## Ineligibility of candidates rule ISOSU elections invalid

International Students of Oregon State University (ISOSU) held elections March 29 and then called them void soon after.

Three out of four candidates elected were found to be ineligible to even run for election according to the Student Activities Center regulations for participation.

The candidates had not filled the GPA requirement or had not accumulated enough hours at OSU to qualify for candidacy, said Mike Fox, current ISOSU president, and candidate for ISOSU president next year.

Fox said the problems with the candidates surfaced because ISOSU accepted walk-in candidates. These candidates had not filled out an application with the Student Activities Center, and the question of their legitimacy was not addressed until they had filled out an application form, after the elections.

"We held early elections for training purposes, so that the candidates could learn about their offices early from the candidates already in office," Fox said.

ISOSU elections are done by an elections committee who represent the students as a whole, instead of a campus student ballot vote. However, these are still considered campus-wide elections, Fox said, because the affiliates are supposed to con-

tact the students they represent.

This election committee voted to nullify the March 29 election and to hold a new election May 3, said Yvonne Sebastian, Acting Advisor of the Student Activities Center. ISOSU also decided to meet with program advisors to repair their elections guidelines.

"We don't have to do anything to the constitution, unlike ASOSU," said Sebastian. There were no guidelines in effect, so ISOSU just created new guidelines, which deal with elections, as well as candidate verification procedures, balloting, voting, speeches, ballot counting and other meeting procedures.

"We're going to have a tight election this time," she said.

## Survivors of Holocaust topic of Memorial Program speech

A noted author, Lawrence Langer, presents theories about ways survivors deal with the past and present

Victims of the Holocaust transform Holocaust memories into something more manageable and less oppressive. These people are illustrations of the triumph of the human spirit, said Lawrence Langer at OSU's Holocaust Memorial Program.

Langer, professor emeritus at Simmons College, began his speech by talking about the effects the Holocaust has on survivors and society 48 years later. The Holocaust Memorial program hosts yearly appearances of scholars who have written about the Holocaust.

The lecture, "Memory's Time: Chronology and Duration in Holocaust Testimonies," was held at LaSells Stewart Center on April 22.

During the Holocaust, approximately six million people of the Jewish population in Europe were killed. Hitler blamed Jews for Germany's loss in the First World War. The political and social doctrine of Adolf Hitler, Nazism, haunted the Jewish population from 1933-45.

Currently, 24 percent of adults and 12 percent of high school students believe that the

Holocaust never occurred, Langer said.

"People don't know where to put the Holocaust in history because it was not a typical event," he said. "There were no good consequences of the murder of two-thirds of the Jewish population."

Langer explained the two types of time experiences that survivors seem to undergo.

The first are the events, that beginning with their birth, tell a story of who they are, where they came from, where they went to school, what happened to them after the Germans came, how they survived, and how they came to America, he said.

"The other level of time experience, which I call durational time, are fixed moments in time that we can't forget. Durational time focuses on specific moments that are fixed in memory."

To support his theory, Langer presented fragments of videotaped testimonies of the Holocaust survivors. The videos showed how the many memories of the Holocaust were buried or forgotten by the survivors. "Most thought they would die, most felt they had died; the durational self dies," Langer said.

"In the chronological life, you can control and choose your life. Times in the durational

experience are controlled by circumstances."

Because of this loss of control, people were forced to do things that under normal circumstances they wouldn't do, he said. "Survivors lost the capacity to choose, that's a privilege for you and me today," Langer

said.

Langer has been teaching and writing for more than 30 years. He has written four books. His most recent book, *Holocaust Testimonies: The Ruins of Memory*, was the winner of the 1991 National Book Critics' Circle Award for Criticism.

## All candidates on ASOSU ballot

All students who signed up to run for office in the ASOSU elections, which start today and end tomorrow, will be on the official ballot. This action overturns a decision made by the ASOSU Elections Committee last week.

In an effort to increase student involvement in the elections, the committee extended the original registration deadline to run for an office. The extension was later ruled unconstitutional by the Elections Committee.

Several students who had registered after the original deadline were told they would have to conduct a write-in campaign.

In an effort to have a fair and impartial election, some ASOSU members and students met with JoAnne Trow, vice president for student affairs, on Friday to discuss the issues concerning the election guidelines.

"I called a meeting to discuss the issues and the options available," Trow said. "We need to arrive at a solution that will be fair to all concerned."

Scott Ballo, vice president for ASOSU Senate, attended the meeting and said the

options discussed included letting the election run its course and adding a supplement to the ballot listing the write-in candidates, putting everyone on the ballot, putting everyone on the ballot and delaying the election for one week or declaring the election null and void to start the process over.

The decision was made to include all the names of people who registered and put their names on the ballot.

"The students as a whole decided what to do," Ballo said. He said it was possible that someone could contest the election for constitutional reasons.

