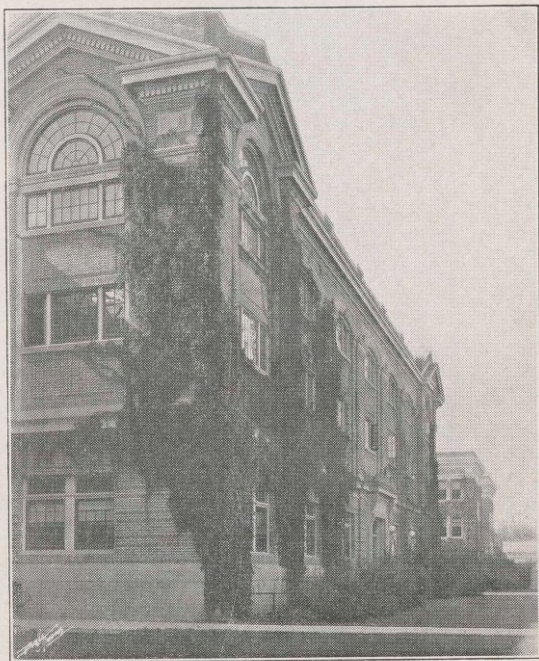

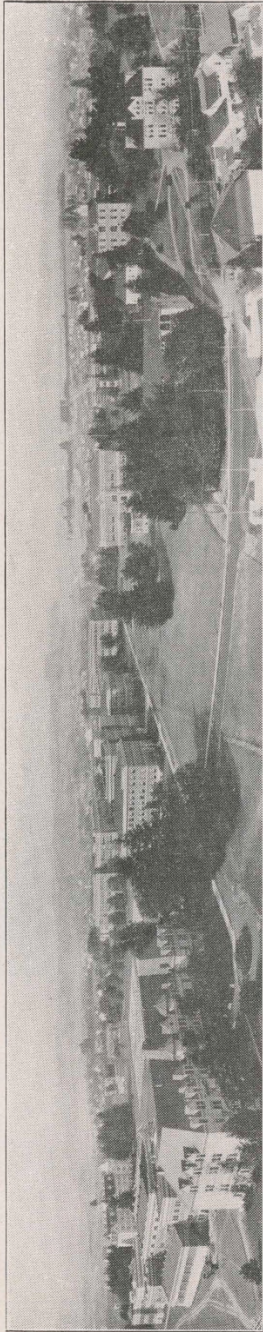

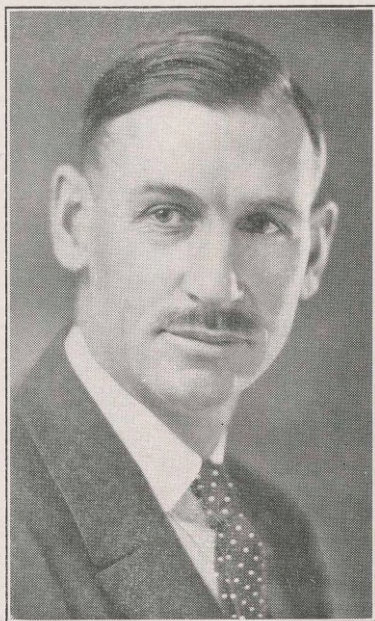
General view of West and East Quadrangles, showing Men's Gymnasium near extreme left.

COACHING SCHOOL

Knute Rockne, Paul J. Schissler, Bob Hager, "Coley" Coleman, Robin Reed, Olympic wrestling champion; Louis "Happy" Kuehn, Olympic springboard diving champion; Karl Heckrich, physical director of the Minneapolis Athletic club, under the direction of W. A. "Bud" Kearns, director of athletics and physical education for men, offer in a **six weeks' coaching school** in football, basket-ball, track,

baseball, wrestling, and swimming an opportunity for high school coaches and other physical directors, **unique in the Northwest.**

FOOTBALL

Rockne to Teach Football. It will mean something for football coaches to be taught by **Knute Rockne of Notre Dame**, one of the most thorough students of the game, as shown by his long string of victories. No football coach has occupied the

limelight longer; no coach has more consistently progressed with the constant changes in football. His slogan is, "When better football is played, we will play it." He will teach his system of football at O. A. C. this summer. His two weeks' course, June 22 to July 3, will be worth much to experienced football coaches; it will also afford a firm foundation for the less experienced.

Paul J. Schissler, head coach of football at O. A. C., will give his course in football coaching, continuing and supplementing the work of Coach Rockne. He will pass on valuable things which have come to him during his successful football campaigns at Lombard College, St. Viator, Hastings College, Doane College, and Nebraska (freshmen). The friendship and former association of the two coaches, Rockne and Schissler, make of them a great instructional team.

BASKET-BALL

COACH "BOB" HAGER will be in charge of the course in basket-ball coaching. Coach Hager has always had teams of championship caliber. He has a "fighting and confidence" psychology which any coach may do well to study.

