September

HUNTING MISHAP-

Thomas Hogg, OSU professor of anthropology and assistant dean of research dies from a ricochet bullet in a hunting accident.

ENDURANCE RECORD BROKEN-

Three cosmonauts aboard the Soviet Salyut 7 space station break the 112 day space endurance record for consecutive number of days in space.

A.I.D.S. SCARE-

Fear of contracting A.I.D.S. (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) keeps many from donating blood and bloodbank reserves are dangerously depleted across the country.

ARTS PARK OPENS-

The Bruce Starker Arts Park, sporting an amphitheater, fountain, pond and bike trails, on a 15 acre plot of land between Corvallis and Philomath receives its official dedication.

REAGAN & GROMYKO-

President Reagan meets with Soviet foreign minister Andrei Gromyko, the president's first indepth talk with a Soviet leader.

October

DETROIT WINS-

Rowdy fans go wild after the Detroit Tigers win the 1984 World Series for the first time since 1969.

THREE SHARE NOBEL-

Three researchers win the 1984 Nobel Prize in medicine for their work in pioneering studies in immunology that have led to promising new treatments for diseases ranging from allergies to cancer. They are Niels Kaj Jeine, Georges Kochler, and Cesar Milstein.

BABY FAE-

A dying 14-day-old infant girl receives the transplanted heart of a baboon sparking many ethical controversies.

GANDHI ASSASSINATED-

Prime Minister of India Indira Gandhi is killed by assassins, setting off violent rioting by Hindu mobs seeking revenge against members of the Sikh faith.

November

ELECTION RESULTS-

The incumbent republicans, President Ronald Reagan and Vice-President George Bush win the 1985 presidential election with a resounding sweep of 49 states, carrying 60 percent of the popular vote. The defeated democratic ticket of Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro still make history though with Ms. Ferraro being the first woman to run on a national ticket.

SNIPER ATTACK-

A University of Oregon student terrorizes the U of O campus, killing one man and wounding another before taking his own life.

WHERE'S THE BEEF?-

Clara Peller, age 80, immortalizes the phrase "Where's the beef?" with her TV commercials for Wendy's restaurants.

ETHIOPIAN FAMINE-

Americans become aware of the major African famine gripping several nations of that country. Ethiopia being among the worst hit.

SECOND ARTIFICIAL HEART TRANSPLANT-William Schroeder, the second person ever to receive the artificial heart transplant seemed to be faring well after the 6½ hour implant operation. Doctors say Schroeder has fewer other complications than did Barney Clark, the first artificial heart recipient who was able to live for 112 days with the implant.

December

SWEET SUCCESS-

Dr. Daniel Azarnoff introduces a molecular model of the artificial sweetener "Nutra-sweet", a nonnutritive, low calorie sweetener that is quickly replacing saccharine in many low calorie foods.

BHOPAL DISASTER-

Deadly gas leaks from a Union Carbide plant in Bhopal, India killing an estimated 410 people and causing health ailments in countless others within a 25 mile radius of the plant.

NEW FOOTBALL COACH-

David Kragthorpe is chosen to replace the ousted Joe Avezzano as OSU's new head football coach.

January

DRY SPELL A SURPRISE -

January quickly becomes the driest on record. But the lack of precipitation seems to be well countered by the reserves from a near record snow pack which grew substantially during November and December when record setting rainfall was recorded.

STUDENT AID IN JEOPARDY-

President Reagan proposes a massive cut in federally funded student aid programs in an effort to "help balance the budget".

NORTHWEST NUCLEAR DUMP?-

The Energy Department includes the Hanford site in Washington state in its list of leading candidates to be the nation's first permanent burial ground for nuclear waste, but immediately encounters a great deal of legal and political opposition. President Reagan will pick three of the sites for extensive drilling and testing.

WHOOP-WHOOP-

Portland's new mayor and former tavern owner Bud Clark officially takes office.

February

THE HEART OF ROCK & ROLL-Popular rock singer Huey Lewis plays at Gill Coliseum to a large, diverse and very receptive audience.

CONTROVERSIAL BUDGET PROPOSED-Reagan submits a 974 billion dollar budget for fiscal year 1986, calling for nearly 40 billion dollars to be cut from domestic programs while requesting an increase of 30 billion dollars for the Pentagon. The plan also forecasts a 180 billion dollar deficit.