"They could contest the election and they would have to file an appeal to the Judicial Board," Ballo said.

Jon Bial, ASOSU executive director of finance and candidate for ASOSU president, said he didn't know what would happen if someone contests the election because guidelines in the ASOSU constitution weren't followed.

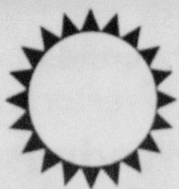
"I wanted the time-line of the election dates changed," Bial said. "These people who were original write-in candidates have

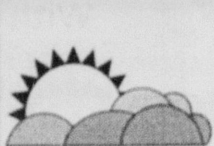

## Arson investigators determine cult set fire

WACO, Texas — Independent arson investigators Monday supported FBI claims that members of the Branch Davidian doomsday cult started a fire that consumed their prairie compound in a suicidal inferno a week ago.

"We believe it was intentionally set by persons inside the compound," said Paul Gray, who headed the investigation team. "At least two locations were significantly distant enough from each other that they couldn't have been set by the same source at the same time."

The FBI has said the fire was set by Branch Davidian members. Some of the nine survivors have said the fire began when an FBI tank that punched holes through a wall knocked over a burning lantern.

Also Monday, a second victim of the blaze was identified, and authorities said she had a bullet wound in the head; and a purported adviser to cult leader David Koresh surrendered.

The Feb. 28 raid by the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms left four agents dead and started the 51-day siege that ended with the fire that killed as many as 86 people, including Koresh and 17 children.

Gray said several factors contributed to the quick movement of the April 19 fire, which burned the compound to the ground within 45 minutes, before firefighters could begin dousing the blaze.

"The building contained a large amount of unusually flammable materials," including guns, ammunition, hay and several types of gaseous liquids, he said. The compound was poorly constructed and the blaze was fanned by wind gusting to 30 mph.

Because of the other factors, a quicker response by firefighters "may have been inconsequential," Gray said.

The FBI has said its snipers saw a cult member start a fire and that helicopters saw the blaze begin in three separate places at about the same time.

Gray, an arson investigator for the city of Houston, said the team had not determined if cult members had spread fuel to speed the fire.

The team's findings will be submitted to Attorney General Janet Reno, who ordered the independent report to answer questions raised about the FBI's responsibility in the fire.

The body of a woman found atop the bunker inside the compound was identified as 18-year-old Shari Doyle, said David Parey, a McLennan County justice of the peace.

He said Doyle had a gunshot wound to head, but smoke, carbon monoxide, and extensive charring also contributed to her death.

The FBI has said that three cult members had been shot. One still has not been identified.

The first victim was identified Sunday as David Michael Jones, 38, Koresh's brother-in-law. He died of a gunshot blast to the face, Parey said.

Koresh's lawyer, Dick DeGuerin, said Jones was the mail carrier who learned from a television photographer of the impending raid on the compound and warned Koresh.

Paul Fatta, 35, one of Koresh's reputed "inner circle," surrendered Monday to Texas Rangers in Houston. He was charged with conspiracy to manufacture and possess unregistered machine guns, said Texas Ranger Brantley Foster.

U.S. Magistrate Marsha Crone ordered Fatta held pending a detention hearing on Friday.

Fatta and his 14-year-old son left the compound the day of the raid to attend a gun show. They could not return after authorities sealed off the area following the gunbattle.

Fatta's attorney, Mike DeGuerin, said his client surrendered to Rangers because he did not trust federal marshals.

Five of the nine survivors were scheduled to appear in court for detention hearings on Monday. Some were being held as witnesses and others faced a variety of charges.

Graeme Craddock was ordered jailed without bond. Dave Thibodeau was ordered released on a \$5,000 personal recognizance bond. Ruth Ottman Riddle, who appeared in court in a wheelchair with her left leg in a cast, was sent to a halfway house.

Conspiracy charges against her niece, Rita Riddle, were dropped and her hearing canceled, said defense attorney Chuck Grigson.

## Quake's damage was widespread

PORTLAND — Last month's Scotts Mills earthquake caused more damage than expected for a quake of its magnitude, a state geologist said Monday.

"For some reason, this earthquake caused much more damage over a wider area than it should have for its size," said Ian Madin.

Madin joined other specialists at a news conference to discuss what has been learned so far about the March 25 quake. The earthquake measured 5.6 on the Richter scale and was centered in a previously unknown fault area near Scotts Mills, 35 miles south of Portland.

Preliminary mapping shows the most extensive damage occurred in an oblong-shaped area running southeast to northwest from Scotts Mills to Newberg.

The quake also caused extensive damage in Molalla and Mount Angel, nearer to the epicenter, and rocked the 55-year-old state Capitol in Salem, 20 miles away. Total damage is estimated at \$28 million to \$30 million.

