

OSU COACHING STAFF



Dave Emigh

Men's Varsity Coach Eighth-year, OSU Head Coach Tenth-year Men's Coach

Washington State University (BA 1973, MS 1979)

Emigh started rowing at Washington State University in 1971. He raced for the WSU Rowing Club during the 1972 and 1973 seasons and then became a member of the Lake Washington Rowing Club. Emigh competed in open races through 1982.

Emigh coached at Washington State for four years (1976-79) with his teams finishing fourth in the Pacific-10 during those years. In 1979, the eight year old WSU Rowing Club won the Varsity-4 Intercollegiate National Rowing Championship.

Oregon State won the Intercollegiate Freshman-4 with coxswain and finished second in the Varsity-4 with coxswain during Emigh's first season. In 1987, the men's lightweight 8 boat was the first OSU boat to claim a victory at the San Diego Crew Classic. The 1987 lightweight 8 finished fourth in the nation (OSU's highest finish for a Men's 8 at National Championships). Emigh coached at the U.S. Olympic festival in 1989 and 1991. Eight current or former Beaver rowers won medals in the 1991 U.S. Open National Championships.



Roger Payne Women's Varsity Coach Eighth-year OSU Women's Coach

University of Washington, 1976.

Payne rowed as a lightweight at the University of Washington and had a successful sculling career at the Lake Washington Rowing Club. While at LWRC Roger won 10 regional championships in all boat classes and four consecutive Canadian Henley championships in lightweight double sculls.

Roger has coached women at LWRC and Seattle Pacific University. He has, also, worked with several National and Olympic team scullers. Payne was head coach at the 1989 Lightweight Women's Development Camp at Lake Placid, NY and at the Olympic Festival in Oklahoma City, OK. Currently, he is a member of the Lightweight Men's Committee of the U.S. Rowing Association.

Some successful OSU varsity women's crews under Payne include: 1985 Northwest Regional Varsity 8 champion, 1986 NW Regional Lightweight 4 Champions, 1986 second place Lightweight 4 National Collegiate Champions, 1986 and 1987 third place Collegiate Rowing Champions in the Lightweight 8 and 1991 NW Regional Champions, Varsity and JV 8's.

Clark Jones Men's Novice Coach Second-year

Oregon State University, 1988.

Jones graduated from Corvallis H.S. in 1983 and played soccer and wrestling for all four years. While going to school at OSU, Jones participated in crew from 1983-86, redshirted 1986-87, varsity 1985-88. In spring of 1991, Jones assisted the Novice women. And in the summer of 1991 he was the assistant coach for the Olympic Festival Development Camp.

At the current time, Jones is working on a graduate degree at OSU. Jones combines his degrees in education, crew experience and military training to provide his athletes with a well organized

training program.

Jones' philosophy is to teach good rowing technique as a basis for developing controlled, yet aggressive crews. He spends countless hours in racing shell repair and maintenance to provide his crew with excellent equipment.

OREGON STATE CREW

Rowing has often been described as the most magnificent of all sports. The power and grace of a boat gliding through the water, with the rowers working in perfect harmony, creates an image matched in no other experience.

NO EXPERIENCE REQUIRED

THE ROWER:

Successful oarswomen come from a variety of athletic backgrounds including basketball, volleyball, soccer, track and field, etc. We have even had members in the varsity boat who had no competitive athletic background prior to rowing. In fact, 95 percent of our crew athletes have never rowed prior to coming to OSU. Everyone starts out even in crew. DESIRE, DETER-MINATION and HARDWORK will win you your seat in the boat!

Suggested size of an oarswoman: 5'6" or taller, 125-185 pounds. However, there are **no size restrictions**. Smaller athletes have made it into our best varsity crews.

THE COXSWAIN - the "quarterback" of the crew:

Prior to informing you more about this position it should be known that a coxswain for the women's crews may be of either gender.

Coxswains are very important members of the team. No coaching is allowed from the shore during crew races so the coxswain is the "player-coach" on the water. A coxswains duties include: directing the shells (boats) to and from the water, conducting on the water warmups, commenting on and correcting technical inconsistences and implementing the race plan and strategy.

Suggested size of a women's coxswain is a minimum of 100 pounds.

HISTORY OF ROWING AT OSU

In the fall of 1926, two rowing shells arrived in Corvallis with the California football team. The shells were a gift from the California rowing club. At the time, OSU had no use for the boats, and they were stored temporarily in the basement of Fairbanks Hall. In 1929, the Oregon State Rowing Club (OSRC) staged and won its first race against Washington. Crew began to grow, and by 1935 the club travelled to race in California and Washington. Crew was temporarily suspended during the Second World War.