POSTAGE HIKE-

The price of a first class postage stamp rises this month from 20 cents to 22 cents. The first rise in 31/2 years, the postal service says the increase is necessary to keep pace with inflation.

March

600 FOR RALPH-

OSU head basketball coach Ralph Miller wins his 600th game. This win moves him into 9th position on the all time career victory list among collegiate basketball coaches.

INAUGURATION FOR BYRNE-

Inauguration ceremonies welcoming new OSU president John Byrne take place this month. President Byrne replaces Robert MacVicar as president of OSU upon MacVicar's retirement after holding that office for 14 years.

CHERNENKO DIES-

Long ailing Soviet president Konstantin Chernenko dies of natural causes and is replaced by Mikhail Gorbachev. Gorbachev's appointment sparks a good deal of speculation about U.S.-Soviet relations mainly because of the new leader's relatively young age. At 54, he is likely to be in power for many years.

BEAVER HOOPS-

The OSU Beaver basketball team makes it to the first round of NCAA play against Notre Dame.

April

GORBACHEV-REAGAN SUMMIT?-

Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev says he has accepted President Reagan's invitation to a super power summit and has ordered missile deployments in Europe frozen until November. Gorbachev has not mentioned a possible date or place for a summit.

OREGON LOTTERY-

The Oregon State lottery officially starts this month with prizes ranging from two dollars to possible millions. Each ticket sells for one dollar, with 10 cents from each dollar being put into a giant "jackpot" cash prize.

May

BOATING TRAGEDY-

Two OSU students are killed at Lake Shasta over the Memorial Day weekend. Laurl Chiaretta drowns after trying to save Thomas Morrish who was struck by the boat which had been towing the pair and was returning to pick them up.

MOUNT ST. HELENS-

On the fifth year anniversary of the great explosion of May 18, 1980, Mt. St. Helens is still showing signs of life as witnessed by recent dome building activity.

UNITED STRIKES-

Scores of commuters and vacationers fight long ticket lines when United Airlines pilots call a strike against the company - one of the largest air carriers in the nation.

PLAYBOY TRYOUTS-

Playboy magazine photographer David Chan comes to campus to interview co-eds for the magazine's up-coming "Girls of the Pac-10" issue.

June


DOWNTOWN MALL-

3,679 degrees are awarded to OSU students in the third largest graduation in the university's history. The graduates range in age from 20 to 63 and represent 48 states and 64 countries.





SALUTE TO ROBERT MACVICAR

On a clean, crisp afternoon in December 1984, Robert MacVicar left the Administration Building on the corner of Jefferson and 14th Street for the last time as Oregon State's university president. With him, Mr. MacVicar took 14 years of sentimental memories and the legacy of being one of the most powerful members of Oregon's education community.

In November of last year, we at the Beaver sent a group of writers and a photographer to record some of MacVicar's thoughts on his term of office.


MacVicar revealed that his most enduring memory will be the students and how they have changed over the years.

"It will be the students," MacVicar says that he will miss most. He is a firm believer that young minds and young ideas are a very healthy part of any community and are the right ingredients to bring out the best in the older generation.

He finds the students now on campus to be friendlier, more ambitious, and of more diverse backgrounds than ever before. Diversity of the student body is an accomplishment that MacVicar is particularly proud of. OSU has grown from a university that once boasted a student from every county in Oregon to one that now boasts of a student from every continent and major country in the world. "OSU is now truly an international school."

His advice to today's college students is a "stop and smell the roses" philosophy. "Students today work much harder than my contemporaries and I did in college," MacVicar maintained. "Competition is much more rigorous and students in turn spend many more hours today studying and/or working to put themselves through school. My advice is to take it easy on occasion. A quick trip to the mountains or the coast may seem impossible today but, in a few years, will appear to have been so trivial."

Mr. MacVicar plans to do some traveling following his retirement and to get settled in his new home in Corvallis. He will remain active on campus, however, occupying an office in the Nuclear Engineering Building.



"Each country is so interrelated and interdependent that many organizations are in need of cross-cultural relations." 



The School of Education believes in it's commitment to excellence in teacher education that will give all of it's graduates special feeling of pride and accomplishment.





FORESTRY

When the College of Forestry was founded over 80 years ago, foresters were mainly custodians charged with protecting forests from fire, disease, insects, and overcutting. Today's forester has the same charge, but in addition is expected to apply the latest scientific knowledge and managerial skills to meeting the demands of modern society of forest resources — demands for wood, water, wildlife, recreation, range livestock, minerals and the solitude of undisturbed wilderness.

