OREGON STATE HEAD COACH TODD ROLFES

Oregon State head coach Todd Rolfes was hired just before the 1989-90 fall season, and has had a big impact on the golf program since his arrival.

Rolfes is originally from Mapleton, Iowa, where he grew up and attended Maple Valley High School, before heading west.

In 1979 Rolfes went to Arizona, and decided to attend and play golf for Scottsdale Junior College in Scottsdale, Ariz. He attended S.J.C. through 1981, and then went on to work as an assistant professional at a golf course until 1985.

Rolfes then returned to school at Arizona State University and became an assistant coach there in 1987. In the fall of 1989, he was offered the job at Oregon State, and soon accepted the position at OSU as his first head coaching job.

He came to Oregon State with two goals. His short term goal was to make the Beavers competitive again, and has done that in just a season and a half. His long term goal is to lead Oregon State to a Pac-10 Championship.

His coaching philosophy is quite simple, and has definitely been effective. It is as follows: *"Use the game of golf to help each individual to mature and develop to be the best in whatever he chooses to do."*

Rolfes has also paid much attention to the academic life of the student-athlete. When he arrived he said that as important as it is to have successful players, seeing that they graduate with a degree is equally important. In addition to the strong academic support already offered by the university, Rolfes has set up stringent academic policies including study hall sessions exclusively for the golf team.

Integrity and respectability for Oregon State and the athletic programs are what Rolfes demands, and won't settle for anything less.



THE OREGON STATE GOLF PROGRAM

The success of the Oregon State golf program is attributed to the following six areas. Oregon State University believes continued emphasis in these areas will produce a national championship caliber team.

FACILITIES: The OSU golf team has unlimited privilege at the university owned Trysting Tree Golf Club. Trysting Tree is located 5 minutes from campus and offers the best university practice facilities in the country. In addition, OSU plays at seven other premier golf courses in the Mid-Valley area.

SCHEDULE: OSU competes in the Pac-10, which is considered to be the best golf conference in the country. As a result, each tournament offers Oregon State players the opportunity to compete against the best teams in the country on a regular basis.

COACHING: As a former teaching professional and member of a collegiate national championship team, coach Todd Rolfes has the knowledge and experience to help young men reach their golf potential and goals, both on and off the course.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT: The Corvallis area provides support to OSU athletics which is unparalleled in the collegiate golf world. Oregon State golf is a major benefactor of this support as illustrated by the success of several major fund raising tournaments in the Corvallis area to benefit the golf program.

WEATHER: Located in the Willamette Valley, between the Coastal Range Mountains and the Cascade Mountain Range, Corvallis offers the player a chance to practice and play year round.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT: The Oregon State University athletic department academic support system has been used as a model for several other universities across the nation. The OSU athletic department emphasizes the importance of the student-athlete obtaining a meaningful education and degree, and provides support toward this goal in numerous ways. Academic advisors are always on hand to help student-athletes develop meaningful curriculums and monitor progress on a regular basis. Tutoring and counseling are provided when necessary, and study halls are used on a weekly basis to provide individual attention to each student-athlete throughout the term.

1990 GOLF: MOVING UP THE LEADERBOARD

Senior Warren Vickers: "This could be the best team in the history of Oregon State golf."

This will be the second spring for the Oregon State golf team under head coach Todd Rolfes. He and the team have set a goal to finish in the top half of the Pac-10 Conference and qualify for the NCAA Championship tournament; two things an Oregon State golf team has yet to achieve.

Rolfes was hired just before the fall schedule of 1989, and immediately began implementing his system, which included a total commitment to recruiting and scheduling. He also added a team conditioning program and a team study hall, both hadn't had much attention before his arrival at Oregon State.

The effect Rolfes has had on the program can be easily recognized, starting with the Fall of 1990. Rolfes combined talent already existing at Oregon State with recruits he brought in, to lead the Beavers to a first, a second and two fifth place finishes in four tournaments.

The increase in top notch tournaments is also a result of Rolfes' connections and work in the off season. In fact, it is believed this year's schedule is the toughest in the history of this program.

Last fall Oregon State was scheduled in one of the toughest tournaments, outside of the Pac-10's, the UCLA Bruin Desert Classic. After the first day of the tournament the Beavers were in second place, only six shots back of Fresno State, and ahead of powerhouses such as UCLA, Hawaii and USC. Beaver junior Shane Jackson shot 70 in the first round and was in second place individually. In the second round the weather got tough, in Palm Springs of all places, and all schools dropped off considerably except for USC, who took over the lead. Oregon State fell to fifth, and the third round was cancelled due to the weather conditions.

