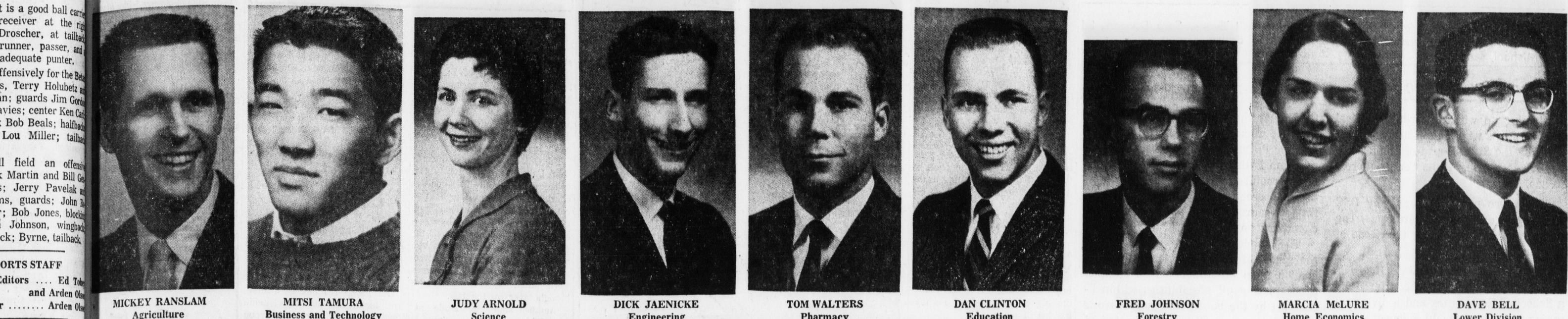


Model Senate to Discuss Campus Problems at Open Meet

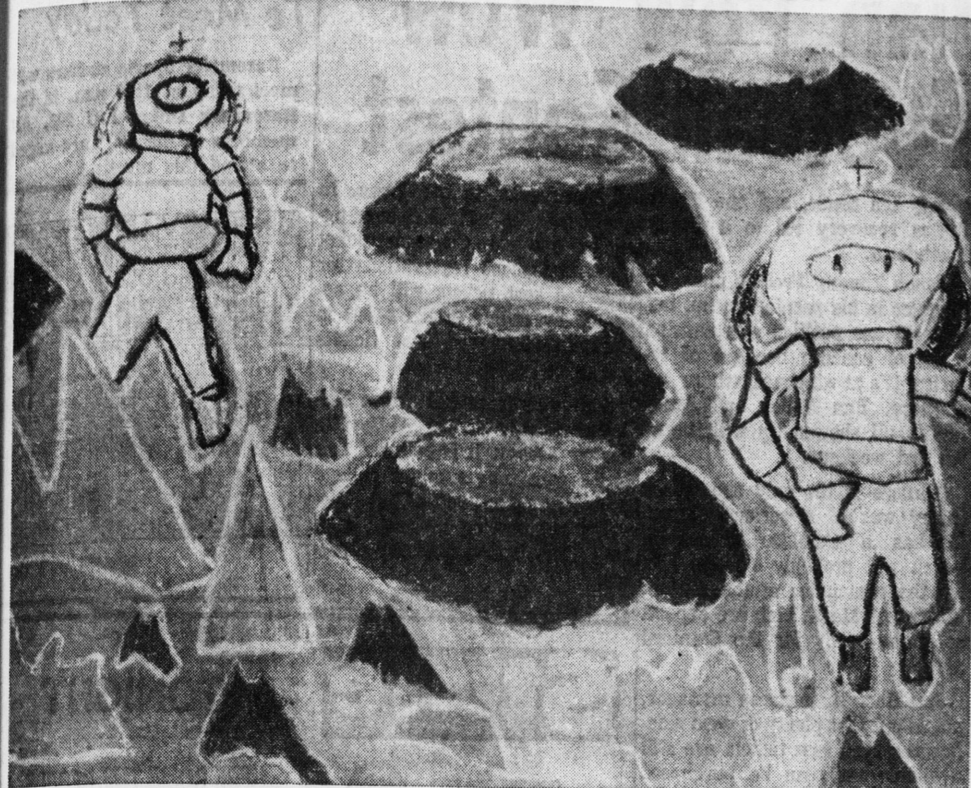
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'Life on Moon' Youth Sketch

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GWIL'S QUILL

University of Southern California's Mike McKeever forgot why he was playing football when he fell elbow-first upon Cal's Steve Bates. Bates' facial injuries attest to the fact that some players give in to the pressure to win and do not remember that football is great today because good sportsmanship and fair play have made it that way.