Madin, a seismic hazards geologist, said soil conditions probably contributed to the extensive damage. A layer of soft sand, silt and clay on top of hard rock can amplify an

earthquake's power, he said.

Officials said they were not surprised by the effects of the crustal quake, which was centered about 11 miles below the Earth's surface. But they said it should serve as a "wake-up" call for Oregonians.

The quake reached a level of 7 near the epicenter on a scale used to measure the intensity of a quake. A level 8 quake can cause widespread damage. A bigger quake is likely in the future, the scientists said, although nobody can predict when one might strike.

Unreinforced masonry buildings, such as the Molalla High School and the Capitol, suffered the greatest damage. A similar-sized quake centered in Portland would have done significantly more damage because of the great number of unreinforced masonry buildings in the metropolitan area, Madin said.

"Those buildings will continue to threaten their occupants until they're fixed," he said.

Craig Weaver of the U.S. Geological Survey in Seattle said Oregon was 60 years behind California in efforts to earthquake-proof buildings.

"We've got a lot of catching up to do in this region," he said.

had to fight so hard to simply have the right to have their names on the ballot. The appeals have taken time that should have been used to campaign more effectively."

Yvonne Sebastian, activities advisor of the student activities center, said the final outcome of the meeting was a decision made by the Election Committee.

## Clinton reaches 100-day mark

**BOSTON** — President Clinton says he knows he isn't accomplishing all he'd hoped in his first 100 days, but "that's why you get a four-year term not a three-month term."

He vowed to press on with major campaign promises despite some early frustrations.

Shrugging off last week's Senate defeat on his jobs-stimulus program as a minor setback, Clinton looked to the big battles ahead, including the one over health care reform.

"We're going to bust a gut trying in this administration. We're going to do our best," he told the Newspaper Association of America on Sunday.

Clinton also voiced frustration over the ongoing ethnic violence in Bosnia, calling it "the most difficult foreign policy problem this country faces."

Separately, in an interview with The Boston Globe, Clinton expressed reservations about the

possibility of U.S. bombing of Serbian artillery positions to slow the "ethnic cleansing" campaign in Bosnia, as some members of Congress have suggested.

"I'm convinced that the United States cannot just simply decide to bomb a few targets in Bosnia and reverse the situation on the ground politically," Clinton said.

He reiterated earlier assertions, however, that he had not made up his mind on the matter.

In the same interview, Clinton suggested "that I may have overextended myself" in his first days, "and we've got to focus on big things."

Clinton expressed some touchiness in his session with newspaper executives on the subject of the 100-day mark, which comes Thursday, and on his inability to get his \$16.3 billion stimulus package past a cohesive Republican filibuster in the Senate.

Clinton said it was "just not realistic" to expect that he could have moved on all his campaign commitments in his first 100 days.

