The name Barometer was suggested by Frank E. "Johnnie" Edwards, the first editor. Edwards, now deceased, came back from the Philippines with the rank of major in the army.

The monthly College Barometer was first issued in February 1896, and five numbers were published that year.

The baby Barometer printed the general and departmental news of the school—the first of numerous stories by Dennis H. Stovall, '88, an oration by Mildred Linville Patterson, '96, that won second place at the University of Washington in competition with other Northwest colleges, and all of the oral addresses of that year's graduating class.

It has been a long and tedious climb from this small beginning to the present standard maintained in publishing the Barometer, and this writer wishes to congratulate the students and professors on their outstanding achievements.

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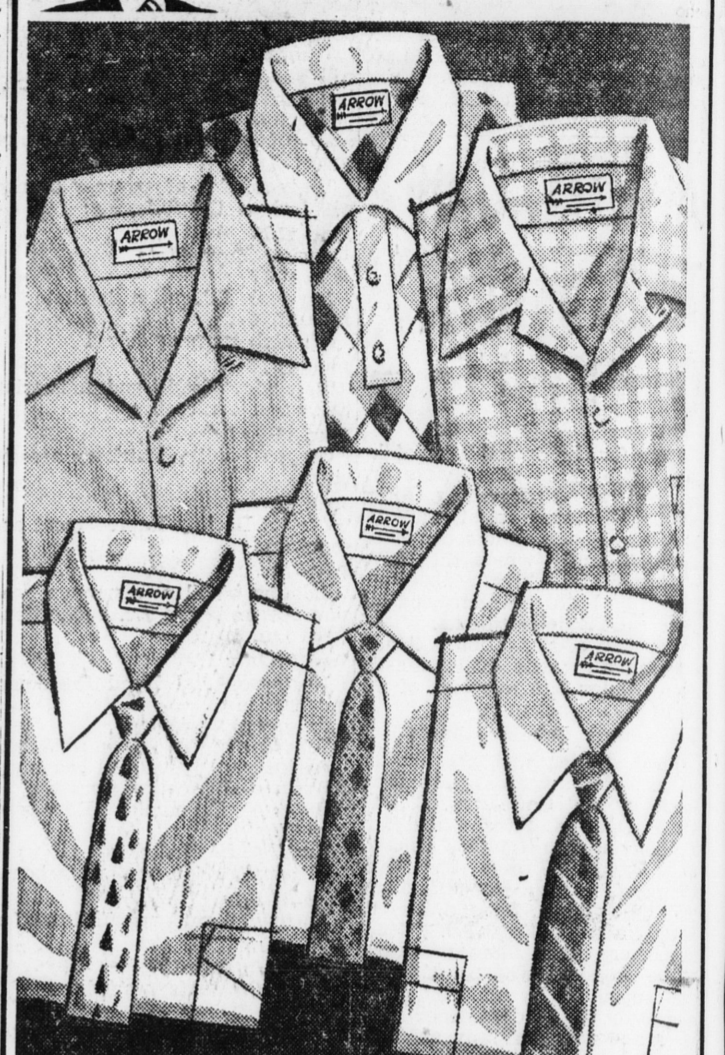

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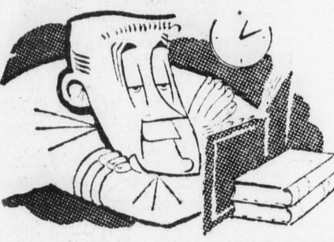

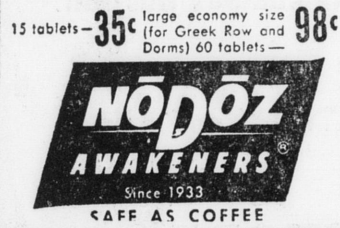

Beaver Nine Chooses Exley to Lead '56 Team

All American Jay Dean added another honor to his fast-growing list last Wednesday when he became the first two-time winner of the annual Victor D. Brown memorial award at the annual baseball awards dinners at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

Dean, leading hitter in the Northern Division this year, won the award last year. The trophy goes annually to the OSC baseball player who contributes the most in inspirational leadership and sportsmanship to the Beaver baseball team. The award started in 1947 in honor of Victor D. Brown Jr., OSC baseball player who was killed in World War II.

