157; Rob Howanic, fourth at 167; Mike Morehead, 177; and Lonnie Wells, 150. Graduation losses included Greg Nelson, NAIA fifth place winner at heavyweight. OSU leads series 4-0-0.

IOWA - February 12 at Iowa City

Former assistant coach Gary Kurdelmeier is starting his first year and will have 14 lettermen to work with from last year's team that finished second in the conference and was 11-0-1 overall. Other lettermen returning who placed in the conference meet are Russ Winegardner and Matt Clark, each third at 126 and 167, respectively, and Dan Holm, fourth at 150. NEBRASKA-OMAHA - February 9 at Omaha

Nebraska at Omaha finished 17-3-1 last year, coach Mike Palmisano's first season. His lifetime record is 74-24-3, having served as head coach at Onio Northern prior to taking over at Nebraska. Nine lettermen return, including detending conterence champ and NAIA second place tinisher Paul Martinez, 118, and NAIA champion Phil Gonzales at 126. Nebraska finished second in the NAIA tourney last year, after finishing fourn in the Rocky Mountain tournament and tirst in the NAIA district meet. NORTHERN COLORADO - January 20 at Corvallis

Coach Jack LaBonde, in seven years at NC, has a 76-21-1 lite-time record and won the Rocky Mountain AC title last year. Five returning lettermen include defending conference champs Dave Bruner, 126; W. D. Martin, 158; and Bert Dalton, 167. Northern Colorado finished seventh in the college division of the NCAA last year. Beavers won 34-5 last year, one of three losses NC suffered. They won five. The RMAC has split this year into two sections, with NC now in the Great Plains AC, which will not have a wrestling tourney, since only two members have wrestling programs. NC leads series 6-5-0.

NORTHERN IOWA - February 13 at Cedar Falls

Chuck Patten, with an 86-37-6 lifetime record, has been at Northern lowa eight years. Last year his squad won their conference title and finished second in the NCAA college division meet. They had six conference champions and three return, Vern Ellison, 118; Jon Moeller, 134; and Mark Fox, 142. Losses included heavy-weight Mike McCready, first in the CD and third in University competition. Daul record was 12-5-1. Newcomers include lowa prep champ Dave Cunningham at 118 and national JC title holder Tom Garcia at 134. First meeting between schools.

OKLAHOMA - January 6 at Corvallis

The Sooners, under new coach Stan Abel (formerly of Cincinnati and Ohio Univ.), are again rated among the nation's top mat teams. Last year they were fifth in the NCAA, but only third in their conference, finishing with a 9-4 dual record. Oklahoma and the Breece family are one in the same. Gary was NCAA runnerup at 118, Jim is at 126, Dave at 134 and freshman Steve will also go 118. Eddie Webb, third at 26 in the NCAA last year, is also back, along with 10 other lettermen. Others to watch include Jeff Callard, 158; Warren Reid, 177; Paul Erwin, 167; and Jim Jeffries, 190. Conference champs back are Gary Breece and Callard. Reid was second, Paul Darrough, Webb and Jeffries fourth place winners. Oklahoma leads series 2-0-0.

OREGON — Januray 18 at Eugene — February 17 at Corvallis

Former Oregon State great Ron Finley is in his third season as head coach of the Ducks. He has a 12-16-1 career record and Oregon was 7-8 last year and fourth in the Pacific-8. Eight lettermen return, including the only PAC-8 freshman champion ever, Mark Purkey at 167. Dave Luke, 126 was second; Mike Oilar third at 142; and Duane Stutzman fourth at 150. The Ducks were second at Chico State Invitational last year, fourth at the Washington Invitational and first at the Sun Devil tourney. Other reurning letter winners include Rick Willoughby, 118; Dean Dixon, 142; Wes Hines, 190. Oregon State won both meetings last year, 20-15 and 29-8. Newcomers include heavyweight Tom Persons and Shuichi Shoji from Japan at 134. OSU leads series 29-1-0.

