Oregon State University is Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning, dating back to October 27, 1868. It was established as one of the nation's land grant colleges, receiving federal land grants to

help launch its public education-service program.

On September 7, 1971, OSU was designated as one of the nation's first four Sea Grant Colleges, charged to help advance man's wise and orderly use of ocean resources and to provide teaching and research programs related to marine sciences. The Oregon State University Marine Science Center at Newport has become OSU's important "Campus on the Coast." The 177-foot, all weather Wecoma and smaller research vessels operate from there in studying the ocean, estuaries and rivers.

From an initial graduating class of three in 1870, OSU has grown to the point that it now confers about 3,500 degrees each June. Student enrollment during the regular school year is about 16,500; summer term enrollment now

tops 5,000.

The main campus covers nearly 500 acres on which there are 100 major buildings. Experimental farms, an arboretum and teaching-research forests, all located within just a few minutes drive of the campus, make up an

additional 18,000 acres.

Oregon State provides the research base for Oregon's two largest industries, forestry and agriculture. In addition to university research facilities and forests, a federal Forest Science Laboratory is located on campus. The Agricultural Experiment Station operates a number of branch stations throughout Oregon for work on specialized, regional problems. Coastal research units, in addition to the Marine Science Center, are the Seafoods Laboratory at Astoria and a fisheries culture station at Netarts Bay.

Water, key to the future, is getting special attention, including work in water resource manangement, water quality and reuse, pollution control, oceanography, fisheries and irrigation. One of the three major National Environmental Research Centers operated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is located on campus, and considerable cooperative research is

underway.

Important additions to the research and training facilities of the Northwest are the OSU Radiation Center, Computer Center, Environmental Health Sciences Center, Air Resources Center and the International Plant Center. Other research units include the Engineering Experiment Station, and the Genetics, Nutrition, Science, Water Resources and Nuclear Science and Engineering Research Institutions. The State Fish and Wildlife Commission's Research Division is headquartered at OSU

Oregon State University is "extended" into every one of Oregon's 36 counties through the extension Service. Extension agents in each country help interpret, adapt and disseminate research findings for practical use and assist in such programs as human and natural resources development. The 4-H Club program, which enrolls approximately 50,000 young Oregonians annually, is a part of the OSU Extension Service. The 4-H program is open to all Oregon youth, ages 9-19.

WHAT IS CREW?

Like fragile water spiders, the rowing shells skim the water's surface, the rowers' backs arching, their arms reaching, their oars dipping in perfect unison. Done well, rowing is among the loveliest of sports.

But beneath the graceful rhythm of rower, oar and wave lie raw strength, back-breaking exertion and yes, pain -- all channeled toward a single end: to move the boat swiftly and surely through the water.

Rowing — the formal version of which is known as crew racing — is America's original spectator sport, and the nation's oldest intercollegiate athletic event, pre-dating football by $17~{\rm years}$.

The first college crew race, in 1852, pitted Harvard against Yale in a contest modeled after England's famed Oxford-Cambridge rivalry, already 23 years old by then. Oxford, Cambridge, Harvard, Yale: with progenitors like these, little wonder that crew racing calls to mind blue blood, Ivy League schools and genteel, aristocratic idylls.

But if you thought crew was the quaint and leisurely pastime of an effete Eastern upper crust, think again. It is a rigorous sport, one that demands strong muscles, intense concentration, and months of grueling practice to perfect.

OSU launched its crew program in 1926; three years later, the team staged -- and won -- its first race against the University of Washington.

Home races start from the OSU crew docks, just north of the VanBuren Avenue Bridge.

What to watch for? At the beginning, the starter will bring the crews just upstream from the starting line and have them drift back until their bows are even. The starter may stop and restart a race within its first 30 seconds if any team's equipment breaks, but otherwise crews are on their own. Boats may be disqualified if they are late to the starting or otherwise violate race regulations.

As in foot racing, different crews use different strategies as they race for victory. A crew may row all out the entire distance; it may hang back slightly, letting another boat set the pace and then "sprint" to the finish; or it may take the lead and attempt to stay there, matching opponent spurts.

Whatever its strategy, each crew's members must strive to work in unison, adding leverage to each thrust by shifting their weight back and forth on the boats' sliding seats.

