## Connect week a must attend

The week before classes begin, known as CONNECT, offers many activities for new students to get to know OSU and the Corvallis community.

The events, put on by the office of Student Orientation and Retention (SOAR), are designed to get new students to interact with other new students and the surrounding area. Events like "Taste of OSU" and "Slice of Downtown Corvallis" are just a few of the activities that new students have to look forward to.

"Taste of OSU" gives students a chance to meet OSU faculty and staff as well as other new students, while "Slice of Downtown Corvallis" lets new students know exactly what there is to offer outside campus life.

Small businesses will have the opportunity to participate in the "Beaver Bingo" where students go around to different shops downtown to find certain items.

"We have CONNECT because it gets students out and meeting new people and seeing new places," Rick DeBellis, program coordinator for SOAR, said. "We want OSU to be more than just a place for classes, and we figure the best way to achieve that is to show all new students just what we have to offer.'

A CONNECT week staple and student favorite is the Late Night at Fred Meyer event. The Fred Meyer on Kings Blvd. will close and then reopen just for OSU students. During the event there will be door prizes, student discounts and many other special offers.

Student IDs are required for the event, so be sure to bring them.

"It just seemed like a fun idea to do," DeBellis said. "It's something we started a few years back and now a lot of different universities are copying us because it has been such a success.

There are also educational sessions ranging from budgeting and credit card use to sessions on maintaining long distance relationships through the first year away

Many colleges host their own orientation events during the week as well. These programs give new students the chance to ask any last-minute questions they might have as well as a chance to get to know other students within their major.

# Career Services offers more than job placement



OSU students who only visit Career Services when they're ready to graduate are cheating themselves of tremendous learning opportunities available to students of any class standing. Students new to OSU are often unsure of what major to declare or how a major of interest to them might translate into future career opportunities.

Carrie Coplan, a career counselor in Career Services, recommends that students visit Career Services to see what options are available to them. "I think Career Services is a great resource to help students sort through what can seem like an overwhelming number of programs and majors at OSU," says Coplan.

Students weighing specific majors, as well as students who have already declared a major, can discuss with a counselor what career opportunities are related to that major. Counselors in Career Services also can help students sort through their values, interests and goals to discover what majors inspire them. Regardless of a student's field of interest, career counselors can provide guidance on how to develop marketable skills that will make a student a viable job candidate in the future.

Career Services partners closely with student organizations, OSU academic departments, alumni, employers, and the community to provide a wide variety of experiences to students. The most visible

examples of this commitment to collaboration are the OSU University-Wide and Engineering Career Fairs.

Quarterly Career Fairs offer students a way to meet and learn about employers from across the state and nation. In a matter of hours students can interact with up to 100 employers without leaving campus. For students who aren't yet ready to apply for a job or internship, the Career Fairs provide a chance for students to gain perspective on future job opportunities, as well as practice networking with employers.

'Students can ask what employers want and start getting experience like that to put on their resumes," Coplan adds. "Students need to do well in class and on tests, but employers often are

looking for more [in an employee], like leadership experience."

The National Student Exchange program (NSE) offers students a year at another university. Those who apply and are accepted into the NSE program may choose from hundreds of partner institutions to which they can transfer for up to one school year. Participation in the NSE program allows OSU students to spend time in a different part of the country or take classes that are only available at a handful of institutions. Coursework taken at an NSE partner institution is transferable to OSU, and students can often attend partner institutions at rates at or below OSU in-state tuition.

# Assistance offered by writing and math centers

#### **Writing & Math Centers**

The Writing Center and the Math Learning Center (MLC) are two of Oregon State University's richest resources. Specialized, one-on-one student meetings make the centers the place to go for academic tutoring, curricular advice and a host of other concerns.

"There is no reason to sit at home if you are having problems," said Michael Smith, a Business major uses the Writing Center. "There are people here who can help you. Why not utilize it? It's free. Your tuition pays for it."

When material in his writing class became too complicated, Smith sought help. The Center offers more than help with class work. According to Wayne Robertson, the 2004 Writing Center Coordinator, "One of the most popular uses of the center is for students working on resumes, cover letters, scholarship letters and personal statements for graduate school."

Other tutorial services provided at the Writing Center

· Overcoming writer's block, preparing for class presentations, and organizing, developing and revising your own

 Assistance with paragraphing, sentence structure, grammar, punctuation and spelling

· Teaching how to revise, edit and proofread your own work

Writing assistants won't proofread your papers, but they will make suggestions on the content, structure and style of your writing and point you to materials in the Writing Center that may help you write more effectively.

Computer Science major, David Nguyen became a regular visitor to the MLC when he was a student. He dropped by Monday through Wednesday for help with college algebra. The

time he spent at the center paid off. "If I didn't have a tutor, I don't know what I would do," he said. "I would probably end up with an F."

Nguyen had to balance work and school. The MLC made it possible for him to get his math questions answered quickly. "The tutor walks me through it step by step until I understand the concept," he said. "They're also really good about letting you know what your strengths and weaknesses are."

The services offered by the Math Learning Center include:

· Well-lit study area with tables and a coin-operated photocopy machine

· Free drop-in tutoring provided by graduate teaching assistants, faculty volunteers and a few hired undergraduate tutors.