The modern forester is a planner employing the latest computer technology to analyze alternatives and make decisions. When the college celebrated its 53rd Annual Fernhopper Day this year, alums had a chance to reminisce about their undergraduate field laboratories during a tour of McDonald Forest, the college's research and teaching forest. But they soon found that the training of today's student goes far beyond what they could have imagined even 10 years ago.

Today's forestry student can easily obtain forest inventory data from an electronic file accessible from the college's new microcomputer laboratory. Spreadsheet software on the computers greatly simplifies data analysis. Graphics and mapping programs, and word processing greatly simplify the production of those forest management plans every forestry student loves so well.

The College of Forestry provides the comprehensive education needed by the forest managers of the future, while preserving the traditions of one of our Nation's noblest professions - forestry.

Human resources are our most precious commodity. The mission of the College of Health and Physical Education is to enhance the health and welfare of those resources without limitation as to sex, age or performance level. The academic thrusts of the college involve study of the effects of physical activity on health as well as the influence of environment on our well being. Students may specialize in a variety of sub-disciplines concerned with health and the promotion of active lifestyles. Health specialization include areas such as: teaching in schools, developing community health education programs, coordinating efforts related to environmental health and designing programs for reduction of health hazards and accidents in the private and public sectors. Physical education offers opportunities in teaching, athletic training, commercial fitness, pretherapy and sports leadership. A specialization in health care administration also is available through the college.

Research is directed at extending knowledge in the areas of health and physical education and in methods to better utilize that knowledge. Specific research interests serve to compliment the instructional programs and focus on improving the health: environment interface and to enhance our understanding of human movement and its contributions to human health and wellness.

The college also serves its community through a vareity of service activities. Highlighted here is the Special Physical-Motor Fitness Clinic. The clinic provides specialized physical education programs for school-aged youths. Individuals served by the clinic include those with developmental, neurologic, sensory, mental, orthopedic or other disabilities who need individualized physical education and fitness programs. Instruction is provided in aquatic and physical-motor fitness activities by a staff of professionals, assisted by graduate and undergraduate students enrolled in various professional programs on campus.


Other service activities of the college include the physical education activity program in which over 4500 OSU students are enrolled each term in a wide variety of sports, dance and fitness activities. The Department of Intramural Sports conducts a comprehensive program of more than 30 activities for student participation. The college also is involved in a youth traffic safety program and activities related to consulting with business and industry in environmental healthy and safety.

This service activity serves to demonstrate the whole fabric of the college weaving together the threads of teaching, research and service.

HOME ECONOMICS

The College of Home Economics at Oregon State University with appreciation of the past, awareness of the present and an orientation to the future adheres to the following statement as its goal for education at Oregon State:

Concern for the family is the core of home economics. Professionals in this interdisciplinary field are concerned with the aesthetic, economic, physical, biological, psychological and social needs of family members. Home economists are also concerned with the relationships, services, goods, and resources which enable families to function within environmental constraints.

The profession helps families and individuals at all age levels deal with diverse and changing lifestyles as well as with the interrelationships between families and local, national and world conditions which impact on families.

Home economists use the theory and knowledge from relevant humanities and sciences to develop a research and empirical base for the various subject matter disciplines. Outcomes are used by individuals, families and communities as they strive to set and attain their goals.

Professional specialization in the college are grouped into six departments: Clothing, Textiles and Related Arts, Human Development and Family Life, Family Resource Management, Foods and Nutrition, Communications and Home Economics Education; and Food Systems Management. The departments are not insular units; rather they are bound together by their common focus on the family to contribute a total approach to human needs, resources, and behavior. Resident instruction, research, extension and public service programs in these areas are applied to daily life concerns.

Although there exists all of the professional colleges here on campus, concentration on such technical fields ignores another vital part of the university: The College of Liberal Arts. This is because one-third of all student credit hours at Oregon State University are taught in the College of Liberal Arts.

If you came to college for just a technical education, your knowledge will probably be outdated in a few years unless you find a way to educate yourself in later years. The College of Liberal Arts helps with that self-education.

The College of Liberal Arts is the humanities, the arts, and the social sciences. Thus, it's about the culture in which we live.