During the "recovery" phase of the stroke, the rowers try to keep their blades nearly parallel to the water and just inches above its surface; using a rotating wrist motion, they roll the blades perpendicular to the water and instant before dipping back into the catch.

If they're doing it right, you should hear a unified "chshhh" as all of the blades enter the water at the same time.

THE HOME COURSE; WILLAMETTE RIVER -- CORVALLIS, OREGON

The Oregon State Beaver men's and women's crews row on the Willamette River, which flows as a border to the city's downtown area. The course is rowed upstream from the start at Rennie Street to the finish at Washington Street. Although the course is less than the regulation 2,000 meters in length, it approximates a 2,000 meter course in time, depending on the flow of the river. Spectators may view crew races from the east bank of the river above the crew facility, which is located between the 500 and 1,000 meter marks along the river near the base of the Harrison Street bridge. The facility (two boat houses, a muscle clinic, a workshop and a lockerroom area) may be reached via U.S. Highway 34. Races may also be viewed from the Harrison Street or Van Buren Street bridges that span the Willamette River or from automobiles following the events from the west The first college crew race, in 1852, pitted Harvard against Yale 1. . THE RACE

Last year women's races were changed from 1,000 to 2,000 meters due to a change in length of the national competition. All races are now 2,000 meters. Speed of the average eight-person shell varies from 11 to 14 miles per hour and varies between 28 and 44 strokes per minute.

THE OREGON STATE SHELLS

THE PREPARATION

Before an OSU rower steps into a shell for the season's first race, the coaches make sure that that crew member is in shape. This means that the Beaver athletes undergo intensive fall and winter-term training, which includes a regular program of running, bicycling, weight-lifting and overall conditioning. By selling programs and cleaning up Gill Coliseum after athletic events, the athletes raise money for season travel. This winter, the rowers participated in a row-a-thon to raise money for the team.

THE TRANSPORTATION

Considering the size of the OSU crew roster, the Beavers cannot afford to send their rowers out of town by plane for regattas, so they rely on charter buses and/or vans supplied by the Oregon State Motor Pool and use a shell trailer to transport boats. Comaraderie is important to crew team members, since they all work together in preseason fundraising efforts that combine with athletic department funds and alumni and booster club donations to pay for their travel expenses. Sometimes the rowers must cram into as few as three or as many as six or more state vans when they go on road trips. Once in a while a minor disaster will force the athletes' patience to the limit, as a few years ago when the women's novice boat —the Karl F. Drlica — fell off of a van enroute to an ou-of-state regatta.

AN INFORMAL HISTORY OF OSU CREW

In the fall of 1926, two rowing shells arrived in Corvallis on a train with the California football team. They were a gift from the Cal. rowing club. At the time, OSU had no use for them so they were stored temporarily in the basement of Fairbanks Hall. 1929 found the Oregon State Rowing Club (OSRC) staging and winning its first race against Washington. Crew began to grow and by 1935 the club was traveling to race in California and in Washington. Crew was temporarily discontinued until the end of the second World War. In 1950 the OSU business office purchased the 160 acres which includes the site of the present rowing facilities. Women began rowing at OSU in 1952 in an intramural program. Throughout its growth since the early thirties, the OSRC had gained recognition as a highly competitive crew and was respected throughout the nation. Acknowledgment of this came in the mid 1960's when the Varsity team organization granted the crew membership and permission to grant eight inch varsity letters. The OSU Board of Intercollegiate Athletics accepted the crew as a varsity sport in 1967. At that time acceptance was limited to the heavyweights. In 1977, both the women's crew and the men's lightweight crew were given varsity sport status.

COACHING STAFF

DAVE EMIGH: Second-year OSU Head Coach, Fourth-year men's coach Washington State University graduate (BA 1973, MS 1979)

Emigh started rowing at Washington State University in 1971. He raced for the WSU Rowing Club during the 1972 and 1973 seasons. He then became a member of the Lake Washington Rowing Club. Emigh competed in open races through 1982 and has recently competed in Master's (over 27 years old) sculling races.

Emigh coached at Washington State for four years (1976-79). WSU finished fourth in the Pacific-10 during those years. In 1979, the eight year old WSU Rowing Club won the Varsity-4 Intercollegiate National Rowing

Championship.

Oregon State won the Intercollegiate Freshman-4 with coxswain and finished second in the Varsity-4 with coxswain during Emigh's first season. Oregon State placed eleventh overall, with ten competitors finishing ahead of the fifty man contingent from Cornell as well as many others.

