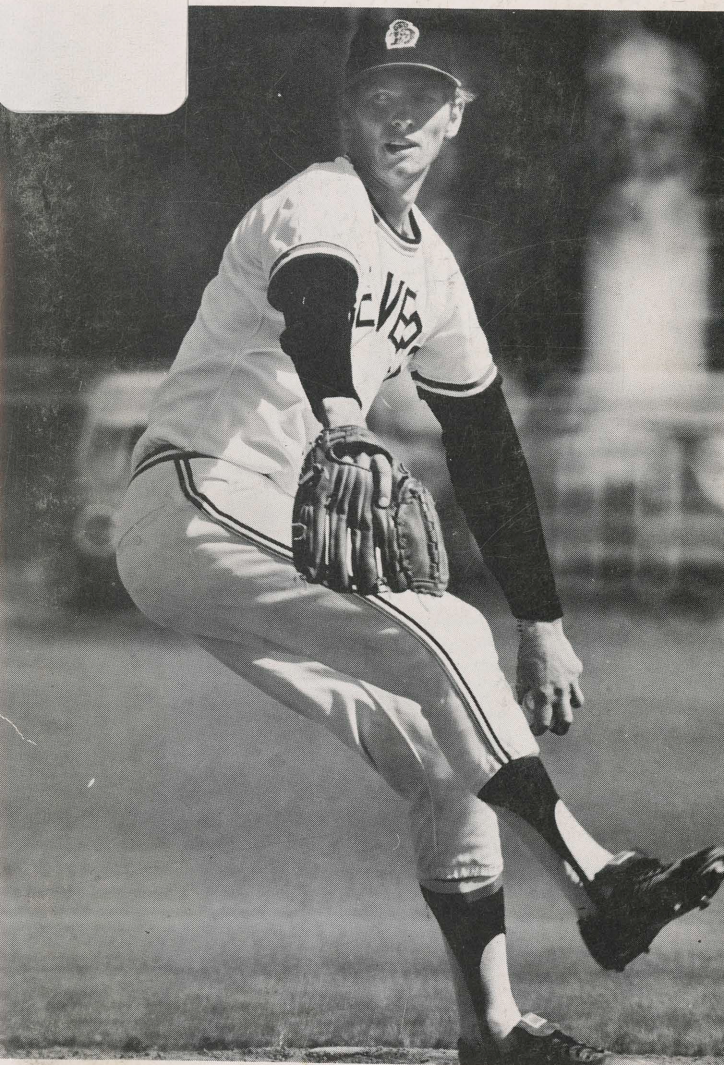

KNOW YOUR COACHES

JACK RILEY — BASEBALL

OSU's newest head coach joined the staff September 1, 1972. Previously Riley was head baseball and basketball coach and athletic director at Lower Columbia College in Longview, WA. He is a 1960 graduate of Linfield College and earned a master's degree in education from Oregon State in 1971. He attended Grant High in Portland and gained All-State honors in basketball and was second leading scorer in state his senior year. Later, at Linfield, he became the first player in history to be named to the All-Northwest Conference first team four consecutive years and the first player to take league scoring honors three straight years. He was named to four All-American teams. He was also three-time all-conference in baseball and as a senior, led the NAIA in stolen bases. Following graduation, he was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers and played with the Salem Dodgers from 1961 through 1963. Prior to taking his position at Lower Columbia, Riley taught and coached at Portland's Jefferson High. He was assistant baseball and basketball coach from 1960-62, at which time he was named head

basketball coach. His teams placed fourth and third in State A-1 tourneys. During his stint at LCC, Riley's baseball teams won four straight Coastal Division championships, won the State title in 1970 and also finished second, third and fourth in the tournament. Overall, his record was 97-31. Born 4/22/38; Wife: Jean; Children: Mike, 5-27-60; Mickey, 8-8-61; Pam, 10-12-64.

PAUL VALENTI — TENNIS

Valenti took over the tennis reins in 1971, following 24 years of association with Oregon State's basketball program, first as a player, then as an assistant coach and finally as head coach. In three years he has put OSU's tennis program at the top of the list in the Pacific Northwest. Tennis is not a new game for Valenti, who was a standout player as a youth. As a collegiate player, however, on the basketball staff for 18 years, 1945-63, he stepped up to basketball star out of Larkspur, CA in the fall of 1938. With the exception of Navy service in WWII, he has been on the campus ever since. He led the freshmen to an undefeated season and then starred three years on the varsity. After serving as an assistant he concentrated on basketball. Although not a native of the state, Oregon is quick to claim him. He came to Corvallis as a freshman the head coaching job when Slat Gill became the athletic director in 1964. His six-year total while head coach was 85-74 and included a Pacific-8 championship in 1966. That year he was named "Coach of the Year" for the West Coast and was selected at the Hayward Banquet of Champions as Slat Gill "Man of the Year" in Oregon. In three years his teams have won 50 dual meets and lost only 9. Last year they were 16-2 overall and 15-0 in dual competition. In addition to his tennis coaching duties, Valenti is also assistant to the athletic director. Born 9/10/20; Wife Fran; Children: Vicki and JoAnn.

KARL DRLICA — CREW

Drlica has been crew coach at Oregon State since 1950, although the sport didn't become a major sport at OSU until 1968. Previously, crew was under the jurisdiction of the Recreation program. Drlica, a native of Juneau, Alaska, moved to Portland as a youth and attended Benson High School. He is a 1940 graduate of Oregon State and from 1946 through 1950 he held a civilian position with the U.S. military government in Japan. Since returning to OSU, Drlica has also received his Master's degree. Dividing his time between coaching OSU's crew team and teaching physical education classes in crew and other water related activities, Drlica is very active in promoting crew competition throughout Oregon. Born: 12/3/17. Wife: Gail; Children: Dr. Steve, Dr. Karl, Karen, Diane.

