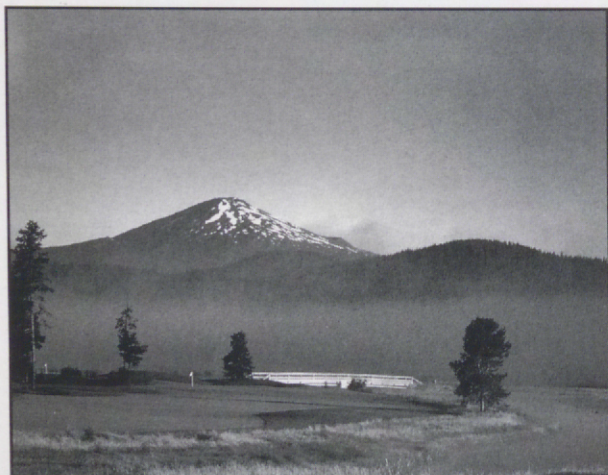
Crosswater was honored by *Golf Digest* as the Best New Resort Course in America for 1995 and as one of America's 100 Greatest Courses 1999-2000."

OREGON STATE GOLF

The Oregon State University women's golf program will have a new look as it enters a new millennium. Yes the team returns six letterwinners from a club who participated in postseason for the sixth straight year, but gone are three letterwinners who experienced 288 combined rounds during their collegiate careers.

"We certainly lost some very talented individuals, but the cupboard is not bare," tenth-year Head Coach Risë Lakowske said. "We have a solid nucleus of players who have experienced the demands of intercollegiate golf."

Leading the way in 1999-2000 will be seniors **Rachel Borcherts**, **Reena Eklund**, **Andrea Hehn** and **Jennifer Ferrante**. Borcherts played in all but one tournament last season on her way to an average of 78.3. The Las Vegas, Nev., native posted a season best finish of fourth at the Jeannine McHaney Memorial at Texas Tech University. She also posted three additional top-15 scores.

"Rachel is definitely the team leader, what she does will dictate how we progress through the year," Lakowske said. "She has the most experience on the team, and she put a lot of effort into her game during the summer. I expect her to have a very solid season."

Eklund enjoyed her best year of her career last season, particularly in the spring. She played in the final five events of the season, including the Pac-10 and NCAA West Regional Championships.

"Reena is a tournament player," Lakowske explained. "She always has played her best in the fall -- this year I look for her to compete at a high level throughout the season."

Hehn of Langley, Wash., and Ferrante of Lake Oswego are two players Lakowske is also looking toward for leadership. Hehn has played in 25 tournaments for her career and has posted some of the lowest single rounds in school history, while Ferrante has been a steady contributor."

"Both these players have contributed a great deal to the program," Lakowske said. "Andrea is coming off an injury that hampered her during the spring slate, and Jennifer contributes to the program in a number of ways, including leadership."

Lakowske is expecting solid numbers from junior **Carina Olsson** of Sweden, who redshirted last season after two promising years. She has a 79.3 career average, which includes a pair of top-10 finishes. Olsson also is one of the team's most experienced players, having competed in the NCAA Championships once and twice appearing in the NCAA West Regionals.

"Carina worked very hard during her redshirt year, and often was the number two player during our intrasquad tournaments," Lakowske explained. "Rachel and Carina will be tremendous leaders for this team."

Consistency is one goal junior **Anne Brooksby** of Portland has her eye on in 1999-2000. She has shown she can shoot low numbers, and in pressure situations, after firing a career low round of 73 at last year's Regional. Brooksby has yet to notch a top-10 score, but had four showings in the top-30 last year.

"Anne has made a lot of strides in her game, and she has proven she can play with the best," Lakowske said. "She has become more confident and that should make her even a better player."

Sophomore **Erin Borcherts**, the younger sister of teammate Rachel, is one of the best underclassmen at OSU in several years. In her true-freshman season she averaged 79.6 and played in the postseason. She finished in the top-30 five times, including a season-best tied for 14th at Texas Tech.

