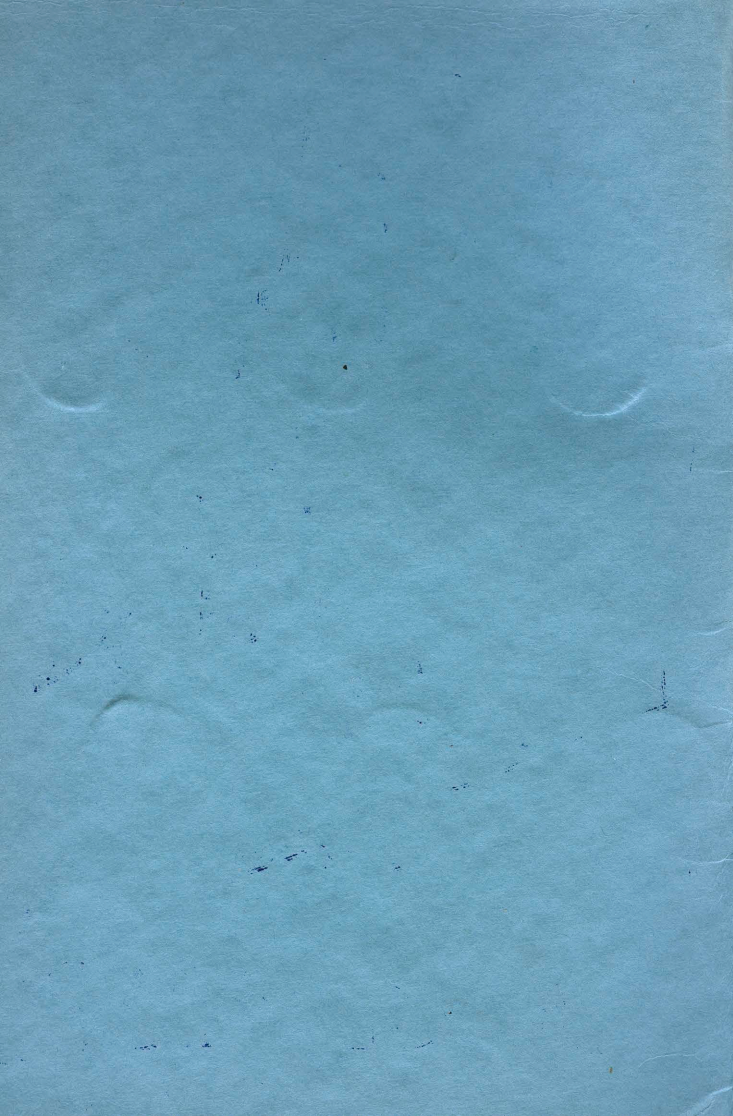

Religious Groups

If you aspire to be a platter flipper, radio singer, "emoter," script writer, or sound effects man, sign up for campus broadcasts over at KOAC in the physics building. Auditions are scheduled any morning before 10 o'clock by appointment.

Musical Organizations

O.K., you shower sopranos, you don't have to be an opera star to cue in for Madrigal, women's singing organization, and you get an hour's credit as an extra dividend. There is also a chance that

you might be chosen for membership in Euterpe, the honor society for exceptional songbirds.

Or if you prefer the instrumental angle, sign up for the Co-ed Band or the college symphony and toot your horn all you wish.

Forensics

Perhaps you are better at the "gift of gab." Then devote time and energy to a few speech courses and specialize in oratory, debate, or extempore speech. Delta Sigma Rho will be your reward for exceptional performance. This national forensics honor society fosters intercollegiate and intramural speech contests.

Home Economics

The Home Ec club is first on the dial for domestic girls who choose this field as a major. It has varied activities to suit many interests such as the rummage sale, various teas, the "Calling Mrs. Oregon" broadcast, and such. Dues money goes for a foreign exchange student.

Then in your junior year, if you have been outstanding in your work in home economics, you will be given a place in Omicron Nu, the home-makers honor society.

Physical Education

It's no flash bulletin that you don't have to be muscle bound to like athletics. Those of you who like sports and athletic activities will probably be around when the Women's Athletic Association

calls. There are ample facilities for you to show your prowess in the intramural sports. The Physical Education club opens its doors to all majors and minors in P. E., and Orange O is a goal to head for, as it's an organization for all junior and senior women outstanding in sports. Membership in Parthenia, local physical education honor organization, will be your reward if you are outstanding in the field.

If you like to take to the hills, go with the Hooper's club, which is open to anyone.

Then there's an Orchesis membership which awaits those whose specialty is modern dance. One highlight of Women's Weekend is their annual dance recital.

Social Organizations

We bring you greetings from the various social organizations on the campus.

Phrateres aims to promote friendliness and welcomes you co-eds to its meetings. Greater Halls Council is composed of the officers of the women's dormitories. The Co-Resident Women's Council names the officers of the seven women's cooperative houses on its roster.

The Panhellenic council is on hand with a representative from each sorority to control rushing and to foster smooth sorority relations.

The Nurses' club offers an opportunity for you to share your interests with others if you are in the medical field.

