

# HERE'S HOW OREGON AND WYOMING STACK UP

It seems like a tough act to follow, but ask anyone from players to coaches about the turnover from a top-ten matchup to a game against Wyoming and the same answer resonates. No disrespect toward Wyoming, but the national exposure following this game won't quite be comparable. Nevertheless, Oregon will conclude its non-conference schedule Saturday with an early morning kickoff at 11 a.m., before beginning Pac-12 play.

#### **OFFENSE:**

**Oregon:** Marcus Mariota is proving to be everything that he was predicted to be early in the year. He now has a marquee win next to his name and he should continue to scorch the opposing defense with a combination of instinct and ability. That's not a question.

What will be worth watching, however, is how the offensive line operates with the presumed addition of Tyrell Crosby. Crosby played well by all accounts last Saturday and we can assume he will get the first start of his career on Saturday, but it will still be something that coaches will most likely key on. Elsewhere, Oregon is simply more athletic than Wyoming's defense and it will come down to how the game plan is executed.

Wyoming: The last time Wyoming's head coach,

Craig Bohl, lost a game was in November of 2011. The ex-North Dakota State head coach has a longer winning streak in charge of a program than Mark Helfrich has as a head coach period. The threetime national champion at the FCS level has a different challenge though at Wyoming and against an Oregon defensive line that overmatches the Cowboys' offensive front.

While at NDSU, Bohl was known for a powerful downhill rushing attack that included two running backs who ran for over 1,300 yards in 2013. He is now in the beginning stages of implementing that same type of system at Wyoming, but it will obviously come in stride. The offense has scored just 17 points per game in its first two contests of the season, but its leading rusher, Shaun Wick, is averaging nearly five yards per carry.

Advantage: Oregon

#### **DEFENSE:**

**Oregon:** The way Wyoming's offense works, Oregon's defense could be in line for a heavily productive day. Considering how well they were able to stop the Spartans' rushing attack in the second half, it would seem logical to think some things are starting to fall into place up front and in

the trenches, which could lead to positive results on Saturday.

The linebacking corps, now including Joe Walker, was a huge bright spot last week and provided a level of play that hadn't been seen in the week prior. Now with an opponent like Wyoming, it seems like everything as far as size and ability goes sways in their favor.

Wyoming: Wyoming allowed just 12 and 13 points, respectively, in its first two games. However those two defensive showings didn't do anything to suggest they were ready for this "blur-offense" that they'll find themselves up against this weekend. Wyoming has experience, but as Bohl noted in his teleconference Monday, the key to the game for the Cowboys' defense will involve everyone on defense getting to the ball.

"I think it's unrealistic to think that we'll go into the game and have on point one-on-one tackles being made," Bohl said. "We got to make sure our pursuit angles are set."

With redshirt junior Tyler Johnstone out for the season after re-tearing his right ACL and Andre Yruretagoyena out from an injury during the Michigan State game, Tyrell Crosby was called upon to hold the line against a tough Michigan State defense. And he did exactly that.

"Nothing phases him," said offensive

line coach Steve Greatwood. "I thought he did very well. For a true freshman to go in there in that situation and perform against a caliber of opponent that he did, I was very pleased with his performance."

After 73 impressive minutes against Michigan State the true freshman from Henderson, Nevada will be with the starting O-line against Wyoming.

Redshirt freshman Devon Allen and true freshman Royce Freeman scored four of the six touchdowns against Michigan State, two apiece. Allen is stepping up for the major target Heiseman candidate Marcus Mariota, in a position that is missing key receiver Bralon Addison.

Freeman, on the other hand, is earning playing time with Thomas Tyner, Byron Marshall tandem. Freeman, who stands 6-feet, 229-pounds, has been as advertised out of Imperial High School.

Freeman has racked up 164 yards along with four touchdowns on just 23 carries so far this season.

