HISTORY OF O. A. C.

In 1862 Congress appropriated 90,000 acres of land to the State of Oregon, on condition that they have a college in operation by 1867.

The destiny of O. A. C. might have been changed had it not been for the generosity of the South Methodists in donating their church building as the first "Temple of Learning."

This simple old structure served as the entire college for many years, for in 1867 there were but twenty students registered.

O. A. C. was founded as a National and State institution in 1885.

In 1887 Benton County gave thirty-five acres of land to secure a permanent college at Corvallis, and in this same year the citizens of Benton County laid the corner-stone for the present Administration Building.

At this time only four courses were taught, they being Agriculture, General Science, Mechanical Arts, and Household Science.

In 1899 only a limited number of students could take advantage of gratuitous education there being but one chosen from each Senatorial and Representative District.

By way of comparison, the college has grown from four main courses with five instructors and twenty students in 1867, to more than thirty-five main courses, two hundred fifty instructors and more than four thousand students in 1919. O. A. C. boasts of having representatives from every county in Oregon, from thirty-two other states, and from eight territories and foreign countries.

In accommodations O. A. C. has developed from one building and thirty-five acres of land in 1885 to twenty-eight substantial buildings and three hundred forty-nine acres of land in 1919.

Perhaps the most important factor in the wonderful development of "Our O. A. C." is the fact that there have been but very few changes in the Presidential chair, President Kerr having been with us since 1907.

COLLEGE TRADITIONS

It has been the custom for many years for the departing class to leave a gift that will enrich the campus.

The "Lady of the Fountain," the Band Stand, the Maples in front of the Mines Building and other places on the campus, Cement Seat by the Women's Gym on the lower campus, and the Drinking Fountain in front of Agricultural Hall are the gifts of former classes.

The large cottonwood tree between the Administration Building and Science Hall bears an interesting history. Briefly told, this old landmark once served as a front yard shade tree, then after the establishment of O. A. C. this tree was used as a general meeting place for all students.

In 1907 a large stone was placed beneath it which seemed to hallow even the surrounding ground, for since that time only Seniors have been deemed worthy to tread the grass beneath the old sentinel.