The Beavers' tournament win last fall came at the Black Butte Invitational, in Black Butte, Ore. They did not play particularly well, but still won the tournament by 28 strokes. OSU senior Warren Vickers won medalist honors, finishing just ahead of teammate Ben Walter.

Oregon State kicks off the spring portion of the schedule very early this season with a January 21 trip to Santa Barbara, Cal., to compete in the 17-team Pacific Coast Intercollegiate. Highlighting the field in the tournament will be UCLA, USC, Cal and Oregon State. Coach Rolfes expects nothing less than a top five finish for the Beavers.

For the second year in a row, the Beavers will travel to Phoenix to compete in the Sun Devil/Thunderbird Golf Classic. The tournament is hosted by Arizona State, and is held on the Karsten Golf Course on campus.

Other key tournaments for the Beavers this spring will be the Southwestern Invitational in Westlake Village, Cal., the U.S. Intercollegiate in Palo Alto, Cal., and of course the Pac-10 Championships also in Palo Alto.

Rolfes believes despite the tough schedule this will be the season the Beavers will make it into the top half of the Pac-10. His keys to success rest largely on the top players in the program; Warren Vickers, senior from Lewiston, Ida., Ben Walter, sophomore from Menominee, Wisc., and Shane Jackson, junior from Saskatoon, Canada.

"Warren is a proven winner, and he needs to pick up where he left off in the summer and fall," says Rolfes. "He is a leader who always strives to win, and I can't ask anymore of him.

"Shane Jackson has done a lot of work coming off his National Junior College championship, and will definitely contribute to the program," says Rolfes. "Ben Walter has also been a pleasant surprise. We knew he had the ability to come through as a sophomore and it was just a matter of doing it.

"This will be the year we break into the top five of the Pac-10 Conference," says Rolfes. "Our fall performances put us in a position to qualify for the NCAA's. Quite honestly, the guys expect to qualify for the first time ever."

The highest an Oregon State golf team has finished in the Pac-10, since it became a 10-school conference in 1979, is a tie for fifth in 1984. Last season the Beavers finished in eighth place, the highest since 1986.

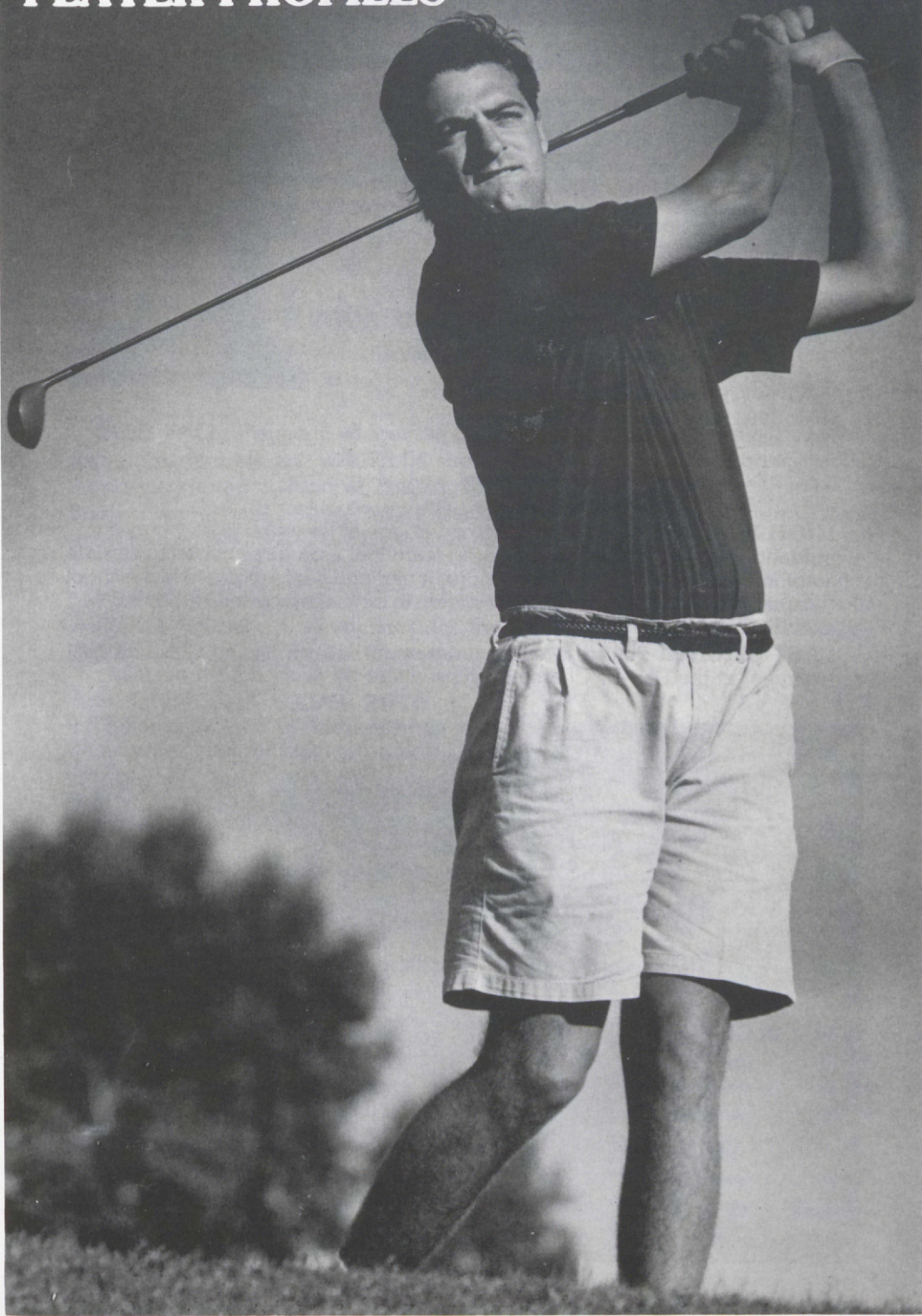
Senior team leader Warren Vickers believes this team is ready to challenge, and is by far the best team he has been on in his career at Oregon State. He even thinks this is the best team school history.

