## TRYSTING TREE GOLF CLUB

Trysting Tree Golf Club is still in its early stages of growth, but since its grand opening in the summer of 1988 the spacious course has quickly developed into one of the Northwest's finest public golf courses and one of the nation's premier collegiate facilities.

Despite being only nine-years-old, the idea of building an 18-hole golf course just off highway 34 and along the Willamette River dates back to 1951.

Oregon State University purchased 175 acres in 1951 solely for the purpose of building a public golf course, but funding difficulties and debates with local farmers and Linn County commissioners prevented its beginning stages. Finally, Trysting Tree was granted approval and has been the home of the Beavers ever since.

Each fall Trysting Tree is the site of the men's and women's Nike golf tournaments, attracting schools from around the country. Teams participating in recent years include USC, UCLA,

Santa Clara, Nebraska, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Pacific, UNLV, California, Stanford, Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, Pepperdine, San Francisco, Kansas, San Diego State, San Diego, UC Santa Barbara, etc.

"This is a great golf course," BYU head coach Bruce Brockbank said. "This facility is as good as I've seen — it's very comparable to Arizona State's facility (Karsten Golf Course). Oregon State has done a great job with this facility and the city of Corvallis ought to be very proud of what is has here."

Brockbank's comments are echoed by other coaches and players who marvel at Trysting Tree's appearance.

"It's fun to bring a team to a course where the people in charge show a lot of pride," Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin said. "I thought the fairways at Stanford were in great shape until I saw these. This course is unbelievable, it's a tribute to Corvallis."

Thanks to a very particular grounds crew, the course is in superb shape all year round, uncanny for a public golf course. Just five minutes away from the OSU campus, Trysting Tree is a versatile golf course varying in length from 5,500-7,000 yards and carries a par of 72. Trysting Tree offers a variety of shots and golfers can experience all types of weather conditions. Because of its superb drainage, Trysting Tree is an excellent winter course.

The Oregon State men's and women's golf programs are blessed to have one of the best practice facilities on the West Coast. Playing consistently on a championship course, OSU golfers can quickly increase their skills. The coaching staff stresses the importance of playing quality golf from within 100 yards which is why the players have their own short game practice area. The teams constantly work at hitting targets placed at different yardages. In addition, OSU has its own two-tier putting green with a green-side bunker, and has access to their own side of the driving range.



### No. 1, Par 4, 443 Yards

The first hole is a simple starting hole with a wide open landing area off the tee. The deception is the second shot into a large green that can fool your club selection if the normal Trysting Tree breeze is blowing in.

It's no secret in golf circles that Trysting Tree Golf Course is part of the reason why the men's and women's golf programs at Oregon State University have become nationally-recognized.

## OREGON STATE MEN'S GOLF - AN EXCITING TIME

"Out of all the years I have been coaching, this might be as talented a team as I have ever had." Second-year Head Coach Mike Ketcham makes that bold statement about a team which has two seniors and five true-freshmen. It's a statement he firmly believes.

"I'm not guaranteeing anything, because there are a lot of variables about a how a team comes together, but I really like the looks of the squad" Ketcham said. "There has to be good chemistry, and you have to gel, and that's the challenge for me and Coach Merritt (assistant)."

This year's team does not feature the familiar names of Nelson, Kingsbaker or Kang that are household names in the OSU golf community, but it features names that will likely become household. Names like Emanuel, Arvidson and Deacon - all true-freshmen.

"The experience factor concerns me to some degree, but our most important tournaments are at the end of the year," Ketcham explained.

"Our freshmen have played extensively at the national level, so it's not going to be anything new to them to play in the major college events."

The freshmen trio of Chris Emanuel (Ottumwa, IA), Todd Deacon (Scottsdale, AZ) and Anthony Arvidson (Beaverton) may be the best freshmen to ever enter the program. All three have extensive national competition experience.

