# High-scoring Bears set to face Ducks' solid defense

Weak Oregon offense has yet to score a passing touchdown

On paper, Saturday's game between the No. 6 California Golden Bears and the Oregon Ducks ought to be no contest.

Cal outranks the Ducks in every single offensive category and does so in dominant fashion. The Golden Bears are in the top 12 in the nation in three out of the four major offensive breakdowns with 488.7 total yards per game (11th), 250.3 rushing yards per game (10th), and 48.7 points per game (second). Oregon on the other hand, does not rank in the top 60 in any of the four major categories.

But when kickoff happens at 12:30 p.m., everything on paper goes out the window and the Autzen faithful will get to see just what this year's team is made of. Heading into Saturday's game against the nation's top running back in Jahvid Best, the Ducks have been able to keep their focus and leave the rankings and statistical banter out of site and out of mind.

Junior quarterback Jeremiah Masoli said focusing on the team has been key.

"We don't really worry about outside distractions and what people our saying about us," he said. "We just come here and work every day to get better."

Masoli, who has recorded four of Oregon's seven rushing touchdowns this season, will look to reach the end zone through the air for the first time

this year after meeting with a frustrated receiving corps last Saturday.

"We all talked after the game last week and we just kind of told each other, it's time to step up and shine," he said. While the offense has been able to improve little by little

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
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
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#### Best's combination of size, speed has Oregon worried

Receivers lones, Tucker take pressure off Heisman hopeful

After the Washington Huskies knocked off powerhouse USC last week in Seattle, Wash., the No. 6 California Golden Bears moved in as the early season favorite to win the Pacific-10 Conference title and make their first trip to the Rose Bowl since 1959.

And with one of the nation's top contenders to win the Heisman Trophy this season - running back Jahvid Best — Cal will look to stretch its current sixgame winning streak as it takes on the Oregon Ducks tomorrow in Autzen Stadium.

Oregon linebacker Eddie Pleasant said the team is gearing up to face Best on the field.

'We know we need to stop him and that's one of the things we've been working on," he said.

Best, now in his junior season, is leading the nation with nine touchdowns and ranks third in rushing with 412 yards through three games — only 29 yards less than the Oregon's 441-yard season total. Last week at Minnesota, Best set a school record with his five-touchdown performance, and it helped break a four-game road losing streak for the Bears.

"He's got tremendous speed and he's got good size," said Oregon head coach Chip Kelly. "A lot of times you've got a kid that can run, but he's not that big. (Best) can break tackles, he's got great vision."

While Cal head coach Jeff Tedford understands what a

gifted player his running back is, he also commented that he and his squad — especially Best are very team-oriented.

"It's team first, all the way, and everybody knows that," he said. "Jahvid understands that, Jahvid appreciates that and Jahvid appreciates the tandem of him and Shane (Vereen), of keeping him fresh and healthy.'

Equally impressive for the Cal offense through the first three games has been the play of junior quarterback Kevin Riley. The Beaverton High School graduate has thrown for 698 yards on 46 of 71 passing, while reaching the end zone five times and has yet to throw an interception.

"I like the way he plays," Kelly said of Riley. "He's a student of the game. He doesn't really try to force the issue, he really takes

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

# Running, passing proving difficult for Duck offense

2009 Oregon offense not nearly as powerful or effective as many of its predecessors

Who would have guessed it? Oregon's vaunted rushing attack is ranked No. 64 in the nation. A year after burning up the field turf with two 1,000-yard rushers, the Ducks don't have a single running back projected to breach even 950 yards in 12 games. But that's not the story. Oregon looks positively stellar on the ground compared to what the team has done through the air.

Through three games the team has yet to throw a touchdown pass. It's one of four teams out of the 120 Football Bowl Subdivision teams that hasn't.

To add to it, the Ducks are ranked No. 116 in passing offense, and they're averaging 126 yards per game. However, Oregon is 2-1 despite throwing for 95 yards against No. 18 Utah

on Saturday.

It's an enigma for sure, but head coach Chip Kelly said he still has confidence in quarterback Jeremiah Masoli despite a few Duck fans calling for backup Nate Costa on the message boards.

"We're just practicing football," Kelly said. "We're not changing things. He's the same kid who has won 10 games for us."

Masoli said after the Utah game that the he and the receivers needed to work on their timing and reads and coming into Friday, he feels confident they have done that. At the end of the practice clutch drill Wednesday, he connected with tight end David Paulson for a touchdown to win the game over the scout team.

