As managing editor, Poulsen will supervise day and night staffs and be in charge of editorial page organization. Duties of the assistant editor will include doing editorial page make-up and keeping the cut file.

#### News Editor to Work

The news editor will be in charge of news writing assignments and will work with publicity chairmen for campus events. The associate editors will work on the editorial page staff.

The complete staff program will be laid out next fall. Any students interested in Barometer staff work are asked to contact Miss Seibert before leaving school this term if possible, or early fall term. High school experience is sometimes sufficient for lower staff work. A course in journalism (J. 111) is recommended.

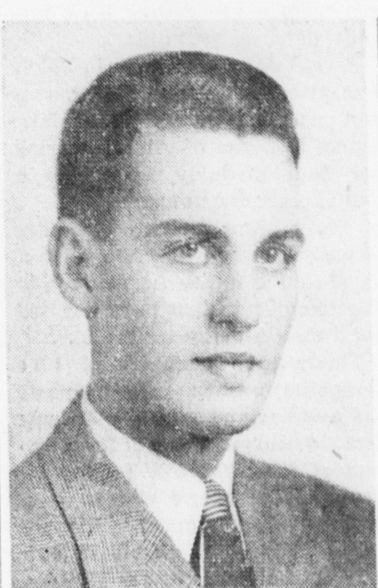

### 200 Commissions Set For Air Force ROTC

Commissions in the air force reserve officers training corps will be limited to a quota of 200 in four options of air science, Col. Rex Beach, professor of air science, has announced.

The options and number of commissions assigned to each are administration and logistics, 45; communications, 25; flight operations, 80; and general technical, 50.

Quotas will first be met in 1954, Col. Beach indicated, unless there are a number of transfers or veterans admitted to the program several years sooner. Sophomore students at Oregon State college have already been selected for entering the two-year advanced program next year, he said.

Administration and logistics deals with organization, publications, stock control, storage, issue, and accounting.

Communications is only open to students in the technical fields of electrical and mechanical engineering. This course concerns wire and radio mediums, and radar and its maintenance.

Flight operations is designed to provide instruction which augments academic phases of training. It will include many methods of equipment operation. The general technical options will point out how the specialists contribute to the accomplishment of assigned missions.

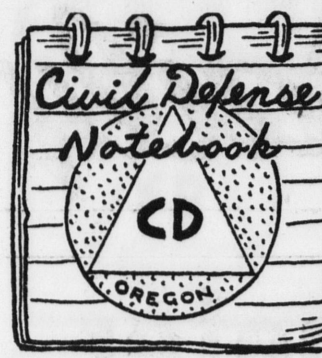

Oregon State's varsity baseball team, now clutching to a precarious first place tie with the University of Washington Huskies, closes out its 1951 diamond season this weekend with a two-game stand against the formidable Oregon Webfoots.

The arch rivals will open the do-or-die series for the Beavers on Howe field in Eugene Friday afternoon and will return to Corvallis for the season's finale Saturday at 2 p.m.

### Ruppe Added To Grid Staff

Newly added to the Oregon State football coaching staff on a part-time basis for next fall is Rudy Ruppe, four-year letterman quarterback and end for the Beavers who completed his eligibility in 1949.

Ruppe, who will graduate this June, assisted with the recently completed spring practice and was praised by Coach Kip Taylor for his work. He will start working towards a master's degree next fall. The former North Bend prep star first came to Oregon State in the fall of 1946 and made the varsity as a freshman. In 1948 he tied for second in the conference in pass receptions with 25. In his senior year he was one of the top defensive backs on the squad.

In the losers' bracket, Heather Rae came back after losing its game to Sackett C to beat Jamestown 5-4 in a game last Thursday and Delta Gamma Monday. The Delta Gamma's got in some good hits but were unable to score.

With this win Sackett C moves into the semi-finals bracket. They will play the winner of the Heather Rae versus Alpha Chi Omega game on Thursday for the tournament championship. If the team in the losing bracket wins, a second game will have to be played.

#### Huskies Have 4 Games Left

However, the Northern Division champion will be decided on the basis of the percentage standings compiled from each team's won-lost record. The Beavers received a rough jolt when their two game series with Idaho was rained out, thus giving the OSC nine fewer games of league play to build up their percentage. As the situation now stands, Washington has four remaining games while the Beavers have just two. Both teams boast identical 8-4 records to date.

The Huskies play cellar-dwelling Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday, then shift to Pullman for a two-day stand against the potent WSC Cougars. To secure the elusive pennant, the Beavers need a double win against the Ducks, while Washington is dropping one of their four games.

