HOME OF THE BEAVERS -- TRYSTING TREE GOLF CLUB

Trysting Tree Golf Club is still in its early stages of growth, but since its grand opening in the summer of 1988 the spacious course has quickly developed into one of the Northwest's finest public golf courses and one of the nation's premier collegiate facilities.

Despite being only eight-years-old, the idea of building an 18-hole golf course just off highway 34 and along the Willamette River dates back to 1951.

Oregon State University purchased 175 acres in 1951 solely for the purpose of building a public golf course, but funding difficulties and debates with local farmers and Linn County commissioners prevented its beginning stages.

Finally, Trysting Tree was granted approval and has been the home of the Beavers ever since.

Each fall Trysting Tree is the site of the men's and women's Nike golf tournaments, attracting schools from around the country. Teams participating in recent years include USC, UCLA, Santa Clara, Nebraska, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Pacific, UNLV, California, Stanford, Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, Pepperdine, San Francisco, Kansas, San Diego State, San Diego, UC Santa Barbara, etc.

"This is a great golf course," BYU head coach Bruce Brockbank said. "This facility is as good as I've seen -- it's very comparable to Arizona State's facility (Karsten Golf Course). Oregon State has done a great job with this facility and the city of Corvallis ought to be very proud of what is has here."

Brockbank's comments are echoed by other



coaches and players who marvel at Trysting Tree's appearance.

"It's fun to bring a team to a course where the people in charge show a lot of pride," Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin said. "I thought the fairways at Stanford were in great shape until I saw these. This course is unbelievable, it's a tribute to Corvallis."


Thanks to a very particular grounds crew, the course is in superb shape all year round, uncanny for a public golf course. Just five minutes away from the OSU campus, Trysting Tree is a versatile golf course varying in length from 5,500-7,000 yards and carries a par of 72. Trysting Tree offers a variety of shots and golfers can experience all types of weather conditions. Because of its superb drainage, Trysting Tree is an excellent winter course.

The Oregon State men's and women's golf programs are blessed to have one of the best practice facilities on the West Coast. Playing consistently on a championship course, OSU golfers can quickly increase their skills. Both coaches stress the importance of playing quality golf from within 100 yards which is why the players have their own

short game practice area. The teams constantly work at hitting targets placed at different yardages. In addition, OSU has its own two-tier putting green with a green-side bunker, and has access to their own side of the driving range.

It's no secret in golf circles that Trysting Tree Golf Course is part of the reason why the men's and women's golf programs at Oregon State University have become nationally-recognized.

"Trysting Tree Golf Club is one of the deciding factors in me accepting this position," Beaver head coach Mike Ketcham said. "There aren't many universities in the country that have facility like this at their disposal."

1996-97 Men's Golf Outlook -- "We'll Be Just Fine"

First-year head coach Mike Ketcham hasn't exactly inherited an empty cupboard. The 1996-97 team features nine returning letterwinners, five of whom have competed in the postseason.

"Depth is going to be one of our strengths," Ketcham said. "We have 10 players on this team who have a chance of playing -- not only playing a lot, but contributing in a big way."

Leading the cast of returnees is senior **Charles Kingsbaker**. Kingsbaker has played 105 rounds during his collegiate career, averaging 73.9 shots per outing. He is also a two-time Pac-10 Conference second team selection and has 10 top-10 finishes.

"Charles is one of the main catalysts of this team," Ketcham explained. "He has had some very good years at Oregon State, and I expect good things from him again this season."

Three other seniors join Kingsbaker to lend experience to the club. Marty James is a three-year letterman, Jeff Richardson has lettered twice and Ryan Kelly once. James has had up and down periods during his career that started in the fall of 1992. He has a career average of 75.4, but also shares the school record with a 66 as a freshman, and won last year's University of Portland Pilot Spring Invitational. Richardson owns a career 76.5 average, and Kelly, who transferred from Washington prior to last season, has a 76.0 average.