"Erin is one of the best young players we have had in the program in a number of years," Lakowske stated. "We are making a swing change with her, but that should only improve what has already been very good play."

Oregon State's true-freshmen class will likely see competitive action this season. The threesome of **Bridget Bieth** of Sacramento, **Stacie Ferguson** of Tucson and **Melanie Furuta** of Long Beach, Cal., all bring impressive credentials to Corvallis.

"I anticipate all three of these players contributing a great deal to our program this year," Lakowske said. "They are all very solid athletically and academically, and have bright futures at Oregon State University."

A demanding schedule awaits the Beavers in 1999-2000, including September's NCAA Fall Preview.

RISË LAKOWSKE HEAD COACH

The Oregon State University women's golf program continues to make strides under 10th-year Head Coach Risë Lakowske.

The popular coach has guided the program from the depths of the college golf world to national prominence during her tenure.

Lakowske, who has a reputation for her rapport with her student-athletes, has taken the program to six consecutive NCAA West Regionals. She also was named the 1998 Far West District Coach of the Year.

Lakowske played at OSU from 1973-77 and played in four National Golf Championships. She won four tournaments and several non-collegiate events during her college career. The team of Lakowske and Mary Budke, a member of the OSU Sports Hall of Fame, captured third place at the 1974 AIAW Golf Nationals.

A standout basketball player as well as golf, she played for then basketball coaches Mary Covington and Len Guggenheim.

Lakowske's overall talents prompted Covington, who was also her golf coach, with this comment in 1976:

"Risë is demanding of herself. She enters all the tournaments and works very hard at the sport. I've noticed one thing about first class athletes like Risë, though they ask a great deal of themselves, they are never demanding of anyone else. They're just super nice people."

Born in Laurel, Miss., Lakowske grew up in Arkansas and started playing golf when she was eight-years-old.

After graduating with a degree in history in 1977, Lakowske competed professionally until 1981. She also served as the volunteer golf coach at OSU in 1979 and '82. She was hired as the full-time coach in 1990.

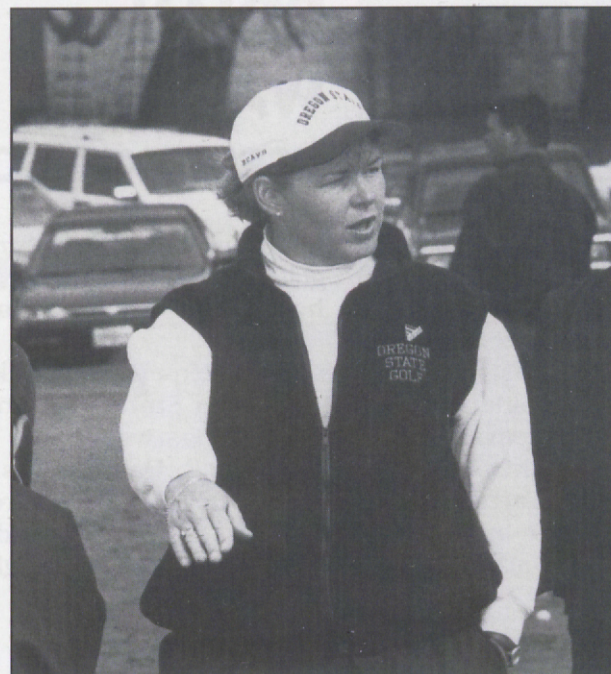
Academics and goal setting are two aspects Lakowske preaches to her golfers. She encourages her student-athletes to do well in school as this builds self-respect and increased motivation which helps counter difficult endeavors throughout life. By setting appropriate individual and team goals, Lakowske believes each golfer can increase their skills rapidly.

Lakowske is a huge believer in course management and she knows experience is the best teacher, but she expects her players to make the correct decision when it comes to tournament play. She constantly teaches strategy and how it might differ from one player to another, and she expects her team, not only to keep the ball in play, but in a position to make the next shot.