"We have the best team in the history of Oregon State golf," says Vickers. "We have three potential All-Americans, and have a good chance to make history by qualifying as a team to play in the NCAA's."

The predictions will likely have Oregon State picked low in the Pac-10 Conference, which is the toughest golf conference in the nation. Vickers and the rest of the team believe differently.

"We can do as well as second, and I expect to be in the top five," says Vickers. "That is a little misleading though, because just a few strokes can separate three or four teams in a tournament like the Pac-10 Championships."

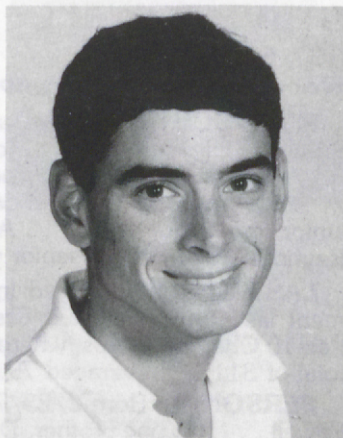

OSU: A UNIVERSITY FOR EVERYONE

Oregon State University, located in an attractive college town in Oregon's lush Willamette Valley within an hour's drive of both ocean beaches and the beautiful Cascade Mountains, and only 90 minutes from metropolitan Portland, is the perfect setting for academics and athletics. Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning, dating back to October 27, 1868, OSU was established as one of the nation's land grant colleges, receiving federal land grants to help launch its public education-service program.

Corvallis, with a mild climate that sees warm, pleasant summers and winters with only an occasional dusting of snow, quickly becomes a favorite "home away from home" for students and visitors alike.

From an initial graduating class of three in 1870, OSU now confers about 3,200 degrees each June. The 16,000 regular and 4,000 summer-term students enjoy a spacious 500-acre campus on which are located more than 100 major buildings. The summer campus is a showcase for vibrant azaleas and rhododendrons, and elegant tulip poplars and magnolias. Experimental farms, an arboretum and teaching-research forests, all located within a few minutes drive of the campus, make up an additional 18,000 acres.

The college of science and the college of liberal arts are the largest academic units. Other colleges include agricultural sciences, business, engineering, forestry, health and physical education, home economics, oceanography, pharmacy, veterinary medicine, and education.

Distinguished alumni reflect the diversity and excellence of OSU's academic programs. Dr. Linus Pauling, OSU chemistry graduate and twice winner of the Nobel Prize, recently made OSU the official repository for his papers and medals. Art department graduate Harley Jessup received an Oscar for special effects for the movie "Innerspace" at the 1988 Academy Awards.

