

ATHLETIC STAFF

ROY S. "SPEC" KEENE, athletic director at OSC, is one of those rare individuals whose name always has been synonomous with success-whether as a college athlete, public citizen, coach, businessman or head man in Oregon State's vast expanding

athletic program.

As top administrator in the athletic department, he must make decisions that affect the future of OSC athletics for years to come In every case, Keene has used his great experience wisely, and through his efforts Oregon State now has one of the most sound athletic programs in the country-not to mention one of the outstanding all-round sports plants to be found anywhere.

Under Keene's leadership and planning, OSC built a beautiful basketball Coliseum that seats 11,000 fans. Five years ago, again with Keene at the helm, Parker stadium for football was constructed. The stadium can accommodate 28,000 spectators and ties in perfectly with Keene's wish for a separate field for each separate sport."

It was no wonder that Oregon Staters from all walks of life staged a night in his honor at the OSC-USC football game in Portland last fall. They called it "Ten Keene Years," in refer-

ence to his 10 years as OSC athletic director.

Keene has always been an Oregon Stater, in one way or another. He was student body president here, becoming head coach at Corvallis high following graduation. His next step up was that of assistant coach for the Beavers, where he remained until 1926.

At that time, "Spec" became head football coach at Willamette university in Salem, where he also served as athletic director. His Bearcat grid elevens completly dominated the Northwest conference for 15 years and many players won little all-America berths. He's almost as much of an institution to Willamette as he is to Oregon State.

Keene was in the army in World War I, and in the navy as a lieutenant-commander in World War II. For years, he was on the state of Oregon parole board. In 1947, he replaced Percy Locey as athletic director at OSC and has been on the job ever

since.

JIM BARRATT, athletic business manager, is Keene's righthand man in all phases of the athletic program. He has the rugged task of trying to keep all ticketseekers happy and works overtime to accomplish that goal. Firm in his belief that good public relations are vital to any program, Jim wears a big smile at all times and is patience personified. No customer is too big or too small to escape Barratt's undivided attention. Originally from Heppner, he graduated from OSC in 1950 and became assistant alumni director. Jim left that post at the close of the 1951 football season campaign for his present job and has remained there ever since. He is a navy veteran of World War II and assists with coaching the Beaver golf team.

Bill Neland, adminstrative assistant, is "Mr. Versatile" of the athletic department. He does everything, and does it well. In short, he's the top troubleshooter for the department, spending three-fourths of his time with Jim Barratt and one-fourth of it with John Eggers. Witty and intelligent, Bill has an answer for almost any question or problem that arises. He came to OSC as a student in the fall of 1947, prior to military service with the Marine Corps. One of those three military years was spent in war-torn Korea. Bill returned to OSC after discharge and joined the staff on a full-time basis three years ago.

BILL ROBERTSON, athletic trainer, is fast-becoming an institution in himself at OSC. For 11 years, he's headed the tape-brigade here and in that time probably has come to know more athletes better than anyone else in the department. Extremely adept at poetry and humorous recitations, Bill is oft called upon for bits of oratory at both private and public functions. Beaver coaches praise him as one of the top trainers in the nation. After service in Italy and the Aleutians in World War II, Bill returned to OSC and has long been one of the

most popular members of the Corvallis community. JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, is now in his 8th football season or the staff at OSC, the last six of which under his present title. Eggers took over the job on July 1, 1952, after serving two years as assistant to his predecessor, Irwin Harris. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later became an OSC all-American. He played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSC from the fall of 1946 through the spring of 1949. Eggers worked for a year as sports writer for The Oregonian in Portland before returning to his alma mater.

HEAD BASEBALL COACH

Ralph O. Coleman

A total of 377 victories against only 219 defeats in 27 seasons of coaching.

Past president of the American Association of College Base-

ball coaches.

One of the best known-and best respected-coaches in the nation.

That's Ralph Coleman, Oregon State's venerable baseball coach, who starts his 28th season as the helm this spring. He's known as the "Silver Fox" to northern division baseball followers and is one of the real competitors among coaching ranks.

Although this will mark his 28th campaign as Beaver headman, "Coley" has been around the school much longer than that. From the time he started coaching at OSC in 1924, he has been on the scene almost continuously, except for a brief six-year stint from 1932 through 1937 when press of other campus duties forced him to temporarily give up baseball.

Coleman was a native of Canby, attending high school there. He was at OSC in the years 1914-1918, with service as a lieutenant in the army during World War I spaced in between. He was discharged from service in December 10, 1918, returning to become coach and physical education director at Corvallis

high in 1919.

The P. E. department lured Coleman in June of 1919, and he has remained there ever since. Three years ago, hundreds of his ex-players and friends staged a testimonal dinner for for Ralph on his 25th anniversary year at coaching. He was presented with a beautiful TV set and other gifts.