The humanities include fields of knowledge and experience having to do with the production of people as feeling, thinking communicators- English, foreign languages and literatures, journalism, history, philosophy, religious studies and speech communication.

The social sciences include those fields of knowledge pertaining to human institutions, customs and behavior, anthropology, economics, geography, political science, psychology and sociology.

The arts help establish the basis for lifelong creative expressiveness in various art forms including music, the theatre and art.

Two Interdisciplinary Programs: American studies and liberal studies and five certificate programs: human services, humanities development, Latin American affairs, women studies and Russian studies complete the areas of study that are at the heart of the college.


The College of Liberal Arts also prides itself in the fact that the majority of their classes, even beginning level courses, are taught by full-fledged faculty members, available for consultation and committed to undergraduate education. A unique experience in such a large university. Upper division classes, those you take the last two years are usually quite small also, again offering the student individual attention from senior faculty.

Obviously, the College of Liberal Arts means looking at the basis for knowledge as opposed to application of knowledge.

OCEANOGRAPHY

During the past 20 years, the College of Oceanography at Oregon State University has become a leader in Oceanographic research and study.

Research is carried out in all the areas of the world. Most of the research is done in the North Pacific. OSU research vessels and vessels from other cooperating universities and laboratories carry faculty and students to remote parts of the world to participate in research cruises.

The College of Oceanography offers graduate programs leading to the MA, MS, or PhD degrees. Students may work toward any of these degrees by majoring in biological, chemical, geological, or physical oceanography or geophysics in the undergraduate level.

The Oregon State University College of Pharmacy is one of the smallest but one of the most active groups on campus. Academically, its objective is to contribute to the improvement of public health and welfare through dissemination, expansion, and application of biomedical knowledge. In doing so, the College provides an instructional program assuring academic and technical proficiency in the basic sciences and their pharmaceutical application. The College of Pharmacy utilizes practicing pharmacists, physicians, and other health care personnel from around the state as lecturers in the undergraduate and graduate teaching program.

Formal pharmacy education is divided into two parts, two years of prepharmacy and three years of professional pharmacy. A portion of the fifth year is completed by serving an externship in selected clinical and community pharmacy settings. After successful completion of the course requirements, a graduate is licensed by examination by the State Board of Pharmacy and may reciprocate to 45 other states.

Pharmacy provides excellent and challenging career opportunities. OSU's College of Pharmacy now has a 50 percent female enrollment, and all graduates are actively recruited by hospital, industry, community, and nursing home pharmacies.

The College of Science is central to an education at Oregon State University. Every graduate takes some science courses, and more students are enrolled as majors within the College than any other academic unit on campus.


The College of Science is concerned with basic fields of knowledge in the area of natural and mathematical sciences. Courses are offered (1) to its own majors as integral part of their professional studies in Science, (2) to students majoring in programs outside the College of Science for foundation study in their professional school and (3) to liberal arts students to satisfy an essential component in their general education.

Programs in the College of Science are leading to bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degrees at the undergraduate level and to master of arts, master of science, and doctor of philosophy degrees at the graduate level.


The College is composed of 14 departments grouped into four informal "divisions". The Mathematical Sciences includes the departments of Computer Science, Mathematics and Statistics. Physical Science contains departments of Chemistry, Physics, and Biochemistry and Biophysics. The Biological Sciences include Biochemistry and Biophysics, Botany and Plant Pathology, Microbiology, and Zoology. The Earth Sciences include Atmospheric Sciences, Geography, and Geology.

An education in science is an investment in the future and provides an entree into diverse careers. Oregon State University has a vigorous and knowledgeable faculty representing a wide spectrum of scientific activities. They are dedicated to the task of providing a modern education for the next generation of scientists. As practitioners, they are well qualified to bring the results of new science into every level of instruction in the College of Science with excellence as their goal. Oregon State University is a good place to study science.

VETERINARY MEDICINE

Veterinary medicine began at OSU in 1882 as a collection of courses, and later a department was established in the School of Agriculture. In 1975, the Oregon State University College of Veterinary Medicine became one of the 26 accredited veterinary colleges in the United States.

Much of Oregon's economy depends upon farming, ranching, and livestock. If wildlife refuges, zoos, and animal owners are also considered, the importance of veterinary medicine can be seen.

The college provides a service to the needs of Oregon by being a source of information on animal health, a center for research, and a learning laboratory for veterinary studies. Through the extension veterinarian, the college distributes information about it's services and faculties to Oregon's practicing veterinarians and livestock producers. In turn, these individuals send questions to the college that generates further research.