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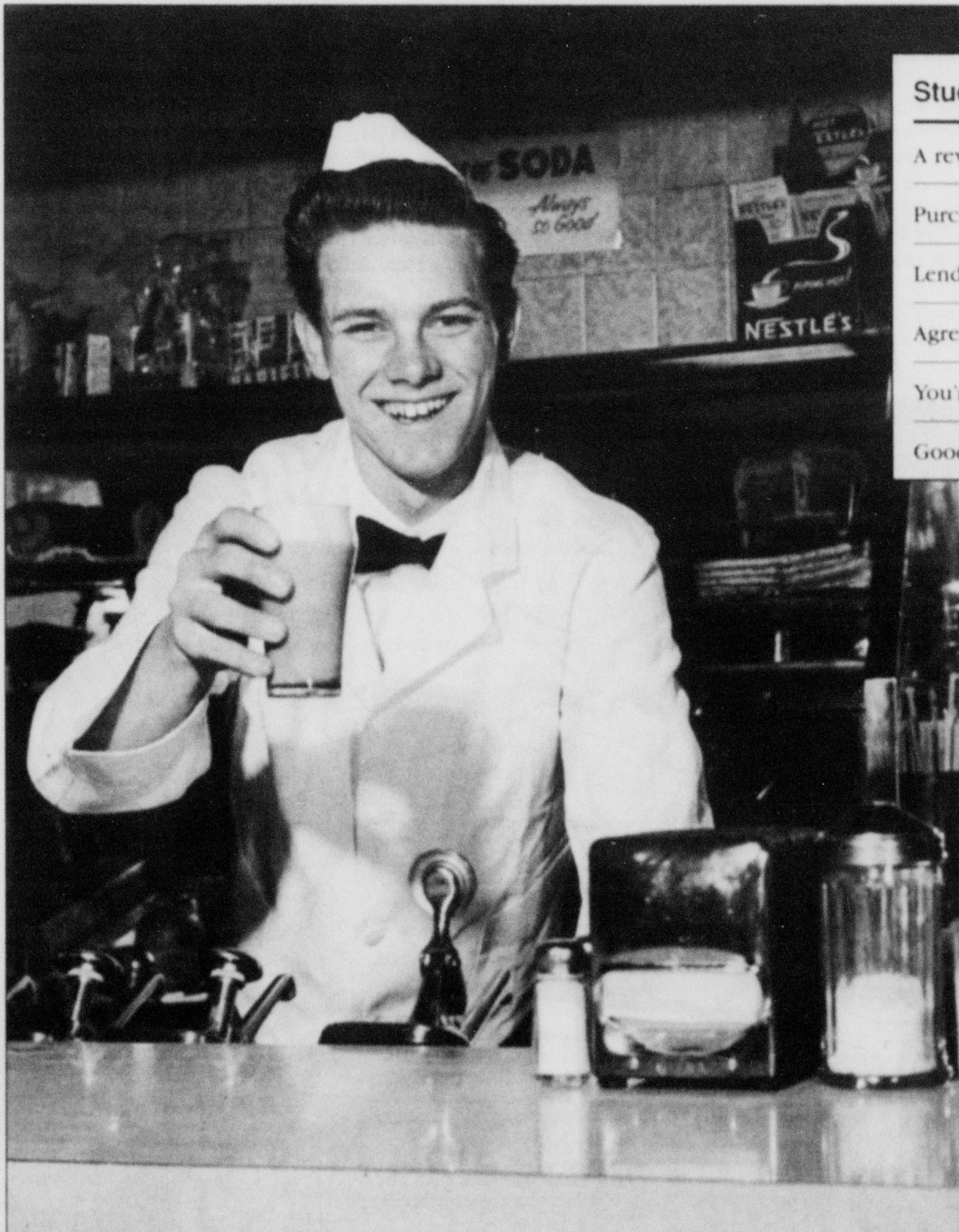
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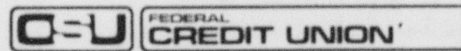

We, the members of H.O.P.E. (Helping Our Peers Effectively), would like to respond to the front page picture of Wednesday, March 10. We feel it is necessary to respond for a variety of reasons. First, we are not opposed to tasteful representation of our group in The Barometer. However, we did not choose the picture, the photographer chose it. We feel that it not only misrepresented H.O.P.E., but it was unprofessional and thus compromised the image of our group. There are many other ways to more sensitively demonstrate what H.O.P.E. does, and still use a picture on the front page.

## Op - Ed

H.O.P.E. is a student organization that consists of four components: campus wide events, peer listening, peer educating, and Marketing. We focus our efforts in all of these areas on promoting healthy lifestyles and healthy behavioral choices. Our purpose is to serve the needs of this campus on a variety of health-related issues, including date rape, alcohol awareness, eating disorders, and AIDS/STD's. 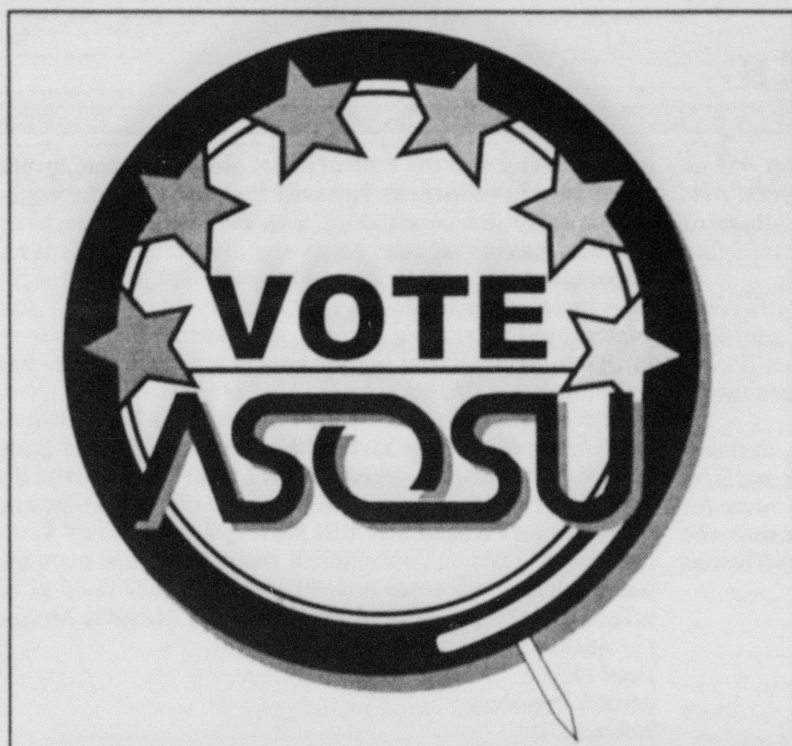