As an athlete at OSC, Coleman was one of the school's all-

As an athlete at OSC, Coleman was one of the school's alltime bests. A great distance runner in track, he once ran the 440, 880, mile and two-mile in a meet against Oregon. His best time in the mile was 4:20, which at that time constituted a

school record.

Ralph led Oregon State to northern division crowns in 1940, 1951, 1952 and 1958. The Beavers tied for the top spot in 1938 and 1943. In 1952, they went all the way to a Pacific Coast conference and Western Regional NCAA championship. Last year, OSC lost a two-game PCC playoff to USC, the team that ultimately won the national crown.

An ex-professional pitcher in the Pacific Coast league, "Coley" has knack for developing pitchers and has turned out plently of good ones—men like Glen Elliott, Bailey Brem and Don White. Desire and hustle are two requisites Coleman insists on from his players, and through the years it has paid off in huge

dividends.

BASEBALL OUTLOOK

Good pitching, a fast outfield, experienced catching and an almost totally-inexperienced infield—that best describes Oregon State's 1959 baseball squad that will be out to defend its northern division championship won last year.

The mound help must come largely from a pair of sparkling southpaws who won eight of OSC's 10 conference victories in 1958 as sophimores. Gary Moore (5-0) and Ray Lunde (3-1) did the trick a year ago, and have looked mighty impressive in

drills this spring. Trying to find some depth behind them is one

of Coach Ralph Coleman's biggest problems.

There's no worry in the catching department, for two-year veteran Dan Luby can go with the best. He has a bullet-arm, knows how to handle pitchers and potentially is a .300 plus hitter.

Speed is the keynote of Coleman's outfield, where four lettermen will cavort. Co-captain Kim Bradshaw, a senior, will be in left, with junior Jerry Droscher in right. Droscher was an all-tournament choice with the Drain club that won the national semi-pro tournament last summer. In center, it will be either Grimm Mason or Bob Berreman—both junior fly-chasers and both good hitters.

The infield may be one of the most enexperienced Coleman ever has coached, for he lost practically everyone through graduation or other channels. Gone is Gene Bates, all-league first baseman who turned pro, and also missing are Twink Pederson, Jim Phillips and Tom Bowen. So the Beavers must start from

scratch there.

Carlo Petroni, a hustling transfer from Lassen JC in California, looks good at shortstop, and another transfer, Rene Moye, from Shasta JC, may take over at first base. Third base goes to Bill Wagner and sophomore Gary Baker probably has the inside track at second. Other top infielders are Bruce Day and Larry Walker.

Oregon State finished second in league standings four out of the last five years before winning the title last year; in fact, teams under "Coley" seldom finish lower. Chances are the 1959 Beavers will be in the thick of the race right up to the final wire, though Washington State and Oregon are sure

to be strong.

The Cougars have virtually the same club back that finished just a shade behind OSC last year, and Don Kirsch at Oregon has a habit of making it tough for the others. All in all, it looks like a close northern division race—which would be normal rather than an exception to the rule.

N. D. Pitching 1958

Two lefthanders-Oregon's Don Lane and Oregon State's Gary Moore-topped northern division pitchers for the 1958 season. Each compiled a 5-0 won and lost record and Lane also pitched the league's only no-hitter, against Idaho. He had a fine 2.02 earned run average through the 40 innings he worked. The

Duck senior struck out 35 and walked only 17.

Moore, a stylish sophomore, hurled 45 innings, whiffed 34, walked 19 and compiled a 3.39 ERA. It was a good year for sophomores, generally. In addition to Moore, OSC had Ray Lunde with a 3-1 mark; WSC had Dick Montee, 4-2, Bob Boling-broke, 2-0 and Elwood Hahn, 3-2. Lunde had the league's best ERA among starters at 1.95. He hurled 41 innings and allowed only nine earned runs. He struck out 22 and walked the same number of batters.

HEAD TRACK COACH

Sam Bell

If success can be measured in terms of personality, integrity and vast knowledge of a chosen profession, Sam Bell is off to a good start in his new role as Oregon State's head track coach.

Sam has all those attributes, plus a good many more, and he's a man who likes a challenge. He knows well that OSC's track and field program has sagged in recent years, but he wanted the chance to raise it back on the high pedestal it belongs.

The 31-year old cinder expert was born at Columbus, Missouri, but attended high school both at Giltner and Aurora, Nebraska, where he was a four-sports star in football, basketball, baseball and track. He went on to Doane college in Crete,

Neb., where he continued his football and track.

