Withholding the News

It is getting to be old stuff around Oregon State that the elections committee tries to protect unsuccessful politicians by not releasing the primary returns except to the candidates. The Barometer asked for the returns this election, and again was denied the right to publish official returns. We had access to the unofficial results of the candidates, but were requested not to publish them.

When there is news, it should be reported, according to an old precept of the journalist. And the same thesis states any event which involves a group with a large public is immediately open for public comment. An election on this campus is certainly such an event.

The exponents of withholding primary results have long said that they feel some candidates will be publicly embarrassed if the numerical tally is given. They also add that people will get on the band wagon of a sure winner and just fatten an early lead if they know how the primary candidates ranked.

Is Oregon State college such an incubator that we have to protect student politicians from getting hurt even though in real life elections they know very well that their though in real life elections they know very well that their votes will reach the public eye along with those of other candidates?

Many reasons for publishing the results, besides the free public comment idea, are clearly evident. Our elections committee could be fradulent - we certainly don't think they are, but they could be - and declare their friends but they could be - and declare their friends but they could be - and declare their friends primary winners. On another tack, many candidates try to pull through an election on popularity, not definite statements or active campaigning. We think it would make a better election if these people were publicly embarrassed, and thought twice about running for office.