## OREGON HAS HIGH HOPES FOR WALK-ON PLACE KICKER AIDAN SCHNEIDER

Aidan Schneider wasn't the biggest football fan growing up and didn't start his football career until he was a junior at Grant High School in Portland, Oregon. Schneider, who had been a soccer standout out his entire life, first joined his high school team as an upperclassman and eventually molded into its top place kicker.

Now, as a walk-on place kicker at Oregon, Schneider is looking to help the No. 2 ranked Ducks in any way he can.

"Being a walk-on you don't necessarily expect to be in this situation, but I'm here."

Schneider first came into the kicking scene after attending the well-known Chris Sailer Kicking Camp prior to coming to Oregon. The camp, which has locations all across the country, has ties with every Division I college team as well as Nike, ESPN, Rivals.

com and Scout is accredited as the premier camp for the top kickers and long snappers in the country. The multitude of NFL players will attest to this.

Schneider, who had only played a couple years, was not only invited to the camp – his first ever – but he also won the overall kick-off competition in front of scouts and coaches. He was then invited to a number of other Chris Sailer camps and even finished third in the kick-off competition in Las Vegas last January.

"The first kicking camp I ever went to was the Chris Sailer camp here last year and I won the kick-off competition there," Schneider said. "I kicked with friends when I was in middle school, just kind of messing around, but I didn't really anticipate going where it did."

Determination is the word that best describes Schneider. Coaches and players have been impressed with how far and quickly Schneider has come into the football scene – having only played a few years – and it's his work ethic that has carried him this far.

"It's been amazing for a guy that hasn't played football but for a year," special teams coordinator Tom Osborne said. "His improvement at camp and technique were mind boggling."

Schneider's receptive and hard-working nature has helped separate him from others.

"Ît just speaks to his commitment to being the best," Grant high school coach Diallo Lewis said.

"He's a guy that would come kick and spend a lot of time on his own, just finding ways and time to get better."

In their season opener against South Dakota, Schneider made his first collegiate appearance and went 6-for-7 on extra points. While Schneider hasn't kicked a field goal since, he is continually competing for playing time.

"It was definitely good to be out on the field and getting the first game out of the way," Schneider said.


"Everything has been good and I'm really liking what I'm doing"

However, the mere fact that Schneider is in discussion alongside the former No. 2 high school kicker Matt Wogan for the starting job is an attribution to how far he has come in such a short amount of time.

Schneider may be listed as a walk-on for now, but that could change at any moment based on recent track record

"His upside is off the charts," Osborne said. "He was at our camp before his senior year and noticed this guy could be a great walk-on. With a little bit of time, he can be a really, really good player."

# WHAT TO WATCH FOR A PERFECT SATURDAY

After last week's thrilling games wowed the crowds and shocked people around the nation, the third week of the college football season looks to be just as exciting.

The headliner of the week is an SEC top-25 showdown between Georgia and South Carolina, but it might not prove to be the best game of the weekend.

Here's a look at the top games to watch this weekend so get ready to sit back, relax and enjoy some good old fashioned college football

#### **MORNING:**

Virginia vs. No. 21 Louisville (9:30 a.m.): A first look at the teams and one would automatically think Louisville should win this game and win it easily, but hold your horses on that. Louisville has yet to play a tough opponent since the departure of record-setting quarterback Teddy Bridgewater to the NFL, so taking a solid Cavalier squad at home could spell disaster. It should also be noted that Virginia took No. 12 UCLA to the wire in its first game of the year and if not for three defensive touchdowns by the Bruins, Virginia would've scored the first major upset of the vear.

#### **AFTERNOON:**

No. 2 Oregon vs. Wyoming (11 a.m.): Realistically this game will turn out to be another Oregon blowout when it's all said and done but the questions is how long will it take the Ducks to get going after last week's come-from-behind victory over then No. 7 Michigan State.

UC Davis vs. Colorado State (12 p.m.): If the other afternoon games are both on commercial, it might be worth checking out UC Davis and starting safety Charles Boyett. Boyett is the younger brother of former Oregon star safety John Boyett and is being mentioned as

having all-American like skills.