Several national organizations are represented at Oregon State such as Mu Beta Beta, the 4-H honorary; the O.S.C. Grange; Teminids, the campus Eastern Star organization; and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Honor Societies

Finally we switch you to our brain-trust station for a brief resume.

Study hard your freshman year, and you will be eligible for Alpha Lambda Delta, national sophomore women's honor society. The requirements for this are a 3.5 grade point average for two terms, or a 3.33 grade point average for your entire freshman year.

And if you do make those grades your freshman year, you will probably receive a Phi Kappa Phi freshman award of recognition. If you are still outstanding in your junior year, perhaps you will be tapped for membership in this all-school national scholastic honor organization.

You'll be seeing a lot of the Talons, the sophomore women's service honor society. They will be on hand to keep you on the straight and off the grass. If you obey the rules and are check plus on scholarship, cooperation, and school spirit, you may become one of them in your sophomore year.

Right at the top of your ambitions is Mortar Board, national honor society for outstanding senior women. Junior class leaders in scholarship and service are tapped for this society at the Women's Weekend convo.

Official Bulletins from Supreme Headquarters

Although Joseph Petrillo doesn't tell us what music we can or can't broadcast or the FCC doesn't restrict our campus program, we do have our rules and regulations to be obeyed. And make no mistake, you'll be put off the air unless you keep to script specifications!!

The administrative offices draw up most of the general rules and you'll find that they make for the best conditions for uninterrupted broadcasts of fun and fancy. Standards Committee, composed of the presidents of all women's living groups, discusses and passes on special rules as they are brought up from term to term. They are the "direct wire" from the dean of women's office to each living group and bring back the news from their twice monthly meetings.

Check carefully!—

Closing Hours

Freshman women—7:30 p.m. closing hour for Monday, through Thursday—fall term only.

Special—during Freshmen Week closing hour for all women will be 10 o'clock, Monday through Thursday.

Upperclassmen and Sophomores—Sunday through Thursday, closing hour 10 p.m.; lights out at 11:30 in residence halls. Friday and Saturday, closing hour 12 o'clock and lights out at 12:30.

Saturday and Sunday afternoons and evenings are open to men callers. Monday through Fridays men may call between 4 and 6 p.m.

The night before a holiday has the same closing hour as a Saturday night.

Closed week end begins after the last scheduled class on Friday afternoon before finals. Closing hours are 12 o'clock. Exam week hours are the regular time. Individual houses usually make special restrictions about study hours during exam week. All house entertaining is banned and all efforts are concentrated on making study conditions the best possible. Dates are limited by each living group. Students are expected to leave the campus as soon as exams are completed.

Social Functions

Scheduling—organized social events involving men and women are scheduled in the office of the dean of women over a two-week period as follows:

Hours—all social functions shall close at 11:30 on Friday and Saturday evenings. Closing hours for women shall be extended to 12:15 a.m. on the nights of all-college social functions. (Note: An all-college social function is one open to all members of the student body.)

Closing hours for women on the night of Mortar Board Ball shall be 12:30 a.m.

No dances or other organized events are scheduled for Sundays. However, there may be informal dancing in women's living groups between 5 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Chaperone cards—must be signed by the chaperone in person. Cards must be filed in the office of the dean of women by Tuesday noon preceding the weekend in which the event is to be held. A fine of \$2.50 will be due to accompany chaperone cards filed later than Tuesday noon. Cancellation of the event is the penalty for filing cards later than Wednesday noon.

Approved events—lists of approved social events are sent each weekend to the hostesses of women's houses.

As a matter of good taste at OSC, women do not go to men's residences except to attend scheduled social events.

Town Permission

Signing out—Women leaving the houses after 6 p.m. on Monday through Saturday and after 2 p.m. on Sunday will sign out with the housemother and check off with her the time of return.

Overnight permission—a woman student may not spend the night in Corvallis in any other than her own residence except under the following conditions:

Permission slip—any woman wishing to leave Corvallis for overnight with her parent may have her parent obtain permission from the housemother.

Pledge permission—pledges wishing to spend the

night in the sorority house should sign out on a special slip.

Out-of-Town Permission

Permission slip—Women wishing to leave the campus must have on file with the dean of women a permanent permission slip signed by her parent or guardian. Permission slips must be signed by the dean of women for coeds leaving the campus for destinations other than home. Housemothers sign slips for those going home.

Changing Residence

College women shall not change residence without a written statement issued by the dean of women to the housemother or householder.

Miscellaneous

Upperclassmen and Freshmen privileges—shall be designated by each individual living group.

Telephone—Calls are usually discouraged during study hours, 7:30-10 p.m., and during the dinner hour. However, each house makes its own regulations concerning telephone calls.

Smoking—to reduce fire hazard, there will be no smoking in women's living organizations except in rooms provided and furnished for that purpose.

Initiations—sorority initiations are scheduled in the office of the dean of women.

House guests—are expected to conform to all house regulations and their hostesses are held responsible for their conduct.

Any living group may make these rules more rigid, but may not make them more lenient. Exceptions may be made ONLY by the dean of women.