Since 1979, the college has enrolled students in the professional education program. After three to four years preparatory undergraduate work, the students apply for admission to the program. During their next four years, the students apply their knowledge of the basic Sciences with hands-on experience under the supervision of the school's clinical instructors.


After graduation, the majority of the veterinarians work in private practice, while others work in industry, government, or education.


The University Exploratory Studies Program (UESP) was created Fall of 1972. Dr. Morris LeMay designed the non-degree granting program for undergraduates who are undecided about their major field of study. At present, there are approximately 500 students in the program.

With the dedication of aiding students in an academic environment, the Student Counseling Center administers and coordinates UESP. They provide counseling on an individual basis and give career inventories to help students explore the wide range of vocational opportunities.

Students enrolled in UESP are generally advised to begin fulfilling the general university requirements. The student's interests help evaluate possible majors and they are encouraged to further explore that field of study by taking introductory courses.

On the average, the University Exploratory Studies Program has achieved a high reputation of satisfied students. The program has indeed been a success for many by exploring several areas of study and counseling to help the undecided student choose a suitable major and begin planning his or her future career.





RESEARCH

Dr. George H. Keller, Dean of Research, coordinates efforts of the various research units of the University. The Research Office encourages and assists faculty members in the development of research programs and in handling grant and contract applications; advises the University president regarding general progress of the institutions research programs; works to ensure maximum opportunity for the integration of graduate instruction and research; and maintains a technology transfer service for research staff who identify new devices and/or processes useful to the public.

Oregon State University research faculty attracts over sixty million dollars annually from outside sources to support research projects in disciplines across the campus. Research is conducted in eleven colleges and twelve centers or institutes. There are major areas of research in Oceanography, Gene Research and Biotechnology, Advanced Materials Science, Engineering, Forestry, Agriculture, Marine Resources, Pharmacy, Environmental Health, and Veterinary Medicine.

OSU is both a Land Grant and Sea Grant University, so the research activity and its impact extends throughout the state and beyond.

The ASOSU Experimental College is a free university service offering low cost, non-credit courses to OSU students and the Corvallis community. Over 150 courses ranging from aerobics to microcomputing to yoga are taught each term by volunteer instructors. OSU students who teach also have the possibility of obtaining reading and conference credit by making arrangements with their departments. Experimental College is run by students with some paid positions and many volunteer ones. It offers an easy-going, yet efficient atmosphere and anyone who comes in contact with Experimental College makes new friends.


The Cooperative Education Internship program, also called the co-op program, has benefited many students at Oregon State by assisting them in obtaining job experience related to their studies and to put their knowledge to use while still in school. AT OSU, over 800 students and 450 employers participate each year.

When co-op education first became a part of OSU, the individual departments helped students obtain job experience. Now, the Cooperative Education center at the Career Placement Center consults and aids many students and works with the departments, and many businesses, organizations, and agencies to help students obtain professionally-related work experience.

Students involved in the program work on a full-time or part-time basis. Some work experiences are non-paying, while the majority of the students receive pay.


If a student wishes to become involved in the program, he or she can talk to a Cooperative Education councelor at the Career Planning and Placement Center, or an advisor from a specific department.








COMING HOME


GILL'S NEW FALL LOOK






BREAKIN' AWAY . . .

"YES!" the audience cheered.


"Don't you have homework to do?" he asked.



OREGON SPECIAL OLYMPICS AT OSU


The Oregon Special Olympic Program provides athletic training and competition for mentally handicapped athletes throughout the state. The training programs culminate with a state tournament which brings together athletes from every county in Oregon for a weekend of competition and social activity. Oregon State University is the site of the annual Oregon Special Olympics Basketball Tournament. The 1985 tournament attracted over 700 athletes, making it the largest basketball tournament of any kind in the state of Oregon.


The success of this tournament is largely due to the support provided by the OSU campus community. OSU President John Byrne provides the facilities required for the tournament and encourages the involvement of the campus community. The list of volunteers and supporters for the year's tournament included: Head Football Coach Dave Kragthorpe, who serves as Spirit Coach for Oregon Special Olympics; Mr. James Douglass (Director) and the OSU Pep Band; the OSU Rally Squad; the Army and Navy ROTC units; members of the OSU football team; several campus fraternities and sororities, and many students who volunteered as individuals. Through tournaments such as this one, it is hoped that the volunteers and spectators will see the high level of skill that these athletes possess. As such, the abilities of the mentally handicapped population will be recognized, facilitating a greater understanding and acceptance of these athletes in our society.