By developing a strong course management side of the game, Lakowske believes her players can cope with tense situations on the course. Through a competitive college golf experience, she hopes her student-athletes

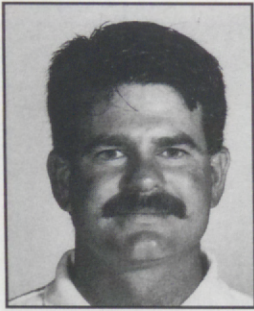
will develop a sense of confidence that will serve them the rest of their lives.

Brian Watts has returned to the Oregon State University golf program after spending five years in private business. He had been an assistant during the 1996-97 and

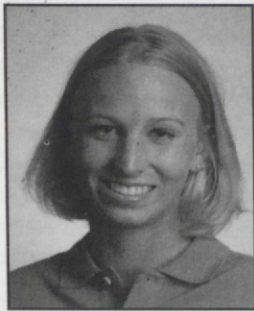
1997-98 seasons.

OREGON STATE (1998-99): For the second consecutive season, Rachel lowered her average, edging it down to 78.3...she played 33 rounds for the season, the second-highest for the team...best finish was fourth at the Jeannie McHaney Texas Tech Memorial...shot rounds of 73 twice, at Texas Tech and at the Arizona Invitational...she played in the NCAA West Regional for the third consecutive year...has a career scoring average of 79.1...honorable mention academic all-conference.

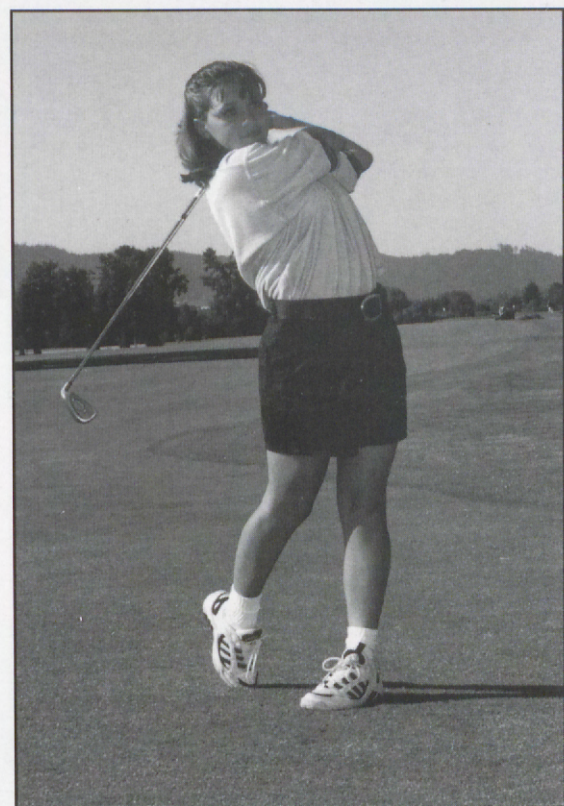

In a number of ways, Oregon State Head Coach Risë Lakowske may have done her best coaching job of her career in 1998-99.

Consider the team played nearly the entire spring season without two of its top three players, Anjeanette Dabbs and Andrea Hehn, and still came within three shots of qualifying for the NCAA Championships is no small achievement.

Dabbs and Hehn each missed the last five events, suffering from a shoulder and hand injury, respectively. To add to the team's football-like training room visits was Kathleen Takaishi, the program's best player in over two decades, with nagging injuries and illness.

"It was amazing what this team had to overcome just to be in contention in tournaments and qualifying for the NCAA Championships," Lakowske said. "I don't know if I could have expected more from this group, it's nearly impossible to overcome the loss of two starters, but this team came close to pulling it off. I was impressed by their resolve."