No. 24 South Carolina vs. No. 6
Georgia (12:30 p.m.): Both of these teams began the season with the same aspirations but only one of them is currently in the process of achieving those goals. Georgia opened the season by dismantling No. 16 Clemson and running back Todd Gurley announced himself to the nation as the best running back and Heisman hopeful in college football. Meanwhile, South Carolina began the season by getting pounded by No. 7 Texas A&M and are looking to make up some ground in the race for the four college football playoff spots.

#### **EVENING:**

No. 12 UCLA vs. Texas (5 p.m.): This is a game featuring two teams that both need a convincing win. the Bruins have yet to put a full game together with the season shining in the first game (see above) and the offense finding its rhythm in the second game. The other side will feature a Longhorns team that was beat on it's own home field by 34 points against an unranked BYU squad. It's not the way new Texas head coach Charlie Strong wanted to start his tenure as head coach but a win over UCLA at the Rose Bowl can make everything better.

Boston College vs. No. 9 USC (5 p.m.): The Trojans, coming from a highly emotional victory over No. 15 Stanford, must now travel across the country to face a Boston College team that is more than capable of taking down a ranked team on its home field. If USC starts slow and is jet-lagged, look for the Eagles to fly high for the win.

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

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s Taylor Alie took a knee to seal Sheldon High School's 13-6 victory in the 2012 state championship game, one chapter of his life was ending while the next was just about to begin.

......

Fast forward 21 months and Alie is currently in the middle of that next chapter, playing at Autzen Stadium on Saturday, while donning the green and yellow and living the "opportunity of a lifetime."

While the opportunity to play for your hometown college may seem like it can happen once in a blue moon, the same story is currently being written by Ivan Faulhaber and Tanner Davies, star players on the 2012 Sheldon state championship team and current members of the Oregon Ducks.

Together, these three players make up the only athletes on Oregon's 115 man roster to come from Sheldon High School, and most importantly, the city of Eugene.

"It's awesome that all three kids came from the same school, but it is more of a testament to them individually that they are a part of the Oregon program," Sheldon High School varsity football coach Lane Johnson said.

While they all share similar stories on how their paths resulted in coming to play for the Ducks, who they are and what positions they play couldn't be more different.

Alie was the star of the Sheldon football team, named first-team all-state quarterback in 2012 and MVP of the state championship game. Faulhaber was the two-way stud on the same team, playing linebacker and slot receiver while known as the "toughest" guy on the team. Davies was the youngest of the group, being only a junior in 2012, but like Faulhaber, was a second-team all-state selection for the Irish.

"All three players are awesome kids in their own right. They paid their dues in our football program and are now paying their dues in Oregon's," Johnson said. "Taylor and Tanner are both pretty quiet kids (in a good way) while Ivan is very outgoing. All three are extremely hard workers both on and off of the field."

One would think that coming from the same high school to play college football for the nationally-ranked hometown team, that these three players would all be extremely close, but that's not necessarily the case. Sure, the players all see each other and hang out from time-to-time, but their plans on playing college football never really happened till the end of their respective senior seasons.

Alie was the first player to receive an offer from Oregon and once it came in the fall of 2012, he accepted without hesitation and knew his future was clear.

"When I was little, I would always be at Autzen, but I never really thought of myself coming here and playing for Oregon," the redshirt freshman quarterback Alie said. "Late playoffs during my senior year is when I got a letter from Oregon and I knew this was an opportunity of a lifetime, so I took it."

Faulhaber was the next person to be given a preferred walk-on spot on the team, his opportunity coming in the spring of 2013, and immediately committed to playing for the Ducks.

"I didn't really know what I wanted to do when I was younger – football was always going to be one of my options, so I was just going to let my athleticism kind of take me wherever," redshirt freshman Faulhaber said. "Once the option to come here opened up, I took it right away because I knew there was no place better."

