Know Your Coaches

GENE TANSELLI - HEAD BASEBALL COACH

A native of Portland (Oregon), he attended high school at Jefferson, graduating in 1947. An all-American prep shortstop, Tanselli enrolled at Oregon State in the fall of 1947 and starred on the OSU varsity in 1949-50-51. He was team captain his final year and won all-Western Regional NCAA honors. Following graduation in 1951, he played pro baseball with the Portland Beavers and San Diego Padres of the Pacific Coast League, Tulsa of the Texas League and Salem Senators of the old Western International League. Later he coached at Franklin High two years (Portland) and at Clark Junior College in Vancouver, Washington, four years before returning to OSU as an assistant coach and member of the physical education department. He has been back at OSU since 1962, but became head baseball coach in time for the 1967 season, when his Beavers compiled a fine 25-13 mark. In 1968 the Beavers were 23-13-1 and in 1969 they were 17-20-1. Last year OSU was 19-15 and placed third in the PAC-8 playoffs. Tanselli succeeded retiring Ralph Coleman, who had coached at OSU for 36 seasons.

PAUL VALENTI - TENNIS

Valenti, in his first year as OSU tennis coach, is no stranger to Oregon State sports, having been a student and then serving 24 years as part of the basketball coaching staff, six of those years as head coach. He was a standout tennis player as a youth but concentrated on basketball as a collegiate player.

Valenti isn't native to Oregon, but the state is quick to claim him by adoption. He came to Corvallis as a freshman basketball star out of Larkspur, California, in the fall of 1938. With the exception of Navy service in World War II, he has been on the campus ever since. He led the freshmen to an undefeated season and then starred three years as a regular on the varsity.

After serving as basketball assistant coach for 18 years, Valenti stepped up to the head coaching chores when Slats Gill became athletic director in 1964. His six year total while head coach was 85-74 and included a Pacific-8 conference championship in 1966. That year he was named "Coach of the Year" for the West Coast, and was selected at the Hayward Banqet as the Slats Gill "Man of the Year".

In addition to his tennis coaching duties, Valenti is assistant to the athletic director.

KARL DRLICA - CREW

Drlica has been crew coach at Oregon State since 1950, although the sport is only in its third season as a major sport at OSU. Previously, crew was under the jurisdiction of the Recreation program. Drlica, a native of Juneau, Alaska, moved to Portland as a youth and attended Benson High School. He is a 1940 graduate of Oregon State and from 1946 through 1950 he held a civilian position with the U.S. military government in Japan. Since returning to OSU, Drlica has also received his Master's degree. Dividing his time between coaching OSU's crew team and teaching physical education classes in crew and other water related activities, Drlica is very active in promoting crew competition throughout Oregon.

JIM JARVIS - GOLF

Jarvis, one of Oregon State's greatest athletes, in his first year as golf coach. A three sport athlete in high school and college, Jarvis played basketball at Oregon State from 1963-1965 and and at the same time played baseball and some golf when he could find the time.

He excelled in all three and made the Helms Foundation All-American (basketball) team in his senior year, 1965. He was leading scorer in the Pacific-8 conference that season and also became the highest scoring guard in OSU history with 1,142 points over a career. He was All-Pacific Coast and All-Western Regional NCAA.

Jarvis was also a regular second baseman much of his baseball career and over his three years as a varsity player he hit .345. His senior year he was chosen as one of 10 outstanding seniors at Oregon State and as the outstanding senior athlete, winning the Buzz Randall Award. Following graduation, Jarvis played two years in the ABA pro basketball circuit.

He was an all-stater at Roseburg in his prep days and was one of the most sought after by colleges when he finished his prep career. His father, Curt, was head basketball coach at Roseburg at the time.

Jarvis is currently working on his master's degree in guidance and couseling and has helped with the basketball program, in addition to his golf duties.

He was all-league in football and honorable mention in basketball in addition to his baseball exploits. Co-captain as a senior in 1968 at Hillsboro. Hit .389 in semi-pro ball last summer and in two years of American Legion ball, hit over .300.

Fantastic season for Beavers as a freshman last year, hitting over .300 and making Riverside Collegiate Baseball all-tourney team. Became an outfield regular from the start. Arrived at OSU on a football scholarship and played freshman ball as a quarterback but has decided to concentrate on baseball. A three sport prep star at McLane High in Fresno, California. Made All-City two years, was outstanding high school athlete as a senior and after graduation, was drafted by Oakland. Averaged over 10 points a game during senior basketball season and lettered twice. In football, won three letters, named to All-City team as a senior, played in the Shrine game and was named outstanding player at McLane High. Played on 1966 Babe Ruth team that went to Western Regionals and in 1968 played on American Legion team in California regionals. Last summer played ball in Fresno and hit .340. Next summer may play for Fairbanks Gold Panners in Alaska.

Facts About Crew

Course lengths depend on the water available, but generally vary from 7/8 mile to three miles. The Olympic distance is 2,000 meters (just over $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles). The average eight-man shell travels at 11-14 miles per hour with the stroke varying between 28 and 44 per minute.

An eight-man shell weighs about 280 pounds and is 58-62 feet long, with a width of 24 inches. The average oar weighs 8.5 pounds, is 12 feet long and is made of spruce.

Coxswain of a heavyweight boat weighs between 105 and 135 pounds, while the oarsmen weight between 175 and 200 pounds and stand 6-0 to 6-6.