The fall slate began in business-like fashion for the Beavers. The team opened the year capturing the Jeannine McHaney Memorial at Texas Tech University. Oregon State would later finish second at the Rainbow Wahine Classic in Hawaii and third at the Northwest Invitational. The team was among the top-10 in five of the six autumn tournaments.

The injuries would catch up to the Beavers, who climbed as high as No. 14 in the national rankings, in the spring. Still, the team managed a third-place finish at the Peg Barnard Collegiate at Stanford and fourth at the Betsy Rawls Classic in Texas.

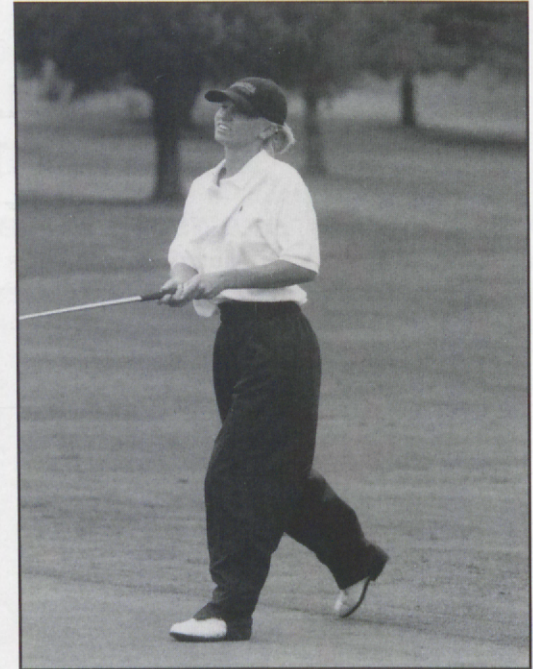
The year concluded with one of the more guttier performances from an Oregon State team in many years, falling just shy of the NCAA Championships. The five member team at the West Regional included two individuals who had never tasted postseason competition, and one who was a true-freshman.

The 1998-99 club was led by the veteran Takaishi. The senior averaged 76.0 for the season, posted three second-place finishes, and concluded her career with 16 top-10 placings. The highlight for the Pacific-10 Conference honorable mention selection was firing a school record 54-hole total of 213 at the Rainbow Wahine Classic. Takaishi did represent Oregon State at the NCAA Championships.

Dabbs and Hehn each had excellent seasons before their injuries ended their year. Dabbs, who averaged 76.3 as a senior, also concluded her career by being named to the Pac-10's honorable mention team. Hehn averaged 76.7, and will be back to OSU for her senior year.

The team also had solid contributions from the sister duo of Rachel and Erin Borcherts, plus Brandi Seymour and Reena Eklund. The Borcherts' and Eklund will return for the 1999-2000 campaign after playing in the postseason last year.

The season was another indicator of just how far the Oregon State program has progressed under Lakowske. In years past it would have been nearly impossible for the Beavers to lose two of its top three players and still entertain thoughts of playing in the NCAA Championships. Today, the program features a roster deep in talent — a roster that includes experienced seniors to youthful freshmen.

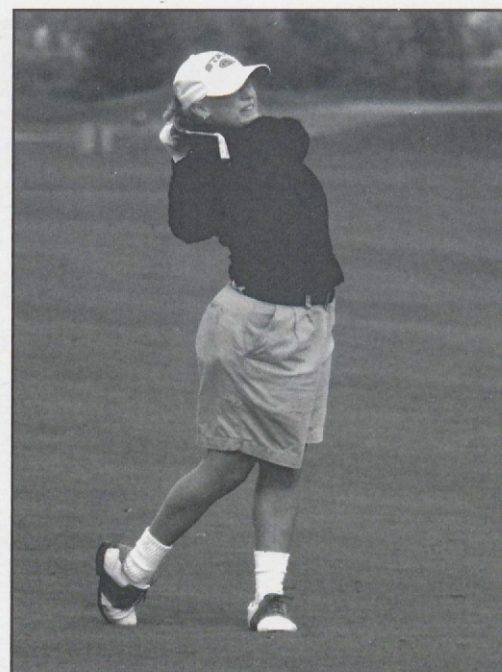

There are also offices for team physicians who conduct exams and provide consultations on site.