On the other hand, Davies had to wait an entire year before he knew he would be playing for the Ducks, but once the opportunity arose, he too, knew that he had to take it and make his dream a reality.

"Growing up, my parents have had season tickets for the past 20 years, so for me, being able to run out of that tunnel (at Autzen) and onto the field, it's an incredible feeling," Davies said. "Ever since I was kid I've always said that if I ever got a chance to play for Oregon, I was going to take it, so I did"

One of the bigger things Johnson has realized, yet the boys haven't, is how much of role models they are to the community of Eugene.

The city itself has six high schools and combined with neighboring Springfield, there are eight schools all within 15 miles of the university. The fact that only three players from those high schools currently play for the Ducks makes it all the more remarkable.

"It's pretty cool to play with them (Alie and Faulhaber) since we won the state championship together," Davies said. "It's even cooler knowing we come from Eugene and are the only ones on the team from this city, so there's an added sense of pride with that."

When playing for a nationally-ranked team, there is pressure to succeed. When playing on a nationally-ranked team in your hometown, the pressure to succeed doubles and is something that all three players have had to deal with. While not being listed on the two-deep at any position on the depth chart, their willingness to keep battling and fighting is what the community sees and what inspires the youth of Eugene/Springfield to strive for better.

"I know the kids in our football program respect what these guys are doing," Johnson said. "The three boys loved playing Sheldon football and it's neat to me that they are continuing to play in college."

In the past 10 years, only 11 players who have suited up for Oregon have been from the Eugene/Springfield area, but none have been able to make a significant impact on the team when it comes to game days. That can all change with the play of Alie, Faulhaber and Davies.

Alie has received raves from the coaches for his performance in the 2014 spring game and is listed as the team's third-string quarterback and placeholder. In the first game of this year, he took the snap on a two-point conversion and bulldozed his way into the endzone for his first career points, a moment he said he'll never forget.

"I was just going through my read and when I saw that they left three guys in the box, I was like 'I'm going to score," Alie said. "It was so cool because my dad was freaking out afterwards, so excited, yet my mom was a little nervous because I got hit by some big guys – she's still recovering."

On the other hand, Faulhaber has had an entire year to get acclimated to the speed of the college game and now that he is eligible to play and see time on the field, he has made the most of his opportunities and has received praises from the coaches. He was named as scout team player of the week for the first week of the season after

helping Oregon get prepared for South Dakota in the season opener.

Davies is the baby of the bunch, still trying to get his feet under him and adjust to all the different schemes that comes with playing highend college football, but after being named to the all-state team the past two years, his ceiling is just as high as any of the other players.

In the end though, it's not about the glory of playing for Oregon that inspires the boys. It's about helping a team achieve a common goal and this year, that goal is a national championship.

"There's a definite sense of doing it for the community and being successful for them, but we all do it for the guy to the left of us and the guy to the right of us," Faulhaber said.

But even if the Ducks do come up a little short of their aspirations, Alie, Faulhaber and Davies will always be deemed a success for taking the road less traveled by others and inspiring a community while doing so.

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# Q&A: ANNA WAITE DISCUSSES THE PICKUP MARCHING BAND

So we had a lot of people that attended those camps come. The September 6 game, because ESPN GameDay is coming, we (required) the band to attend a rehearsal Friday afternoon. The majority of the band is current members.

#### What does the preparation like?

For most games, they are more relaxed. The rehearsal itself is quick paced, but we're not nitpicky as we might be with the full band.

#### What's your overall opinion of it?

I'm the administrative coordinator and this is my second season in my position, but I was in the band when I was a student for four years, and it's a blast. Like both on the administrative side and as a member. It's really cool to have high schoolers come in and get to experience something as cool as what you get to do all the time. It's a lot of fun.

