

Some Facts About OSU

Oregon State University is the oldest state supported institution of higher learning in Oregon and has celebrated its 100th birthday. It is one of the nation's larger land-grant schools, started by the Morrill Act of 1862. Over 100 major buildings are located on the 400 acre main OSU campus. Some 4,000 acres adjoining the main campus are owned and used by the University for research and instruction, and 24,000 acres more are utilized by Branch Experiment Stations for research. The School of Forestry owns and administers 14,300 acres of forest land within seven miles of the campus. The value of the University is estimated at approximately \$75,000,000.

Oregon State University is a growing institution. It not only has its largest enrollment ever of over 14,000, but has one of the largest building programs ever. The new James Kerr Library, Forestry Lab, Radiation Center, United State Government Water Research Lab., Pharmacy Building, Extension, Oceanography Building, Microbiology Center and 4 new dorms, are a few of the newer buildings on campus. Buildings presently under construction include a new Administrative complex, Forestry Center, and one new dorm.

Oregon State University offers a wide variety of courses within the areas of Engineering, Business, Pharmacy, Forestry, Science, Agriculture, Home Economics, Humanities and Social Sciences, and Education. Oregon State's oceanography research program is one of the best in the nation and the oceanography teaching program ranks fourth nationally. The 800 ton research vessel "Yaquina" operates out of OSU's Marine Science Laboratory at Newport, Oregon. OSU offers 125 fields of study in 11 schools and divisions. Masters degrees are offered in 100 fields and doctor of philosophy degrees in 75 fields.

Oregon State University's location in a smaller community (Corvallis' population is about 35,000), is truly a blessing. Student activities are plentiful and well organized. Metropolitan areas usually pull the students away from their campuses for entertainment, but at Oregon State, life is on the campus. Educators say that this is one reason for the student's enthusiasm and interest for their school.

Oregon State University students have a wide range of religious denominations to choose from for their spiritual training. The Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Youth for Christ are among the religious youth groups active on campus.

Oregon State offers a variety of living accomodations for its students. The selection usually is either a fraternity or dormitory, but cooperative, religious and apartment living are also available.

Oregon State University offers young men outstanding ROTC programs. Students can elect to participate in any one of the major branches of the service, either on the basic or advanced level.

Oregon State University is located in an ideal position — just 50 miles from the Pacific Ocean, and even closer to winter sports skiing areas. Although the climate in the Willamette Valley is mild and seldom experiences snowfall, you are close o snow areas if you decide to visit them.

OSU Cross Country History

Cross Country had its start as a sport at OSU back in the 1930's when Coach Grant Swan fielded teams against Oregon Colleges and Universities.

In 1948 the University of Portland started one of the few invitational Cross Country meets that existed on the West Coast. This meet was open to any and all colleges and universities in the State of Oregon. Coach Swan's teams led by Beaver stars George Fullerton (later head coach) and Joe Fisher captured the meet title in 1948-49-50.

OSU Cross Country next went through a transitional stage with three coaches at the helm from 1951-57.

Next on the scene was Sam Bell who carried the Beavers into national competition. In 1961 OSU won the NCAA title with 68 points. OSU's Dale Story won individual honors in the 1961 meet and Richard Cuddihy placed 12th to make the All-American team. In the 1962 season the Beavers placed 8th in the NCAA Championships.

In 1965, Coach Berny Wagner took over and initiated intersectional meets. In 1966, with Tracy Smith placing second, the Beavers again were in the thick of the National championship picture with a seventh place finish.

During the past several years, OSU runners have competed on the desert in Tempe, Arizona, at Salt Lake City, Utah, in British Columbia, Kansas, Wyoming, and New York. This year Utah and the University of Houston are on the schedule.

Know Your Coaches

BERNY WAGNER Starting his sixth season as Head Track and Cross Country Coach, following a brilliant junior college coaching career at College of San Mateo. Coached 13 years in prep ranks in California, following graduation from Stanford where he was an 880 man. Attended and ran for Cal Tech in Pasadene, Stanford, and the S.F.O.C. Obtained B.A. degree in 1948, M.A. degree in 1949 from Stanford. Coach Wagner is married and has three children.