In 1950, the OSU business office purchased the 160 acres which now includes the rowing facilities. Women began rowing at OSU in 1952 through an intramural program. Throughout its history, the OSRC had gained recognition and respect as a highly competitive crew. By the mid 1960's, the Varsity Team Organization granted Crew membership and gave permission to award full-size Varsity letters. The OSU Board of Intercollegiate Athletics accepted the Crew as a Varsity sport in 1967. At that time, only heavyweights were considered Varsity, but in 1977, both the women's crew and the men's Lightweight crew were made Varsity sports.

The 1980's marked progress for the OSU crew as they sent boats to the national championships and launched individual rowers to world prominence. In 1980, the Women's Senior 8 boat claimed both the National Open and Collegiate championships.

As the Beavers row into the 1990's even greater things are expected. Each year the team sets its sights on medals at the Pacific Coast Rowing Championships and on a bid to the Collegiate Championships.


HOME WATER & FACILITIES AT OSU

FALL ROWING & WINTER TRAINING

FALL ROWING

Fall training consists mostly of endurance and strength training for the <u>varsity crews</u>. Practices are in the mornings from 5:45 - 7:15 am with weights twice a week from 4:30 - 5:30. These teams thrust into training for their fall regattas which consist of three and four mile races and one sprint of 1000 meters. To make the boat this past season, a point system was used with a variety of tests. Tests included 10,000m, 5000m, 2000m ergs, bench pulls, four pair trials, three mile run, and flexibility. The six port and six starboard athletes with the least points made the traveling squads of one eight and one four.

WINTER TRAINING

Winter training begins the first day of classes of Winter Quarter. Practice times switch from the morning to the afternoon from 3:45-5:30 (approximately). With weather permitting the varsity and novice crews will row on the water five days a week. Varsity weight training moves to two mornings a week at 5:45-7:15. One day a week the teams will come off the water and do a land work out, either running stairs, hills or rowing on an ergometer. During on the water training, the teams begin to work on getting their race paces and practicing their racing starts. On Friday's, all the men's and women's teams get together and have races or do 10 minute pieces together. Near the end of winter training the coaches begin choosing their top crews and preparing for upcoming races, the majority of these races are during Spring Quarter.

Tom Emmons, Assistant Strength Conditioning Coach, at OSU had the following to say about our varsity crews: "Our rowers work as hard as anyone in the United States. Five and six days a week they are on the water or in the weight room preparing to win. As individuals they are enthusiastic and put themselves forward in all that I have seen them do. As a team they have a strong nucleus of leaders but many of the best efforts that I have seen have been more a function of a 'team desire' and 'gung ho' attitude then any specific individual.

Both women and men train in this weightroom twice weekly and are pushed to their limits. Workouts here are not designed to be easy and are not for the fainthearted. Time and time again our varsity women and men surprise me with the way their intensity translates to results. I look forward to our coming season and feel confident that we will be prepared."

BEAVER OUTLOOK

MEN'S SEASON OUTLOOK

Oregon State has continued to produce outstanding oarsmen. This summer three former Oregon State oarsmen, Karl Bjergo, Charlie Owen and Shane Petersen, were members of the 1991 U.S. Pan American Team. Bjergo and Petersen both won silver medals. The three oarsmen were the most male athletes from one university on the Pan American Rowing Team.

Bjergo, Owen and Petersen last rowed for OSU in 1989. It took them two years of training, past their college careers (including summer rowing), in order to develop enough to make the National Team.

The keys to producing faster OSU Varsity crews are to:

- * have more athletes with National Team potential together at the same time
- * provide more rowing specific training so the athletes reach National Team quality at an earlier age

We have adapted our program to achieve both of these goals. The development of a freshman (first year in college only) eight has become a priority here at OSU. This allows us to enter both a Freshman and a Novice (first year rower of any year in college) eight at the Pacific Coast Rowing Championships.

We, therefore, double the number of first year athletes racing in a Championship event and bring more athletes with National Team potential into the program.

Currently, a majority of our new rowers are not freshman. They are sophomores or juniors and most do not have an opportunity to row for four years. Freshman can row collegiately for four years and, therefore, can reach their rowing potential at an earlier age.


WOMEN'S SEASON OUTLOOK

The varsity women's team returns six members from last year's regional champion eight and two members from the Pacific Coast bronze medalist lightweight eight. With the consolidation of the lightweight and heavyweight programs, the return of two redshirts, and the addition of a transfer from UPS and a boatload of hardworking novices, there has been quite a battle for seats in the first boat. Several 1991 varsity boat athletes were not in the varsity eight during fall racing. The squad has a lot of experience, with seven women who have been in the program three or four years. This year's varisty will not be a physically dominating group, but will make up for their relative lack of size with excellent technique, good internal leadership and work ethic, and a very aggressive race plan, with a goal of making the finals at the Pacific Coast Championships.

The novice women currently have three boatloads of athletes working hard to make the first novice eight. Our 1991-92 novice crew will be one of the biggest and strongest groups we have had at Oregon State. They will physically match up well with any crew on the west coast, and under assistant coach Charlie Owen's capable direction are setting their sights on medalling at the Pacific Coast Championships.