Dean, this year's baseball captain, announced that Jerry Exley has been chosen by his teammates to captain the Beaver nine next year. Exley, a junior, was chosen on the all-northern division baseball team this year.

First Winner
Lowell Pearce, sophomore right-hander, became the first winner of the Bill Cloyes award, a new honor which will go annually to the outstanding pitcher. Cloyes, a former Beaver pitcher

in the late 20's, is one of the most active Oregon State alumni. The award is based on won-lost record, earned run average, calibre of opposition, and number of innings pitched.

Baseball coach Ralph Coleman presented a going-away present to the five graduating seniors who have played four years of varsity baseball under Coleman. They were Dean, Bobby Buob, Chuck Fisk, Jim Ruggles, and Jack Stehenson. Dean presented Coleman with the team's gift to the Beaver mentor.

The evening's final presentation was made by Earl Heckart, long-time rooster of OSC athletics, who gave the five graduates a book written by the immortal Grantland Rice.

SAE Scores 77 To Win Crown

Sigma Delta Psi, national athletic honorary fraternity, today announced the final standings for this year's competition in athletic skills. Sigma Alpha Epsilon is first in team competition, and Dave Johnson, Beta, is high individual scorer with qualification in nine events.

Sigma Delta Psi events are held each year on a team or individual basis. SAE scored a total of 89 points. Only 77, however, applied to the team trophy, because credit was given only to those men who have completed three or more events.

Second place was Beta Theta Pi with 72, 49 of which are toward the team trophy. In third, fourth, and fifth places Sigma Chi, Theta Chi, and Tau Kappa Epsilon.

The 1955-56 Oregon State basketball team will participate in the annual Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C., in addition to hosting five inter-sectional contests at Corvallis next year, Roy (Spec) Keene, Athletic director, announced Monday.

The Beaver hoopers will open next year's hoop season with Oregon in a non-conference game in Eugene on Friday, December 2, and then tangle with the University of Colorado the following night here.

The Beavers and Ducks will join in another of their annual home-and-home double-headers, on December 20 at Corvallis, Oregon will take on Northwestern in the opener, while the Beavers meet Michigan in the second game. The following night

at Eugene, the two Oregon schools will switch opponents.

Dixie Classic During the Christmas vacation, the OSC hoopers will make their second appearance at the annual Dixie Classic. Two years ago, the Beavers made their first trip to Raleigh, losing their first two games in the three-night stand.

Larry Paulus is the only returning basketballer who made the 1953 trip.

Next winter's defending PCC champions will be without the services of nine of the twelve squad members. The most noticeable loss is towering Swede Halbrook. All-coast center, who was suspended from school because of scholastic reasons. Halbrook is now in Wichita, where he is working and will play ball for an AAU team next year.

Not Returning Other members of last year's championship outfit who will not return are Tony Vlastelica, Tex Whiteman, Bill Toole, Ron Robbins, Reggie Halligan, Jay Dean, and

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Five Varsity, Eight Rooks Duel In Oregon Trackfest; Church Tabbed For Top Spot In Javelin Feature

A thirteen-man Oregon State track squad, composed of five varsity thinclads and eight men from the Rook squad, will enter the Oregon State AAU meet in Portland Saturday night. The annual track festival is being held on the Lincoln high school field.

Participating from the varsity track team will be Jerry Church, northern division javelin champion; Jerry Larson, two mile; Ernie Warren, hurdles and pole vault; Bill Morrison, sprints; and Jack McEneaney, high jump.