Bell's first prep coaching job was at Wymore, Neb., in the years 1950 through 1952. He had previously been in the navy in 1945 and 1946, before attending Doane. Then he moved west and did a top-notch job with prep teams at Central high of Monmouth-Independence, just north of Corvallis. He coached two league championship teams at Central and was second in his district twice.

At Cottage Grove high, from 1956 through 1958, Sam developed the top prep miler in the nation's history, Dyrol Burleson. After running the mile in 4:13.2, a national high school record, Burleson clipped off a 4:11.4 last summer after gradu-

ation.

While at Central, Sam's teams lost only one dual meet, and at Cottage Grove dropped only two—one of which was avenged by beating South Eugene. They were winners at the Hayward Relays three times, twice at Cottage Grove and once at Central. Sam Bell developed a winning complex in those prep years he hopes can carry on at OSC.

The handsome young mentor and wife Fran have four children, Laurie 5, Julie 4, Betsy 2 and Scott, 3 months. They

are all welcome residents to the Corvallis community.

When the OSC track coaching job was open early last summer, some 34 applicants were reviewed. Bell won out, and with the selection went the good wishes of Oregon Staters everywhere.

TRACK OUTLOOK

Nobody expects miracles of Sam Bell in his first season as Oregon State track coach.

After all, one doesn't take on a perpetual loser and develop a champion overnight. It will take time to rebuid Oregon State's track and field program that for some reason has sagged badly in recent years, but Beaver sports followers feel that if anyone can eventually get the job done—it's Sam Bell.

Not much is expected of OSC's 1959 thinclads this spring. The Beavers could be stronger than a year ago, when they won only one northern division meet, but not much stronger.

One bright spot is the return of Wayne Moss, best high jumper in OSC history who laid out of competition last year after ruling as N. D. champion the year previous. Moss leaped 6 feet 8-34 inches while competing unattached at the state AAU meet last summer, his all-time best effort, but has failed to reach that level in early workouts this spring.

Another returning veteran who could win his share of points is Cliff Cordy. OSC 880-record holder at 1:52.9. Cordy may also take a try at the mile for the first time. He has the ability to run with the best, but in the past has lacked the competitive spirit so necessary to greatness. Bell may be able to change that.

Other lettermen on hand are Doug Ballew and Ron Miller, pole vault; Bob Darling, javelin; Duane Marshall, shotput; Oalter Skowhede, and Dick Lee. hurdles; and Don Fergusson, distances. As anyone can see, Bell hasn't much nucleus to build around.

Several sophomores look promising, foremost of which is Darrell Horn, a broad-jumper from Pilot Rock. Horn has leaped 25 feet 5½ inches in competition, 24 feet 5 inches in practice. Sprinter Amos Marsh, too, may win ponts as a sophomore. He has run the 220 in :21.6.

All in all, however, the outlook is anything but bright. Oregon State had a good freshman squad last spring, as first-year outfits go, but not too many are ready to make their way easily in the tough northern division circle. Bell will have to feel hs way along at present, do the best he can and hope for a strong freshman contingent next September. He will need the support of Oregon States everywhere.

TENNIS OUTLOOK

For the first time in years Coach Irwin Harris will open a season with a decidedly pessimistic attitude regarding his varsity tennis squad. Last year's Beaver team very possibly was the strongest in the school's history, but two of the top three performers from that squad are gone and no capable replacements are in sight.

Jimmie Jackson, probably the finest tennis player ever to represent Oregon State and runner-up for the consolation singles crown in the NCAA national tournament at Annapolis last summer, has gone on to dental school and Tom Cottle, the standout sophomore No. 3 man, has been suspended from school for academic reasons—a rare occurrence in tennis.

To make matters worse, Bill Jacobson, the No. 1 man on last year's Rook team and a fine varsity prospect, transferred to

Washington.

The 1959 squad will be built around Capt. Paul Skvarna, a senior who already ranks as one of the finest college players in the Pacific Northwest. As a junior ast year he won 13 matches while losing only 3 during the regular season. He and Jimmie Jackson formed probably the best doubles combination in OSC history as they won 14 and lost 2 and then reached the third round of the NCAA tourney before losing in three sets to the Big Ten champions from Iowa. One of the biggest problems confronting Harris this spring is to find a suitable partner for Skvarna.

Other returning lettermen include Denny Todd, Ron Guenther and Ken Rayburn. All three of these men have been consistent winners in the 4 and 5 spots but will have to improve to winhigher up in the lineup. Best of the varsity reserves are Dick Stafford, who appears to have improved considerably over last year; and Dick Burke, a scrapper who could help.

The two most promising newcomers are Bob Dietsche, a transfer from Eastern Washington college; and Roy Stangeby, a steady winner as No. 2 man for the Rooks last spring.

Harris, who is starting his 15th season as coach, has compiled a record of 104 wins against 34 losses over a 14-year span.