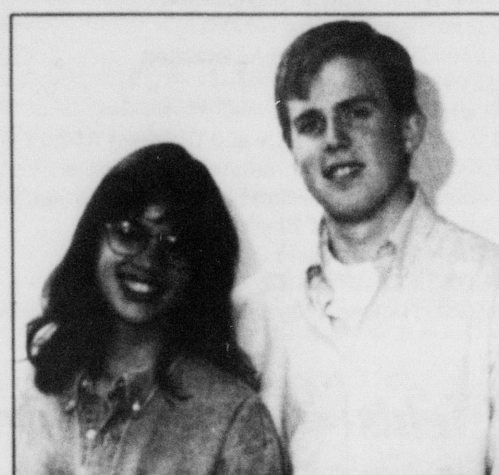

We want them protected from it, Lee! And I am so sick of people throwing NAMBLA in the faces of gays and lesbians, especially considering no GLBi association recognizes or acknowledges this group! ## Shareholders criticize IBM

TAMPA, Fla. — Angry IBM shareholders on Monday unleashed a torrent of pent-up frustration at new Chairman Louis V. Gerstner Jr., who promised to revive the computer maker but asked for patience.

In just his 18th workday at IBM, Gerstner tried to use the annual meeting to focus on a broad outline of goals. Instead, he heard impassioned calls by a dozen stockholders for the ouster of the board of directors that were greeted with loud applause.

"If I were a director I would be embarrassed to even show up here and have my name on a list to be elected," said Dr. Gilbert Jannelli of Clearwater. "How can you work with that group of people when their attitudes, their trusted decisions caused this company's demise?"

About 2,300 shareholders, many of them Florida retirees and longtime company employees, attended an unusually contentious meeting that reflected just how far International Business Machines Corp. has fallen.

The meeting capped a remarkable four months at 79-year-old IBM, whose founder's credo — "Think" — set a standard of excellence for corporate America. In addition to hiring Gerstner as its first outsider chairman, IBM laid off workers for the first time and lost \$285 million from January through March.

IBM has lost more than \$7 billion in the past two years, cut a quarter of its work force — or more than 100,000 jobs — since 1987, and lost significant market share amid growing competition. The company has sought to reverse itself through restructurings that have given IBM business units more freedom.

Gerstner, the 51-year-old former RJR Nabisco chairman, took over on April 1 after a closely watched search for a successor to now-maligned former Chairman John F. Akers.

In a frank assessment, Gerstner said slow demand and poor economies had reshaped the computer industry, but he defended IBM's technological and market power.

To shareholders' approval, Gerstner didn't try to minimize IBM's problems.

"IBM has changed, but most people would say not fast enough," Gerstner said. "This slowness and failure to act quickly is really the root cause of IBM's problems."

Gerstner listed four priorities for 1993: completing major staff reductions, defining what businesses IBM will pursue, improving customer relations and decentralizing. He said he hadn't been working long enough to be more specific.

"I don't have answers for you yet and we can't expect quick fixes," Gerstner said. But he promised: "I can tell you the steps we will take will not be pussyfooting but bold strides."

Wall Street seemed to welcome Gerstner's comment. IBM stock rose 62 cents to \$48.37 a share on the New York Stock Exchange. That's still well off last summer's peak of \$100 a share.

Before the meeting, IBM's board declared a 54 cents-per-share quarterly dividend. In January, IBM cut the dividend for the first time, from \$1.21 per share.

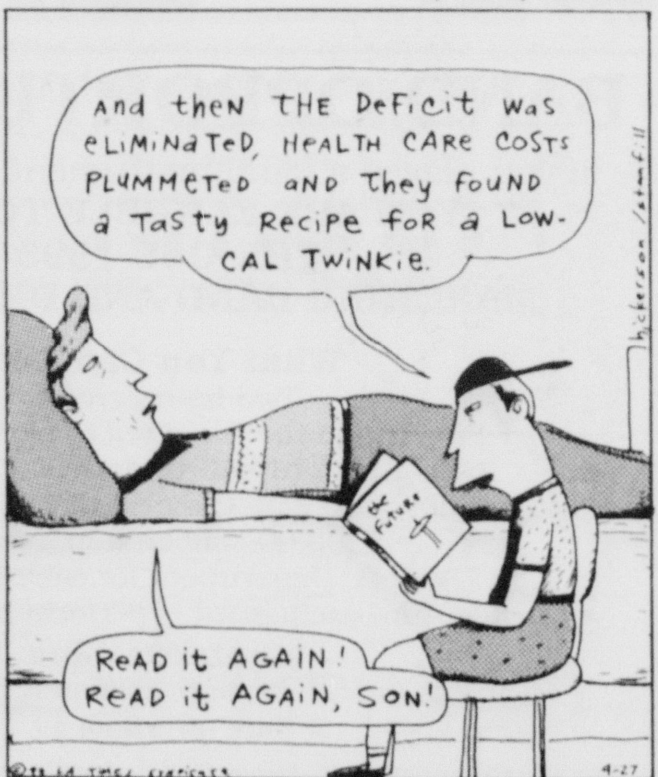
At the meeting, shareholders vented anger over IBM's fallen stock price, the rapid and drastic nature of its cuts, and a pay package under which Gerstner can make tens of millions of dollars in stock options if the company's stock rebounds.