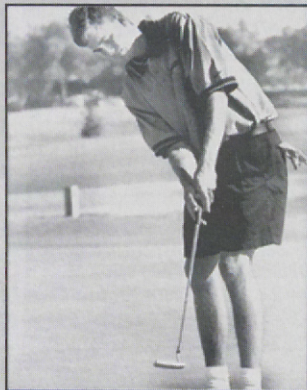
Ketcham does have a pair of seniors who should fill the leadership role, Eric Fiskum (Salem) and Chris Janson (Chehalis, WA). These two players have a combined 123 rounds played.

"Eric and Chris have a lot of experience and form a bulk of our returning nucleus," Ketcham said. "I look for good seasons from both of them."

Ketcham played with a relatively small roster last season, afterelecting to redshirt three players. The threesome of Justin Johnson (Castro Valley, CA), David Crowell (Corvallis) and Eric Dahm (Tualatin) expect to be big contributors this season. Johnson came to Oregon State from Chabot Junior College, where he averaged a Northern California Junior College best 72.3 per round. Crowell and Dahm played in various tournaments as true-freshmen after being two of the top players to come of the prep ranks.

Junior Kyle Hudson (Reedley, CA) and true-freshmen Jason Adams (Bend) and Noel Smith (The Dalles) will likely redshirt this season, according to Ketcham.

"This is really an exciting time for Oregon State golf," Ketcham said. "I really looking forward to a successful season."

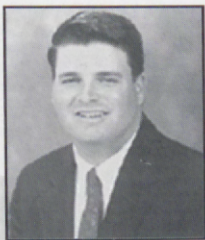

Mike Ketcham is in his second year as the director of the men's golf program, after spending five years at San Jose State University. While heading up the Spartan program, the team made three appearances in the NCAA West Regionals and qualified for one NCAA Tournament. The program was ranked consistently in the top 25 during his tenure, and he was selected the Big West Conference Coach of the Year once.

The Ottumwa, Iowa native started his coaching career as the mentor of the Scottsdale Community College program in Arizona. He led the team to the National Junior College Athletic Association national championship both years (1993, '94) he was associated with the school. He was named the NJCAA Coach of the Year both seasons, and coached eight NJCAA All-Americans. His teams compiled an 84-1 conference record over the two years.

## Richard Merritt

Richard Merritt became a member of the men's golf program in the summer of 1997 as an assistant coach,

rejoining Head Coach Mike Ketcham. Merritt played for Ketcham his junior and senior year at San Jose State University.

The 25-year-old Fresno, Cal., native started his collegiate career at Fresno City College, where he earned all-league honors as a freshman and sophomore. He transferred to San Jose State for his junior and senior seasons, and helped coach the Spartans. Merritt helped Ketcham and the

Ketcham's amateur career included two years at Odessa Junior College in Texas and two years at the University of Arkansas. He was a NJCAA All-American in 1985 helping the team finish second at the national championships. He participated in the Porter Cup and U.S. Amateur.

Ketcham entered the professional ranks in 1988. He played on the U.S. Golf Tour, Asian Tour and the Canadian Tour. His four-year pro career included going through the PGA Tour Qualifying school twice and working with Chuck Hogan of Sports Enhancement Associated, and Peter Kostis.

The physical education major has also served as Tournament Director for the 1993 and '94 NJCAA Golf Championships, sports information director at Scottsdale C.C., and as a coach for the United States at the World University Games in Madrid, Spain.

Ketcham and his wife, Kathryn, have one daughter, Kelsey (3) and one son, Michael (6 months).

"This team has as much talent as any team I've ever been associated with," Merritt said about the 1997-98 club. "The possibilities are endless with a team of this caliber."

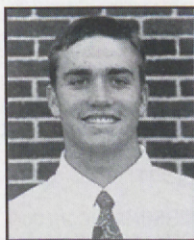
Merritt and his wife Shannon have been married three years, and are expecting their first child in April.