Overall, Moms' Weekend 1985 was deemed a huge success and was enjoyed equally by students and moms alike.








OSU GOES INTERNATIONAL



range from a term to a year. Study abroad programs are also available in the summer for those students who don't want to miss the academic year at OSU through the foreign language department.




cause due to Norton's experience in the Vietnam War.




The water in the Kerr Library fountain was once again turned on, at the request of OSU vice president for administration. A protest was led to get the fountain turned back on for spring.



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A NEW BEGINNING FOR THE


Years of hard work, studies, and struggles came to a finish, if only momentarily, for 3,540 OSU graduates in the third-largest graduation in OSU's history.


The graduation represented all 36 Oregon counties, 47 states, and 64 countries.

Epping slyly tells the story of how he got into Beaver basketball games while still in high school. "I forged a marriage certificate and got into the games pretending to be my sister's husband," he said. "The Beav's were #1 and I was willing to do anything to see them play."

His love for sports is still very much apparent. He brags about never missing a home football game in his four years at college, and you can bet whenever the basketball team is in town he'll be there at courtside rooting them on.

A graduate of Sacred Heart High School in Salem, Epping is an active member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity. "I really enjoy living in a fraternity, I have had four great years living in the house and will miss it a lot when I graduate."

After graduating with a BA in International Management and Finance, Epping hopes to get a job which involves traveling. "I would like to get a job with a multinational corporation so I can do a lot of traveling rather than sitting behind a desk," Epping said about his career plans. He also expressed an interest in one day owning his own business if things work out the way he plans.

Epping's enthusiasm and ambition make it quite clear that he will be doing much more than sitting behind a desk after he graduates.

Clench is used to. "Our classes are all pass or fail, we don't use letter grades." Rebecca is an exchange student from Robert Gorden's Institute of Technology in Aberdeen, Scotland.

The teaching style is different for her. She's used to taking lots of notes from lectures and studying from them. They don't use the books very much. During her first few weeks of school at OSU, she took lots of notes and put her books on a back shelf. She realized she was missing something and asked someone in her class where they were getting all their information. "By the time I realized I was supposed to be doing so much reading, I was way behind."

According to Rebecca, students here take their education more seriously than they do in Scotland. "It is probably because they have to pay so much. All students in Scotland get their tuition and fees paid by grants from the government."

Rebecca has noticed many differences in the two countries. "I can't say one is better than the other, they're just different," she says. She was surprised at how much people snack here. In Scotland, places to buy food are generally only open at mealtimes. She says she was quick to pick up on the snacking habit, but she hasn't aguired a taste for American chocolate yet.

"Living accomodations are much better here," says Rebecca. "It's almost impossible to find a place to live in Aberdeen. When you do get one, it's not as nice as they have here. It generally doesn't have carpeting, just stone floors."

Terminology has caused some problems. "People will start laughing at things I say and I won't know what is wrong," says Rebecca. "Some words that are ordinary words for me have bad meanings here, and the other way around."

Since Rebecca was involved in the OTC, Officer Training Corps, in Scotland, she decided to participate in Army ROTC while she's here. Belonging to OTC is an extracurricular activity in Scotland. It's more like a club than a class. She joined to "meet people, guys in particular." Her university is spread out, it's not all in one section of town. Since she's in Home Economics, almost everybody who takes classes where she does are girls.

"I like having the university so close together like it is here," she comments, "because it's easier to find out what's going on and you can join in easier." One of her goals while she is here is to "meet as many people as I can."

Besides serving as a learning facility for hundreds of OSU students interested in the field of radio, simultaneously we've strengthened our reputation for quality programming and professional attitude.


KBVR-FM is recognized nationally as one of the leading and most progressive college radio stations in the country, almost the antithesis of what some people believe Corvallis is all about.





















UNSUNG HEROES




"I also have one other 'hobby': I really enjoy working here," she said. Then, with a smile, she added, "But don't let anyone know that!"

A 1976 graduate of McNary High School in Salem, Wilson is married and has a five-year-old daughter.