Their sharpest criticisms were directed at IBM's 18 board members. The directors were re-elected but the company did not say by how much. When a proposal came up to halt generous retiree benefits to directors, 28 percent of the shareholders supported it, reflecting an unusually high level of dissatisfaction.

## Beavers look to sweep season series from UO

The Oregon State softball team travels to Eugene today with fifth place in the Pac-10 Conference on the line. The two teams will meet for the second time this season at Oregon's Howe Field at 2:30 p.m.

At 11-11 overall and 6-5 in the Pac-10, the Beavers stand a half game in front of the Ducks, 14-12 and 5-5, in the conference standings. But the game means more than just a spot in the standings to the Beavers.

This season OSU has already set team records in conference wins, and will finish out of the conference cellar for the first time since entering the Pac-10 in 1987. A victory Tuesday would also ensure a first-ever series win over the Ducks, and bragging rights as the best college softball team in the state. Barring a miracle, neither team will make it to post-season play, so Tuesday's games will be both team's playoffs.

The Beavers won the first battle of the Civil War earlier this month in Corvallis. OSU beat the Ducks 3-2 in 10 rain-soaked innings. Oregon's Rachelle Taylor hit OSU's Michelle Trujillo with the bases loaded sending in the winning run for the Beavers.

## DiMaggio feeling better after suffering chest pain

ROME — Joe DiMaggio cancelled a visit to his parents' hometown in Sicily after suffering chest pain, his spokesman said Monday.

John Salamone, who is accompanying the 78-year-old baseball Hall of Famer on his Italian visit, said DiMaggio felt ill Saturday night after dinner in Rome and decided to cancel his trip to Isola delle Femmine, a small town near Palermo, Sicily. The town had planned a ceremony to make him an honorary citizen.

"DiMaggio had chest congestion but it is nothing serious. He is doing fine," Salamone said.

The spokesman said DiMaggio went for a walk Monday.

"He's up and about and enjoying Rome," Salamone said. Dr. Kenneth Ciongoli, a neurologist traveling with DiMaggio's group, said that DiMaggio had coughed up blood.

Salamone disputed a report that the former New York Yankees star had to cancel a meeting with Italy's head of state, President Oscar Luigi Scalfaro. Both the spokesman and the presidential palace said no such meeting was ever scheduled.

On Saturday, DiMaggio threw out the first ball at an Italian league game in Rome.

Salamone said DiMaggio would accept an award Tuesday at the foreign ministry and return to the United States the following day.

A native of Martinez, Calif., DiMaggio set a major league record by hitting safely in 56 consecutive games in 1941. The record still stands.

In 13 seasons with the Yankees, DiMaggio hit .325 and belted 361 home runs.

## Beaver crewers glide past Gonzaga

OSU wins all eight races in a home washout of the Bulldogs

The Oregon State crew team swept all eight races it participated in Sunday against the Gonzaga Bulldogs on the Willamette River.

The OSU men's varsity eight came from behind to win the 2000-meter race in a time of 5:31.9. Head coach Dave Emigh said he was relieved with the victory, especially since it was the first race of the season that the Beavers had come from behind to win.

Gonzaga jumped out to a quick lead of a boat length and OSU's surges didn't draw it any closer. By the 1,200-meter point, OSU began to eat away at the lead, and coxswain Kris Williams began to call for a quicker pace as they went into a sprint.

"Kris Williams did an excellent job of keeping the boat under control," Emigh said. "We worked a lot on sprints this week, and I'm glad we did, because we needed it today."

OSU's varsity women posted their second strong race of

the weekend with an impressive win by a 10-second margin. The Beavers were competitive, but outmatched, a day earlier against powerful Washington State.

"They learned what they're capable of doing the last two days," said women's coach Roger Payne. "The start was a little shaky, but they came out with as much intensity as they had yesterday. I've been waiting to see it all season. They've finally decided they want to go out and win some boat races."

## Tyson gives interview on Dateline NBC

NEW YORK — Mike Tyson, in his first prison interview in almost a year, says he does not even think about boxing let alone savor a title fight with champion Riddick Bowe.

"I never dream from the outside, I only dream from prison," the former heavyweight champion said. "When I sleep, I only dream about being in prison. I don't dream about outside. That's the reality, I don't dream about it. I deal with my circumstances the way they are."

