

FRANK MORRIS Mens Cross-Country Coach

The highly-regarded new track and cross country coach is Frank Morris, who was an assistant at the University of Oregon since 1974. He succeeds Steve Simmons who resigned after a three-year stint at OSU.

Morris is a 1951 graduate of Medford high school where he was a star in football, basketball and track. He is a former state record holder in the high and low hurdles, and his record in the highs stood for eight years.

Frank competed in track as a freshman at Washington before transferring to Oregon and earning his B. S. degree in Education. He also picked up his masters from Oregon in 1972.

Morris was im charge of many groups at Oregon, including weights, hurdles, jumpers and decathlon people. He has coached some of the top athletes in each area. Among his top weight men was Mac Wilkins, 1976 Olympic champion in the discus and former world record holder.

Frank has gained the respect of those he trains. A former member of an Oregon team said Morris was his primary inspiration in athletics., "because he is the only person tough enough to make me throw as far as I can."

Some of the other well-known products of Morris include Craig Brigham, decathlon, who scored over 8,000 points, and a pole vaulter, Tom Hintnaus, who finished second in an NCAA meet.

Morris is a member of the U. S. Olympic Development staff and was a coach for the west team in the first national Sports Festival. He was meet director for the 1979 Sports Festival.

Frank is the brother of Jack Morris, ex-University of Oregon football and track star. The Morris brothers rank high among the imposing list of prep standouts coming out of Medford high school.

PRANK MOKRIS Mens Cross-Country Cosch

The highly-regarded new track and cross country coach is Frank Morris, who was an assistant at the University of Oregon since 1974. He succeedes Sheve Sissons who resigned after a three-year stint at OSU.

WOMENS CROSS-COUNTRY COACH

Will Stephens, womens head cross-country coach at Oregon State University, has won recognition at both the local and international level.

Having coached such notables as Kathy Weston, Kathy Hammond and Evelyn Ashford, all members of the U.S. Olympic teams, his name appears brightly on the select list of coaches in America. He also has been western region coach for the U.S. Olympic committee's first national sports festival held in Colorado Springs.

Stephens became head coach at OSU in 1977 and led the Beavers to one of their best seasons in years. The cross-country team qualified for the national championships for the first time. In 1978, OSU posted a 3-2 dual meet record, and one of the wins was over Washington State.

Stephens, a native Oregonian, spent 18 years in Sacramento before returning to his home territory. He coached at award-winning Encina high school in Sacramento and was coach of the AAU team called "Will's Spikettes."

Under his leadership, the "Spikettes" captured nine national cross-country age group championships and one track and field national crown. Since 1959, he has coached 33 individual varsity conference champions and eight individual performers who have represented the U. S. in international competition. He has helped coach American AAU teams against the Russians, British Commonwealth and in world games for the deaf. Just this past summer, he coached in France, and Montreal in connection with the World Cup. He was womens assistant coach. He completed work on his master's degree from the University of San Francisco in 1977.

He was in the Marine Corps in World War II, and later served in the Korean war. He has written a book on techniques for track, and has prepared films and guides for the National Athletic Institute.

Oregon State University is indeed fortunate to have him at the helm.

He entered Oregon State university in 1968 with a major in Science History. In the decathlon, Lucas scored 6,785 points. His best marks were 14.9 in high hurdles, 206-10 in the javelin, 6-6% in the high jump, 148-4 in the discus. He was third at the Pacific-8 conference meet in 1975 and sixth in the PAC-8 in 1974.