PORTLAND STATE — December 8 at Corvallis January 31 at Portland

Don Conway's fourteenth place finishers in the 1972 NCAA meet should be very tough again this season, although they will be young. Gone are NCAA three-time placewinner Wayne Karney, heavyweight, and Bob Bergen, sixth last year at 142. Returning lettermen number eight and include Marklin Grahn, 158; Dan Mello, 126; Sam Jones, 150; Larry Soto, 134; Kelly Bledsoe, 190; Sam Oono, 142; David Jennings, 134; and Martin Roberts, heavyweight. Conway, with a 7-7 career mark after his first year in 1972, also has brought Ron Castles at 118, Castles is an ex-Beaver. Several freshman, including Robin Richards, will bolster Conway's starting lineup. The Viking coach is also an ex-Beaver and OSU's first collegiate champion back in 1961. They are Lee Allen, third at 118 in the CD tourney; Bill Knipple, 177; Gaylord Strand, 126-134; Dave Smith, 190; and Martin Vogt, 167. Speasl was also fourth in the national NAIA meet. Freshmen include Erick Wade, 158; Jeff Matthews, 167; and Larry Siler, 167. Riehm's career mark is 29-13. Last year, OSU won 23-14. OSU leads series 5-0-0.

UCLA - January 19 at Corvallis

Both of coach Dave Hollinger's Pacific-8 placewinners, John Meikle and John Zenith, have graduated. Meikle won the 126 pound title and Zenith was third at 150. The Bruins do return, however, seven lettermen and several new freshmen should add strength. Hollinger is in his eighth season at UCLA and last year the Bruins were sixth in the Pacific-8 meet. Lettermen returning include John Abad, 142; Mark Black, 150; Craig Deane, 158; and Jim Rodriquez, 126. OSU won last year's meeting 39-3. OSU leads series 3-0-0.

WASHINGTON — January 22 at Seattle February 3 at Corvallis

Jim Smith's Huskies are expected to again be among the nation's best, but will be hard-pressed to top last year's fourth place finish in the NCAA meet. Gone are Larry Owings, NCAA champion and twice runnerup; and conference placewinner Don Pleasant. Smith, with a 70-30-5 mark in five years at Washington, returns 11 lettermen. NCAA champ Bill Murdock at 177; third placer Hajime Shinjo at 150; and sixth place winner Jim Woods at 167 return; along with conference placewinners Mike Downer, second at 118; Mike Kondo, fourth at 134, Randy Corn, second at 190, and Don Dunham, second at heavyweight. Shinjo and Murdock were also conference champs. Woods turned out to be the biggest Huskie surprise. He failed to place in the conference meet, but wrestled very well and placed sixth at the nationals. Summary of the 1973 NCAA Wrestling Rules

The individual match point system in wrestling is an evaluation of the activity used to determine a winner in case there is no fall. It is the referee's duty, among other things, to analyze the situation and signal the points to the scorer. The points signaled by the referee are usually a reward to a wrestler for his action. Once in a while a wrestler is penalized and points are awarded to his opponent for infractions such as illegal holds and/or unnecessary roughness as well as four various technical violations relating mainly to stalling. First, let us consider the rewards or positive legislation of the rules. There are actually only seven things that a wrestler tries to do including the fall, and he is given points for all except the latter. The fall terminates the bout. Keep in mind, also, the wrestler must be on defense at the time he is on offense. Sometimes he may counter moves made by his opponent rather than just stop them.

Wrestling Terms

Following are the definitions of the five maneuvers for which a wrestler is awarded points and also the definition of the fall. (Note key words are in boldface.)

TAKEDOWN From a neutral position wrestler gains control of opponent on the mat. Two points awarded wrestler who gains position of advantage.

Defensive wrestler gains a neutral position. ESCAPE One point awarded wrestler who escapes.

When defensive wrestler comes from under-REVERSAL neath and gains control of his opponent, either on the mat or in a rear standing position. Two points awarded for reversal.