Tyson, serving a 6-year sentence for rape, spoke last Saturday with NBC News legal correspondent Star Jones. The interview will air Tuesday night on "Dateline NBC."

Tyson was asked if he thought of a possible bout with

Bowe, the current champion.

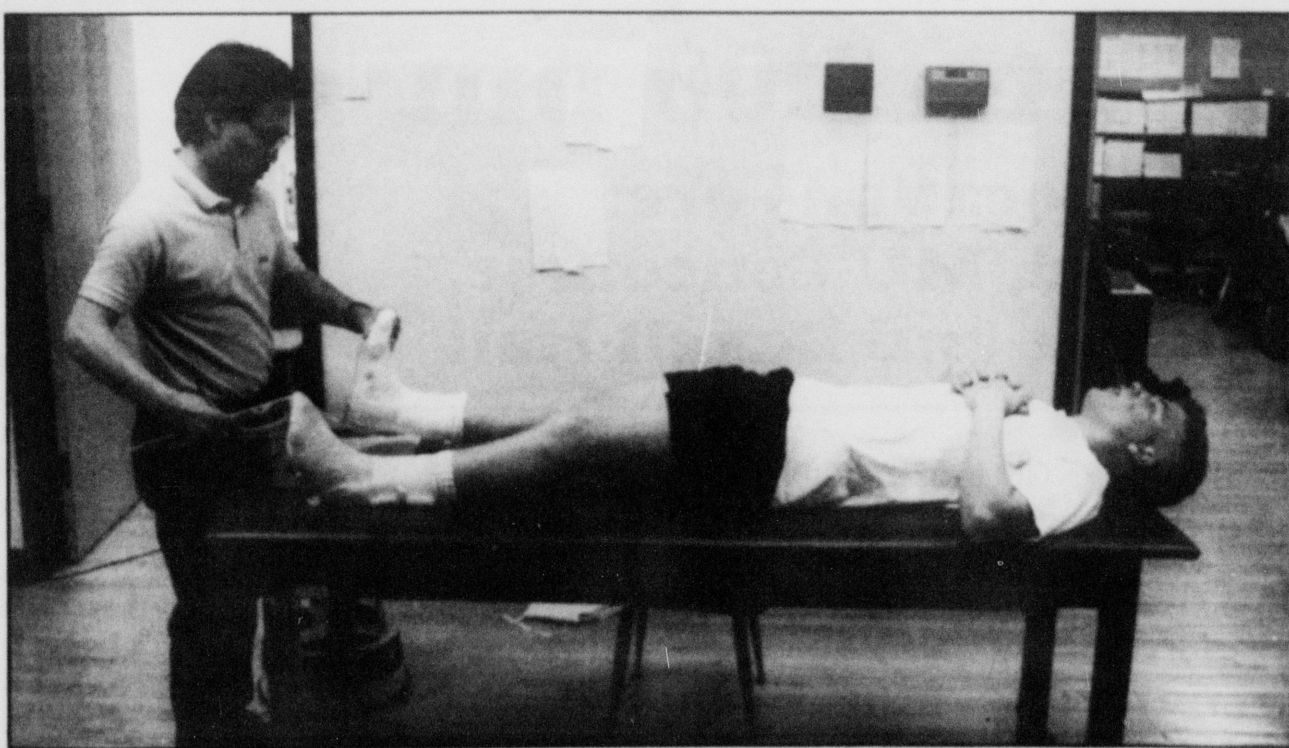
"I don't even think about fighting him," he said. "I don't even think about that stuff."

## Fidel Castro considers Havana 10K road race

BOULDER, Colo. — A Boulder sports writer met Cuban leader Fidel Castro this month about organizing a 10-kilometer road race in Havana.

Mike Sandrock, a former University of Colorado runner and now sports editor of the Colorado Daily, says he was encouraged by his 30-minute talk with Castro.

"He looks you right in the eye and gives you his full attention," Sandrock said.

The race is to be called the Ernest Hemingway 10K in honor of the writer who lived in Cuba and is greatly admired by Castro.

Sandrock hopes to return to Cuba in June to work on the race, which is to take place in December. The route is uncertain but Sandrock hopes it will weave along the waterfront and start or finish at the hotel where Hemingway wrote *For Whom The Bell Tolls*.

Sandrock's meeting was arranged by Bob Walz, who owns a public relations firm in Boulder.

Castro was dressed in army fatigues and surrounded by armed security. The two spoke at a home, whose walls were adorned with pictures of the Cuban leader playing baseball. Sandrock offered Castro gifts, including a baseball signed by Colorado Rockies manager Don Baylor.

The meeting was to have lasted four hours but was cut short because of domestic matters.