Six full-time NATABOC certified athletic trainers coordinate the health care of student-athletes. The team is joined by a host of graduate and undergraduate certified trainers who are enrolled in Oregon State's nationally recognized athletic training education program.

Covering every specialty, over two dozen physicians and dentists participate as "Beaver Menders" insuring the needs of the student-athletes are met with great expertise and efficiency.



Oregon State's student-athletes have the luxury of improving their strength and conditioning in either the 6,400 square foot Valley Center or the 3,500 square foot Gill Coliseum strength training facilities. Either way you're under the guidance of Strength and Conditioning Coach John Freeman or his certified strength training personnel.

The Beaver women's golf program devotes a large percentage of time to the strength program, utilizing the vast facilities available at Oregon State University.

The objectives of the strength and conditioning program are to help in the development

of speed, power and strength, intensity, kinesiology and endurance. The strength staff feels the stronger the athlete the better they will be equipped to compete on the intercollegiate level.

Did You Know? Former Oregon State University golfers Sara Berlin and Felicia Galindo are now head coaches at other Division I institutions. Berlin is in her third year as Head Coach at the University of San Francisco and Galindo is in her second year as Head Coach at Northern Arizona University.

The Athletic Department's Lifeskills Program, or Beaver Athletes for Life Skills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence (BALANCE) is one of finest in the nation.

Oregon State University was selected to participate as a pilot institution for the NCAA's parent Life Skills program. The program has since been recognized on a national scale.



The BALANCE program has developed into an educational value as well for student-athletes. There are three credited courses offered, in addition to a number of seminars and workshops. The freshman and orientation course

includes over 20 topics in areas such as nutrition, time management, diversity and communication skills.

Classes under the heading of Drugs and Sports, which focuses on the relationship between a student-athlete and drugs, and Athletes in Transition, a career development class, are also important facets of the BALANCE program.

Endowed Scholarships

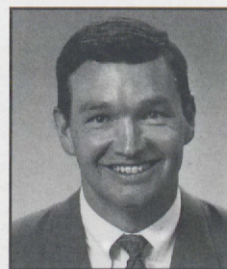

Mitch Barnhart Director of Athletics

Mitch Barnhart officially became Oregon State University's 11th Director of Athletics when he was introduced to the Beaver community Feb. 12, 1998.

The 40-year-old came to Oregon State after a successful 12-year stint at the University of Tennessee as Senior Associate Athletic Director.

"He is an innovator and person of great personal energy and enthusiasm," OSU President Paul Risser said upon Barnhart's hiring. "He's just what OSU needs to improve all of its intercollegiate athletic programs. He has the talent to be one of the premier athletic directors in the nation."

Barnhart, who has a solid background in marketing and fund-raising, earned high marks for departmental management and fund-raising during his tenure at Tennessee. He helped increase private giving to nearly \$8 million annually, and helped increase athletic marketing to nearly \$6 million per year. He aided the Tennessee overall budget growth from \$11 to \$38 million.

Barnhart has been associated with college athletics since his undergraduate days at Ottawa University in Kansas. He graduated from Ottawa in 1981, and earned a master's degree in sports administration in 1982 from Ohio University.

He started his climb up the collegiate administrative ladder in 1982 when he joined the staff at San Diego State University. He moved to the University of Oregon in January of 1983, serving as the institution's athletic fund-raiser in the Portland area. His last stop prior to Tennessee was in December of 1983, where he served as an Assistant Athletic Director of the Southern Methodist University Mustang Club.