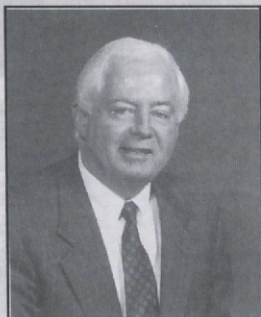

## OSU PRESIDENT PAUL G. RISSER



Paul G. Risser was chosen to be the 13th president of Oregon State University and began his tenure January 1, 1996. He is an internationally known biologist whose research interests include the structure and function of grass-

land and forest ecosystems, environmental planning and management, landscape ecology and global change.

Born September 14, 1939, in Blackwell, Okla., Risser received his bachelor's degree in biology from Grinnell College in 1961, and earned his master's in botany (1965) and his Ph.D. in botany and soils (1967) at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

He worked as a research assistant at the Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine, conducting studies in plant physiology before beginning his teaching career in 1963 at the Univ. of Wisconsin.

Risser joined the faculty at the University of Oklahoma in 1967 as an assistant professor of botany. He was assistant director of the Biological Station at Lake Texoma from 1970-74, and director of the Oklahoma Biological Survey from 1971-77. In 1977, Risser earned full professor status and was promoted to chairman of the Department of Botany and Microbiology.

He served as program director of ecosystem studies for the National Science Foundation in 1975-76 and chief of the Illinois Natural History Survey from 1981-86. In 1986, Risser was appointed vice president for academic affairs in 1989-90, and interim for one year before he was appointed provost and vice president for academic affairs.

Risser was president of Miami University of Ohio for three years, prior to his selection as president of Oregon State University. He was appointed Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1985 and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1994.

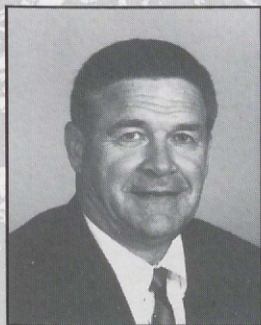
He served as president of the Ecological Society of America in 1984-85, president of American Institute of Biological Sciences in 1991-92, and is currently the Secretary General to the Scientific Committee on Problems of the Environment in Paris

He was consultant for the Argonne National Laboratory, the National Academy of Sciences, the National Audubon Society, the National Science Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution, Time-Life Books, the U.S. Department of Energy, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and the U.S. National Park Service.

He and his wife, Les, are the parents of six grown children.



## INTERIM ATHLETIC DIRECTOR LEE SCHROEDER



Lee Schroeder, Oregon State University's vice president for finance and administration, was named interim athletic director August 11. Schroeder replaced Dutch Baughman, who resigned after serving as the

school's A.D. for over seven years.

Schroeder is no stranger to the athletic department; having worked with Baughman on many issues over the last several years. He has a strong knowledge of how the athletic business world works, and the department doesn't expect to miss a beat during his leadership.

The 58-year-old Schroeder, who has been on the Oregon State faculty since 1967, was named assistant dean for research and graduate studies in the College of Engineering in 1974, and associate dean in 1985. He accepted the job of interim vice president for finance and administration in October of 1992, and was promoted to permanent status shortly thereafter.

Schroeder holds a bachelor of science degree and a master's degree in civil engineering from Washington State University. He also has a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of Colorado.

While at Washington State, Schroeder was a member of the football program for five years. He played four years and served as a graduate assistant coach for one year under Head Coach Jim Sutherland. The three-year letterman at tight end helped the Cougars post a mark of 23-16-1 during his playing tenure.

Schroeder's athletic roots go deeper than his football days at Washington State. His father was

a prep football coach, and Lee himself served as a state high school football official for over 20 years.

Schroeder has won several awards at Oregon State for teaching and service. He is a registered professional engineer in the states of Oregon and Washington, and belongs to the American Society of Civil Engineers, the International Society of Soil Mechanics and Foundation Engineering, and the American Society for Testing and Materials.

Schroeder has also worked as a research engineer for the Boeing Company, as a staff engineer for firms in Corvallis and Boulder, Colo., and served as a Lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers from 1963-65.