#### Beavers Regain Batting Eye

Following a long hitting slump which developed on the ill-fated road trip, the Orange and Black nine regained their batting eye against the Webfoots last Monday. The Staters jumped on three Oregon hurlers for 13 safe blows, including a home run by Captain Gene Tansell.

Coach Ralph Coleman will probably start Right Hander Bailey Brem on the mound Friday and will come back with Southpaw Don White on Saturday. Brem suffered his first ND loss against the Ducks in last Saturday's defeat in Eugene.

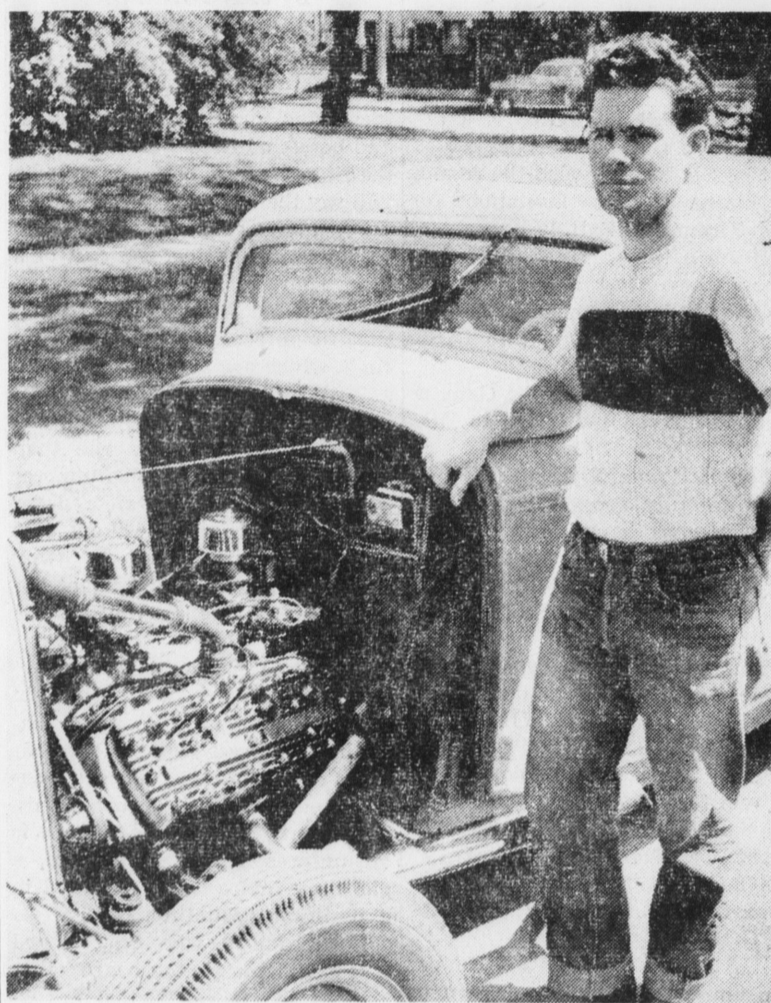
### McNary Takes Lead In Mural Dual Track

McNary hall qualified seven men for the finals in the all-school track preliminaries Tuesday. No field events were run and three of the running events were not run in the prelims because there was not an excessive number entered in the races.

Bill Anderson, McNary, turned in a sparkling 10.2 time in his heat of the century. This proved to be the best time of the season and only .2 of a second off the record.

Mark Groves, McNary, and Carlyle Staab, SN, won their respective heats in the 120 yard low hurdles in identical 14.0 second times. The third heat was won by Gordon Packer, PDT, in 14.1 seconds.

Carlyle Staab, SN, pulled a switch when he ran the 220 yard dash instead of his usual 100. Staab won his heat when he ran the distance in 23.4 seconds. There were only two heats for this race; the second one was taken by Staab's running mate, John Mulligan, also of Sigma Nu. Mulligan was .2 of a second behind Staab at 23.6.

The first heat of the 50 yard high hurdles was won by Jerry Doyle, SC. Doyle ran the tall sticks in 6.9 seconds. Gordon Packer, PDT, broke the tape first in the second heat. His time was 7.0 seconds.

Bill Anderson, McNary, won the first heat of the 100 yard dash in 10.2. The second heat was won by Jack Pinion, TX, in 10.9 seconds.

Favored Sigma Nu turned in the best time in the 800 yard relay. Sigma Nu's time was 1.3 seconds off the record of 1:36.5. Right behind Sigma Nu was McNary at 1:37.0.