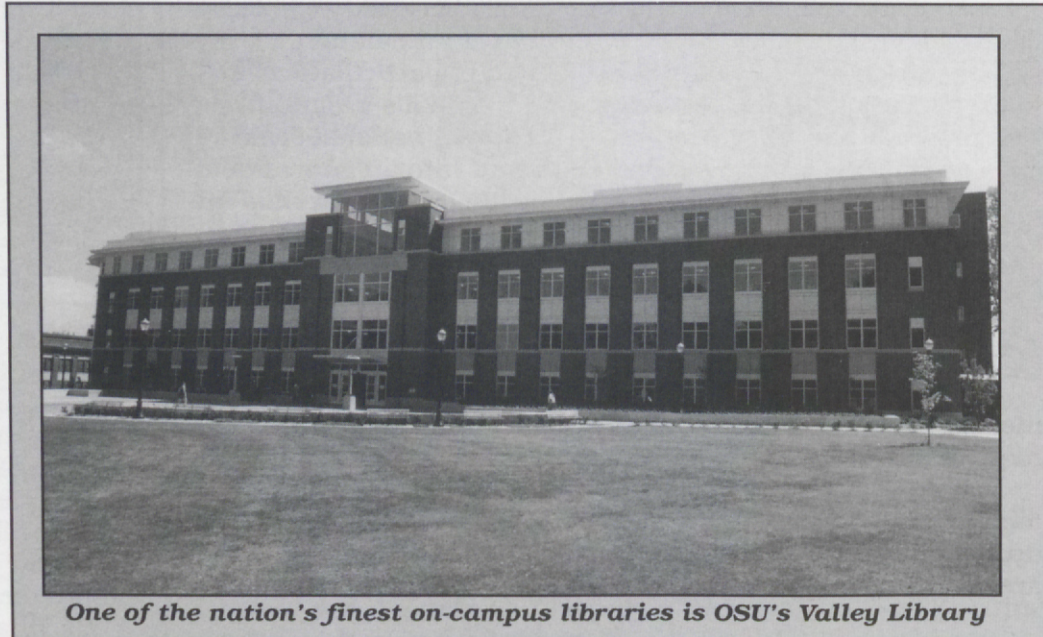
Barnhart and his wife Connie, have three children, Kirby, Blaire and Scott.

Trysting Tree Golf Club is still in its early stages of growth, but since its grand opening in the summer of 1988 the spacious course has quickly developed into one of the Northwest's finest public golf courses and one of the nation's premier collegiate facilities.

Despite being less than 10-years-old, the idea of building an 18-hole golf course just off highway 34 and along the Willamette River dates back to 1951.

Oregon State University purchased 175 acres in 1951 solely for the purpose of building a public golf course, but funding difficulties and debates with local farmers and Linn County commissioners prevented its beginning stages. Finally, Trysting Tree was granted approval and has been the home of the Beavers ever since.

Each fall Trysting Tree is the site of the men's and women's Northwest Invitationals, attracting schools from around the country. Teams participating in recent years include USC, UCLA, Santa Clara, Nebraska, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Pacific, UNLV, California, Stanford, Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, Pepperdine, San Francisco, Kansas, San Diego State, San Diego, UC Santa Barbara, etc.

"This is a great golf course," BYU head coach Bruce Brockbank said. "This facility is as good as I've seen -- it's very comparable to Arizona State's facility (Karsten Golf Course). Oregon State has done a great job with this facility and the city of Corvallis ought to be very proud of what is has here."

Brockbank's comments are echoed by other coaches and players who marvel at Trysting Tree's appearance.

"It's fun to bring a team to a course where the people in charge show a lot of pride," Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin said. "I thought the fairways at Stanford were in great shape until I saw these. This course is unbelievable, it's a tribute to Corvallis."

Thanks to a very particular grounds crew, the course is in superb shape all year round, uncanny for a public golf course. Just five minutes away from the OSU campus, Trysting Tree is a versatile golf course varying in length from 5,500-7,000 yards and carries a par of 72. Trysting Tree offers a variety of shots and golfers can experience all types of weather conditions. Because of its superb drainage, Trysting Tree is an excellent winter course.