He and his wife Twila have two sons and one daughter. His sons Murray and Alan were all-state football players, and now work as engineers in Wyoming and Washington, respectively. His daughter, Sally, a former all-state volleyball player, is a teacher and coach in Washington.

## LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM BENEFITS STUDENT-ATHLETES

Imagine going to your first job interview and not having a clue on what to expect; imagine you're a college freshman with three final exams the same day; imagine you were one of the most popular students in high school and now you're just one of many in college. To many of us these situations aren't hard to imagine at all, they are real life experiences.

The Oregon State University Athletic Department is helping its student-athletes cope with these kinds of situations by participating in the NCAA's parent Life Skills Program. This program has grown considerably over the last two years and now there are more than 176 Life Skills programs across the country.

Oregon State's program has inherited the name BALANCE, standing for Beaver Athletes for Life Skills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence. The purpose of this program is to focus on the whole person — academically, athletically and emotionally.

"To be successful and happy with everything you do, each area of your life, academics, athletics and your personal life need to be functioning well," BALANCE Coordinator and former OSU softball standout Andrea Talcott said. "The program is designed to give the student-athletes the knowledge and the skills to make the right choices in their life."

Oregon State sees 100 percent of its student-athletes involved with some aspect of the program.

"Whether the men's basketball team is collecting food, or the women's golf team is taking a nutrition workshop, each team and each student-athlete is somehow affected by the BALANCE program," Talcott explained. "The

student-athletes can't get enough of this program. They continually want to do more, not only help the community, but to promote their program and to better themselves."

At Oregon State the BALANCE program has developed into an educational value as well for the student-athletes. There are three credited classes offered to the student-athletes, in addition to a number of seminars and workshops. The freshman orientation course includes over 20 topics such as nutrition, time management,

diversity and communication skills. The Drugs and Sports class focuses on the relationship between a student-athlete and use of drugs. This class concludes with a presentation to a local junior high school class about the student-athlete's position on drug and alcohol use. The third class, Athletes in Transition, is for juniors and seniors and focuses on career development. Topics include interviewing, networking, and resume and cover letter writing.

The desired outcome of the BALANCE program benefits the student-athletes and the community as a whole. The program features materials presented by athletics department staff members, other university personnel and community leaders.

A mentorship program was added to the BALANCE program in the fall. Once a student-athlete chooses a career path, a member in the community is selected to guide them in choices regarding internships, what the job is really like, and most importantly, emotional support.

"What a wonderful opportunity for a student-athlete to ask the questions only





someone in the career would know," Talcott said. "We are constantly looking for members in the community, boosters or friends of the university who would be interested in getting involved in the mentorship program," Talcott added.

"This is an opportunity for others to be involved in the growth and education of the student-athlete. It is an incredible feeling to know you helped someone succeed in their life."

So while BALANCE at a first glance appears to be skewed toward making the student-athletes college stints successful, it also is an important program in preparing the individual for their post college days.

"An athlete who uses the resources offered to them through the BALANCE program will have a considerable amount of experience to take with them as they go out into the real world," Talcott said. "Combined with their degree, what they have learned from real life situations, and what they have learned from being in athletics all of their lives, these student-athletes will have a lot to offer."

The BALANCE program's reputation has grown considerably on a national level over the last two years and is considered one of the top programs in the nation.

Those heart-pounding, stressful situations like a first-time job interview might be a little easier to handle for the athletes you are seeing on the field and courts today because of the efforts of many people in this class. These same student-athletes could be working for you in the future, and thanks to the BALANCE program, will already have the skills necessary to be successful employees and citizens of your community.

## **W.A.R.M.**

### **(We Are Role Models)**

In addition to the BALANCE program at Oregon State University, the W.A.R.M. program was established. We Are Role Models is an athletic department bureau of student-athletes who are trained in public speaking. These student-athletes are available to local schools and youth organizations for various presentations.

W.A.R.M. students speak on topics such as the importance of hard work, sportsmanship, goal setting, education or the dangers of drugs and alcohol. This service is provided free of charge to the schools and youth organizations.