"We definitely look sharper," Masoli said. "We are

just running simpler routes and basic stuff. We're running the same stuff, just not as complicated."

Wide receiver Jamere Holland said the first three games have been frustrating and he's looking forward to California. So far this season, Holland has caught seven passes for 105 yards.


"It has been kind of rough," Holland said. "As a receiving corps, we like to score to touchdowns and catch balls and do all these great things and it just hasn't happened yet for us."

But wide receivers coach Scott Frost said if players are frustrated, it's the wrong mentality. He wants them to be a part of the solution and not feel sorry for themselves.

"I think if guys are frustrated I have a problem with that," Frost said. "We're never going to put ourselves in front of the team. Guys at the wide receiver


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

what the defense gives him."

California receivers Verran Tucker and Marvin Jones will also look to contribute to the Golden Bears' potent offense. Tucker has pulled down six receptions for 128 yards through three games, while Jones has recorded seven receptions for 104 yards and a touchdown. Cal's mark of 488.7 total yards per game ranks them 11th in country, while also ranking second in the NCAA in points per game with 48.7.

The Bears will be without wide receiver Nyan Boateng for the next four-to-six weeks after havFROM PAGE 4

ing surgery on his broken right foot this past Monday. Boateng had recorded five receptions for 78 yards and a touchdown as Cal's third receiver.

Defensively, sophomore linebacker Mychal Kendricks has led the way for the Golden Bears thus far having recorded 30 tackles, one pass deflection, one forced fumble and he also recovered a fumble.

Senior Tyson Alualu will has been a force to be reckoned with on the defensive line having recorded 13 tackles and 2.5 sacks while also deflecting two passes and forcing a fumble. Alualu

started in 27 games over his first three years with Cal, playing in all 39, and was selected as a preseason honorable mention All-American after recording a career-high 62 tackles in 2008.

Although the Bears are favored to win, Tedford said they aren't taking Saturday's game lightly. The Bears have been focused on the Ducks since last week's game in Minnesota, he said.

"It was very serious on Sunday," Tedford said. "It was almost like we'd lost the game the day before. They were very focused, very serious about what we're getting ready to get into."



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

## Pac-10 play in full swing Saturday

USC hopes to rebound against WSU; Arizona State goes on the road against Georgia

#### No. 24 Washington at Stanford (6 p.m.)

After shocking the nation last week with a 16-13 win over USC last week and climbing into the AP Top 25 for the first time in six years, an upstart Huskies team looks to keep its momentum going in Palo Alto. Turnovers played a key role in Washington's upset of the Trojans, as USC lost two fumbles and also had a pass intercepted. Huskies quarterback Jake Locker stepped up with the game on the line, leading Washington on a 10-play, four-minute long drive that resulted in the game-clinching 22-yard field goal. Stanford never trailed last week in their 42-17 win over San Jose State, and Chris Owusu returned a

kickoff 94 yards for the first touchdown of the game.

Key stat: Washington quarterback Jake Locker's 811 passing yards for the season already eclipses his total from last year by 299 yards.

#### Arizona State at No. 21 Georgia (4 p.m.), ESPNU

A week after steamrolling Louisiana Monroe 38-14, the Sun Devils travel to Sanford Stadium to face Joe Cox and the No. 21-ranked Bulldogs. The Sun Devils defense was stifling last week, holding the Warhawks to only 126 passing yards. Omar Bolden returned a kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown, while running back Dimitri Nance ran for two touchdowns of his own.

Key stat: Arizona State has al-

lowed a total of only 168 passing Conference loss, the Trojans yards this season. Conference loss, the Trojans hope to have injured stars Matt

#### Arizona at Oregon State (4:35 p.m.)

Both the Wildcats and the Beavers hope to bounce back from tough 10-point losses last week. The Wildcats fell to Iowa 27-17 in Iowa City, and struggling quarterback Matt Scott was benched in the fourth quarter after completing only four of 14 pass attempts. The Beavers were stifled by a surging Cincinnati team as star running back Jacquizz Rodgers was held to only 73 rushing yards on 20 carries.