> When both shoulders of defensive wrestler are held momentarily stopped within four inches of mat (or less), or when one shoulder is touching the mat and the other shoulder is held at an angle of 45 degrees or less with the mat, two points shall be awarded wrestler in position of advantage.

If the above criteria for near fall is met for five uninterupted seconds, three points shall be awarded wrestler in position of advantage.

The difference in time accumulated by each wrestler in the position of advantage. If one wrestler has one full minute or more of net time advantage, he shall be awarded one point. Point awarded only at conclusion of match and does figure in total score.

Any part of both shoulders or area of both scapulas held in contact with the mat for one second. Can be made from any position. Do not award fall if shoulders of defensive wrestler are out of bounds, if either wrestler is handicapped by having any portion of his body out-of-bounds. A fall terminates match.

If no fall has occured at the end of match (three periods), referee shall award the match to wrester who has scored greatest number of points. In dual meets, if wrestlers end in a tie, draw is declared.

When one of the wrestlers is unable to continue for any reason.

A wrestler receives a forfeit when his opponent, for any reason, fails to appear for the match. However, wrestler receiving forfeit must be dressed in wrestling uniform and must appear at mat.

NEUTRAL POSITIONS When neither wrestler has control of the other.

OUT-OF-BOUNDS

Wrestlers are considered in bounds if supporting parts of either wrestler are inside the boundary lines. Supporting parts are the parts of the body touching the mat which bears the wrestlers weight, other than those parts with which he is holding his opponent. Wrestling shall continue as long as the supporting parts of either wrestler remain in-bounds, however, nearfall or fall may be earned only while shoulder(s) of defensive wrestler are in bounds.

STALEMATE

When wrestlers are **interlocked** in a position other than a pinning situation in which **neither** wrestler can improve his position.

Now let us consider penalty points on the things that a wrestler should not do. These come, for main part under two categories. First, illegal holds and unnecessary roughness which is for the safety of the wrestlers. Second, technical violations. These are put in for the main part to discourage the wrestlers from being purely defensive. The rule whereby the wrestler in the position of advantage cannot lock his hands or arms around his opponent's body or both legs, unless his opponent has all of his weight supported entirely on his feet or has him in a pinning situation is an example. Such things as leaving mat with outpermission, delaying match, intentional forcing opponent off mat, intentional going off mat, stalling and grasping clohing are all considered technical violations. Illegal holds are such things as the hammerlock above the right angle; the twisting hammerlock; front headlock; headlock without the arm; the straight head scissors (even though the arm is included); overscissors; flying mare with the palm up, full (double) nelson; strangle holds; all body slams; toe holds; twisting knee lock; key lock; overhead double arm bar; the bending, twisting, or forcing of the head or any limb beyond its normal limits of movement; locking the hands behind the back in a double arm bar from a neutral position and any hold used for punishment alone.

The referee shall caution the user of a potentially dangerous hold in order to prevent possible injury. Such holds should be stopped by the referee, if possible, before reaching the dangerous stage.

Penalties are awarded as follows:

*Note: One warning is given for stalling, but not for other infractions.

If a wrestler is guilty of flagrant misconduct, he is disqualified on first offense and one team point is deducted. If wrestler is guilty of abusive and/or unsportsmanlike conduct, no warning is given and one team point is deducted. If such action occurs a second time, wrestler is removed from the premises.

It is the responsibility of contestants, officials and coaches to avoid the use of stalling tactics or allowing the use thereof and action is to be maintained throughout he match by the contestants making an honest attempt to stay in the circle and to wrestle aggressively whether on the top, bottom, or neutral positions. This concept shall be demonstrated by those responsible with strict enforcement by officials.

EACH MATCH IS OF 8 MINUTES DURATION WITH PERIODS of 2 - 3 - 3. The referee will allow a maximum time-out of 3 minutes which is cumulative throughout the match for injury or equipment problems. No time-out is allowed for rest or consultation.

First period starts with both wrestlers neutral or standing — Second period starts with one wrestler in the position of advantage — Third period starts with the other wrestler in the position of advantage.