A trio makes up the junior class headed by **Chris Janson**. Janson was second for the team in rounds played last season with 43, and posted four top-15 finishes. He averaged 75.3 and had three rounds under 70. Janson is joined by **Eric Fiskum** of Salem and junior college transfer **Justin Johnson** to complete the junior class. Fiskum should blossom this year into one of the better players on the team, while

Johnson was a top player in the junior college ranks in California (Chabot JC) last season.


The sophomore class of **David Crowell** from Corvallis, **Eric Dahm** from Tualatin and **Kyle Hudson** showed promise last season, and should be ready to take their games to another level in 1996-97. The trio combined for 52 rounds last year.

"I feel confident with this team," Ketcham said. "Coach Altman did a super job by laying a solid foundation for this program. When I was with San Jose State last year we were paired quite often with Oregon State in tournaments. That experience has given me a little bit more of an understanding of what these players are capable of accomplishing."

As per usual the Beavers will be playing in the region's best tournaments, including the Western Intercollegiate, Arizona State and Stanford Invitationals, the Ping Intercollegiate and its own Nike Northwest Classic to name a few. OSU will also make a weeklong trip to Hawaii, and will make an appearance at the Aldila Collegiate in San Diego and the University of San Francisco

Invitational at the Olympic Club.

"I think we'll be just fine," Ketcham said in conclusion. "We have some strong athletic kids that possess great ball striking capabilities. We need a little work on the short game, but overall we'll be just fine."

Mike Ketcham is in his first year as the director of the men's golf program. The successful 31-year-old replaces Steve Altman, who resigned after six seasons.

Ketcham inherits a program that has made huge strides during the last five seasons, making three appearances in the NCAA West Regional and qualifying for an NCAA Tournament. The program has been ranked consistently in the top 25 during the last three years.

"A characteristic of my teams have been they get better as the year goes on," Ketcham said. "Sometimes we start a little slow, but we always peak at the end of the year."

Ketcham is no stranger to having teams with national notorioty. He was the head coach at San Jose State University for the past two years, and guided the Spartans to a 10th-place finish at last season's NCAA Championship. He was named the 1996 Big West Conference Coach of the Year, after receiving the same honor in 1995.

"A lot of players make the mistake with their game of thinking they have to start from scratch at college," Ketcham said explaining his philosophy. "I believe you never want to regress and go back to ground zero." The Ottumwa, Iowa native started his coaching career as the mentor of the Scottsdale Community College program in Arizona. He led the team to the National Junior College Athletic Association national championship both years (1993, '94) he was associated with the school. He was named the NJCAA Coach of the Year both seasons, and coached eight NJCAA All-Americans. His teams compiled an 84-1 conference record over the two years.

Ketcham's amateur playing career included two years at Odessa Junior College in Texas and two years at the University of Arkansas. He was a NJCAA All-American in 1985 and helped the team finish second at the national championships. He also has participated in the Porter Cup and U.S. Amateur.

Ketcham entered the professional ranks in 1988. He played on the U.S. Golf Tour, Asian Tour and the Canadian Tour. His four-year pro career included going



through the PGA Tour Qualifying school twice and working with Chuck Hogan of Sports Enhancement Associated, and Peter Kostis.

The 32-year-old has brought a wealth of experience to the program, as he has played on the Golden State Tour, Florida State Tour and on the Canadian PGA Tour for four years.

Watts is a 1989 graduate of Western Oregon State College in Monmouth with a bachelor of science degree in physical education. He also attended Oregon State University for one year.

He worked as an assistant professional at the DeBell Golf Course in Burbank, Cal., from January 1984 to January of 1985 before returning to school at WOSC. Upon his graduation he worked as an assistant manager at Golf Classics of America in Beverly Hills and San Dimas.

At the conclusion of his professional career he served as the first assistant golf professional at the Springhill Country Club in Albany. His duties included private and group lessons, organizing and planning the Junior Golf Program, and requirements of operating a pro shop.

In September of 1994 he opened his own private business, the Pure Air Company.

Watts is a 1982 graduate of Reedsport (OR.) High School. He and his wife Carrie have one daughter, Madeline.