# Rothstein given the ax after Pistons miss playoffs

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. — Ron Rothstein, whose team failed to make the playoffs for the first time in 10 years, was fired Monday as coach of the Detroit Pistons.

Pistons president Tom Wilson and Billy McKinney, the player personnel director, met with Rothstein at The Palace on Monday and announced his dismissal at an afternoon news conference.

"This team was beset with inherent problems from the day I took over," Rothstein said in a statement. "I don't think I have to

recount the other problems that unfolded as the year progressed.

"I have given this job my all from day one. I tried to find a balance between the needs and wants of the players and what I felt was my responsibility as the head coach. Above all, I have tried to conduct myself in a professional manner."

Don Chaney, an assistant who once coached the Houston Rockets, is considered a leading candidate to succeed Rothstein, although the club would not comment in that regard.

"It wouldn't be fair to say that before we talk to all our assistants," McKinney said. "Maybe toward the end of this week, or early next week, we'll have an announcement on a replacement."

Rothstein's biggest problem was Dennis Rodman. The moody forward missed all of training camp, a West Coast road trip and several other games because of suspensions or vague injuries.

In all, Rodman missed 20 games and the Pistons were 4-16 without him. They even lost to Dallas. In the end, they missed qualifying for the playoffs by one game.

"I think it's really important for a coach to have great rapport with his players," McKinney said. "After all, it's a players' league."

The Pistons, in their first season under Rothstein, finished 40-42 and missed the playoffs for the first time since 1983. After that season, it was coach Scotty Robertson who was fired.

Robertson was replaced by Chuck Daly, who went on to become an icon in Detroit, leading the Pistons to the NBA finals three times and winning consecutive championships in 1989 and 1990.

"It is naturally difficult when you come in behind a man like Chuck, and especially in an organization that's had so much success," McKinney said. "We're not a championship team anymore. And the players aren't the same now as they were then."

Rothstein made his reputation as an assistant to Daly. As a result, the expansion Miami Heat made him their first coach in 1988. But the complaints in Miami were the same as the complaints in Detroit. The players didn't like his hard-driving, short-tempered style.

It is unlikely the next coach, whoever he is, will have to worry about Rodman. The NBA rebounding leader almost surely will be traded before next season.

"His future here is very cloudy," McKinney said. "I would say it's unlikely he will be back with the team next year."

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## Vikings use 7th-rounder to get Torretta

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — The last thing the Minnesota Vikings needed was another quarterback. Yet every time they looked at their draft board, Heisman Trophy-winner Gino Torretta was the best player there.

The Vikings reviewed Torretta's statistics, especially his 26-2 record at Miami, and couldn't resist using their seventh-round pick to take him Monday in the NFL draft.

"At one point, you say, 'Who's your highest-rated player, regardless of what position he plays?' That's why we went with Torretta," said Minnesota coach Dennis Green, who added Torretta to a quarterback mix that includes free-agent acquisition Jim McMahon, 1992 starters Sean Salisbury and Rich Gannon and second-year pro Brad Johnson.

"There are a lot of things said about Gino, mostly negative, and we don't really deal in the negative," Green said. "We deal in the positive. We look at what a guy does. And what he does is complete a lot of passes, break a lot of records, win a lot of football games and show leadership at one of the toughest programs in the country."

"I think that would qualify a guy to be drafted. In the seventh round, it was a great bargain for us."

Torretta, whose mechanics, arm strength and mobility have been questioned by scouts, was the fifth quarterback and 192nd player chosen. Yet he feels he's every bit as good as Drew Bledsoe and Rick Mirer, the top two picks in the draft.

"I felt I was a first-round quarterback," he said. "As far as these ratings go, I don't know how they rate some of the guys. Obviously, I did everything asked of me in college and I felt I have all the ability to be in the NFL and I felt I should have been up there."

"I've thrown 1,000 passes in college and won 26 of 28 games and two national championships. I don't think there's anything else to say. I have nothing to be ashamed of in my career at Miami, nothing at all."

Torretta, 6-foot-2 and 212 pounds, completed 598 of 1,090 passes for 8,229 yards, 48 touchdowns and 29 interceptions. But in two bowl games, he was 43-of-97 for 535 yards, one TD and five interceptions. He was picked off three times by Alabama as the Hurricanes lost the '93 Sugar Bowl — and the national title.

"We had a bad game and Alabama had a great game," Torretta said.

While he felt he should have been drafted higher, he seemed to be in good spirits.

"Am I bitter? No, I'm excited. I just got picked in the NFL draft," he said. "It's a little difficult at times. But if you're not confident in your abilities, then I don't think you're ever going to make it. I just kept a positive attitude through the whole thing."

Torretta was the third high-profile player taken by the Vikings, who selected Ohio State running back Robert Smith in the first round and Syracuse receiver Qadry Ismail in the second.