Second Triumph Church, in addition to winning the northern division javelin for the second straight year, placed third in last weeks PCC meet at Eugene. The strong-armed senior got off his best throw of his career last week, 220 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Larson, only a sophomore, will have plenty of competition in the two-mile. Also entering the event are Ken Reiser, Oregon's PCC champion who ran a 9:02.6 two-mile last week in Eugene, and Neil Rader, who finished fifth in that event in the PCC.

Top Hurdler Warren, a fifth-place finisher in the high hurdles in the PCC, is expected to get plenty of competition from Jack Morris, Oregon frosh standout hurdler, and Al Torgerson, N.D. high hurdles king from W.S.C.

Competing from the Rooks are Wayne Moss, high jump; Sam Wesley, sprints and broad jump; Wendell Brooks, 440; Bill Fredericks, hurdles; Benson Foley, pole

vault; Neil Saling, weights; Ron Jolly, javelin; and Dave Jesmer. Shot put, and discus.

Moss Favored Moss is the favorite in the high jump. The ex-Rook basketballer has cleared 6-4 this year, the best mark in the Northwest. The Rook standout is also a strong contender in the shot put, but will have to beat Burl Grinos, northern division shotput champion.

Wesley, a consistent 10-second, 100-yard dash man, will also face some stiff opposition in the sprints. Bob Gary, double winner in the PCC meet in the 100 and 200 and Morris, who ran a .09.8 hundred in beating Wesley two weeks ago, are the favorites.

Duel Renewed Fredericks and Morris are looking forward to a renewal of their duel in the 200-yard hurdles. In the final Rook-Frosh track meet, Fredericks led Morris all the way to the last hurdle, but tripped on the final stick and had Morris come from behind to edge him out.

The University of Oregon will enter Bill Dellinger, two-time PCC mile champion and defending NCAA king, in the mile. Other Duck standouts who will enter the meet are Doug Clement, 880 man, hurdlers Doug Basham, and Bill Sorsby, and javelin tosser Ed Bingham. Jim Bailey who won the PCC 800 last week, will not compete due to a bad leg.

Good High Schoolers Some outstanding high school

performers have also entered the meet. They include Roosevelt's Roger Stout and Mark Robbins, who finished one-two in the state high school mile, Jim Grelle, new Oregon high school 880-record holder, and Eldon Francis, Medford's state champion javelin thrower.

Grant high's John Erickson, Oregon 440-yard dash winner, will oppose Churk Chronis of Vancouver, Washington's quarter-mile king.

The state of Washington's 100 and 200 yard champ, Clarence Goosby, will run against Huey Gattin of Portland's Jefferson, Oregon 100-yard dash champion, and Julius Strong, state 220-yard winner.

Another Nifty Another interesting duel looms in the high school weights, where Washington's state shot and discus king, Steve Fry, meets up with Duane Marshall of St. Helens and Bob Amble of Albany. Fry has heaved the iron ball a state-record distance of 59 feet 3 1/2 inches, while Marshall holds the Oregon record at 58 feet 2 1/2 inches.

In the discus, Amble has the best mark. The Albany lad has recorded a 164 feet 6 1/2 inch throw, while Fry's best mark is 160 feet 1 1/2 inches. Another Washington discus thrower, Ray Kinnaman of Centralia, has thrown the platter 161 feet three inches.

Aschbacher Signs With San Francisco

Big Ron Aschbacher, Oregon State's all-coast tackle, has signed a contract with the professional San Francisco 49'ers of the National football league. Aschbacher, a senior, performed in the annual East-West Shrine game last New Year's day, in addition to being the outstanding performer on last year's cellar-dwelling Beaver eleven.

The big tackle turned down an offer to play with Edmonton of the Canadian pro grid circuit, preferring instead to stay on the Pacific Coast. Aschbacher will report to the 49'ers summer training site at St. Mary's, Calif., on July 10.

The San Francisco club is planning on shifting the 220-pounder to defensive end instead of his customary tackle position. Aschbacher drew the raves of Southern writers after his one-man performance against California and USC last fall.