Born September 14, 1939, in Blackwell, Oklahoma, Risser received his bachelor's degree in biology from Grinnell College in lowa in 1961, and earned his master's degree in botany (1965) and his Ph.D. in botany and soils (1967) at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

He worked as a research assistant at the Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine, conducting studies in plant physiology before beginning his teaching career in 1963 at the University of Wisconsin.

Risser joined the faculty at the University of Oklahoma in 1967 as an assistant professor of botany. He was assistant director of the Biological Station at Lake Texoma from 1970-74, and director of the Oklahoma Biological Survey from 1971-77. In 1977, Risser earned full professor status and was promoted to chairman of the Department of Botany and Microbiology.

He served as program director ecosystem studies for the National Science Foundation in 1975-76 and chief of the Illinois Natural History Survey from 1981-86. In 1986, Risser was appointed vice president for academic affairs in 1989-90, and interim for one year before he was appointed provost and vice president for academic affairs.

Risser was president of Miami University of Ohio for three years, prior to his selection as president of Oregon State University. He was appointed Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1985 and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1994.

He served as president of the Ecological Society of America in 1984-85, president of American Institute of Biological Sciences in 1991-92, and is currently the Secretary General to the Scientific Committee on Problems of the Environment in Paris, France.

He was consultant for the Argonne National Laboratory, the National Academy of Sciences, the National Audubon Society, the National Science Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution, Time-Life Books, the U.S. Department of Energy, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and the U.S. National Park Service.

Risser is chairman of the Board on Environmental Studies and Toxicology for the National Academy of Sciences; member of the Science Program Committee for the National Park System Advisory Board, co-chair of the Board on Oceans and Atmosphere for the National Association of State Universities, and Land-Grant Colleges, and a member of the Advisory Board of the National Park System.

He and his wife, Les, are the parents of six grown children.



Dutch Baughman Director of Athletics

Dutch Baughman (pronounced Bock-man) was named the 10th athletic director in the history of Oregon State University April 30, 1990, succeeding Lynn Snyder. He was promoted from his position of senior associate

athletic director, a position he started in October 1989.

The hiring of Baughman was a very popular choice among OSU coaches and athletic department staff members. In his tenure as senior associate director he was successful in improving the morale and overall operating procedures of the athletic department. When Baughman was hired as senior associate, his primary responsibilities included budget preparation and control, personnel, supervision of coaches for Olympic sports and compliance with NCAA and conference regulations. Baughman, a stickler for detail, passed his first test with flying colors as the Oregon State athletic department completed the 1989-90 fiscal year with a budget in the black for the first time in six years.

Baughman's management style in his tenure at Oregon State has been very successful, and one of the big keys to his success is his ability to communicate.

He came to OSU in October 1989 with outstanding credentials. He brought with him 16 years of previous experience in top athletic administration, including athletic directorships at Furman University (1979-83) and Virginia Tech (1988). Baughman has also served as assistant and associate commissioner of the Southwest Conference (1983-87).

Baughman is demand as a convention speaker, both on the local and national level. He has spoke at the NCAA convention, and to the Division I Athletic Directors Association regarding OSU's very successful Balance and Life Skills program. He was also the keynote speaker at this year's NCAA Division I Football Coaches Association convention.

Three are three aspects Baughman is most proud of in his tenure at Oregon State -- the development of the Beavers' Balance and Life Skills program for student-athletes; the successful compliance program that is considered a model program in the NCAA; and OSU's leading role in the Pac-10 and nation for student-athlete graduation rates.

Baughman earned his bachelor of arts degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1971 and his master's in athletic administration from Ohio State in 1976. In addition, he spent six years on the U.S. Sports Academy's national faculty He is also a graduate of the Ranch Management Program at TCU in 1988.

After receiving his degree from Ohio State, he was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1971 as an infantry officer. He was honorably discharged in 1974 with the rank of Captain.

In addition to being athletic director at Furman and Virginia Tech, Baughman spent two years as associate A.D. at Northwestern (1977-79).

As an athlete, he earned two letters in football as a line-backer, one in basketball as a guard and three in baseball as a catcher at Columbus West High School. He lettered three years in lacrosse at Ohio State and was a member of The Ohio State University football team during his collegiate tenure.