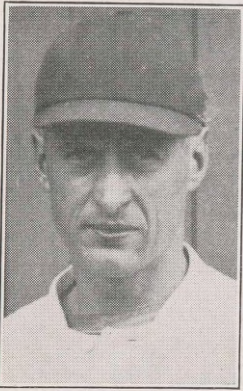
Last season the O. A. C. quintet won the Northwest Conference championship, with Coach Hager's "percentage system" of basket-ball, which was decidedly new and effective.

Before coming to O. A. C. Coach Hager led the Lincoln, Nebraska, high school team to state championship, and set a defensive record no tournament winner has ever duplicated. Out of all teams met in this championship tilt, where 162 teams were entered, only two teams were able to score a single field basket against them. The Oakland (Calif.) Golds under Hager won the P. A. A. championship and rated as the "biggest little team" in the country. They averaged 56 points per game, on a schedule which called for 37 games, each of which fell in the win column.

Coach Hager will also teach a course in track and field athletics and one in tennis.

BASEBALL

COACH RALPH O. COLEMAN will give his regular course in baseball. "Coley" is a graduate of O. A. C., where he played his first baseball. Coach Coleman

is a pitcher himself and has been the property of the Portland baseball club of the Pacific Coast league since 1921. This is Coach Coleman's third year as varsity baseball coach. His teams have been a real credit to him and his school. He has a definite system of play, and each year has seen his teams more dangerous.

"Coley" knows baseball and has been a keen student of the game from the coaching standpoint.

In his baseball coaching course he covers: developing the individual player, judging men for various positions, batting and pitching strategy, team play, and general baseball strategy.

TWO WORLD CHAMPIONS ON SUMMER SESSION STAFF

Wrestling. ROBIN REED is now coach of wrestling at O. A. C., having sacrificed his amateur standing, but not until he had reached the peak of the grappling world as an amateur, being Olympic champion, 1924; National champion, 1921, 125-pound class; National champion, 1923, 136-pound class; National champion, 1924, 135-pound class; Northwest champion, 1924, in four weights, 135, 145, 165, 175 pounds.

"A world champion"—this takes in all the territory open to amateurs. He is considered by many critics one of the cleverest wrestlers of all time. At the Olympic games he won all of his matches by straight falls, a feat seldom duplicated in such fast company. He is a rare combination of talent and

brains. Coach Reed will offer his course for wrestling coaches for the first time this summer. All holds, breaks, and everything which goes to make up a smart wrestler will be covered in a very comprehensive manner. Reed's success has not been an accident, and he is proving a very successful coach.

Swimming. LOUIS "HAPPY" KUEHN, springboard diving champion, 1920 Olympic games, will have charge of everything in aquatics on the program for athletic coaches. Fancy diving will be featured. "Hap" is the Varsity swimming and diving coach at O. A. C. This summer will give every one especially interested in water sports a chance to get the best of training under a coach who has gone through all the preliminary steps which champions have to take. The program in swimming this summer will be conducted in the superb 50-by-100-foot tiled pool.

In this course, besides fancy diving and swim-

ming, Coach Kuehn will give instruction in aquatic games, life-saving, water carnival stunts, and teaching methods for beginners and advanced classes.

GENERAL WORK IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION

While engaged primarily for the program in physical education for women, Mr. Karl Heckrich will contribute to the general program for men, giving instruction in Primitive Gymnastics, Lyric Gymnastics, and Theory of Play, and Playground and Schoolroom Games. Representing a new revolutionary method in free exercises recently developed in Europe, notably in Denmark (Nils Bok), Germany and Czecho-Slovakia, Primitive Gymnastics are new to this country. Mr. Heckrich in introducing them declares them "simply remarkable and great stuff for coaches."

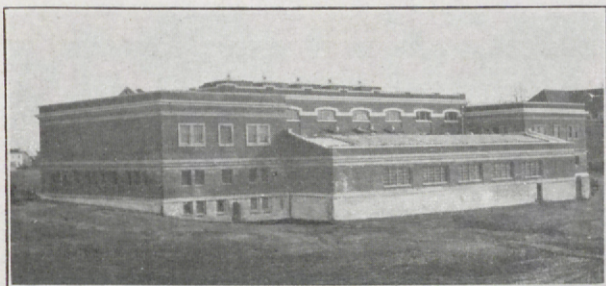
Coaches engaged for basket-ball, football, and baseball often find that they are expected to take charge of classes in branches of Physical Education for which they are not especially prepared. Mr. Heckrich's course supplements the coaching work to afford a rounded equipment.

Karl Heckrich is physical director of the Minneapolis Athletic Club. He returns to O. A. C. after having established a fine record and made many friends in the 1924 Summer Session. He is a personal friend of Mr. Otto Mauthe, of the Multnomah Athletic Club.

Physical Education for Women. The full program in the field of physical education for women will be announced separately by Professor Edna Agnes Cocks, director of physical education for women. Mr. Heckrich will be one of the features of this program. Mr. Heckrich's classes in dancing were outstanding in the 1924 session. He will repeat them. Mr. Heckrich, in his gymnasium and dancing classes, gives work based in part on Chalif, Mascagnio, Vestoff-Serova, and others, with a great deal that is entirely his own. He has studied in New York, Berlin, Dresden, and Vienna.