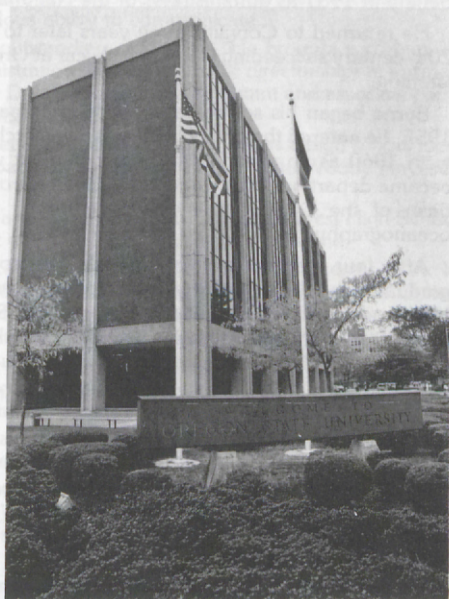
From OSU's food science department has come the maraschino cherry that tops your hot fudge sundae. And, over the last 15 years, food science research at OSU has resulted in a dramatic increase in the size of the wine grape industry in Oregon (from 10 to 70 wineries), and the industry has produced some world class wines, notably their pinot noir . . . one of many research efforts at OSU that have significantly impacted the Oregon economy. A reflection of Oregon's concern for the environment, the entomology department has been a leader in developing systems to control major insect pests on crops, thus reducing the use of pesticides.

There is something about the city of Corvallis — small and unencumbered, revolving around the university, yet conveniently possessing the "city life" — that makes it extremely attractive. You can experience a delightful lunch overlooking the Willamette River or savor continental cuisine before a warm fire. At night, enjoy dancing to live music or take in a movie or a concert.

You can stroll through one of Corvallis many parks or enjoy a game of golf or tennis at one of the city's public or private clubs. You can fish, boat, or water ski less than a block from downtown, bike along an extensive network of bicycle paths, or ski in the nearby Cascades.

Rarely will you find a community that will be more friendly and make you feel more welcome. The city is alive with an active, athletically minded populace whose relationship with Oregon State University is as secure and healthy as you will find in the nation.

One of the beautiful West Coast's few Division I schools with a college town atmosphere — **this is Oregon State University.**

Long before Dr. John Byrne was named president of Oregon State University in 1985, OSU's leader had taken an active interest in the role of athletics within the university.

He is a competitor himself and cherishes certain moments in his own athletic accomplishments. By his own admission, when his son shunned fishing for dirt biking as a recreational outlet, "to keep up with him, I had to buy one, too. I learned how to ride a dirt bike and had never been on a motorcycle before."

He fondly recalls his days as a reserve on the lacross team at Hamilton College ("The little things you remember — screening two opponents enabling us to score.") and also his progression through four years of intramural hockey ("learning how to skate, playing goalie as a freshman, left forward as a senior scoring a hat trick — again the little things you remember.").

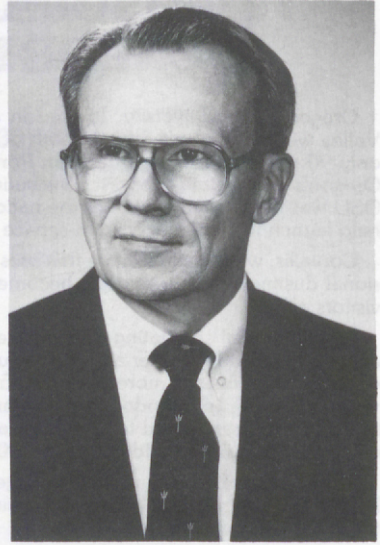
Byrne is familiar with the OSU campus and the Beaver athletic program. He spent 21 years at Oregon State before he was nominated by President Ronald Reagan and confirmed by the U.S. Senate in 1981 as administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

He returned to Corvallis three years later to lead the university into the latter portion of the 20th century succeeding Robert MacVicar at Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning.

Byrne began his science and teaching career as a laboratory instructor at USC in 1953. In 1955, he entered the private sector as a research geologist until he joined the Oregon State faculty in 1960 as an associate professor in what was then the department of oceanography. He became department chairman in 1963, was promoted to full professor in 1965 and was selected dean of the OSU school of oceanography in 1972 (the program is now the college of oceanography).

After four years as dean of research and, concurrently, one year as acting dean of the OSU graduate school, Byrne was appointed vice-president for research and graduate studies in 1980. His responsibilities included direction of the OSU research program, which then involved more than 800 separate projects with a total annual support base of \$40 million, and the graduate school with its 2,500 master's and doctoral students.

Byrne and his wife, Shirley, have four children, Donna, Karen, Lisa and Steve.

Dutch Baughman (pronounced Bock-man) was named the 10th athletic director in the history of Oregon State University athletics on April 30, 1990, succeeding Lynn Snyder. Dutch was promoted from senior associate athletic director, a position he started in October, 1989.