Last year Emigh took an inexperienced (by Pac-10 standards) varsity boat to a fifth place Pac-10 finish and a Northwest Regional Championship title, beating the University of Washington heavyweights for the first time

since 1977.

ROGER PAYNE: Second-year OSU women's coach University of Washington graduate (1976)

Payne rowed at the University of Washington and had a successful sweep and sculling career at Lake Washington Rowing Club. He has coached women at LWRC and Seattle Pacific, coached junior scullers from the North-west region at the Sports Festival, worked with the Northwest Women's lightweight team in 1984 and worked with several elite scullers.

Last year, Payne took the women's Varsity-4 to a fourth place finish

in National competition.

JOHN HOLTMAN: First-year assistant men's coach Washington State University graduate (1982)

At Washington State, under Emigh's watchful eye, Holtman rowed to the 1979 National Championship as part of the Cougar Varsity-4. 1980 found Holtman capturing the Collegiate Pair title.

As a member of the Vesper Boat Club in Philadelphia, Holtman collected seven national medals, two N.W. Regional championships, and a silver medal at the National Sports Festival. He placed third in the World Championship Trials and was a member of the all Pac-10 team.

From September 1981 to June 1983, Holtman assistant coached the

Cougar program.

HOLLY KAYS: First-year assistant women's coach Oregon State University graduate (1985)

Kays was the 1985 Varsity captain, most valuable senior and Varsity "O" award winner. The three-year letter winner capped her career at OSU with fourth place in the Varsity-4 at the Collegiate Nationals and, two weeks later, won the petite finals of the Women's Sr. Single at the Women's Open Nationals in her first competition as a single sculler. In addition to coaching, Holly is training hard towards her goal of winning a spot on the U.S. National Team.

1986 SEASON OUTLOOK

MEN'S OUTLOOK

A relatively inexperienced lineup of oarsmen has head crew coach Dave Emigh expecting constant progress throughout the 1986 season.

Seven eights of men (63, including coxswains) turned out for practice, providing a young but strong talent pool for future crew campaigns. Over half of those men are novice rowers.

Last year the men's lightweight eight progressed from a two-length deficit to a two-length advantage in just a six week period.

"The progress may not be quite that dramatic," cautioned Emigh, "but we will definitely see a change.

For the last four years, Pacific-10 order of finish has been static.

Although the length differences have changed, the crews of the conference have consistently finished in the following order: University of Washington, California, UCLA, Stanford, OSU, Washington State, USC, and UO.

Emigh feels it's difficult for any team to make a breakthrough in this order due to the combination of financial support and strong tradition, that have become synonymus with the leading programs.

Last year marked the first time in history that both the men's and women's teams won the Regional competition for Oregon State. An OSU boat had not beaten a UW boat in openweight competition since 1977.

WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

The 1986 Varsity crew is a small squad with little depth. With just three members of last year's Regional Championship crew returning, the women are short on racing experience. However, the return of two oarswomen who did not compete last year and the advancement of three from the '85 novice crew adds up to a group capable of matching last year's performance.

According to Payne, this year's crew has trained hard and has higher technical and fitness levels than the 1985 crew.

Payne feels his novice crew has the size, depth and athletic ability to be serious contenders for West Coast Championship medals.

OTHER CREW TRADITIONS

THE DUNKING OF THE ATHLETES

It's difficult to say how this ritual began or under what circumstances it is practiced, but most rowers will tell you that it's spontaneous. It usually occurs on a nice day — either during practice or after races—when a group or boat of rowers get together and decide it's time for one of their teammates to take a bath. Often they throw their victim in the water because of a birthday, foul language or a poor performance, but sometimes even the elation of a win can move crew members to act in such a way. There are no set rules for this tradition.

THE BETTING OF RACING SHIRTS

Because this tradition is so expensive, many athletes have opted to limit it to the most prestigious races, but it remains a popular season event. It begins when a boat of rowers collectively decides to bet its shirts against a competing boat before the race between them begins. The winner ends up with the loser's school color imprinted racing shirt as a status piece of apparel to flash around through the remainder of the season. Favorites of OSU rowers are the purple-and-gold shirts off the backs of the Washington Huskies and the red-and-white jerseys of the Stanford Cardinal.