**Key stat:** Arizona has lost nine of its last 10 meetings with Oregon State.

#### Washington State at No. 12 USC (7:15 p.m.)

Coming off of yet another early season Pacific-10

hope to have injured stars Matt Barkley and Taylor Mays are ready for Saturday. Even if Barkley and Mays are not ready, USC should have little trouble against a struggling Cougars squad that barely survived Southern Methodist last week. Down 27-20 with two minutes left in the fourth quarter, quarterback Marshall Lobbestael led the Cougars 80 yards down the field and tied the game with a seven-yard touchdown pass to Jared Karstetter. In overtime, the Cougars intercepted Southern Methodist's first pass attempt, and kicker Nico Grasu ended the game with a 39-yard field goal. The Trojans should also walk into this game with a bit more confidence than usual, having embarrassed the

Cougars last year 69-0. **Key stat:** Washington State has not beaten USC in the L.A. Coliseum since 2000.

#### Alabama impressive in 2-0 season start

Let me start off by saying this: the Crimson Tide is good. Really good.

But for Tide fans across the nation, what should be more exciting is that they could be great.

I mean really great. I mean pack-your-bags-we're-goingto-Pasadena-for-the-Rose-Bowl great.

The opening two acts of the Capstone's football club has shown a group of athletes with the dual talent of dazzling and disappointing their followers: a dynamic offense and stifling defense alternate with bone-headed miscues and epic special teams gaffes.

The Tide's outstanding back-to-back offensive performances, in which it put up 498 yards against Virginia Tech and 516 against Florida International, has already doubled the number of 450-yard games from last year's 12-2 squad.

After nearly 10 years of depletion due to probation and sub-standard recruiting by former coaches, Tide football talent has ascended to an elite level under head coach Nick Saban.

But for all the good that the fans in crimson can take from the Tide's 2-0 opening, there remain several nagging issues that simply must be resolved for the Tide to seriously challenge the juggernaut in Gainesville for the SEC championship, and along with it, a shot to hoist the crystal ball in the air in January.

The special teams' performances have been less than stellar, with the Tide allowing two costly touchdowns on kickoff returns, each allowing an offensively dominated team to get back in the game. Against the Hokies, a promising 6-0 start built on the com-

plete domination of the Virginia Tech offense by Rolando McClain and company was instantly erased with one sprint by return man Dyrell Roberts.

This Tide team could accomplish incredible things. As talented as the 1999 bunch that won the SEC, and as well-coached on the defensive side as the 1992 squad that won Alabama's 12th national title, it appears that the sky really is the limit for this 2009 group.

And just how does Kelly plan to stop the best running back in the nation? "Tackle him." he said.

Kelly said it's more than Best alone that makes the Bears offense.

"They're not a one-dimensional team on the offensive side of the ball," he said. "They have a lot of weapons on the offensive side of the ball that we have to contain."

Riley has gone 46 of 71 for 698 yards and five touchdowns this season, while backup running

back Shane Vereen has rushed 30 times for 124 yards and four touchdowns in his limited relief

The Oregon running game was able to find a little more identity last week against Utah as redshirt freshman LaMichael James ran for an Oregon freshman single-game rushing record with 152 yards on 27 carries and reached the end zone for the first time in his collegiate career.

Kelly was not at all surprised at the performance James had on Saturday, especially after seeing him have similar success last season on the scout team offense. "That's kind of what I expected from LaMichael," Kelly said. "He's a lot tougher than I think people give him credit for because he's small. He's a tough sucker."

While Cal will bring in one of the fastest offenses in the country, the Oregon defense has plenty of speed to counter their attack.

"We've just got to play our game," Oregon cornerback Talmadge Jackson III said. "Stick to our rules and our keys on defense and just go out and play our game."

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# Bair of a man presence felt

Two-year mission provides maturity for defensive line stalwart

Oregon defensive lineman Brandon Bair says the Mormon mission is sacred: A rite of passage, an exercise of faith and a calling to serve.

Before his collegiate sports career began, Bair abandoned his hometown of St. Anthony, Idaho, for the Deep South to complete his mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints to help others come unto Christ.

The experience, marked by two years of fried foods and learning Spanish, might have something with what Oregon head coach Chip Kelly calls the 24-year-old's "maturity."

But Bair's life experience as a husband and father might also have something to do with it. Bair and his wife of nearly two vears, Jordan, recently had their first child in August — a baby girl named Brooklyn Hope.

With these experiences under his belt, Bair brings "true leadership," to a relatively young defense, Kelly said.

"He's a great leader by example," Kelly said. "He's got a great work ethic."