She has been the IFC secretary for 21/2 years, a job she said she enjoys very much. "It's fun, there is always something going on, the guys I work with are great," she said.


cee's, Panhellenic, varsity athletics, O.S.U. Fashion Show, and O.S.U. Student Foundation, to name a few.


Our philantropy is respiratory health and our mascot is a teddy bear. We also participate in many Greek and university events, including Mom's Weekend. As our house picture shows, we had an







involved in ASOSU Senate and task forces, Student Foundation, Panhellenic and all class honoraries, among many others.



We take school and grades very seriously,


but the most important lesson we learn can never be taught in a classroom or read from a history book. We learn how to live and relate to sixty other girls and maybe put up with each other's bad



Rolling Stone Magazine made the observation, "If bread is the






Rumor has it every winter term the men of OSU flood the tanning booths in hopes of capturing the title of DeeGee's Mr. Bathing Beauty.

come from similar backgrounds they have starting blocks for becoming acquainted.


At AGR we realize everything isn't learned out of a book. For this reason we have an active social calendar scheduled by chairmen who are elected each term. Social

Sports! What can I say, our bowling team lost. However, our polo team took first at NCAA's. Adding one more trophy to our already overcrowded awards room.



You may have heard of our nickname "the squeeks", well we're trying to lose that reputation, so this year we have only turned in 5 or 6 fraternities for various violations.



GIRL: It was awesome, like a big dog!







"Oh, sure, now I know. The Whitehouse, bitchen!"


Our house needed some supplies, so after straightening out the finance situation I

jammed on over to the Bookstore. Less than halfway there it started raining. I picked up the supplies and asked the cashier to bill Pi Kappa Phi.







involved in many aspects of OSU, from varsity athletics to student government.





He was hired five years ago in hope of pulling up the Beaver football team hampered by a streak of losses under the coaching of Craig Fertig. Joe Avezzano knew there was a big challenge awaiting him when he was appointed head football coach. He still maintained that "... you walk before you run. I believe Oregon State will become a winner in time."

Though he had no head coaching experience, Avezzano had worked under the great Johny Majors for eleven years. He served as offensive coordinator under Majors, following him to Iowa State, University of Pittsburg, and University of Tennessee. His last year at University of Pittsburg, while serving as offensive coordinator as well as line coach, Avezzano helped lead the team to the Sugar Bowl championship. Throughout his career Avezzano was involved in seven bowl games.








Why then did he give up coaching for an Athletic Director position at Utah State? 


Meeting their own high expectations was a difficult, if not impossi-



TOUGH SEASON PROVES



Oregon States' men's basketball team made it through one of the toughest Pac-10 seasons in recent years to claim a third place tie with Arizona and UCLA. USC finished first with Washington second.

OSU's season was a frustrating one, but one full of pressure and excitement. The Beavers finished the season with a 22-8 record and gained a berth in the NCAA Tournament. OSU was put in

the southeastern bracket where they were defeated by Notre Dame in the first game 79-70. It was the Beavers thirteenth trip to NCAA post-season play and they hold a 13-15 record.


OSU set many school records this year including finishing with a 20+ win season for the sixth year in a row. The Beavers also surpassed previous records with only four turnovers in one game against both the University of Portland and California. They also broke the record for the most steals in one game with 27 against Hawaii-Loa, and most free throws attempted in one game, 30/34 against Boise State.

The Beavers won 35 of their last 46 games with four losses at home. Three of those losses were to Pac-10 teams, which is the most Pac-10 losses at home since Miller's first season in 1970-71. Although OSU didn't finish ranked in any major poll, they were as high as 8th on UPI and 10th on AP at one point during the year. OSU's shooting was consistent throughout the year except for games against U of W and California. The Beavers were praised nationally for their strength on defense. They were able to hold their opponents to below .500 in shooting.


OSU Beaver basketball success can be attributed to the work of the whole team. Certain figures, however, made it into the record books with their efforts. Darryl Flowers moved into 7th place on OSU's all-time assists list. Coach Ralph Miller became the 9th winningest of all-time NCAA coaches with 600 wins, and he needs only 11 more to move into 8th place. Steve Woodside became the 21st all-time scoring leader with 952 points. Top honors, however, have to go to the lone senior A.C. Green. A.C. became the third leading scorer with 1,668 points. He moved into second place with 868 career rebounds, and he lead the Pac-10 this year in both areas. A.C. Green was also a unanimous pick for the All Pac-10 Team for the second year in a row.

