OSU Clinches Deal with PP&L

A jubilant Organ State University president John Byrche announced Wedenesday in his annual State of the Staid address that secret negotiations held over the past seven months with Pacific Power and Light company have borne fruit. "I am here to announce a deal with PP&L that will be of tremendous benefit to Organ State

University," saith Byrche. "Over the past two years we have come to realize that the power grid on our campus, which was designed in the 1950s is antiquated, prone to breakdowns and needs to be replaced. Consequently, we began negotiations back in April with PP&L in hopes of replacing our current system. Last night, after a round-the-

clock marathon bargaining session, we came to an agree-

Byrche then went on to explain the terms of the deal. "In exchange for the sum of one dollar, Organ State University agrees, effective immediately, to sell to PP&L all of its vice-presidents and the kilowatt minute of power they share. Further, OSU

agrees not to co-generate vice-presidents in the future and will pay PP&L \$150,000 per year to not return any of the vice-presidents."

Locally, analysts generally agreed that the deal was a good one for OSU, but questioned whether Byrche would be able to hold up his end of the co-generation



Campus Disaster Plans Announced