If this were the first time that such a thing had been blamed on McKeever or if Cal's coach Pete Elliott frequently protested plays by his opponents, it would be easy to say, "It can't be as bad as all that." But the fact is that McKeever had been penalized three times on the two preceding Saturdays for roughness and though not penalized on the Bates incident, he was ejected later in the Cal game for roughing up quarterback Pete Olson.

Films Show Kapp Hurt

Movies of last year's Cal-USC game showed McKeever using the same tactics against Bates' predecessor, Joe Kapp. Kapp was lucky enough to leave the game without injuries. Records show that Pete Elliott has never before protested the actions of an opposing player.

In a three-point resolution, the Associated Students of University of California are backing up Pete Elliott's objections and have asked that Cal refuse to participate in any athletic competition in which Mike McKeever is a team member. Further, they asked that McKeever be suspended from play for a reasonable length of time and finally that the Big Five set up penalties for any players involved in similar unsportsmanlike conduct.

McKeever Must Change

Mike McKeever must learn how to play football without the unnecessary roughness and when he does learn, he'll be qualified to continue in athletic competition so that he and others can benefit from fair play and sportsmanship. The three points of the ASUC plan offer some good suggestions, we hope that the Big Five, Athletic Association of Western Universities, will make use of them to prevent another such incident.

What with the Pacific Coast Conference breaking up last spring and the football gate receipts lower this year, the athletic construction program has been somewhat cramped. As a result of this Spec Keene, athletic director, has commented, "We are not contemplating any immediate construction." With the dissolution of the PCC, Oregon State lost its \$60-70 thousand annual cut of the conference funds. This money came from Rose Bowl gate receipts in addition to radio and television rights.

Keene Is Waiting

Keene has explained that the athletic department is just waiting now to see what is going to happen regarding coast conferences, etc. In order to make up for the \$60-70 thousand dollars which won't be coming in, the department is working on further intersectional sports clashes in order to make the athletic budget balance.

Included in the now far-distant future for building is the construction of a rook baseball field on college land west of Parker Stadium. Besides the baseball field, plans are for construction of more seating on Bell field. These plans have to take a back seat for now to the more immediate problem of getting the athletic budget to balance.

Trojans Climb To Third Spot

NEW YORK (UPI)—Syracuse, first Eastern team other than Army ever to top United Press International's major college football ratings, replaced Louisiana State in first place today but led Texas by only nine points.

Texas, a one-point victor over Baylor, advanced from fourth to second and Southern California, easy winner over West Virginia, moved from fifth to third in the latest balloting by the 35 leading coaches who rate the teams for UPI. Syracuse and Southern California (both 7-0) and Texas (8-0) are the only perfect-record teams in the top 10.

LSU slipped to fourth after leading the ratings the last four weeks of the 1958 season and the first seven of the current campaign. Wisconsin advanced from eighth to fifth and Northwestern dropped from second to sixth. Mississippi was seventh, Auburn eighth, Penn State ninth and Tennessee 10th.

Tennessee, which snapped Louisiana State's 19-game winning streak after smashing Auburn's 24-game unbeaten string earlier in the season, was the only newcomer in the top 10. Tennessee replaced Washington.

Clemson, Georgia, Washington, Georgia Tech, Oregon, Iowa, Michigan State, Arkansas, Texas Christian and North Texas State rounded out the first 20 in that order. No other teams received votes this week.

Rooks Journey North Friday For WSU Tilt

Oregon State's freshman football squad will journey to Seattle Friday to play the University of Washington Frosh.

The Rook team has beaten Oregon so far this season.

Coach Jim Brackins said today that four of his top players are injured and probably won't make the trip to Seattle. They include Felix Mazzocco, starting right guard; Bob Lazark, No. 1 tailback; Gary Casey, best wingback on the squad; and Roy Jones, 6-7, 250 pound tackle.

Lazark has a chance of playing but the other definitely will be left at home. Other OSC starters for Saturday include Ken Haack and Bob Stiles, ends; Ben Gasatis and Jeff Harris, tackles; George Gnos and Fred Miller, guards; John Farrell, center; Lad Horn, blocking back; Dick Brooks, tailback; Al Biancni, wingback; and Ernie Thomsen, fullback.

Dietzel Claims Refs Errored

BATON ROUGE, La. (UPI)—Louisiana State football coach Paul Dietzel claimed Monday night that Tennessee scored its 14-13 upset on the Tigers last week on three refs infractions.