# PAC-12 ROUNDTABLE: TWO WEEKS IN AND PLENTY TO TALK ABOUT

With just two weeks into the college football season, a variety of predictions have either been correct or completely wrong, and a list full of surprising teams and players have emerged. It's nothing out of the ordinary, but following some of the bigger headlines in the Pac-12, staff reporter Ryan Kostecka, associate sports editor Hayden Kim and sports editor Justin Wise answered a roundtable of questions leading up to week 3 of the

# Upon further review, with UCLA's early struggles and USC's burst into the AP top 25, who do you predict will win the Pac-12 South?

Kim – I fully expect the Trojans to finish atop the Pac-12 South. It is apparent – even after two games – that the Bruins aren't a top 10 team in the nation. On the other hand, the Trojans are. Not going to go as far as saying the Bruins won't be in the mix, but it's going to be the Trojans' game to lose.

Kostecka – Washington has really caught my eye, and not for the better. I knew USC would be good so that's not surprising but what surprises me is how bad Washington is, especially under Chris Petersen. Petersen's teams are known for being technically sound and cool under pressure but sloppy performances against Hawaii and FCS-power Eastern Washington have led to undisciplined play and emotional outbursts on the sidelines.

**Wise** – Stanford turned into one of the uglier performances we've seen since Jim Harbaugh took

over as head coach. That definitely caught my eye. It now turns into a question of whether this team is an outlier from the previous Harbaugh/David Shaw teams or is just a game that was out of character. They don't have a go to running back and Kevin Hogan looked pedestrian throughout, creating a ton of questions that haven't typically been associated with them.

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
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




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## Kim: Joe Walker filling Kiko Alonso's cleets

Michael Clay sent out a tweet following Oregon's 46-27 win over No. 7 Michigan State claiming Joe Walker was the second coming of Kiko Alonso.

The junior linebacker out of Palos Verdes High School, who had started in place of Derrick Malone for matchup purposes, shined against a physical Spartan front seven and finished the game with a team-high nine tackles.

Walker may not realize it, but Alonso's former counterpart was spot on. Whether it be his soft-spoken tone or exploding speed through the gaps, Walker is the closest comparison to the reigning NFL defensive rookie of the year the Ducks have seen as of late. And if used in the right capacity, Walker appears to have the skill set to help Oregon – in spurts – reach the inaugural four-team playoffs.

Walker is a man of few words and his reserved nature is something that hasn't been seen since Alonso's heartfelt speech at the 2012 Rose Bowl. Both carry this certain level of shyness that isn't often seen in such aggressive players and is a trait that keeps them true to who they are.

Walker still has a long way to go before he can proclaim himself as an NFL prospect, but his breakout performance against the Spartans was one that put him in the spotlight for the time being.

From a schematic standpoint, Walker adds a dimension to the Oregon defense that has been lacking since the departure of Clay and Alonso. Whenever the Ducks needed penetration for a big play, those two were making it.

Watching Walker and Tyson Coleman go at it last game, brought flashes of that duo back into the minds of Duck fans.

Walker was poised at the podium during his postgame speech. Sitting with his big shoulders slightly facing inward – while giving short word responses – Walker gave off an impression that resembled the very shy nature Alonso exhibited during his interviews with Oregon. The two are obviously forces to be reckoned with on the field, but off it, they act like two church boys at a Sunday service.

After coming off the bench for 12 games last

season, Walker got his first real start against the Texans in last year's Alamo Bowl. Now, following his performance against the Spartans, Walker will presumably get more starts, especially versus physical fronts.

Walker possesses this knack for wrecking havoc in the trenches and it is something that cannot be taught. If first year defensive coordinator Don Pellum took anything away from the Michigan State game, it is that Walker can work to his advantage in certain situations better than Derrick Malone. Due to his bigger size, Walker will always have this opportunity.

Walker's future is unclear as of now, but he does hold an upside that could be utilized in key moments. With teams like Stanford and UCLA on the schedule, the Ducks will be needing Walker's services and it may be in their best interest to mix it up with him and Malone.

It was one marquee game for Walker, but sometimes, that's all it takes.