Dutch and his wife, Jacquelyn, a former elementary school teacher, have one son, Eric, and one daughter, Emily.



LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM BENEFITS STUDENT-ATHLETES

Imagine going to your first job interview and not having a clue on what to expect; imagine you're a college freshman with three final exams the same day; imagine you were one of the most popular students in high school and now you're just one of many in college. To many of us these situations aren't hard to imagine at all, they are real life experiences.

The Oregon State University Athletic Department is helping its student-athletes cope with these kinds of situations by initially being one of 46 colleges and universities to participate as a pilot institution for the NCAA's parent Life Skills Program. This program has grown considerably over the last two years and now there are more than 176

Life Skills programs across the country.

Oregon State's program has inherited the name BALANCE, standing for Beaver Athletes for Life Skills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence. The purpose of this program is to focus on the whole person -- academically, athletically and emotionally.

"To be successful and happy with everything you do, each area of your life, academics, athletics and your personal life need to be functioning well," BALANCE Coordinator and former OSU softball standout Andrea Talcott said. "The program is designed to give the student-athletes the knowledge and the skills to make the right choices in their life."

Oregon State see's 100 percent of its student-athletes involved with

some aspect of the program.

"Whether the men's basketball team is collecting food, or the women's golf team is taking a nutrition workshop, each team and each student-athlete is somehow affected by the BALANCE program," Talcott explained. "The student-athletes can't get enough of this program. They continually want to do more, not only help the community, but to promote their program and to better themselves."

At Oregon State the BALANCE program has developed into an educational value as well for the student-athletes. There are three credited classes offered to the student-athletes, in addition to a number of seminars and workshops. The freshman orientation course includes over 20 topics such as

nutrition, time management, diversity and communication skills. The Drugs and Sports class focuses on the relationship between a student-athlete and use of drugs. This class concludes with a presentation to a local junior high school class about the student-athlete's position on drug and alcohol use. The third class, Athletes in Transition, is for juniors and seniors and focuses on career development. Topics include interviewing, networking, and resume and cover letter writing.

The desired outcome of the BALANCE program benefits the student-athletes and the community as a whole.

The program features materials presented by athletics department staff members, other university personnel and community leaders.

A mentorship program was added to the BALANCE program this fall. Once a student-athlete chooses a career path, a member in the community is selected to guide them in

choices regarding internships, what the job is really like, and most importantly, emotional support.

"What a wonderful opportunity for a student-athlete to ask the questions only someone in the career would know," Talcott said.

"We are constantly looking for members in the community, boosters or friends of the university who would be interested in getting involved in the mentorship program," Talcott added. "This is an opportunity for others to be involved in the growth and education of the student-athlete. It is an incredible feeling to know you helped someone succeed in their life."

So while BALANCE at a first glance appears to be skewed toward making the student-athletes college stints successful, it also is an important program in preparing the individual for their post college days.

"An athlete who uses the resources offered to them through the BALANCE program will have a considerable amount of experience to take with them as they go out into the real world," Talcott said. "Combined with their degree, what they have learned from real life situations, and what they have learned from being in athletics all of



their lives, these student-athletes will have a lot to offer."

The BALANCE program's reputation has grown considerably on a national level over the last two years and is considered one of the top programs in the nation.

Those heart-pounding, stressful situations like a first time job interview might be a little easier to handle for the athletes you are seeing on the field and courts today because of the efforts of many people in this class. These same student-athletes could be working for you in the future and thanks to the BALANCE program will already have the skills necessary to be successful employees and citizens of your community.

W.A.R.M. (We Are Role Models)

In addition to the BALANCE program at Oregon State University, the W.A.R.M. program was established. We Are Role Models is an athletic department bureau of student-athletes who are trained in public speaking. These student-athletes are available to local schools and youth organizations for various presentations.

W.A.R.M. students speak on topics such as the importance of hard work, sportsmanship, goal setting, education or the dangers of drugs and alcohol. This service is provided free of charge to the schools and youth organizations.