Speaking before a televised meeting of the Baton Rouge Quarterbacks Club, the LSU coach said, "We're not complaining, but we think it's a shame to lose one like that. I've already mentioned it to the man in charge of the officials."

The loss cost LSU its top national ranking and snapped the nation's longest current winning streak at 19.

Athletic officials at the University of Tennessee refused comment on any portion of Dietzel's charges.

Dietzel said Tennessee tailback Glenn Glass "was clearly in motion" when he took the snap on the Tiger 33 and passed 19 yards to Don Leake on 14. He said a Volunteer lineman was offside on the same play.

On the next play, Dietzel said a blocking back "practically tackled" an LSU linebacker who was in line to stop Neyle Soolie who stepped down the sidelines to score.

It was the final and fateful touchdown of the game.

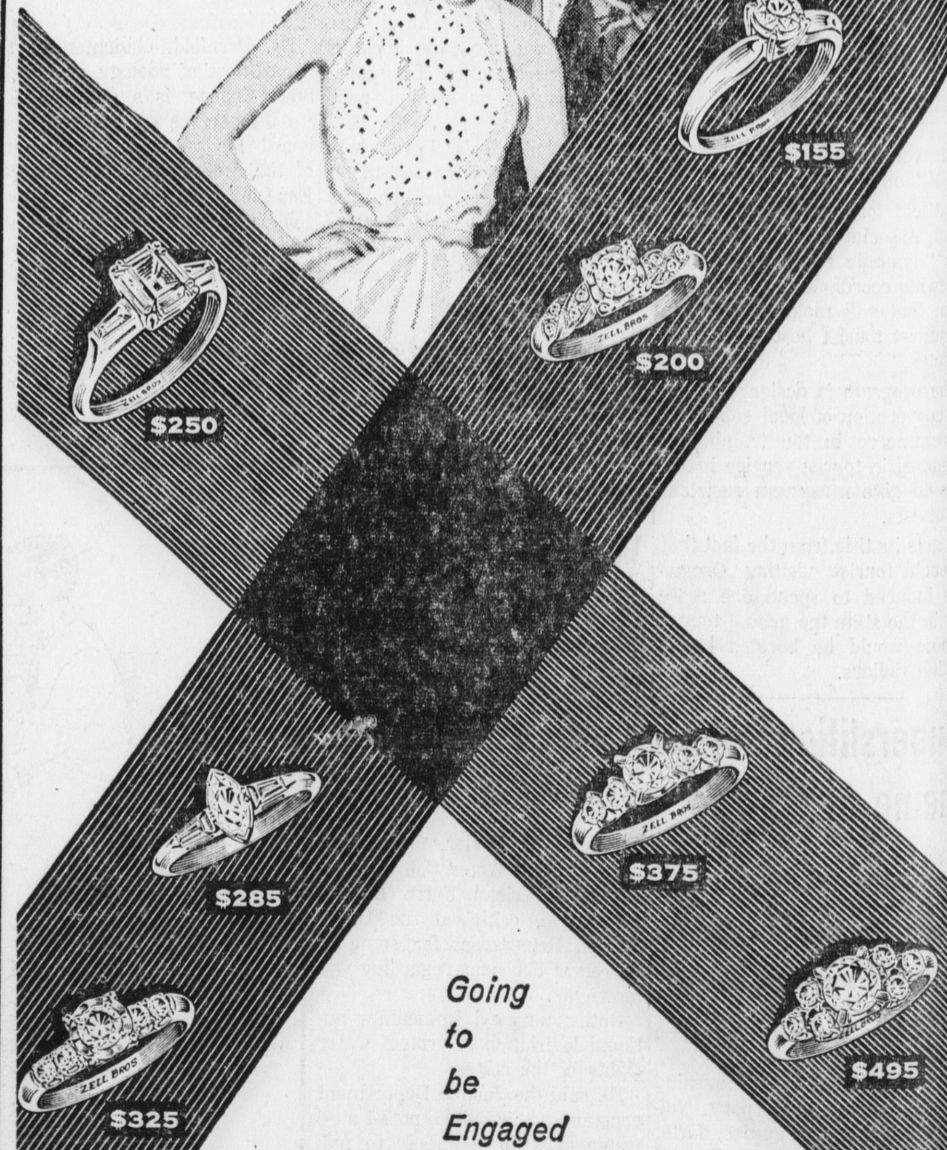