Bair is among the ranks of several other Mormon athletes who postponed collegiate sports careers for missionary work. Mormon athletes who have also completed missions include defensive end Will Tukuafu, offensive guard Mark Asper and tight end Sam Doman. Redshirt freshman center Hamani Stevens has left school to complete his mission.

For Bair's mission, in addition to moving to Jacksonville, Fla., and Brunswick, Ga., church leaders told Bair he would have to learn Spanish.

Bair had never held much interest in the language before, he said, but he took it upon himself to learn it with a sense of duty.

"They sent us to what they call the Mission Training Center in Provo, Utah," Bair said. "I the basics of the language, and



In large part through the emergence of Oregon defensive tackle Brandon Bair, the Duck defensive line has answered many of the questions surrounding it at the opening of fall camp. The junior from St. Anthony, Idaho, having never recorded more than three tackles in a game before this season, is averaging four per game and partially blocked a punt against Utah.

then they sent me out there and basically said, 'Figure it out."

As with Spanish, Bair had to be prepared for a life of college football following his mission - a task that proved difficult while spreading the word in the South.

"In the mornings, we'd get a half-hour time to work out," Bair said. "I'd just wake up a half-hour before that (at 5:30 a.m.) and go to the gym and work out (and) run back to the house.'

Keeping up consistent physical ardor was exceptionally challenging given that, as Bair recounted with a smile, "I went to the South. I ate a lot of fried chicken. Everything was fried.'

When Bair left for his mission, the first-team, all-state defensive lineman was already committed to the Ducks. Bair's scholarship was honored by

then-head coach Mike Bellotti upon his return, and in the fall of 2006, he began working with the offense as a freshman.

However, a spate of injuries caused Bair and Ed Dickson to move to defensive end to shore up depth. Dickson later returned to tight end the following year and became one of the top tight ends in the country for the 2009 season.

Bair, meanwhile, was steadily seeing repetitions and being integrated into the Oregon defense. He played in all 13 games in both the 2007 and 2008 seasons, recording four and eight tackles in the respective seasons and fumble recoveries in victories against Michigan in 2007 and Oregon State in 2008.

At the end of the 2008 season, Nick Reed, Ra'Shon Harris and Cole Linehan all graduated, leaving a void of experience along the defensive line -

recruiting misses had resulted in questionable depth. Bair was moved to tackle during the spring, where his 6-foot-7, 250-pound frame is atypical among the squat pluggers that traditionally inhabit the position but where Oregon could plug in one of its better overall defensive line players.

"You've gotta know both positions to be on the field," Bair said. "Technically, you're basically doing the same thing. It's all the same fundamentals.

Adjustment to the interior of the line notwithstanding, Bair has proven himself an important piece of what might have been the offseason's biggest puzzle.

"He's still a work in progress," said defensive line coach Jerry Azzinaro, in his first year on the Oregon coaching staff, "but you've gotta grade what you see on film and he's been productive and technically sound."

Statistics for defensive linemen, Kelly said, can greatly deceive. To date, Bair has recorded four tackles a game, along with a partially blocked punt against Útah.


"The D-line isn't going to have a lot of tackles because they're tying up blockers and keeping guys off of your linebackers," Kelly said. "Casey Matthews is the leading tackler in the Pac-10. If you don't have the D-line keeping guys off of him, you don't have him running around making those tackles. A lot of it is the byproduct of what the defensive ine is doing up front."

But what of Bair's encounters with Spanish? Like in his football career, Bair - a double major in Spanish and business administration — intends to put his language skills to greater use when future opportunities arise.

"That was one of the things I was nervous about when I came home off my mission," Bair said. "If I didn't take it here, I wasn't going to use it. You can't give up something like that."

On the gridiron, as in life, Bair continues to learn, one partido at a time.

everything appears to be in the Bears' favor for this game. While LaMichael James' career-high 152 yards in Oregon's win against Utah last week was impressive, he will have to face a run defense that is ranked tenth in the nation.

If Oregon can get the same sort of success and limit the interceptions that ultimately doomed Minnesota, it will be a ball game.

IT: First off, anyone who thought Oregon would implode after its loss to Boise State didn't really know this team. That being said, it's still hard to predict whether the Ducks will live up to their potential or not. The Bears, on the other hand, have the look of a determined team. 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

Masoli is also confident that this weekend things will turn around.

"We talked after the (Utah) game last week," he said. "And we told each other that it's time to shine."

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