DICK SHAFER — GOLF

Appointed golf coach during the summer of 1972, Shafer is a retired Navy captain and former submarine captain. Although born in Baltimore, Maryland, Shafer was raised and attended high school in Oberlin, Ohio. He was a four sport athlete, football, basketball, track and golf. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1940, after starting on the Navy football, golf and track teams. He was the only member of his graduating class to win the "N" Star in three sports, given to Navy athletes who are on teams that defeat Army. He was named Most Valuable Player on the 1939 Navy football team and scored the winning TD against the Army in 1939, operating as a tailback in a single wing attack. Shafer gained the rank of Captain in July, 1959. Among his Naval assignments was a stint as Commanding Officer of the Oregon State NROTC unit, 1960-62. He retired in 1964 and is currently employed by a Corvallis investment securities firm. Born: 11-19-16; Wife: Betty; Childrer.: Patricia, Robin, Jane, Dick Jr.

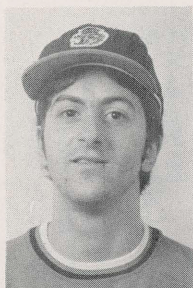

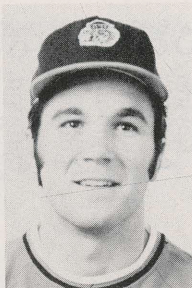

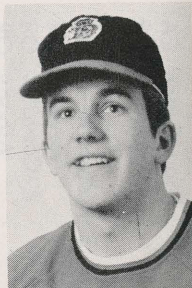

RICH DODGE INF Freshman 5-10 175 18 R-R

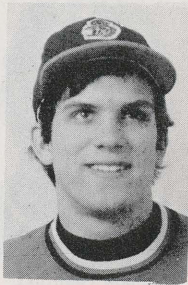

ROB DRAHN INF Sophomore 5-11 185 19 R-R

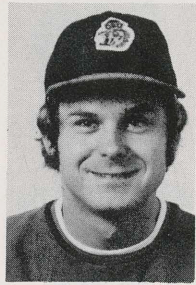

RON GARNER P Senior 5-11 180 22 L-L

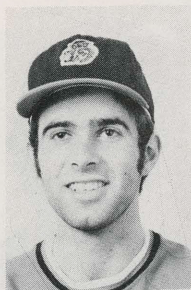

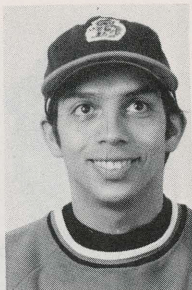
GREG JURGENSON P Senior 6-4 196 21 L-L

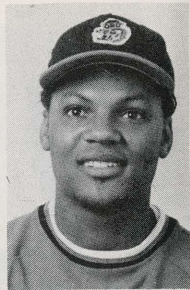

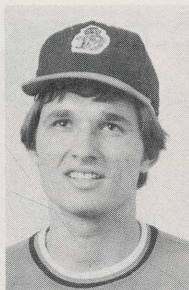

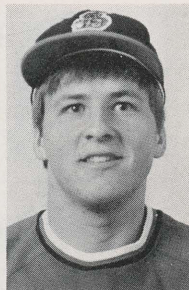

ANDY MASON INF Freshman 6-2 196 18 R-R

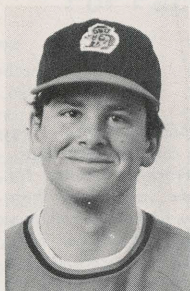

TOM SIMAS INF Junior 5-11 170 20 R-R

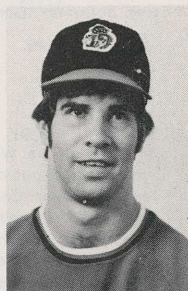

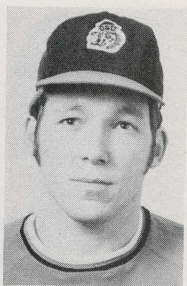

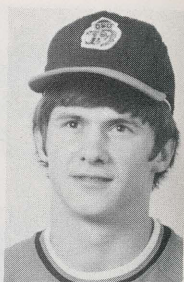

Facts About Crew

A. The Crew Race

Length of the course depends on the water available. Varies on Pacific Coast from $7/8$ mile to three miles. Most universities row the Olympic distance.

Olympic Distance — 2000 meter (just over $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles).

Speed of an eight-man shell — from 11 to 14 miles per hour; 1000 to 1200 feet per minute; 17.5 feet per second.

Eight-man crew develops about four horsepower.

Between seventy and eighty pounds of pressure is applied to the oar handle each stroke per man.

Strokes per minute — varies between 28 to 44.

B. The Oarsman

Coxswain weight — minimum 110 pounds

Oarsman weight — 175 to 200 pounds

Oarsman height — 6-0 to 6-6.

Lightweight division (men) — under 160 pounds

Lightweight division (women) — under 130 pounds.

C. The Equipment

1) The shell:

Weight — 280 pounds.

Length — 58 to 64 feet.

Width — 24 inches.

Skin — $5/32$ inches thick.

Seat — travels 28 inches on wheels.

Stretcher boots — simulated shoe to feet in boat.

2) The oar:

Weight — $8\frac{1}{2}$ pounds.

Length — 12'1" to 12'6".

Material — spruce.