"We have a lot of fun, along with the work, we get a chance to travel with the OSU teams, and we get an opportunity to meet lots of OSU alumni."


Thus, the force that motivates, also is motivated by all the rewards and excitement the OSU seasons have to offer.







seniors, but the younger members also excelled this season.






As Eacobacci says, "We became very united and developed a strong sense of cohesion. The season was really a building block year; we worked to grow for the future."













Fonda DeCree muscles the ball away from her opponent to lead the Beavers to an 80-69 win over Fresno State.

Freshman, Debbie Dalluge, anticipates a rebound, as the Beavers put down a 76-60 win over Santa Clara.




The Oregon State women's basketball team ended the 1984-85 season with a 19-10 record. The 10 losses proved to be a record for Coach Aka Hill's career at OSU. Hill's team also failed to qualify for the NCAA Division I championships, a first in her seven year coaching career at Oregon State. The Beaver women were plagued by injury during the season. Lisa Channel, who was expected to be a key player

this season, spent the season on the bench due to injury. Juli Coleman also began the season with a knee injury, but came back to complete one of the most successful seasons in OSU history.

Senior guard Juli Coleman, averaged 23.9 points per game this season. She also sported an outstanding 80 percent free throw percentage. Coleman led the NorPac Conference in points per game and was a first team, all-league selection. She was named to the NorPac All-Tournament team, the first team All-America squad by Women's Basketball News Service, and was a second team CoSIDA Scholastic All-America pick. She ended her career as the No. two scorer in OSU history with 1,840 points, beaten only by Carol Menkin with 2,243 points.

Both Aka Hill and assistant coach Bucky Gill motivated the team to "keep their goal in sight." Not only was it to win as many games as possible, but to play their best as a team. Granted with strong-willed rookies, the


stein. Freshmen standouts Tina Barnes, Debbie Marland, and Carol Schroeder performed like professionals by the end of the season.


Not only were the Beavers victorious against their competition, but they won the hearts of fans and the audiences at Gill were larger than OSU has seen before to support the lady Beavers.



The O.S.U. wrestling season was very promising overall. The season went fairly well-the team lost a few close matches but improved both individually and as a team.



As for next year? "Recruitment is going well with lots of young talent in the state," said assistant coach Jim Cremley.







The Beaver season ended with a 1-0 loss to California in the Northern Pacific Conference Softball Tournament. Collen

The Beavers finished their season with a 22-24 overall record.






and his staff, crew members spend hours on the river practicing strokes and strategy.

second at the Norpack tournament. Kari Weston took the school record for the 400-meter hurdles and was deemed second fastest in Oregon State history for the high hurdles.




Kristi Wreath beats her own personal best in the shot put with a put of 42-1/4.

INTO PAC-10 TITLE




The OSU baseball team finished a very rollercoaster season with a Pac-10 Northern Division record of 12-12 and an overall record of 31-15. The fourth place finish still put the Beavers into post season play with Washington, Washington State, and Portland State. OSU won the tournament and proceeded to the NCAA playoffs.

OSU started their League season coming off an exciting 8-0 tournament streak that brought them the championship of the Riverside Baseball Invitational. The tournament featured some of the best baseball teams in the U.S and it brought the Beavers much respect when they took the tourney title. The rest of the season, however, wasn't so sunny. "Maybe we had a flash-in-

the-pan type thing and after that we settled into things like we should have." said OSU coach Jack Riley.

The season went up and down for the Beavers, but 'must' wins over Western Oregon and Eastern Washington gave them a run at post season play. Many standouts this year include a 10 game winning streak by pitcher, John Sipple, which ended with a blemish in the last game of the regular season when OSU lost to Eastern Washington after clinching a playoff spot. Dave Brundage finished the season leading the team with a .380 batting average, and Gary Hamilton and Mel Mallinek both had six home runs to lead the team this year. The All-Division infield, picked by the Northern Division coaches, was made up of all Beavers. Dave Brundage at first, Mel Mallinak at second, Ken Bowen at shortstop, and Quinn Williams at third proved that the Beavers infield was a force to be reckoned with.






Exuberant Beaver fan demonstrates the "Wave" at Gill Coliseum.



This Beaver fan reflects the spirit of OSU fans for the women gymnasts.


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

LACROSSE CLUB



RUGBY CLUB



SOCCER **CLUB**




KARATE CLUB