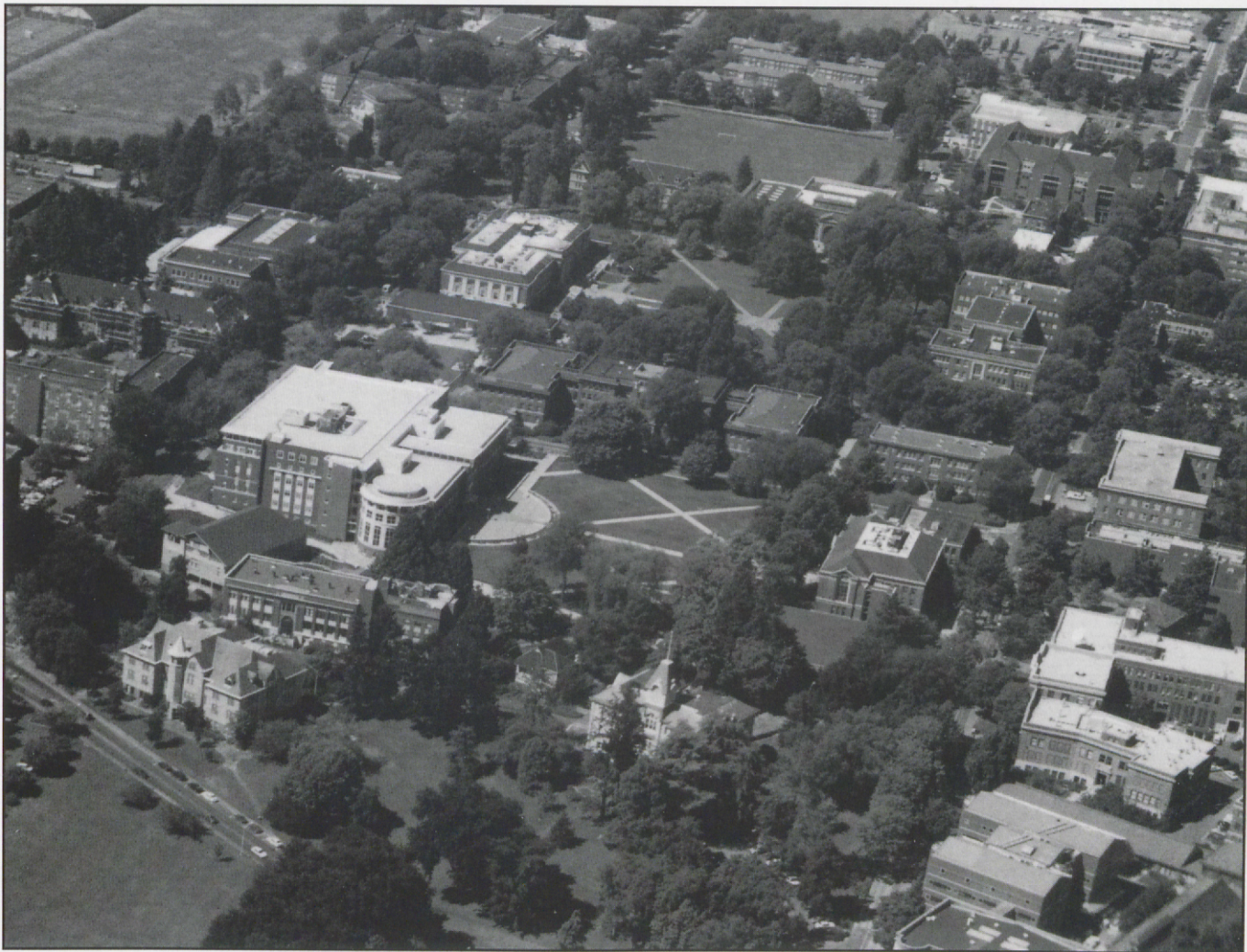