· A mathematics education resource room and a computer lab open to students with an Onid account.

# TC: Take a class and try it

Parachuting from a thousand feet five times in the course of a week is not a typical OSU experience. Business major Brian Peterson, who made those jumps last year, says the major difference between him and most OSU seniors is, "I have a bed time. Three days a week there's Physical Training from six to seven in the morning." Peterson, a member of the National Guard from Bend, OR, is a cadet in the OSU Army Reserved Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program.

He thinks that moving from Central Oregon Community College and joining ROTC at OSU, "Got me more focused. I changed my major from computer science." He decided to sign onto the program because his little brother was doing it and for both Petersons the commitment made sense.

Peterson says he gets mixed reactions when he wears his uniform on campus, but that he often here's people say, "Thank you for serving our country." That makes him feel good because, "When you are in ROTC, you are really proud of it."

Of the 75 to 80 Army ROTC cadets each year only about 20 percent are on scholarship. An even higher number are like Peterson, signed to the National Guard. Major Joseph Hoffman, the OSU Army recruitment officer, says only those on ROTC scholarships are committed to the program from the start. Other participants can take a class as an elective to see if they are interested. National Guard soldiers cannot be mobilized into active duty while studying in the ROTC program. They are guaranteed to be able to finish their degrees before moving to active

Hoffman tells non-scholarship ROTC recruits, "The first two years are elective for students. Take a class and try it on." The classes are active and fun and Hoffman finds his cadets are the best recruiters he could have, "If you are in a club, you invite your friends to join-unless you don't like what you're doing."

The only woman cadet in the senior class this year will be Kyla Johnson. Johnson hasn't minded being the lone female. Johnson says, since there are over a dozen women in the Army cadet program's lower classes, she tends to exercise with them, "Working out is probably the biggest thing. It's good to have other females to work out with."

Johnson from Port Townsend, Washington came to OSU as a member of the National Guard. Last year, she added to that commitment by serving as student body vice president where she, "Worked 20 plus hours





# Dialogue on diversity

For many incoming students, college is the first time that they experience diverse groups of people on a day-to-day basis. Even so, many have already formed ideas about what other groups are like what they say, how they dress, and even how they behave. Sometimes, individuals can treat those assumptions as being more 'real' than their actual experiences with those different from themselves.

At Oregon State University, a group of students working under the name Team Liberation works to build community and honor diversity by facilitating dialogues and workshops to help people understand more about the assumptions they make about themselves and others. The experience is also designed to increase communications skills and leadership abilities, especially as they pertain to the OSU

Team Liberation formed roughly four years ago under Diversity Development. The organization uses facilitated dialogues, experiential exercises, and human relations workshops as a way to get at issues of racism, sexism, heterosexism, ageism, ableism, religious intolerance and other forms of discrimination. Since 2002 Team Liberation has facilitated workshops and dialogues for over 1,300 students, staff, faculty and community members as well as held nine biannual workshops to train new facilitators.

shops or facilitations and Team Liberation volunteers work with the requesting group to develop a unique agenda for each training based on the group's demographics, goals, and needs.

The agendas are constructed from a file full of dozens of exercises the organization has collected that cover everything from how it feels to be told to act like a lady or a man to one that asks participants to think about how they define their own identity.

The organization evaluates its facilitations on a regular basis and often modifies its exercises and practices in response to comments from participants. In this way, the exercises can become even more effective and specific to the OSU community.

One of the main reasons for using experiential exercises is that it helps participants manifest the change they seek in the world — the idea being that everyone, regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation and the like should be given the opportunity to grow, thrive, and live with dignity and respect.

Other goals of the organization include raising awareness of the impact of social circumstances on particular individuals or groups, encouraging participants to recognize the contributions of others around them, and helping people develop new strategies for care in their daily interac-

#### **CAREER SERVICES:**

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Another Career Services offering comes through the internship program. Working as an intern is an excellent way to test the waters of a career field and determine whether it is worth pursuing long-term. Internships can also help students fill their resumes with marketable skills and knowledge that will assist them in securing jobs after graduation. Career Services can help students determine what types of internships might be of interest to them, as well as help pinpoint specific opportunities.

Once students are ready to apply for internships or jobs, Career Services has a host of opportunities from which they can benefit. Students seeking up-to-date job or internship postings can access Beaver Recruiting, a database system where employers can list position openings or search through resumes posted by students. Drop-in hours are hosted in Career Services between 1 and 4 p.m. every weekday and from 5 to 7 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. During this time, students can stop by to have Career Services staff critique resumes

or cover letters. Career counselors are available by appointment to conduct mock interviews with students. Participating in mock interviews can help students gain experience and confidence in their interviewing skills before sitting before a potential employer's hiring committee.

Career Services has much to offer OSU students, no matter where they are in the career decision-making process. Coplan encourages students to visit Career Services to "gather information ... learn what careers are out there and gain realworld information about what employers are looking

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


Having two obligations tested Johnson's limits, but she feels that is what the Army does on a regular basis, "It helped me prepare. You don't quit. You keep going."