The hiring of Baughman was a very popular choice among Oregon State coaches and athletic department staff members. In his short tenure as senior associate director of athletics, he was very successful in improving the morale and overall operating procedures of the athletic department. While Baughman was hired as senior associate, his immediate task was to be primarily responsible for budget preparation and control, personnel, supervision of coaches for non-revenue sports and compliance with NCAA and conference regulations. Baughman, a stickler for detail, passed his first test with flying colors as the Oregon State athletic department completed the 1989-90 fiscal year with an athletic budget in the black for the first time in six years, and the credit has to go to Baughman.

Baughman's management style in his short tenure at Oregon State, has been very successful and one of the big keys to his success is his tremendous ability to communicate.

Dutch came to OSU in October, 1989 with outstanding credentials. He brought with him 16 years of previous experience in top athletic administration, including athletic directorships at Furman University (1979-83) and Virginia Tech in 1988. Dutch also served as assistant and associate commissioner of the Southwest Conference from 1983 to 1987.

In addition to his athletic administration experience, Dutch has also served as a high school football coach and as a graduate assistant football coach under the highly successful Woody Hayes at Ohio State University.

Although Dutch was born in Columbus, Ohio and graduated from Columbus West High School in 1967, he spent the majority of his adolescent years in Texas which he calls home.

Baughman earned his B.A. in Physical Education from Ohio State in 1971 and his M.A. in Athletic Administration from Ohio State in 1976. In addition, he spent six years on the United States Sports Academy's national faculty and he has completed additional graduate work toward a doctorate at Ohio State. Dutch is also a graduate of the Ranch Management Program at Texas Christian University in 1988.

After receiving his B.A., Dutch was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1971 as an infantry officer. He was discharged in 1974 with the rank of Captain.

In addition to being Athletic Director of Furman and Virginia Tech, Baughman also spent two years as an associate athletic director of Northwestern University from 1977 to 1979.

As an athlete, Dutch earned two letters in football as a linebacker, one in basketball as a guard and three in baseball as a catcher at Columbus West High School and he earned three letters in lacrosse at Ohio State and he was a member of the Ohio State University football team during his collegiate tenure, but he did not letter.

Dutch and his wife, Jacqueline, a former elementary teacher, have one son, Eric.

THE 1991 NIKE NORTHWEST COLLEGIATE CLASSIC

at Trysting Tree Golf Course

May 17-18, 1991

Trysting Tree Golf Course has been the sight of the very successful Nike Northwest Collegiate Classic for the past two years. The tournament started in 1989, when Oregon State finished it's own golf course, and finally had a place to hold an event such as this. Last year's tournament was much improved over the first year, and this year's promises to be that much better again.

U.S. International University won the first annual tournament, just edging out California and Oregon State, but it was Beaver Warren Vickers who won the medalist honors the first year, with a tournament record, 208.

In the 1990 tournament, the Oregon State team again finished third, this time behind California and Oregon. Warren Vickers and Mark Bolton led the Beavers with tournament totals of 223. Chris Holzgang of Oregon won the medalist honors, carding a 210.

Trysting Tree plays at nearly 7,000 yards the week of the tournament, and roughs are allowed to get deeper than usual. For the past two years a College-Am tournament has kicked off the festivities at Trysting Tree.

Top teams probable for this year's tournament include: Oregon State, Oregon, Stanford, Washington, and Washington State, to name a few.

TRYSTING TREE GOLF COURSE HOME OF THE BEAVERS

In the summer of 1988 Oregon State University opened its very own university golf course. It is located along a lazy curve of the Willamette River, just minutes from campus. Designed by noted architect Ted Robinson, Trysting Tree has been dubbed as one of the best public courses in the Pacific Northwest.

Robinson has transformed the gently rolling land into a unique layout. At first glance, it appears to be relatively wide open as there are not many trees on the first nine. However, the course has been laid out so that the few trees provided for tight landing areas or act as obstacles off the tee. In addition, the sand traps are blended in with large, grass-covered mounds around the small, undulating greens, so accuracy is required on all approach shots. The course also has a man made lake, which comes into play on several holes. Four sets of individually elevated tees allow the course to play at various lengths, ranging from 5,500 to over 7,000 yards.

The only thing missing from the course for the first two years was a club house and pro shop, and they were added last spring. Club pro Tom Ferrin runs a spacious pro shop, and dining is available next to the pro shop.

The addition of the university golf course is a great benefit to the OSU golf program. The team members finally are able to hone their game on a championship course and a quality practice area that is close to campus. Also, the team has access to the course for hosting collegiate tournaments and fund-raising events.

Trysting Tree is the sight of the Nike Northwest Collegiate Classic golf tournament each spring. This year will mark only the third men's collegiate tournament ever on this golf course.