CHUCK McNEIL Now in his sixth season for OSU as an assistant to Coach Wagner. Chuck was a standout sprinter at Modesto J.C. and later at San Jose State College. His best marks included 9.6 in the 100, 20.8 in the 220 and 47.4 for the 440. Before coming to OSU Chuck was assistant track and field coach at Bakersfield Junior College in 1961-62 and Head Coach at South High in Bakersfield in 1963.

NEIL WEBBER, newly hired assistant coach, is a graduate of Milwaukie High School and received Bachelors and Masters Degrees from Lewis and Clark College in 1964 and 1969. He was Northwest Conference 880 Champion in 1961, and ran for the Oregon Track Club in 1965 and the Santa Monica Athletic Club under famed Hungarian Coach Mihai Igloi in 1967. Neil is single, and has been cross country and track coach at Fort Vancouver High School in Vancouver, Washington for the past three years.

Individual Profiles of Leading Runners

CHRIS CAREY - OSU Rook Record holder in the two mile, three mile, and steeplechase. Should be able to handle the collegiate distances better in this, his sophomore year.

PAT CAREY - A junior, last year's number seven man was a victim of mononucleosis last year, but seems fully recovered.

DOUG CROOKS - Illness kept Doug from reaching his high school track bests of 4:07.5 and 9:03.0 last spring, but he has had a good summer of work and should have a fine sophomore year.

GORDON CURRIE - A junior transfer from De Anza Junior College. Gordon is a fine cross country runner who should continue to improve.

LEONARD HILL - State of Oregon A-2 high school cross country champion and record holder.

JOHN LILLY - A heavy Forestry curriculum ruled out cross country last fall, so John has his senior season yet to come. Better known as a half miler, he has run 4:07.6 in the mile and can handle longer distances.

SPENCER LYMAN - Last year's number one man and OSU course record holder. One of only three seniors on the entire squad.

BOB McCARTY - Named the outstanding senior cross country runner in Northern California. This St. Francis of Mountain View runner was the Central Coast Section cross country champion. California high schools do not have a state cross country championship.

KEITH MUNSON - This will be Keith's junior year of competition. He last ran cross country in 1966 and track in the spring of 1967. He spent three years in the Army and now seems ready to resume a fine running career.

JEFF OVESON - State of Oregon B schools cross country champion has sub-fifty second speed in the quarter mile.

STEVE SQUIRES - One of the top seven last year. Stayed out of track last spring to concentrate on lab courses in his pre-med curriculum. He has had a good summer of running.

MIKE TOLSTAD - A junior from Blanchet high school in Seattle. Improved a great deal last year.

DENNIS WEED - Another of our sophomores who should be more accustomed to the four and six mile races which seemed so long in their freshman year. Has fine potential.

1970 FORECAST

by BERNY WAGNER OSU HEAD COACH

Last year the Oregon State Varsity consisted of three freshmen, two sophomores, and two juniors. There is no reason to believe that the top seven won't remain the same with an extra year of experience and maturity, but it is possible that some newcomers will win a place in the top seven. The outlook, therefore, is for a stronger team than the 1969 version.

Spencer Lyman, last year's number one man finished his season by running a new course over the four mile OSU course. He became the first man to run under 20 minutes on the difficult Avery Park layout, breaking the records set by Olympians Tracy Smith and Gerry Lindgren. Spencer has since run two miles in 8:47.4 indoors, and three miles in 13:52.8. Chris Carey, number two man last year for most of the season set a Rook course record at home, breaking Lyman's previous freshman standard. Chris also set three freshman distance records for OSU before succumbing to mononucleosis last spring. Others returning from last year's top seven are Steve Squires, Mike Tolstad, Pat Carey, Dennis Weed, and Doug Crooks.

Some promising newcomers are junior college transfer Gordon Currie from Saratoga, California; Leonard Hill, a freshman from Phoenix, Oregon; Bob McCarty, the top high school cross country runner from Northern California, and Jeff Oveson, a freshman from Wallowa, Oregon. Hill, McCarty, and Oveson were all winners in the toughest competition in their high school cross country schedules whether that was a section or a state championship.

Some returnees of note are John Lilly, 1:48.3 half miler who did not run cross country last year but will give it one last fling, and Keith Munson returned from three years of Army duty including one and one-half years in Viet Nam. Keith was the number three man on the 1966 OSU team which placed seventh in the nation during his sophomore year.

The attractive schedule this year including meets with the University of Utah and the trip to the University of Houston in Texas, plus an eager group of improving runners should add up to an interesting and successful season.
